The County Council has a total working budget of £320M and reserves of about £8M. 71% is raised from the Council tax, 29% from other grants. In the last 3 years the grant component has been cut by 34%, 32% and 28%. As well as reduced income, the Council must meet increased

costs in delivering the same service, and increased demand for services. According to the budget select committee report the County has taken out £68M in costs over the last three years, and needs to take a further £65M over the next three years.

Council tax increases are limited to below 2%. If the council decides not to increase council tax the government awards a council tax freeze grant. However, this is only for the one year and does not carry forward into

Spring/Summer 2014/15 the following year's calculations, so in practice it is another cut.

As well as increased demand for services from an increasing elderly population, Bucks has the fastest growing population in the country of 0-15 year olds, and a big increase in the number of children referred to social services, mainly for neglect. Legislation is adding statutory responsibilities without funding to support them, such as the Care Act and Deprivation of Liberty standards for people with learning disabilities. The Care Act alone could eventually add up to £34M a year additional expenditure.

In conclusion I would say that there is a very high risk that the County will either not be able to deliver services within this reduced budget, or that services will fail or be inadequate.

Children's Services

The OfSTED report last August judging Bucks Children's Services 'inadequate' apparently caught senior officers and councillors unawares, although a formal warning to the Chief Executive from the head of children's services made almost a year before the Ofsted, apparently went unregarded, has since been leaked. Since then a recovery plan has been put into action, albeit slowly, and expenditure on children's services in the current 2014-15 financial year increased by more than £6M, with £3M recurring in all subsequent years. Although some reports liken the Bucks situation to Rotherham, the most recent report by consultants put in place by the government do not recommend putting the council in to special measures. Services for missing children and children at risk of sexual exploitation had been prioritised and were judged adequate, although in a poor context overall.

Pitstone Parish Post Key to both the poor performance and the recovery is the recruitment, retention, effective management and professional standards of gualified social workers. The current position shows that the numbers of first response social workers has doubled from 13 to 27, but even now only 7 are permanent, plus 20 agency; and for children and families 179 permanent and 55 agency, showing a small increase since last year, but not enough without going overseas to Canada and Romania in the short term. There is also talk of setting up a new social work faculty on the new Bucks New University Aylesbury campus.

Roads

The County spends about £50M pa on roads. There are exactly 100Km of roads in the lvinghoe Division alone. In 2014 10 roads were repaired under the severe weather recovery government grant. There is also a members allocation scheme, prioritised with the help of the highways engineers and the data at their disposal. This members scheme however is subject to reallocation or slippage, and the programme although ambitious has still got lots to complete. So far the work done on the B488 has been part of this scheme.

Schools

The School Bus charging policy is no nearer resolution I regret to say. In fact it is likely that transport charges will increase again. It was compounded this year by the acknowledged appalling administration in August leaving many children stranded, uncertain, without allocated places or buses.

There has also been some controversy over the school grant allocation. Bucks is funded well below the average, which comes as no (Continued on page 8)



surprise, and this year the small overall increase was awarded to early years and special needs areas. There had been no increase to these groups for five years and it is hard to argue against it. As regards the lack of funding overall the County is beginning judicial review proceedings against the Educational Funding Agency.

Health, Wellbeing and Adult Services.

This portfolio is under more pressure than the others, even though significant additional funding has been received for joint working with the NHS, and the new responsibilities for public health. As a result completely new ways of delivering services to support people are being considered. A consultation is under way on changes to support for elderly people in housing schemes, and more consultations are expected in 2015.

Library

Although Library hours in the big libraries are likely to be curtailed, the Beacon Villages Community Library is unaffected and its grant from BCC is still guaranteed for 4 years. Like all voluntary groups the library is always on the lookout for new committee members to oversee the running of the library and help fundraise with events such as the Library lunches, the VE Day garden fete which was held on May 9th, and BeaconLit festival, June 27th. The library AGM is on Saturday 20th June.



Draft Annual Report and Accounts

Included in this edition you will find draft annual report and accounts. Parish Council financial affairs are subject to two layers of audit, the first via an auditor we appoint (called the 'internal audit') and the second via one appointed on our behalf (called the 'external audit'). Further details of the audit result will be published in due course.

Pitstone Annual Assembly 2015 plus Volunteer Fair and Defibrillator Demonstrations

The above combined event took place on 21 April 2015. Our thanks to everyone who attended and especially those that signed up to help one of the community groups look-**ing for extra support. If you couldn't make** the event and have some spare time, there are still numerous vacancies available so please do contact the parish clerk for more information.

The defibrillator demonstrations by Derek Flint of South Central Ambulance Service were very popular and Derek also gave a general demonstration to all those assembled for the Parish Assembly. Hopefully everyone that attended will now be a little more comfortable with using the equipment in the event of an emergency. The council would once again like to thank the Village Health Centre for providing the community access defibrillator and to all the football & cricket clubs that sponsored the external lock-box to house it. This life saving equipment is now mounted outside the Village Health Centre in Yardley Avenue and the 999 operator will provide you with the access code should you require it. The Annual Assembly itself featured the presentation of the Volunteer of the Year Award to Dave Clifford (see full article), updates on the Neighbourhood Development Plan and Pitstone Development Area, as well as the usual presentations from Thames Valley Police, the Parish Council and the District/County Councillor Avril Davies.

Questions You Asked at the Community Engagement Days

A number of questions were tabled at the Community Engagement Days. Those that fall within the remit of the Neighbourhood Development Plan are being answered within the separate article in this edition of PPP. Some of the questions posed do not directly fall within the scope of that project, so we are providing answers below:

Q: What are the limits of the National Trust land around the windmill?

A: National Trust own significant amounts of land within the Parish including the Ashridge Estate and Pitstone Hill. They also own Pitstone Windmill and the field it resides in, plus the agricultural field along Vicarage Road, and the Marsworth Road allotment site (which is then leased to the Parish Council). Bell Field (located between the allotments and the end of Rushendon Furlong) is in private ownership with a tenant

farmer.

Q: What are Section 106 funds?

A: Any developer building five or more residential properties on a site is required to pay a number of contributions to both the district council (for things like sport and leisure development) plus the county council (for such things as education, highways and footpaths). The District and County Council are responsible for requesting these contributions from developers and then for providing the associated facilities.

The terms are specified in a legal agreement between the relevant council and the developer. The funds normally become payable at set stages of the development. To provide two examples (1) Taylor Wimpey provided over £100k to Bucks County Council towards the foot/cycle path along Northfield Road. These funds were then transferred under a separate legal agreement from Bucks County Council to Herts County Council who will be responsible for delivering the facility within the set time period or returning the funds. (2) Taylor Wimpey provided a sports and leisure contribution to AVDC for development of the leisure facilities by the recreation ground. The Parish Council determined that the community wish the new play space, skate park and multi-use games area plus the land to build them upon, and had to submit proposals to AVDC. The cabinet at AVDC study all proposals and either grant permission or reject them (in this case, permission has been granted). Once approved, the Parish Council can undertake the work, pay the invoices and then claim the funds back from AVDC. Therefore, once the land ownership issues have been resolved, the works will be able to progress. Legislation will soon be changing and S106 will be replaced by the Community Infrastructure Levy. We will write

and provide an update on the changes at the relevant time.

Q: What is happening to the data centre?

A: As far as the council is aware, the data centre is still proposed to be developed at some point in the future. The owners had two sites under development and sponsorship funds became available for the other site ahead of the Pitstone location, so that is being built first.

Q: Can we have improved police presence?

A: Thames Valley Police control the policing for our area, so your queries or requests should be addressed to them. During these times of restricted budgets, TVP deploy their resources to the areas most in need and fortunately for us, Pitstone has a very low crime rate. Your neighbourhood policing team will respond to any concerns you raise regarding activity in the Pitstone area and can be contacted at any time on the non -emergency number which is 101. Any concerns or crimes should be reported via the same number to ensure the police have a full picture of the issues we experience in the village that may go unreported. If you don't report it, they don't know and we will get less policing presence.

Q: Can the Memorial Hall display a timetable of what happens?

A: The hall has historically published a timetable of events on the village notice-boards and details also appear within the Pitstone Guide, however they tend to get out of date quite quickly. The hall now uses an online booking facility which enables everyone to view full details of what classes are available at the hall on what dates, you can also make Spring/Summer 2014/15 Pitstone Parish Post

bookings for any vacant slots. The benefit of this system is that the details are always fully up-to-date. Therefore, please visit: <u>http://pitstone.co.uk/localinfo/pitstone-</u> memorial-hall/

and follow the "make a booking or view details of a class" link near the foot of the page.

Q: Can we have a growing collective to supply residents?

A: This would need to be a community run group. If you would be interested in operating such a scheme please let the parish clerk know and we can put all like-minded individuals in touch.

Q: Can we replace the speed bumps with speed cameras?

A: Highways are controlled by Bucks County Council who installed the speed bumps at the request of local residents. They have advised the Parish Council that the speed bumps still comply with legislation and that they have no plans to remove them. They have been an emotive issue and some residents love them, whilst some hate them. Thames Valley Police operate the speed cameras and have no plans to install permanent fixed cameras in the village however they do undertake regular mobile speed camera patrols. The Parish Council purchased our mobile Vehicle Activated Sign which flashes if motorists exceed the 30mph speed limit. The unit collects speed data from every passing vehicle, regardless of speed, and the resultant data can be used to identify any particular time periods where speeding is a problem. However, the data from the unit reveals that speeding in the village is not as big an issue as in some of

our neighbouring villages.

 $\ensuremath{\mathcal{Q}}$: Can we have a secondary school within the village?

A: Bucks County Council advise that they have no plans for a new school within Pit-stone.



I moved to Pitstone in 2008 because of a strong wish to live in a rural village after some 30

years in Watford and before that North West London. The view of the Chilterns is very much an added bonus. Finally retired in July 2014 after a 50 year career in healthcare management.

My main interest now is the future development of Pitstone. I became a member of the Pitstone Neighbourhood Development Plan steering group because, without an agreed 'neighbourhood plan', there is a danger that the village characteristics could be overwhelmed by unrestrained housing development. Should the Referendum confirm the Plan, it becomes essential that the Parish Council strives to maintain the agreed vision.

2014-15 Annual Report and Accounts for Pitstone Parish Council

At the close of the year the council holds £162,757. £88,208 is reserved for specific purposes or with restricted spending ability (like maintenance payments from Taylor Wimpey) leaving £74,548 of retained reserve. The council is financially independent with no loans, lease payments or debts. During the year, the council took advantage of legislative changes and moved to electronic banking with Unity Trust Bank.



Pitstone Neighbourhood Development Plan (NDP)

Pitstone NDP In the absence of an adopted Local Plan at District Level many parishes have found themselves subject to speculative planning such as the Gladman application for 70 homes in Ivinghoe (5 of which fall within Pitstone). In August, the parish decided to take control of future development within Pitstone and produce an NDP which will have equal planning weight to the eventual AVDC policy.

So far our 'Neighbourhood' has been defined as everything within our parish boundary; a team of volunteers have stepped forward to help investigate options, engage with the community and meet with landowners; rCOH (planning consultants) have been employed to support our volunteers and write our NDP (£13,550 (staged payments)); statutory bodies have been consulted; the associated Strategic Environmental Assessment has been commissioned from rCOH (£2,750); a grant of £6,500 was successfully obtained from Locality to help fund the activity; the community has received updates, leaflet drops, 2 x community engagement days have taken place, and website and Facebook page has been set up. Net cost in this financial year was £4.741. Key issues for residents at the moment include a need for Bucks County Council & the local education establishments to address the current pre-school and primary school capacity issues, and a desire to see the Pitstone Development Area village centre and leisure facilities implemented. The Parish Council strongly supports both these outcomes. You will shortly receive a copy of the draft plan for you to consider and comment upon. All comments will be taken into consideration before producing a final plan, which will be subject to local referendum.

It is vital that you get involved and have your say about the future of the village.

Large Planning Applications

Over the 12 months a number of large planning applications for Pitstone & Ivinghoe have been received by AVDC:

- Outline planning has been granted for up to 40 residential dwellings in Rushendon Furlong
- An appeal will be heard by the Planning Inspectorate in the summer relating to the Gladman application for 70 houses at Ford End Farm in Ivinghoe, 5 of which sit on land behind Rushendon Furlong
- AVDC are yet to determine an application for 40 houses on The Park in lvinghoe
- AVDC are yet to determine an application for outline planning for up to 68 houses off Vicarage Road
- In March the Parish Council was notified that Bucks County Council (BCC) had employed Carter Jonas to investigate options for both the BCC open space and AVDC owned allotments opposite The Crescent, with residential development as one of the options. The Parish Council is strongly opposed to loss of open space and will be continuing to negotiate with these bodies.

New Village Centre delays Play Space and Skate Park

The 2005 Pitstone Development Area Comprehensive Plan set out the proposed development of the L shaped land around the recreation ground including houses, paths, small scale commercial development such as a pub, private nursery and multi-use games area for ball sports.

This development has experienced further legal complications during the course of the year and is yet to come to fruition. Unfor-

tunately the owner of the old allotments (shown as D & G) also owns the third of the 'recreation ground' with the play equipment and football pitch on, and the Charity Commission has advised that they are unable to sell the land to the Parish Council or permit the redevelopment of the play space and skate park until after the main Development Area site has been sold. This has been extremely frustrating. The parish council has planning permission for the play space, which is on just 8 weeks lead-time to install and AVDC are ready to procure the concrete skate park, as soon as we can re-secure permission to proceed.

Improved Health Services



The council supported the Community First Responder service with a dedicated kit, and liaised between the Village Health Centre in Yardley Avenue and the local sports clubs who jointly funded an external defibrillator mounted outside the surgery for use in an emergency. We've also organised training events so that everyone feels comfortable using the defibrillator. In addition, Windmill Pharmacy opened in lvinghoe.

Other Sport and Leisure Improvements

- Options for redeveloping and expanding the pavilion site are being investigated which may include provision for senior football, junior football, tennis, basketball and 5-aside football. Please get involved in the NDP process to let us know what sports you want to see in the village. The facility has generated extra revenue this year through the hire of the car park to Safran and PRS. Additional costs have been incurred to commission a full topography report, necessary to draw up accurate plans for the site.
- The mounds were removed from the allotments in April so 4 new plots could be created, trees donated by National Trust were planted along the boundary and 2 new water troughs have been installed.
- The play equipment in the Windsor Road park has been painted and new gates have been ordered for the Recreation Ground park.
- We are delighted that lvinghoe & Pitstone United Cricket Club has decided to retain the Recreation Ground as their home site and the Parish Council will be working with them regarding future aspirations for improvement and development.
- Consideration is also being given to whether Pitstone can accommodate a new Scout hut as the existing one in lvinghoe has structural issues.



Over £20,000 of Financial Support given to our Local Community



During the year, the parish council provided financial assistance to a number of local bodies so that they can continue to enhance the lives of residents. This included:

- The Parish Council commissioned the removal of asbestos from the Memorial Hall Charity loft void, for which it had insufficient funds, at a cost of £15,820
- £2,565 to South Beds Ambulance to fund a dedicated kit for our Community First Responders
- £1,000 to Ivinghoe & Pitstone United Cricket Club (on behalf of Recreation Ground Charity)
- £600 to A J Groom & Son towards work on the football pitch (on behalf of Recreation Ground Charity)
- £640 to 1st lvinghoe & Pitstone Scouts for camping equipment
- £93.95 to Guides for a new flag
- £150 to the Royal British Legion in lieu of a fresh wreath

In addition a £15 donation was made to Aylesbury Vale Association of Local Councils and £175 made available to the Recreation Ground Charity to clear the ditch. Please contact the parish

New Parish Council

Brian Brooks joined the parish council in May 2014, bringing the compliment back up to the full ten. The term of office for all existing councillors ends in May with the Parish Council elections on 7th. Councillors Ginda and Richardson will unfortunately not be standing for re-election. We thank all existing councillors for their hard work over the last 4 years. This year, 12 candidates are standing for 10 seats.

Other local issues the Parish Council has been involved with

- Royal Mail has finally agreed to install a letter box in Windsor Road.
- Investigative work continues into pedestrian/cycle paths to Tring Station and Marsworth by Herts County Council and the Local Area Forum respectively.
- The Parish Council continues to investigate the considerable issues surrounding the BCC offer to devolve grass cutting and other services to the parishes.
- The landowner has agreed with Rights of Way to replace the broken stile with a gate at the end of footpath 6 where it joins Vicarage Road.
- Vale of Aylesbury Housing Trust has installed bollards around the grass verges at the junction of Yardley Avenue and Cheddington Road to improve safety.
- Transport for Bucks has resurfaced parts of Cheddington Road and Glebe Close, sided out the footpath along Vicarage Road and the lay-by opposite Masons, replaced the damaged village sign along Vicarage Road, and cleared/flushed the drains to reduce flooding at the foot of Westfield Road and along Marsworth Road. Still to come is a bus box in the highway by the Haldi and replacement fittings on the Marsworth Road roundabout.
- Luton Airport secured planning permission to expand facilities (not an additional runway).
- The council funded and arranged for Christmas lights on the Recreation Ground, replacement bin for Marsworth Road and replacement dog bin for The Crescent.



Pitstone Needs You!

We would like to thank all our employees and volunteers who ensure that the village is kept clean and tidy, the pavilion runs smoothly, that the youth café can open its doors each week and to our new army of volunteers immersing themselves in the NDP.

Whilst there are lots of community groups trying to provide excellent facilities and services there is a definite volunteer shortage in the parish. The council has publicised vacancies, appealed for volunteers and hosted a volunteer fair at this years annual assembly to try & help groups address the issue. The Parish Council also runs an annual Volunteer of the Year competition. Our April 2015 winner is Pastor Dave Clifford for his involvement in the Silver Surfers Club, Community Car Scheme and Community Cinema. Unfortunately, Dave leaves us this summer, and we wish him well in his new ventures. Please submit your nominations for 2016 Volunteer of the Year.

YOU ENGAGED. WE LISTENED. SO NOW WHAT HAPPENS...?

Thank you to all of you who helped make our two Community Engagement Days at the end of March such a great success. In excess of 225 local residents turned out to give their views upon all aspects of village life past, present and future.



Spring/Summer 2015

Since then we have been carefully analysing the many Feedback Forms submitted and identifying the key themes and issues raised. This is what you told us:

THE COMMUNITY SPEAKS

You want to preserve the open countryside around the village, particularly the views of the windmill and lvinghoe Beacon. You accept the need for a limited number of new houses but are concerned that the style must be in keeping with the surrounding environment. You want Pitstone to remain a village, not become a small town.

Traffic through the village is a major concern, especially at school drop-off and pick-up times. You want better public transport services, to more destinations (such as Tring station). Tring station, in fact, was major theme: you want better parking, along with a footpath and cycleway for those not driving.

You want a heart for the village: a traditional village green, more of a community feel, better leisure and recreational facilities, and somewhere to go for a drink or a bite to eat. You want to integrate Castlemead into 'old' Pitstone, and you want to see what was promised in Pitstone's 2005 Plan finally delivered.

And finally, you want the challenges we are facing with regards to primary and nursery school capacity addressed, so that local children do not have to travel beyond the village they live in just to go to school.

Your sentiments have been combined with the detailed work that the NDP team's four sub-groups have been undertaking since the turn of the year. Their work to understand where Pitstone is, where it is going, and where you as a community want Pitstone to be in 15 years time, has focused on the following areas:

- Housing & Land Assets
- Sport, Leisure & Education
- Employment, Facilities, Health, Education & Transport
- Heritage & Environment

We've pulled all of this together and, with help from our planning consultants and other professional advisers, we now have a draft Plan for Pitstone!

A DRAFT PLAN FOR PITSTONE

This is the document that will shape the future of our village from now until 2031. Together we have reached an extremely important milestone with the whole NDP team working hard to ensure, to the maximum possible extent, that the Plan:

- preserves what you have said is important
- improves the village as you have asked

creates what you aspire for

By the time you read this edition of PPP, we hope to have presented the draft Plan to the Parish Council and received their approval of it. If not already known, you can expect the dates for the launch of our draft Plan to be announced very shortly. We are planning further 'engagement days' to mark the start of a six-week consultation period during which we want to hear your views on every aspect of the draft Plan.

"But what about the pub?" Well there is no denying that, along with the question of school capacity within the village, the issue of a village pub (or to be more accurate the lack of a village pub!) has been the most emotive to have emerged over the past six months. We want to do something about this.

We think the village wants a pub. You have told us it should have a pub. However, without further concrete evidence about how we could make it work, a village pub will never be anything more than a pipe dream.

Any commercial enterprise has to make money (or, at the very least, break even). There is a massive difference between us wanting something, and it being a viable business proposition. We need your help to determine what we want, what we can get, and how we can best go about getting it.

Every one of you has a real opportunity here to make a difference, and to help the village get what it needs. If we don't seize this opportunity, we may never get another.

Enclosed with this edition of PPP is a Pub Questionnaire. If you have any views about the subject, whatever they might be, please take a few minutes to fill it in and return it to us. You can even do it online if you prefer, by going to www.pitstone.co.uk/PitstoneNDP. In any event we need your views by the end of June. They will then form the basis for how we take this part of our Plan forwards.

Don't lose this opportunity to have your say and help define where Pitstone will be in 20 years' time, not only for you but also for generations to come.

the future of the society has decided that rather than bringing activities to a close, the society should, for the time being, become dormant. This was partly because of the changing circumstances such as the regular Local Area Forum meetings and the development of **Neighbourhood Plans taking place in several villages. The creation of the "Ivinghoe Togeth**er" campaign against large scale planning applications from companies like Gladman, demonstrate effective organisation of local feeling towards unpopular development.

Records of the existing membership will be retained but the collection of the annual membership fees will be suspended. The funds held by the society will also be retained for possible future use in line with its aims. In the event of a major planning issue arising in the future, particularly associated with the Pitstone quarries, a Committee Meeting will be arranged to decide whether the society should again become active and recommence its campaigning activities. If anybody does have any comments about the BVS, we will be pleased to hear from you.

Paul had spots during her performance and sang songs associated with Frank Sinatra as well as performing a dance routine with Fiona. His voice stands comparison with Sinatra although I would say he deserves to be known as a singer in his own right and its time, for him, to desert the bath-robe in favour of the trappings offered by showbusiness.

Both got a warm and generous round of applause at the end of their performance when it was announced that Fiona would be returning during December with her Christmas Show. Many in the audience will be there and perhaps you should be too. The afternoon ended in a barbeque where the audience could indulge in fine food and relax in more nostalgia about times past.






