The Spring gave us a good show of daffodils along Marsworth Road. What a good indication of the village working together and what can be done.

The weather has finally improved and we are slowly drying out which was an ideal opportunity for the Parish Council to clear the surplus spoil heap at the top of the allotments. This has enabled the Allotment Association to create four extra plots and now only leaves one resident on the waiting list.

Many of you will have noticed builders vans, skips etc outside the Memorial Hall. The gents and ladies toilets, plus the kitchen, have all been replaced and updated which were long overdue. Congratulations to the Hall Management Committee, and especially the Secretary, Mrs Laurie Eagling who has worked tirelessly to obtain funding from various sources to the sum of £45,000 to complete these much needed improvements.

Over the last four or five years Luton Airport has been planning expansion. It was finally agreed to increase its flight traffic by 80% (10m to 18m flights per year) without any local consultation. It seems ironic that the owner of Luton Airport is Luton Town Council who is also the local Planning Authority for the airport. Surely this is questionable. However the Secretary of State appointed an Independent QC to oversee and adjudicate the whole proceedings and it is proceeding. Unfortunately flight movements over Pitstone are going to increase substantially. I suppose we should be thankful that we are under the landing flight path and not the take off— we will monitor this carefully and comment where appropriate.

The Parish Council, again this year has entered Pitstone into "The Best Kept Village Competition". Judging takes place in June and I am sure that everybody will do their bit to keep the village looking as good as it does. Last year we were placed in the 'Highly Commended' section, which was praise enough. Finally everlasting thanks to our three litter pickers who work tirelessly in all weathers to keep the village as free of litter as possible. Bob Saintey.

COUNCIL NEWS



DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCIL NEWS

It's annual report time once again, so, looking back over this County Council year I would sum it up as being all about change. Never have I been more inundated with so much information. Local, operational information embedded with the local, operational information for other far flung parts, and also with top level strategic information.

The County Council delivers services, often in partnerships with others, in the following areas: transport and rights of way, some aspects of planning and environment including waste disposal, Adult services, older people, **some health and mental health, Children's** services including education but not schools, Community services such as libraries museums, and with others community safety, public health, Economic Development.

HS2 (high speed rail)

Much time, money and energy has gone in to the anti HS2 campaign this year and previous years, although all the judicial reviews **brought by the 'M52' group of local authori**ties were lost. Recently the council voted unanimously to 'petition' for mitigation measures, which is really important, and **where the County's legal and planning ex**pertise can really make a difference.

Council Tax

All Councils have been permitted to raise council tax by up to 1.99%, without going to prohibitively costly referendum, so the County Council decided to raise the tax to the maximum. My group made alliance with UKIP and voted against this. I strongly felt this was gesture politics; they raised the tax in tough times for people because they could, not because it was necessary.

By increasing the council tax they turned down £2M from the government in council tax freeze grant which would have been continued in future years, and took £3M from Buckinghamshire residents pockets instead. The differential, just under £1M, could have been found from unused contingencies, and the 'generous' reserves. The total County Council budget is more than £300M.

School Transport

The charges introduced two years ago are set to be increased. One of the largest 'savings' in the budget is from this area, with very few changes being made as a result of

Innovation and good practice

Since 2010 the county have cut a third of their budget without total collapse of services. Instead they have won new grant funding, for roads in particular, and made far reaching changes to how services are delivered. One approach is to 'demand manage' - prevent people from needing services in future. Three programmes led by the council but in partnership with others are proving very successful in this. Families First working with 600 families identified as high service users, Prevention Matters - helping keep older people independent, and a programme to reduce the impact of the welfare reforms on services and the users of those services

Public Health

This year has been the first year that the Council has had full responsibility for the public health service. Although the Council was shortlisted by the Local Government Chronicle for how the service was being embedded in to service delivery, the Peer review singled the service out for criticism, saying it used its budget very much in the old medical model rather than on improving health outcomes for people through other services, such as education, economy and environment.

LGA (Local Government Association) Peer review

A recently completed review of BCC by a team of officers and councillors from other similar local authorities, praised these innovative programmes, as well as the County's use of the Better Care Fund to provide joint community health and social care services. Page 4

'Future Shape'

In a programme called 'Future Shape' more and more functions will be transferred to independent or semi independent bodies like the new Bucks Learning Trust, Buckinghamshire Care, and Transport for Bucks, a new Museum Trust is being formed, a Country Park Trust. Not forgetting the majority of secondary schools are already Academies.

This new, indirect, method of service delivery, even if clear governance structures are in place challenges the transparency and accountability of public services.

Roads and Potholes

Dissatisfaction with the state of the roads is constant. Over £500K has been spent in this division (lvinghoe) on road repairs and improvements from the revenue budget, so that is in addition to any capital expenditure. Each member can nominate three roads for repair. I asked for a full breakdown for the county by member division and some of the biggest spend was in lvinghoe, Wing, and Great Brickhill.

In January TfB repaired 4,431 potholes across the whole County, of which 2,381 were in need of urgent repair. In February all resources were diverted to flooding.

More money still has come in to the budget last week, for more piecemeal schemes, but at last the County are considering a more fundamental approach to upgrading the road network with capital spending – lessons learned from the success of the prevention programmes elsewhere I hope.

Grass Cutting comes under this area. Last year the verge cutting was distinctly unsatisfactory. This year the same contractors have

been engaged for some reason, for 3 cuts outside village signs and 10 cuts within. Please be vigilant to see that happens. Parishes should consider taking this work on themselves.

Local Area Forum (LAF)

We have yet to see how our LAF will manage without Jackie Wesley to ensure things happen. She will be sorely missed and I thank her for the fantastic work she has done for the three divisions of Wing, Great Brickhill and Ivinghoe. Paul Hodson has been assigned to our area. We have also had a change in our Local Area Technician. We will miss Paul Foot, but his replacement Rob Anderson, is up for the challenge.

Community Leaders Fund

This year the fund was divided between the lvinghoe Village centre, to complete the internal decorations, BBOWT at College Lake to support the publication and launch of Graham Atkins book on the creation of **College Lake, and The Villager, Slapton's** newsletter which is on line as well as on paper.

Beacon Villages Community Library

The library has had a successful year and has



recently extended its opening hours to Wednesday morning. Many thanks to librarian Shelle, all the volunteers, the fudge makers, Fran-

ces who is running the DVD scheme, and the hard working committee members under the leadership of Emma Huxley. I enjoy the time I can spend supporting them, and particularly want to mention how much I

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Update from the Pitstone Annual Assembly

This is an annual meeting for the community, and not a council meeting, although it legally has to be chaired by the parish council chairman and includes updates from the parish council (which you can read about in the Annual Report section of this PPP). If **you don't follow the regular updates on the** village website or Parish Council page, it is a good way of keeping up to date with developments around the parish.

This year, we had a fascinating talk by the **'bat man', Lawrence Trowbridge from Na**tional Trust, explaining how we can all help to protect these fabulous creatures who help to keep our crops and gardens free of insects and pollinate our plants, but are unfortunately under threat from predation, crime and loss of habitat.

The assembly commenced with the announcement of the Pitstone Volunteer of the Year 2014 —more details below.

Mr Keith Steers delivered an educational talk about the role and importance of Community First Responders to the health and welfare of our community and urged people to sign up as volunteers. You can read more about both of these in other sections of PPP.

Thames Valley Police were pleased to advise us that our community is very safe, with extremely low levels of crime. County & District Councillor Avril Davies provided an update on the issues affecting both these tiers of government and the work she has been involved in. Mr Mark Roberts, Chairman of the Memorial Hall Charity, talked to everyone about the huge amount of modernisation and development that has been happening at the hall and encouraged everyone to come and see the improvements for themselves.

There was a plea from the 1st lvinghoe & Pitstone Cubs and Scouts for more volunteer helpers to join both the weekly sessions and the management committee otherwise they are in danger of closing. We also heard updates about the club for those new to computing, the success of the new **Community Cinema, Pitstone's youth cafe** and the planning permission recently granted to expand Luton Airport to accommodate up to 18 million passengers per year.

If you missed it this year, we hope to see you at the next meeting. Perhaps you'd like to come along and provide an update about the local club you are involved with?

PPP caught up with Brian who tells us a little more about him and his background...

VOLUNTEER OF THE YEAR

The Parish Council annually invites nominations to be put forward from anyone within the Parish of Pitstone, to be recognised as **'volunteer of the year'.**

It is a small gesture to recognise the many individuals within the community who give their time voluntarily to good causes, in service of others. Sometimes nominations are for particular contributions over the last 12 months, other times for longer contributions that may have spanned many years. This year The Parish Council received three nominations for consideration, which were discussed at its meeting on 9th January 2014.

The 2014 winner was unanimously agreed by the council to be Mrs Mary Saintey of Pitstone, who was nominated for her 25 years service to the Pitstone charities, as a Trustee and latterly chairperson.

Mary accepted the award at the Annual Assembly, held on Tuesday 13th May 2014 at Pitstone Memorial Hall.

PPP caught up with Mary who described the significant changes she had witnessed over a quarter of a century, most notably the ever increasing demands that the Charity Commission places on all the Trustees on how they must discharge their duties. Mary describes a very different charity to that which she first became involved with, with the acquisition of land interests over recent years which have further added to the complexities of being a voluntary Trustee. Mary served as chairperson for 7 years prior to retiring in 2013.

It has to be reported that Mary was very reluctant to accept this award for herself something she knew nothing about - preferring to go unrecognised. However, she agreed to accept it on the condition that it was most certainly not for herself, but in recognition of all of the Trustees who devote themselves—past and present—to running the charities. This sentiment has to be admired and reflects the attitudes of many of our local volunteers—thank you to them all. Nominations are now open for 2015—please submit them to the Parish Clerk.

Enhanced access to Play equipment

The parish council is always striving to ensure our play provision meets the local needs of all users. The new play space planned for the recreation ground will include a wide variety of features for those with disabilities. If you have a child with special needs that would benefit from a specific addition to our facilities, please advise the parish clerk directly.

Time to start grass cutting -Transport for Bucks

Our new programme has started. With Spring in the air, we have begun our annual grass cutting progamme. Grass cutting takes place during the summer months and is carried out to provide good visibility in order to ensure safety for road users. The programme is split into two parts - urban and rural.

Urban grass cutting refers to verges within 30 and 40 mph speed limit signs. Rotary blade mowers are used for this work. This year, we are carrying out this work ourselves, rather than using an outside contractor, allowing cost savings and a more efficient programme. We have nine crews with three men in each who work through the season and will carry out six scheduled cuts for urban areas, which is one cut every five weeks.

Rural grass cutting refers to verges between village and town name signs. This year two scheduled cuts including 'rural vision splays' (cutting of grass around road junctions) will be carried out by TfB's contract partner, Robert North.

Cut grass is not routinely collected, but will be cleared from footpaths using hand blowers where possible. Pitstone's new Community First Responders

Have you ever thought about what you would do if you were faced with a situation where someone needed immediate emergency treatment in front of you? What would you do?

We would hope that most people would probably dial 999 and stay with the patient offering comfort and re-assurance until emergency help arrives.

In the surrounding villages the response time of an ambulance could be up to 15 - 20 minutes. "With some emergencies every minute counts".

That is where Community First Responders are vital. When you dial 999, control will know how far the nearest ambulance is and as we carry trackers when on call, they will also know how far we are. We are dispatched by control at the same time as the ambulance, but being local our response time is much faster in most cases within 8 minutes. Our duty is to preserve life, to start life support and to administer emergency treatment, to reassure the patient and monitor their condition until such time as the ambulance

arrives.

Each CFR (when on duty) is equipped with a defibrillator, oxygen and an emergency kit. We are fully trained in the use of this equipment and are regularly re-assessed.

So could you be a Community First Responder? Are you calm under pressure? Can you work under your own initiative? Do you drive and own a vehicle? And are you over 18 yrs of age.

The selection process comprises of a home visit from a trainer to assess your suitability. Arranging insurance cover on your own personal vehicle. Attending a two day training course and followed by three shifts on an emergency ambulance. Training courses are then re-attended every six months on a one day refresher course.

The cost to the ambulance service for your training and kit is £3k. Currently CFRs can book on call whenever they wish, but this may be soon changing with a compulsory amount of hours per month that CFRs have to do.

This is a non paid community role, the rewards of this role is being able to assist a fellow human being in their hour of need. Saving a life has No price.

Pitstone currently has two CFRs covering Pitstone, lvinghoe, Cheddington, Marsworth and other local areas. Keith Steers (pictured left above) and Jonathon Horn (pictured right above).

At the end of last term, we were unfortunately sad to say goodbye to Lana Race and Tracey Spivey. Lana was previously our Setting Leader before going off to have her baby, and she played a huge role in Windmill **being awarded 'outstanding' by Ofsted in** 2011. Both were very valued members of the team who will be missed greatly by the children and committee. We wish them both well in in their new roles and in all their future endeavours.

We are delighted to announce Sharon Berry will be returning to Windmill after the Easter break. Her role will be as a Practitioner working as part of the team under our new Leader's management. Changes within the setting

Existing parents will have noticed that there have been a lot of significant changes taking place within the setting over the last few months. We thank you for your continued patience and support during the periods of change but please rest assured that our **'learning through play' ethos continues to** have a positive effect on the children in our care. If you have any questions relating to any of the changes, please feel free to speak to a member of staff or make an appoint**ment to speak to me or the setting's new** Leader Kate.

Session availability and Admissions

It is never too early to get your child's name on the waiting list – don't forget we take children from the age of two – so we strongly recommend that you do this well in advance of wanting a place – even if you don't plan to enrol your child until they be-

come funded (the term after they turn three). This will prove favourable when there are children of the same age waiting for a place, especially when places will be offered to those who have been on the waiting list longer. To register your interest, please email our Administrator Claire Hose at admin@windmillpreschool.co.uk.

We start the Summer Term with a few places available on Friday afternoons. More sessions will become available in September when our older children leave us to start school. With the continuing expansion of the village, there is great demand for sessions and we strictly adhere to a policy on allocation of places. For parents with children at Pre-School, if your preferred sessions are not available you can request that your child's name be placed on a waiting list. As places become available they are offered to the child at the top of the waiting list. If the parent does not wish to take up the session offered, they remain at the top of the list and the next child is offered the place. This process continues until the place has been allocated. Priority is given to funded two year olds and children with Special Educational Needs if extra sessions are thought to be beneficial. These children are offered available places before those on the waiting list as are children of staff and committee members.

During the final term of this academic year, we have some great events planned, which we hope you will support:

June: Ivinghoe church fete / annual sponsored walk around the villages July: Textile Recycling / sports day

Most of our events are open to everyone, so not just parents with children at Windmill and we hope that we can count on your

PITSTONE MEMORIAL HALL CELEBRATE GRANT SUCCESS

The Committee at Pitstone Memorial Hall Charity have recently been successful in their bid to obtain funding from two grant suppliers, towards refurbishment work to the kitchen and toilets in the original part of the hall building. This project received £15,151 of funding from the Aylesbury Vale Community Chest towards refitting the toilets, kitchen and insulating the loft of the main function hall. The Big Lottery Fund awarded £7,200 towards the renovation and refurbishment of the main building toilets.

Although minor redecoration work had been undertaken in recent years to these areas the overall situation has been that no major upgrade to these particular facilities had taken place for well over 40 years making them look tired unattractive and at times simply not functional to the many users and hirers within the community. These major works form the final phase of a longer refurbishment project to bring the hall facilities up to modern standards which has seen the installation of dedicated disabled toilet facilities, provision of baby change facilities, a microphone system for the main hall, disabled access ramps to all entrances & exits, conversion of all exit doors & internal doors to meet the latest Fire Regulations, installation of CCTV and a fire detection system, refitting & refurbishing the changing rooms and referee room, replacement soffits and roof repairs, replacement windows and the installation of Wi-Fi.

Chairman, Mark Roberts, says "As Trustees we are naturally delighted and grateful that both the Community Chest and the Big Lottery Fund have chosen to fund these works which will undoubtedly be welcomed within the Community and will serve all hirers and local groups well into the future, as well as to encourage a wider audience to consider the Pitstone Memorial Hall as a venue of choice."

The charity would also like to thank all those who supported the Party in the Park fundraising event last summer, including the Pitstone Social Club. This event raised over £3,000 **towards this refurbishment project at the Memorial Hall.** This year's event is being held on 12 July 2014 the charity hope that the whole community will come along to view the improvements delivered through this project for themselves. Works on the toilets and kitchen have now commenced and it is anticipated that the project will be completed in four to six weeks.

More about the Pitstone Memorial Hall Charity:

Registered Charity Number 300318. Founded 13 September 1921 to provide and maintain the village hall for meetings, classes, recreation and leisure with the object of improving the conditions of life for the inhabitants of our rural community. The hall, in its current location, was built in 1972.

Williamson Trust and Pitstone Town Lands Charity

Pitstone Town Lands Charity exists to support people living in the parish of Pitstone generally or individually who are in need, hardship or distress. The charity makes grants and discretionary payments for items, services or facilities when no other organisation can help. This support is mainly provided to older people but grants may also be paid to people in need under the age of 65 where there is a genuine need. For a long time, the trustees have regarded people of pension age as among those most in need and have assisted with grants for glasses, dental care and chiropody.

Until recently, it was often difficult to access NHS dental care, but as a result of changes by the government, this has changed in recent years and there are now local dentists able to accept new referrals for NHS treatment. Therefore the trustees have elected to limit all payments for dental treatment to the NHS rates which are now:

At the close of the year the council holds £167,547. £97,578 is reserved for specific purposes or with restricted spending ability (like maintenance payments from Taylor Wimpey) leaving £69,969 of retained reserve. The council is financially independent with no loans, lease payments or debts.

Changes to the Localised Council Tax Support system are affecting the funding stream for parish councils and will impact on the Council Tax values for the coming years.

Frustrating Year

There have been a number of issues relating to key projects which has resulted in implementation delays (and therefore postponed expenditure). Including:

- A delay to the leisure development project (The parish council is waiting for the discharge of planning conditions from Aylesbury Vale District Council (AVDC) relating to the play space; we are beholden to the landowner to resolve a land issue before the **skate park procurement can commence and the MUGA can't be progressed until** alternative car parking is available for the Memorial Hall as part of the Pitstone Development Area (PDA) plan).
- Taylor Wimpey declined permission for the parish council to install bus shelters and mVAS points along Westfield Road until they have completed transfer of the highways to Bucks County Council (BCC). BCC has issued a list of remedial works required to be undertaken, likely to cost over £0.5m.
- The redevelopment of the PDA will hopefully create a new heart for the village. Negotiations continue between the joint landowners but no plan has yet been submitted to AVDC.
- Even the weather conspired to keep the construction traffic out of the allotment site to remove the mounds of soil. However, we are pleased to report that in April 2014 the ground dried sufficiently for the diggers to negotiate and four new allotment plots have now been created.

Progress in Other Areas

However, there have been a number of achievements during the year in other areas:

- At the pavilion a sub-meter was installed to reduce water costs, enhancements were made to the emergency exits to improve safety, net supports were purchased, a memorial bench for Ben Wesley was installed and wheels were ordered for the free standing goals (now installed).
- The mVAS equipment has been deployed throughout the year, reducing traffic speeds along Vicarage Road, Marsworth Road and Cheddington Road. An additional location point has been approved opposite Ridgeway View and the parish council is waiting for the installation of the ground-screw.
- At the allotments, an extra water trough has been installed and the four new allotment plots have recently been created.
- Pitstone Hill car park has been resurfaced.
- The bi-annual Pitstone Guide was published and residents can now obtain up-to-date information from the new Pitstone & parish council web site.
- The parish council has continued to publish Pitstone Parish Post (PPP) into its centenary year, in the absence of anyone stepping forward to help, in order to keep our residents informed. Our thanks to Councillors Blunt and Ginda for all the voluntary time contributed as Editor and Advertising Manager.
- Raised mounds have been created either side of the lay-by opposite Masons to help prevent damage to the verges. Signs reminded drivers during the spring that the daffodils were growing and discouraged parking on the grass.
- Vale of Aylesbury Housing Trust (VAHT) installed additional parking at the end of Glebe Close in April 2013.
- BCC surface dressed Glebe Close, installed new signage for the Pitstone Green Business Park to help divert traffic away from the high street area and resurfaced the footpath along Cheddington Road. All these issues had been outstanding for a number of years.

Grants to our Local Community

During the year, the parish council provided financial assistance to a number of local bodies so that they can continue to enhance the lives of residents. This included:

- £3,000 to Pitstone Memorial Hall towards building enhancements
- £2,250 to Beacon Village Community Library
- £1,000 to Ivinghoe & Pitstone United Cricket Club
- £765 to Pitstone Recreation Ground Charity
- £600 to A J Groom & Son towards work on the football pitch
- £550 to 1st lvinghoe & Pitstone Scouts
- £396 to St Marys Church, Pitstone
- £355 to Pitstone Parish Charity
- £100 to the Royal British Legion

Success in the Best Kept Village Competition 2013

The parish council was delighted that the excellent work of the litter pickers, notice board manager, hall committee and church committee had been recognised when the village was awarded a Certificate of Commendation in the Best Kept Village competition. Judging for this years award takes place in June.

All the usual activity of the parish council continued with bus shelters maintained (disappointing to note that 5 separate glass panels had been vandalised this year), noticeboards treated to prolong their life, street lights kept operational, our open space and play equipment regularly inspected and maintained, litter picked up and removed, dog fouling bins provided and emptied, Pitstone Parish Post produced every quarter, the youth café offered every week during term time and a range of activities for the younger generation with visits from the portable skate park and Play Around the Parishes.

Ongoing Projects

In addition to the projects that were delayed during the course of the last 12 months and therefore will continue to be developed this year, we are also working on a number of initiatives, many with other bodies, which have not yet come to fruition but will continue to be an area of focus during the next 12 months:

- The provision of a footpath to Marsworth (we are working with Marsworth Parish Council and the Local Area Forum)
- The installation of a foot & cycle path along Northfield Road (we are working with BCC and Herts County Council)
- The enhancement and development of the pavilion site (plans currently being investigated following an update from the I&P Junior Football Club and I&P United Cricket Club that they were no longer pursuing plans to obtain extra land from the Pitstone Towns Land Charity to extend the site.
- Updating and replacing the parish maps to reflect all the development off Westfield Road
- Replacement of the lighting equipment on the Marsworth Road roundabout and options to enhance this feature at the entrance to our village
- Castlemead issues including the handover of the highways to BCC and the handover of the open space to AVDC (currently working on Phase III).
- BCC issues including the installation of a dropped curb by the Cheddington Road railway bridge and footpath works to part of Vicarage Road.
- Working with VAHT to develop and install a solution at the junction of Yardley Avenue and Cheddington Road to prevent vehicles parking on the grass verge and obstructing the exit
- Working with Pitstone Memorial Hall Charity to help identify and achieve future ambitions to make the hall the centre of the village.
- Working with AVDC as they produce a new Vale of Aylesbury Plan which will affect the future housing and planning provision for the parish.

Other Local Issues

- The NHS Litigation Authority granted an application by J T Health to operate a pharmacy from premises in the High Street, Ivinghoe. No planning application has yet been submitted. The impact on dispensing provision at the existing two surgeries remains to be confirmed.
- Anglian Water announced their intention to supply first time sewerage to a number of properties at the far end of Cheddington Road, by the railway bridge. An exact date has yet to be confirmed.

BEACONLIT RETURNS - BIGGER AND BETTER

BeaconLit, the small literary festival with big ambitions, returns on Saturday June 28 with a new venue, a full-day's programme, and a dazzling array of authors.

The festival aims to raise interest in books and writing within the 'Beacon Villages' - lvinghoe, Pitstone, lvinghoe Aston, Slapton, Marsworth, Cheddington and other communities close to lvinghoe Beacon in the beautiful Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. Last year's inaugural half-day event attracted visitors from far and wide, and the organisers are hoping to grow their audience this year.

The morning's activities include the return of crime writer Alison Bruce, who will run a session entitled 'CSI lvinghoe: Getting Away with Murder?', in which she takes a look at novel ways of killing people. 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TALES FROM THE COMPOST HEAP

The Wonder of Weeds

Weeds – perennial ones in particular – are the bane of a gardener's life. Couch grass, ground elder, bindweed, celandine, dandelions, thistles, nettle roots and docks – to name but a few – are all possessed of an almost miraculous ability to keep going and prosper, no matter what. Most gardeners will have pondered at length how to get rid of them, solutions varying from curses and incantations to the prolific use of certain proprietary mixes.

In the majority of cases and assuming that the curses etc. turn out to be ineffective, the only solution is to dig them out carefully, bit by bit. This is wonderfully good exercise for those who wish to develop large biceps and possibly triceps also. Then, confronted by a heap of weeds, what should one do next? These weeds, added to the standard home compost heap, may well demonstrate their unique ability to survive by reappearing to live another day. This is because such a compost heap rarely reaches the temperatures necessary to kill the weeds off. A different strategy is called for – and in fact there is more than one way to go here.

Option one is to stuff the weeds, roots and all, into a black plastic sack; add some green material such as lawn clippings, secure the top and put the bag behind the shed, or some other out-of-the-way spot. After about 6 months, check the contents – which should have turned into a kind of black sludge, or weed soup if you prefer. All traces of the original plant material should have disappeared. You can then add this to your compost heap. Option two is to create a separate heap, just for these perennial weeds; cover it completely with black plastic – not beautiful, but necessary for this job, to smother the weeds. Again, check the contents carefully after a few months. If no traces of the original material can be detected, add the material to your normal heap.

Either way, you will have the satisfaction of knowing that you have performed that marvellous alchemy of turning nuisance weeds into a valuable addition to your garden, and in the process have let nothing go to waste - surely one of the greatest joys a gardener can have.
