**This leaflet is for anyone wanting to know more about PPC, the role of local councillors and how you can contribute to local planning.**

## What do local councillors do?

Your parish councillors are all volunteers and receive no remuneration for their work. Councillors have three main areas of responsibility:

1. **Decision-making:** through attending meetings and committees with other elected members, councillors decide which activities to support, where money should be spent, what services should be delivered and what policies should be implemented.
2. **Monitoring:** councillors make sure that their decisions lead to efficient and effective services by keeping an eye on how well things are working.
3. **Getting involved locally:** as local representatives, councillors have responsibilities towards their constituents and local organisations. This often depends on what the councillor wants to achieve and how much time is available.

The day-to-day work of a councillor may include:

- going to meetings of local organisations such as tenants' associations
- going to meetings of bodies that affect the wider community such as the police, the Highways Authority or schools
- taking up issues on behalf of members of the public

## What are local councils?

Pitstone Parish Council (PPC) is one of over 8,700 parish, town, community and neighbourhood councils representing around 16 million people across England.

It forms the most local level of government and covers the parish of Pitstone, which reaches along Stocks Road towards Aldbury and right up into Ashridge – a population of approximately 3,500 people.

## How are your local councillors elected?

Local councillors are elected to represent a geographical area known as the parish and serve a 4 year term of office. They are elected by people who live in the area. Our last election took place on 7 May 2015.

When a vacancy arises during the 4 year term, a replacement councillor is appointed to serve the remaining period. All councillors are then subject to re-election at the next election. As the Secretary of State has approved the formation of a new unitary council for Buckinghamshire, all parish elections, along with the new unitary elections, were postponed until May 2020. Central Government then postponed the election until May 2021 due to Covid-19. All existing councillors were remain in their seats and serve the community until the next election.

## Where do we get our money from?

Each year a sum of money called a 'precept' is collected through your council tax. This money is invested back into PPC by AVDC to improve facilities and services for you and your neighbours. PPC can also apply for grants and loans and can receive money from rents or leases.

## What services do we provide?

PPC has an overall responsibility for the well-being of your local neighbourhood.

Our work falls into three main categories:

- representing the local community
- delivering services to meet local needs
- striving to improve quality of life in the parish.

PPC provide and maintain the following services:

- allotments
- bus shelters
- car parks
- Children's play areas on the Recreation Ground, Hever Close and Windsor Road
- dog bins
- emergency planning
- leisure facilities at the sports pavilion and on the recreation ground
- litter bins and litter picking
- providing grants to support local organisations
- seating
- street lighting
- tourism activities
- Youth café
- Community Car Scheme

We worked closely with the Steering Group on the formation of the Neighbourhood Plan, and liaise with relevant third parties towards realising its ambitions.

After April 2015 we took on devolved services from Bucks County Council, including verge grass cutting and footpath maintenance.

We also contribute to the Memorial Hall Charity, which is run by a voluntary committee and are sole trustees to the Pitstone Recreation Ground Charity and Parish Charity.

We work with Aylesbury Vale District Council (AVDC), Buckinghamshire County Council (BCC), Thames Valley Police (TVP) and other organisations such as Community Impact Bucks to ensure the effective delivery of services to the local community such as:

- Comment on planning applications
- Create and maintain foot and cycle paths
- Crime reduction measures
- Bring a range of youth facilities to the village such as Play around the Parishes
- Traffic calming and highway issues
- Licensing issues such as the redevelopment of Quarry 2.
- The Pitstone Development Area.

## How do we make decisions?

PPC is made up of ten councillors who meet monthly to make decisions on the work and direction of the council. As elected bodies local councils are responsible to the people they represent – you.

Attending a council meeting is the best way to find out what we do. Give the parish clerk a call and find out when its next public meeting is scheduled to take place.

Try and attend the Pitstone Annual Assembly which provides a summary of the activity during the year and outlines the major projects evolving over the forthcoming 12 months. This is another opportunity for you to get involved and have your say about the future direction of Pitstone.
