By the time you receive this we should be heading away from winter towards longer days, higher temperatures and gently getting excited about spring and all it brings. My biggest gripe/disappointment comes from the misuse and abuse of the football pitch at the Pavilion on Marsworth Road. In the two weeks of the Christmas holiday, youths from this village and from Tring continuously broke in and played football, much against the endeavours of the Groundsman, Councillors and Parish clerk to evict them from the premises. This has resulted in the two goals of the main pitch being poached, the penalty spots being kicked out, rendering them in a condition almost unusable. It is also unfair for the Football clubs, who pay good money to be there. This will

ultimately give rise to further expenditure at the end of the season for our Groundsman to repair these worn areas. Up until the Christmas holidays they were in excellent condition.

What is even more annoying is that now gates and fences are being damaged in order to gain access. When you drop your footballer off in the holidays, are you aware that they may be causing criminal damage for which the Parish Council will involve the Police? The call for CCTV and micro cameras is now being discussed with a view to installation. I wonder if those parents of the youths in the village realise that this expenditure will be included in the rise of the precept. Will it make any difference? I doubt it.







# COUNTY COUNCIL NEWS

Avril Davies County Councillor, Ivinghoe Division

County Council grant settlement means higher taxes and fewer services.

On 17 December councils were notified by government of their grant allocation for 2016/17. It is not news that the cuts have been far greater than expected and come on top of year on year reductions since 2010. Instead of the anticipated 30% cut for this coming financial year 2016/17, Bucks County Council received a 43.3% cut in grant, being allocated only £23.7 million instead of £28 million as expected. Next year it will receive £8.1 million and grants will cease from then on. This should be offset to an extent by the council receiving a portion of the business rate previously retained

entirely by central government, and permission to raise council tax by 2% over and above the 1.9% previous limit, specifically to meet adult social care costs. However the government applies a funding formula called a top up grant adjustment which has reduced Bucks funding this year by a further £1.6 million, and up to a total of minus £52.7 million in the next four years. This negative grant settlement is achieved by holding back the business rate and re allocating it to poorer authorities. Although the County Council budget is still £335 million, excluding schools, there are continuing new costs to meet, for additional duties

in health and social care, children's

services, flood prevention, and more, as well as increasing numbers of people needing care, and the introduction of the national minimum wage.

I could continue, but you get the overall gloomy picture of reduced budgets and services and increased taxes. The conservative administration is vociferously blaming the very government they helped to elect. My group, while equally angry, will face up to the realities of the situation, and challenge them on every priority and 'difficult choice' they have to make, to try to prevent the baby going out with the bath water, and protect those most reliant on services.

Tring Station and the London Midland rail franchise renewal Aldbury Parish Council has written to me and others about the need to have a plan for Tring Station, to improve the parking and reduce the impact on local residents, which I fully support. Although the use of Cheddington station has remained about the same since 1997, Tring station usage has increased by 72%. The West Midlands rail franchise document published on 15 December is now out for consultation.


It is vital that Bucks and Herts, Dacorum and Aylesbury Vale Councils work together to put their views into this consultation and include in their own local plans of the needs of local residents and the impact of future development. The head of Transport Strategy and Growth, Joan Hancox, is attending the next Local Area Forum in Wing on 21st January.

I have added to the case made by Aldbury Parish Council by reminding them that Hertfordshire is still sitting on money to construct a cycleway along Northfield Road, and that Tring Station is restricted by Green Belt and Chilterns AONB designations, which led to the restoration to farmland of the temporary car park created 10 years ago during the West Coast Main Line improvement programme. The bus from Castlemead to Tring Station was withdrawn when funds run out, as only about seven commuters used the service regularly at that time. Ivinghoe conservation area Gladman Developments lost their Station Road appeal because the proposal failed to meet one of the Government's criteria for sustainable development - the environment. The deciding factor was the high quality of the revised Ivinghoe Conservation Area policy and associated document. It was worth waiting for this to be completed and adopted by the new District Council. It might be obvious to all who live in Ivinghoe that the open aspect from the lawn to Mentmore is unique, but the documentation shows that it is recognised by the whole district, distinguishing Ivinghoe's case from many others.





## Look out for Bee Orchids Parish Clerk

Lovely Bee Orchids, also seen in and around the chalk quarry Sadly we do not have the luxury of colour here. The outer petals are a pale mauve and the middle part is dark red and pale yellow to attract the bees

There are a number of fledgling bee orchid plants growing on the grass banks by Short Hale and Dover Close.

At the moment, you can make out the leaves close down by

the grass, so please watch where you are treading. The flowers appear in June, or sometimes May. Bee Orchids do not flower each year, but we may be lucky and get a good display. According to the Wildlife Trust 'The Bee Orchid has evolved beelike flowers; drawing [its pollinators] in with the promise of love. The bees are naturally attracted to the flowers and fly in to attempt a mating. As they land on the velvet-

textured lip of the flower, the pollen is transferred and the poor bee is left frustrated. Sadly, the right species of bee doesn't occur in the UK, so Bee Orchids are self-pollinated here. Look out for their diminutive flower spikes on dry, chalk and limestone grasslands from June to







# Nursery - making the right choice

If you have a child approaching Nursery age, (born between 1<sup>st</sup> Sept 2012 and 31<sup>st</sup> August 2013) you may be thinking about applying for a Nursery place for your child around now. (*E.g. Hertfordshire applications are open between 9<sup>th</sup> February and 18<sup>th</sup> March 2016*) If you are still undecided as to which Nursery setting to choose, here are a few things to consider:

- Visit as many nursery settings as possible so that you can talk to staff and observe the children. There is a big choice and a range of options, so it's worth taking time to look around.
- It may be important to you that there is a school attached to the nursery, to ease transition to the next stage of education.
- Does the nursery offer a personalised provision for your child, with adult to child ratios that allow the team to respond to your child as an individual?
- Is it a vibrant environment? Do the children look busy, purposeful, happy and relaxed in the setting? Do they seem safe to explore and investigate?
- Does the Nursery work in partnership with you as a parent? Are you included in the learning journey and how often are you involved?
- Does the setting offer flexibility for you to buy nursery sessions in addition to the 15 hours that are funded? This can vary between nursery settings. Grove Road in Tring for example, offers additional sessions and lunch club provision across the week, with the option of providing the children with a hot lunch cooked on site.
- If your child was born between 1<sup>st</sup> April and 31<sup>st</sup> August you can now choose to delay the start of school. How the nursery /school setting responds to this may be a question you would like to ask.

#### Sometimes the choice you make can come down to a 'gut feel' or personal choice, so

visiting all the local nurseries can really help inform your choice. Visits to local establishments are generally welcomed. Local nurseries include:



# Pitstone. The Racing Circuit that could have been

In 1933, against a backdrop of world depression, record levels of unemployment and war, a consortium of entrepreneurs made an offer to Pitstone farmers, to purchase an enormous parcel of land, including Pitstone Hill and what we now know as Castlemead, to provide a home for a race track to replace Brooklands and rival the two leading European circuits: the Targa Floria in Italy and Germany's Nurberg Ring.

For Pitstone farmers facing an uncertain future, the offer from speculators drawn from the world of motor racing, to purchase low yield land from them on which, to build the 435 acre racing circuit had come at the right time. At the time, Pitstone had a population of around 450 and the consortium behind the scheme felt that as no one lived on the proposed site, there would be no one to complain. They were mistaken. PPP will report on the rest of this fascinating tale over the next couple of issues.



## Tales from the Compost Heap

It has, rather belatedly, come to my attention that 2015 was declared the 'International Year of Soils' by no less a body than the United Nations General Assembly. I had no idea that the UN concerned itself with such things; however, it apparently does, and seemingly throughout the year has been spreading the message about the importance of soil health, and how we can safeguard our soils by organic gardening practices.

This of course is where composting comes into the picture. Not only does your homeproduced garden compost increase fertility, it also provides a partial solution to the prosem of waste – the more household waste can be used in the compost heap, the better for the environment in terms of less use of landfill and other sometimes highly mechanized industrial processes, used to deal with what we throw out.

So don't ignore your compost heap this winter. It may be chilly outside, by given a fair chance (and perhaps a cosy covering of old carpet, newspaper or some such), your garden heap will be slowly chugging away, living in harmony with the local worms and doing its work of producing lovely crumbly compost to put the heart back in your s al.





#### FORD END WATERMILL IVINGHOE, BUCKINGHAMSHIRE

The only working watermill to survive intact in the county. The mill, recorded in 1616 but probably much older, was in use until 1963.

Now restored by volunteers and run by Ford End Watennill Society, it retains all the atmosphere of a small farm mill of the late 1800s. Visitors can work the sack hoist and mill wheat on a rotary hand quern. Stoneground wholemeal flour for sale on milling days.


