

NEWS DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCIL NEWS

January will be long gone when you read this, but at the time of writing New Year's Resolutions are still fresh in mind. My first resolution was to set up this website independent of the County Council at http://avrildavies.mycouncillor.org.uk/ (done) and write something every week as well as carry on tweeting @avrilpitstone.

The down side of new year is reviewing the list of 2012 unfinished business. The cycleway to Tring Station looks like being set to hang around for a while longer I think, but still very much a live issue on this side of the County boundary. And the cost of travel to school remains a bone of contention with me and many parents. By perseverance, using formal channels of the scrutiny committee, getting the views of head teachers, and with the help of others I have secured the promise of a complete review of the policy early this year, but I need reassurance it is going to really happen.

New year, new plans. Luton airport have submitted their expansion plans to their owners, Luton Borough Council, and can be found on www.eplan.luton.gov.uk application number 12/01400/FUL. The consultation is open until February 18th. Both the County and District Councils will be submitting responses, including the views of councillors and residents.

It's a bad time of year for potholes. Early in December I spent a morning with the County Council highways technician reviewing all the roads in the Division to prioritise planned maintenance for the next financial year. Since then a lot of unplanned maintenance, i.e. potholes, created by early frosts and relentless rain, not to mention heavy badly loaded vehicles, poor reinstatement by gas and electric work, and inadequate maintenance in the past, has totally changed the appearance of local roads.

You can report a pothole, see where the gritters are, and all highway information at the Roadworks Centre http://www.transportforbucks.net/Roadworks-Centre.aspx. Or follow @tfbalerts and see when the gritters are going out or where there are roadworks.

There is good news. The Beacon road was repaired in 2012, and the Travellers Rest roundabout and B488 are priorities for next year. The County, jointly with Herts, has also achieved funding for a high speed broadband programme. Ivinghoe Library, now the Beacon Community Library, has agreed its funding with Bucks County Council. Ivinghoe Village Centre has done a deal also on very favourable terms with the County Council which has enabled it to successfully apply for a big lottery grant to look after the fabric, money the County Council could neither afford, or gain access to. The Freight Quality Partnership Beacon FOP persuaded the cabinet member for transportation that having a strategy for the movement of freight on the roads was a good idea, and has been acted on.

The Great Brickhill, Wing and Ivinghoe Local Area Forum of which I am joint Chair has been very successful in 2012. The priorities workshop brought people from all the parishes together to join together on projects to reduce speeding, improve footpaths, and facilities for young people. Innovative ways have been found to achieve projects, very often using pooled resources and money from several council services and outside grant giving bodies. The community speedwatch has taken off thanks to dedicated volunteers and shown that as well as speed restrictions, other road safety measures are essential.

There are some speeding and danger hotspots, for example in Wing and in Edlesborough, which the speed limit review failed to address. In 2012 the Local Area Forum is going to tackle these matters through the speeding sub group, and footpaths and cycleways through another working group.

This year I will continue to serve on the Strategic Planning Committee and the Economy and Business Development Scrutiny Committee at Aylesbury Vale District Council where I am deputy group leader and shadow spokesperson for economic development; and on the County on both the Scrutiny Commissioning Committee and the Health Overview and Scrutiny Committee where I am also deputy group leader and shadow spokesperson for Health and Wellbeing. At the County all meetings are webcast, and each member's contribution can be searched for here http://www.buckscc.public-i.tv/core/

New play space and skate park for the recreation ground

The Parish Council is yet to appoint a company to provide a new skate park. For a variety of reasons and despite everyone's best attempts the initial tender process did not achieve the desired outcome for the community.

It remains the Parish Council's intent to source a skate park that is both challenging and exciting for the local BMX, skateboard and scooter riders, landscaped into the previously defined space on the recreation ground that is illuminated via timercontrolled floodlights.

To gain additional support, the Parish Council intends to enter into an agreement with Aylesbury Vale District Council (AVDC) to manage the procurement and installation exercise on our behalf. We hope this will benefit the project given they have their own in-house team of engineers, landscape architects, legal professionals (including procurement experts), and a dedicated Leisure Department that have experience of successfully procuring sport and play facilities and services. We consider that AVDC will be far better placed to ensure that Pitstone Parish benefits from a well designed and competitively procured facility.

The District Council will work closely with the Parish Council and a representative of the skate park user group to ensure they prepare a well defined initial brief for the tender. The work that has already gone into the project, including the commissioned geotechnical and topographical reports, will also become part of that documentation. At the start of 2013, AVDC intend to advertise

for expressions of interest for the skate park and anticipate this to be installed during the course of the year.

Whilst we appreciate that the delay is frustrating, we hope you will agree that as this project is costing in excess of £100,000 that it is vital that the right facility is procured for the most economically advantageous price.

In the meantime, the Parish Council hope to progress with removing the old playground equipment and installing the new play space, leaving the skate park site prepared and available when the procurement exercise is complete.

Flashing Speeding Signs (mVAS)

Our mobile vehicle activated sign is on order, the County Council has carried out the necessary road surveys and we are in the process of confirming the exact positions and logistics of moving the equipment around each month. The ground anchors will be installed first, at each of the four locations (Marsworth Road, Westfield Road, Cheddington Road and Vicarage Road) and then we hope to get the scheme up and running as soon as possible.

Bus Shelters for Westfield Road

We hope that you are finding the new bus stops along Westfield Road convenient. Neither Arriva nor the County Council provide bus shelters to support the bus service, so the parish council intends to purchase shelters to match the existing ones within the village for these stops. Each shelter costs approximately £5,000 to purchase and install, so the cost will be borne over several years and is subject to securing

the necessary permissions.

The first two, on the housing side of Westfield Road (ie travelling towards Tring and Aylesbury), for both the Warwick Road and Harlech Road stops, will hopefully be installed by March/April this year. These stops appear more popular than the ones on the industrial side, travelling towards Luton, and will have the added benefit that the senior school children will be able to shelter from the wind & rain whilst waiting for the morning school bus.

Dog bins

Please note that the dog bins are for use only by dog walkers clearing up whilst out on their dog walks. Other dog waste from home should be appropriately wrapped and placed in the general waste bin (green one) for disposal by the fortnightly refuse collection.

A small minority of dog owners appear to be stockpiling their animal's weekly/monthly faecal output and placing it either in or near the dog bins, causing them to overflow. This presents a hygiene and an environmental risk for everyone else, as well as being very unpleasant to all who have to live near or walk by it.

Please refrain from doing so and if you see anyone "fly tipping" their dog waste in this way please contact the Parish Council who will take necessary action.

Dog mess



Whilst on the matter of dog waste there remains a minority of dog walkers who appear to think it acceptable to not clear up at all after their dogs. This situation is getting worse and it is difficult to effectively police, beyond ongoing appeals to people's general standards of public decency. If you see someone not clearing up after their dog please report it. Please help to keep pride in our village and do not just turn a blind eye – it is frankly disgusting to not clear up after your dog, whatever the circumstances – just because it is dark or early in the

morning and you can't see anyone looking, it doesn't mean you should just leave it – you know who you are!

Pitstone Community Film Club Update



Following the announcement of the Film Club in the last issue of the magazine lots of things have been going on in the back-

ground but, unfortunately, everything has taken a bit longer than we'd hoped.

We are now signed up to an organisation that will allow us to properly licence films for screening, and we have built and tested a 5.5 metre wide screen that can be taken apart and assembled when required. Our projection surface is a huge piece of Lycra (enough to clothe about 35 cyclists). To give some idea of scale the screen is almost as wide as the Memorial Hall stage.

We are now waiting for the final piece of the jigsaw puzzle, a film to show! Our plan is to start off by showing recent releases and, due to all the studios pushing out their DVD's in time for Christmas, we decided to wait for a new year release that people are less likely to have seen.

As soon as we find something good we'll be advertising around the village and on the website.

Street lights

In December 2012 the Parish Council were informed by Transport for Bucks who maintain the street lights in Marsworth Road and the Lower Icknield Way that the lantern or luminaire which hovers over the middle of the roundabout has come to the end of its natural life. Also due to two underground cable faults the 'Keep Left' signs on the roundabout had been 'dark' for a number of weeks . These faults, if they have not already been, are due to be repaired soon.

A number of traffic bollards along this stretch of road have been attacked, in recent months, which has seen them detached from their base and either left lying poleaxed in the road or carried off as a trophy. Interfering with a bollard turns it into a hazard rather than a road safety feature. Shame on those responsible, who put their and others lives at risk and waste every resource needed to repair their stupidity on what is a busy route through the village.

WILLIAMSON TRUST

ISSUE OF GRANTS IN 2013 FOR THOSE AGED 65 AND OVER

Residents of the parish aged **65 and over** receive a grant distributed by the Williamson Trust on an annual basis. In 2012 individual grants were maintained at the same level as in the previous year. (£45 paid for a couple in the same household or £35 for someone qualifying singly.) The amount to be awarded in 2013 is likely to be of a similar amount. The trustees, anticipate sending out this year's award during the last week of March.

As a point of interest when the charity was established in the 1970's it was stipulated that individuals grants should not exceed £50.

If you are currently 64 years of age your birthday has to fall before the 1st April 2013 for you to qualify this year.

If you know someone of 65+ living in the parish, please discuss this grant with them. Anyone who has previously declined an award can alert us if they want to change their mind.

The trustees are currently writing to the Charity Commission to add Peter Loose and Mark Robinson, who recently joined the Pitstone Town Lands Charity, to the board of the Williamson Trust.

Newly qualified residents and those 65+ that have moved to Pitstone, in the last twelve months, should make themselves known to a trustee. Grants are not means tested we require only your name, address and date of birth.



The bags will be taken away and weighed, and then the total weight will be converted in to cash. The scheme will also generate an income through rental of the activity space, cafe area, and charges for use of the IT room to enable the enterprise to become self-sustainable.

Carol Tarrant, Chair of Ivinghoe SOS said: "The award from the Big Lottery Fund is an enabler and a confidence booster, as it will triumphantly kick start our Community led refurbishment and equipping of Ivinghoe's Old Victorian School building into our vibrant new Community Hub - a place to halve our isolation and double our happiness! Simply congregating in our new cafe and taking part in activities for all generations, wherein we explore creating new communication channels for ourselves - building resilience to keep us more hopeful well into the future!"

Village SOS, grants of between £10,000 and £50,000 have been awarded to help rural communities with less than 3,000 people develop plans for enterprising projects that will answer a local need or improve services for local people.

Big Lottery Fund Head of South East region Sacha Rose-Smith said: "These fantastic projects show what can be achieved when a community pulls together towards a single goal. With the rural way of life under threat from various factors, Village SOS has provided vital support for all sorts of community-run social enterprises."

By the time this article has gone to press we will be choosing a local builder whose costed plans fit best with our community pocket and will have commissioned them to quickly and thoroughly complete the refurbishment from the topmost roof chimneys, inside insulation and decoration to lowest under floor drains, inside and out windows and doors refurbishment – electricity wiring and sub metering, water pipes, heaters and gas heating throughout! For all this work, we have been busy with more grant applications meanwhileand of course have some final work for volunteers to take us into being ready for final touches and our welcoming open day in the Spring of 2013!

All this has been achieved by a series of skilled villagers giving their skills and time to support us in turn at a 'relay' of informative subcommittee meetings over the last nineteen months....and without whose help none of this would have been possible. These local diverse skills, including also the many 'people persons' who kept the project gossip open and positively informative and inclusive, have got us where we are now, thank you every one!

SOS Ivinghoe is now a voluntary community Trustee group, in charge of a 25 year Lease through Community Asset Transfer from BCC of our Community Old School building to use for our communities 'not for private profit 'additional community hub with activities

voted for by yourselves, and provided and run by our local theatre Business 'Flametree Community Ltd' run by Liz Raba and Joley Roberts, next to the affordable and welcoming community café - open most hours- 'CuriosiTea Rooms' run by local mum Hayley Wesley.

So with all the profits being ploughed back into community use, we pledge to be fully transparent in our financial and community affairs and will post up our actions on our website www.ivinghoeoldschool.com, as well as in Beacon Villages Community Library, Ivinghoe - with links to other relevant websites like the new parish council one also.

All that is left to say now is that we wish to thank you for all your support and invite you to be some of the first through the door in the spring to help us make the opening a triumph and then be part of the on-going use for ever more!

Other projects who received awards outside of our area

An historical building in the village of Combe Oxfordshire will soon be opening its doors to a host of new community activities thanks to a £50,000 award. Combe Coffee House project will restore a community space that will provide new facilities such as a cafe, an internet point, a small shop selling locally grown produce to generate income, and an exhibition area where people can learn about the heritage of the area. The scheme will also provide a workshop area for teaching new skills including crafts and furniture recycling.

Roger Purssell, Trustee Combe Reading Room said: "The trustees of Combe Reading Room are delighted to have received this generous award of £50,000 from such a prestigious programme as Village SOS. These funds provide a splendid start to our project and will hopefully lead to our securing the balance which will enable us to complete the work on behalf of the villagers of Combe."

Also awarded today are East Sussex project, Ripe Village Stores Community Shop and Post

Office with £43,460 to fit out and establish a community run shop taking over the building of the previous commercial shop. The enterprise which will provide a much needed facility and central hub for the community will also generate income through sales of a range of products.

While Cafe on the Rec enterprise in Drayton Parslow, Buckinghamshire receives over £23,000 for a project to renovate the kitchen area of the local sports club and set up a community cafe to give the village community a social venue to meet up and enjoy a coffee and a chat. The enterprise will generate funds for self sustainability through sales of coffee shop products

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


News of these events will of course be given out at monthly meetings.

If we are so happy there, why change the venue? Well, whilst we are still relatively small in number, our main focus is increase in size and step out into new areas of community activities. The Lounge does not allow for this sort of expansion, there are no facilities for Sunday School or families to attend and be properly accommodated. So the Trustees proposed to the membership that we change venue to the Millennium as a first step to widening the work and being more accessible for families to attend. Also, so that we are now situated at what will hopefully be the centre of the village of Pitstone and the Castlemead estate.

Tales from the Compost Heap

Readers cannot fail to have noticed that we have had an awful lot of rain this past year, in places nearly 30% more than normal. But how much of this rain has found its way into your compost heap?

This time of year, with cooler temperatures, your home heap naturally does its work more slowly – this is to be expected, and is not a problem. However, it is altogether possible that your heap is either too wet (if you have the more open kind, made with pallets or wire mesh) or too dry (if you have the enclosed, plastic dalek type). Correcting the moisture content of your heap will help it along through those cold winter months. You can apply a simple test – take a handful of the mixture, and squeeze it. Maybe put your Marigolds on first. It should feel as damp as a wrung-out sponge. If it feels too dry, leave the lid off your bin and wait for it to rain (on present form, you won't have to wait all that long). Also, you could consider adding more green materials – peelings and so on.

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Don't forget to replace the lid after a suitable amount of rain has fallen. Otherwise you may get the opposite problem – an overly wet heap. If your compost is too wet, the air spaces in your heap become clogged up, which restricts the supply of oxygen to those organisms which do the work. Your mix may feel slimy, and smell bad. The solution? Add more brown material – crumpled paper and cardboard, straw, dried leaves – egg boxes are particularly good as they have built-in air pockets.

Get it right, and your heap will chug along slowly through the winter. As ever, it's all a matter of getting the balance right.

Love Food Hate Waste - Recipe Time

Love Food Hate Waste aims to raise awareness of the need to reduce food waste, and help us to take action. It aims to show that by doing some easy practical everyday things in the home, we can all waste less food – which will ultimately benefit our purses and the environment.

Check out their website for recipes and practical tips – www.lovefoodhatewaste.com. Here is a recipe for a warming winter casserole, which can be adapted to your taste and to use up whatever vegetables you have.

Chop one large onion and 4 sticks of celery finely, and cook in 2tbs of oil in a large frying pan till softened. Then add $\frac{1}{2}$ a swede (or a few small turnips), 3 parsnips and 3 carrots – all diced. Also around 110 grams of mushrooms. Keep frying and stirring for a further 5 minutes. Make up 425mls of vegetable stock, and stir in 2tsps of peanut butter; add this to the vegetables in the pan, with some herbs – maybe a bay leaf, some dried marjoram, dried sage and/or dried rosemary. Finally add a tin of chopped tomatoes and a tin of red kidney beans, and put the mixture into a casserole dish. Cover and cook for 11/2 hours, at 200 degrees centigrade, or Gas Mark 6.

Neighbourhood Police Update: Wing, Great Brickhill & Ivinghoe District

Update from PC Steve Brisley

Firstly your Neighbourhood Policing Team would like to wish you all a Happy New Year and hope you enjoyed the festive period. The team have been busy focusing on our Wintertime Burglary Campaign. Hopefully most of you would have seen us out and about walking in villages particularly around the Cheddington, Pitstone and Edlesborough areas. We have been proactively reminding residents of at risk properties. We have supplied a vast number of crime prevention packs including timers for switching on lights. These are a valuable as-

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set to safeguard your property, as the appearance of someone being in may be enough to prevent a burglar from attacking your property. We would urge anyone leaving lights on to also shut their curtains so that no one can see into your property. If you have been supplied with one of these packs and would like any assistance please contact a member of the team who will be happy to help.

Additionally what has been noticed is the amount of garage doors being left open whilst residents go back in doors. This may seem petty, but all it takes is for an offender to simply walk by, seize the opportunity and suddenly you find yourself a victim of crime.

Speeding continues to also be on our priority list. PC Levens conducted speeding operations in Ivinghoe, Dagnall and Cheddington. Also present was a representative from the Road Safety Team at Bucks County Council. A drink drive operation was conducted in Wing by PC Ingram. Several motorists were breathalysed but no arrests were made, which is a good indicator that the 'do not drink and drive' message is getting through.

On another note, PCSO Wendy Taylor from the Winslow Team held a Have Your Say meeting last month where it emerged numerous drivers' licences had expired. It would be a timely reminder to all drivers to check their licence to make sure it is still valid. If you have an out of date licence, then your insurance is invalid and if driven you risk your vehicle being impounded at a considerable cost. It is your responsibility to check your licence is valid.

Fly tipping

Fly tipping continues to be a problem in most rural areas and the police, together with AVDC, will deal robustly with any offenders. Did you know you can report fly tipping via the AVDC website www.aylesburyvaledc.gov.uk who will make arrangements to have rubbish removed.

Theft from vehicles

This is usually more of a summer issue in beauty spots; however, we continue to receive reports of theft from vehicles. Most commonly, owners have left a valuable item in the vehicle such as a sat nav (or even the cradle on the windscreen) which then attracts a criminal. Unfortunately, most of these offences go unwitnessed and happen in the most remote of areas, do not be complacent and think just because you happen to be in a beautiful part of the countryside, something won't get stolen. Anyone seen acting suspiciously around vehicles must be reported to us on 999 so that officers can get there quickly and challenge the suspicious person(s).

Reports of people who have been contacted by fraudsters claiming to be from Action Fraud

Conmen frequently impersonate officials in an attempt to convince people that their offer is genuine. We are aware of a recent scam where fraudsters impersonate an Action Fraud

representative to trick people into sending money.

The caller states that they are from Action Fraud and that the person they are calling is entitled to compensation from a recent incident. The scammer then asks for money to be sent via a Ukash voucher in order to process the compensation claim. The amount asked for is usually in the range of £200 to £400.

Action Fraud is warning people not to pay these bogus telephone callers; there is no way to retrieve Ukash payments as they are in effect cash transactions. This is a scam. You will lose your money.

Action Fraud is in no way affiliated with these scammers and would never under any circumstances be involved in processing claims for compensation. The genuine Action Fraud is the UK's national fraud reporting centre where consumers can report if they have been scammed or defrauded. You can report fraud using www.actionfraud.police.uk.

Thanks to Shelim and team at the Haldi for their hospitality. The Bell's certainly had a new lease of life and we're all very pleased.





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
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Pitstone Car Scheme



DO YOU have difficulty travelling to hospital or other healthcare appointments?

CAN WE help?

Pitstone Community Car Scheme is a new scheme offering a service for residents who have difficulty travelling to healthcare appointments.

The scheme is run by volunteers who use their own cars to drive residents to local hospitals or other healthcare appointments (for example, the opticians, dentist or physiotherapist).

There is a small charge for the service to cover the volunteer's petrol and car parking expenses. To make it easier, a set tariff has been worked out in advance for typical journeys to local hospitals. If you need to access healthcare in another town, eg Hemel Hempstead, the cost will be advised at the time of booking the trip.

In some circumstances, we may be able to undertake hospital trips to the John Radcliffe or Nutfield hospitals. Please contact the number below if you are having difficulty accessing transport to these hospitals.
