Why are there suddenly so many big planning applications in rural areas?

In the last two years an unprecedented number of speculative planning applications for large numbers of homes on land not planned for development have been submitted to Aylesbury Vale District Council. This is because the new national planning policy introduced in 2012, and the scrapping of the South East regional plan which put a ceiling on numbers, means it is

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ing at pace, with various sub groups working hard to research many aspects of Pitstone. We are hopeful that a successful and comprehensive plan can be developed and wish them ongoing success. Please come along to the Community Events and have your say.

now presumed that planning permission will be given unless there is an overwhelming case against it.

Also encouraging locally to developers is that Aylesbury Vale has no longer got a required 5 year housing land supply, and the Council has failed twice to put in place a strong local plan to state local priorities which can interpret and adapt the national guidance to local needs.

Applications for mind boggling

numbers are now accumulating across the Vale. For example as well as the approval in principle for 40 houses on land at Rushendon Furlong in Pitstone (not yet signed off) and 30 in Edlesborough in Cow Lane, 47 houses were approved on appeal in Aston Clinton on Stablebridge Road, their development currently delayed by the discovery of an Iron Age village on the site, plus another 47 on land off Chapel Drive, granted on an appeal with far reaching consequences for other decisions, leading almost directly to permission for 120 in Brook Street Aston Clinton. In Haddenham 280 were recently granted on the Glebeland, with still larger numbers applied for on other Haddenham sites. There are outstanding applications in Slapton, Waddesdon, Steeple Claydon, and many more.

Why are so many of these applications being allowed?

Many applications have been allowed because although Aylesbury Vale planners can still apply policies saved from previous plans, such as encroachment into the countryside or detriment to the character of the landscape, a succession of planning appeal judgements have given very little weight to these, stating instead that the benefits of supplying the houses needed for a five year supply of housing outweighs these considerations and the traffic growth. One of the first policies to be thrown out at appeal was the former limit on rural developments to 5 houses.

So planning applications are being judged on whether the 'good' in terms of providing a five year housing land supply outweighs the 'harm' as measured by the criteria in the NPPF for sustainable development. This is defined as building a strong competitive economy; promoting sustainable transport; delivering a wide choice of high quality homes; requiring good design; promoting

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healthy communities; conserving and enhancing the natural environment; conserving and enhancing the historic environment. When applications are submitted in outline only this is often hard to judge, which is why appeal judgements are so important in interpreting the guidance.

The 2 applications in lvinghoe for 110 houses

The two planning applications for lvinghoe are still not determined. The first application for 70 houses by Gladman has been referred to the planning inspectorate on the grounds of non determination by the planning authority within the statutory time limit, and the other adjacent one on The Park for 40 houses is still being evaluated at AVDC.

lvinghoe conservation area revision

Meanwhile the long overdue revision of the 1971 lvinghoe Conservation Area has been published for consultation and can be viewed on line http:// www.aylesburyvaledc.gov.uk/environment/ conservation-listed-buildings/currentconservation-area-consultation/ivinghoeconservation-area-review/ or in the Beacon Villages library. This proposes major extensions to the conservation area to include the Park and Ford End farm, and describes the significance of views in and out of the conservation area from all points.

Appeals won

It is not all bad news. What we think in Aylesbury Vale still holds some weight. On 26th January the appeal for three sites, Hampden Fields, Weedon Hill and Fleet Marston, totalling 5,800 houses, was dismissed. The inspector upholding in almost every detail the council's grounds for re-

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fusal. Even if these appeals had been allowed, The 5,800 would not have increased the 5 year supply as the sites would not have delivered any houses inside five years, as so much pre construction and infrastructure work as well as detailed plans would have been required.

Aylesbury Vale still one of the fastest growing areas

In Aylesbury the Buckingham Park and Berryfields developments, still being built out from an earlier plan, make Aylesbury Vale the fastest housebuilding area in the country. In addition between Bierton and Broughton, 'Aylesbury East', 2450 houses have been given permission in outline and currently the detailed planning permission is being considered. A further 1560 between Bierton and Watermead are currently at appeal hearing.

Progress on a new plan for Aylesbury Vale

The new Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan (VALP) was begun in May, and has just completed the 'call for sites' stage http:// www.aylesburyvaledc.gov.uk/planning-policy/ vale-of-aylesbury-local-plan/vale-aylesburylocal-plan-call-sites-response/. These sites will all be examined for viability and deliverability, and consulted on next summer. The final plan is expected to be adopted in 2017.

Neighbourhood Plans

The third important strand for planning after the NPPF and the District plan is the Neighbourhood plan.

Cheddington and Pitstone have had their respective neighbourhood areas approved and the process of putting together a plan

has begun, with Cheddington being further ahead having already held a public consultation.

lvinghoe and Slapton have made an application to designate an area for a plan.

Winslow has completed its plan and held a referendum as required. Wing, Marsh Gibbon Haddenham and Great Horwood are following closely behind.

Neighbourhood plans are intended to complement rather than contradict District Plans, so it is with interest we await the outcome of a judicial review brought by Gladman against the Winslow plan on the grounds it had no status without an overarching District Plan, as this will affect every neighbourhood plan currently being put together by hard working volunteers.

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

Play Space, Skate Park and Multi-Use **Ball Court delayed ... but not forgot**ten

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The youth of the village have not been forgotten and the Parish Council is still working with AVDC towards the installation of a new play space, skate park and multi-use ball court by the Recreation Ground. These projects have all been delayed due to complications arising from the Pitstone Development Area (PDA) proposals. We are hoping that the development will enable the ball court as this was defined in the 2005 adopted policy by AVDC, and that following the grant of planning permission for the PDA that the Parish Council may be able to secure the necessary land sale to enable the play space and skate park. Unfortunately, the timing of these leisure facilities is dependent upon the progress of the proposals for the PDA, so it out of the control of the Parish Council. We have been declined permission to install the leisure facilities at present. The combined cost of the leisure enhancements will be approximately £300,000. We will continue to strive for the realization of these aspirations and will keep the community updated.

Dog Fouling on the public footpath in Pitstone?

Some roads are a particular hot spot for some irresponsible dog owners that fail to clear up after their pets at present. The Parish Council has repeatedly tried to educate and encourage owners in responsible dog ownership and provides plentiful number of both dedicated dog bins and ordinary refuse bins in which the deposits can be placed. However, there appears to remain a number of repeat offenders.

Thank you for your assistance with helping to keep our footpaths free of toxic waste.

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Footpath 6

Footpath 6 runs from beside the church to Vicarage Road beside Erleigh Manor. It was the path from the Vicarage to the church but is now redundant and Beacon Villages are donating a gate to make the exit onto Vicarage Road safer. I thought I would take the opportunity to publicise the path as a way up to Pitstone Hill particularly from Castlemead. Vicarage Road used to be a bit of a race track until Westfield Road was built and took most of the traffic away. Now the road is much safer to use and is less muddy than the headland way up to the Silver Birch.

The route goes up the bark path and Church Road to the church. Walk round the church and along to the Vicarage. Turn right and go to the T junction with the B488 which has to be crossed carefully. Cross the field and turn left along a mown path well away from the road. This is Footpath 7 which goes up to the hill round the field. Once you are on the hill there are paths going in all directions depending on how far you want to walk. See the walks in the Pitstone guide and on the village website. Try this walk particularly if you are a midweek walker and you will find it very useful

Life Saving Defibrillator now available at the Village Health Centre, Yardley Avenue

Pitstone is now a little bit safer thanks to the Village Health Centre in Yardley Avenue and the local sports clubs. A new external defibrillator has been purchased and mounted outside the surgery. In the event of a cardiac emergency, the 999 operator will provide the release code and the defibrillator will talk you through the process of giving life saving treatment to the patient whilst the ambulance is on its way. Please make sure that you familiarise yourself with its location, as you never know when you might need it. Please also look out for community training sessions that will provide you all with a chance to see how the unit works so that you are more confident in the event of an emergency.

Our very grateful thanks to The Village Health Centre in Yardley Avenue for funding the purchase and ongoing maintenance costs of the defibrillator itself, and to all the following local sports clubs for funding the purchase of the external lock box that makes this vital life saving equipment available to the whole community: lvinghhoe and Pitstone United Cricket Club, Pitstone and lvinghoe Junior Football Club, Pitstone and lvinghoe United Football Club, Tring Town Football Club and Envirologistics Football Club.



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AN OPEN LETTER TO THE COMMUNITY

from Tony Clare, chairman of the Pitstone NDP Steering Group

Dear Resident

Evolving Pitstone in the hands of its community

Aylesbury Vale District Council is forecasting that it is unlikely to have a local housing plan in place, to answer the dilemma of how it will play its part in meeting the housing shortage in the UK, until Spring 2016. This delay has enabled some very aggressive housing development applications that, without a local plan in place, make it hard if not impossible to argue against. However, within our power is the opportunity to create a community owned Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP).

What is an NDP?

An NDP does not equal "no development". An NDP means, instead, that a community can take charge of creating its own vision of how it would like to develop over the next 15 years. We as a community will then become able to manage random and aggressive applications for development that Pitstone does not need or want. Once in place all future planning applications are decided in accordance with the NDP, which carries the same legal

weight as the District Council's local plan.

So what is an NDP?

An NDP takes an objective view on all plots of land within an agreed area. It looks at their potential development and use. It looks at the infrastructure and amenities required to support existing and future development. It considers education requirements, as well as health needs and sports and leisure facilities available. And it considers, amongst many other things, the heritage and identity of a community and looks at the employment requirements to support it.

Ultimately it creates a vision of how the community as a whole would like to see itself develop over the next 15 or so years. It is a requirement that the majority of that community support it in a referendum, in order for it to be formally adopted.

Where are we now?

A group made up of local volunteers, appointed by and acting on behalf of the Parish Council, has been looking at the questions and challenges that arise out of the development of an

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NDP. It is a huge undertaking and we would ask for your help and support as they go through this process.

We would like to be clear that no decisions have yet been taken. Indeed, this would be impossible without support and input from the local community, followed by a formal consultation process about what our proposed NDP might look like.

To start this intensive process we have been investigating a number of development options for Pitstone between now and 2030. Some of them would undoubtedly be less popular than others. Some of them would involve a trade-off: if you like, a downside in return for an upside. But above all else, we cannot form a clear vision for our community without first investigating all possible alternatives, even if a number of them are then firmly discounted.

Speculation in these circumstances is bound to occur, particularly whilst our initial background work was being undertaken. However, we have now reached the stage where input from and engagement with the community is a vital next step in further developing the vision for Pitstone that is slowly beginning to emerge from our work. We now want to hear your questions, listen to your points of view, and with full transparency tackle together the issues we have identified that Pitstone will face over the forthcoming 15 years.

What's next?

The NDP team will be hosting two **"Community Engagement Days"** at Pitstone Memorial Hall, which are taking place between 11am and 3pm on Sunday 22 March and Saturday 28 March. We would ask that as many of you as possible call in and meet the team on either or both of these days, for as long or as little time as you can spare, to hear **about the challenges we're facing, to share your views and opinions, and to allow us to ensure that everyone's voice is heard.**

Posters are going up, leaflets are being delivered to every house in the village, and there is now both a website page and a Facebook page to allow you to read more and to share views online. And if all that's not enough, the bar in the Social Club will be open as well!

To streamline our work and to enable us to focus more clearly on the issues at hand, the NDP team has been divided into four focus groups. Set out below are just some of the issues on which they, and we, would appreciate your feedback.

Housing & Land Assets

How much new housing should the village have? (Sadly "none" is not an option.) Which sites are suitable for development? What should it look like? What sort of housing is our village short of?

Education, Sports & Leisure

Where do we want our children to go to school? Do we have enough education capacity to support our growing village? What sports and leisure facilities are we lacking, and which ones could be improved? Would you like a pub, for example, and how often would you use it? What about things for the elderly, or the under-18s?

Employment, Facilities, Health, Infrastructure & Transport

How can we manage the flow of traffic better through our village? Do we have enough local facilities to support our existing village and what would be required to meet future growth? What new facilities would you like to see in the village? Is our infrastructure sufficient for future needs?

Heritage & Environment

What is the identity of Pitstone? Do we make the most of the heritage and the history of our village? If not, how could we do so more effectively? In what ways should we look at protecting what we have for future generations?

We look forward to meeting as many of you as possible at one of our Community Engagement Days. Your feedback is always appreciated.

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
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
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
