Undoubtedly, the highlight of the last month has been the overwhelming success of the Neighbourhood Plan. My sincere thanks to the steering team, who completed this difficult and arduous task in record time, and of course to the voting community, who supported it so favourably. We are just waiting now for A.V.D.C. to complete the procedure of accepting it and delivering to us, the Parish Made Plan. This would stand this village in good stead against prospective developers for the next 15 years.

We have all received, on our doormats, notification of our local taxes. You will have seen a 10% increase in the Pitstone Parish precept. The village has been protected from a rise over the last 4 or 5 years by careful financial planning. Central Government has cut its financial support to local government i.e. County and District

Councils, which has affected services in the village. The Parish Council has decided to take on some newly devolved services, particularly grass cutting and other associated maintenance.

The financial sum that was ringfenced for upkeep and maintenance of the Pavilion site on Marsworth Road has expired. This money was originally \$106 money from the phase one Castlemead development some 15 years ago. This now places the onus on the Parish Precept but a new Sports and Leisure Committee is working extremely hard to balance income with expenditure. Now that the weather is improving, and the days are lengthening please can we hope that dog owners will take their pets further a field rather than letting them make deposits along Marsworth Road. Finally, aren't the daffodils around the village lovely? A real herald of Spring.

May 5th and June 23rd. Are you registered to vote?

The March referendum on Pitstone Neighbourhood Plan was a tremendous success with 1127 votes in favour of the plan and 39 against. A 49% turnout is high for any local election but it could have been higher. Nearly as many people as voted against the plan came to the polling station and found they weren't registered to vote.

For several years now registration has to be done individually, not by household. But you can register to vote at any time.

Although you don't have to take your polling card to the polling station in order to vote, if you don't get one, or if only one person in your household gets one, it's a good indication you are not on the register.


#### **Cooks Wharf**

After almost two years and many emails, Bucks County Council have agreed to repair the railings at Cooks Wharf bridge, although it is disputed as to who is actually responsible for future maintenance. The lead time for the repair is June.

#### AVDC have launched an antilittering campaign:

In March Aylesbury Vale District Council set up a display in Market Square, Aylesbury, to showcase the amount of litter dropped in the town centre throughout the day. The displays highlighted the problems litter creates and helped promote AVDC's anti-littering message: 'Bin it or take it home.' The council has to spend £350,000 each year picking up litter from streets, main roads, parks and open spaces. AVDC's Cabinet Member for Environment and Waste said: "A substantial part of our budget has to be set aside each year to clean up litter as it's not only an eyesore but can also become a real health hazard. We'd much prefer to spend this money improving services and facilities for residents, rather than having to pay for expensive and preventable clean-up operations. The problem is made yet more acute as our budget is under ever increasing pressure with our funding from central government soon due

As well as AVDC clean-ups various voluntary groups around the Vale support these initiatives.

# Update on AVDC becoming a unitary authority

AVDC Cabinet Member for Business Transformation, Cllr Janet Blake, has called for the county's local authorities to get round the table and discuss a unitary future for Buckinghamshire.

Recent comments from
Buckinghamshire County Council's
former Chief Executive have reignited
the debate on unitary authorities,
something AVDC was keen to
progress at the end of 2014 - when a
Bucks Business First report gave four
options, concluding that doing
nothing was not an option.

"There's no doubt that our residents and communities are not getting the best deal under the current two tier system, where county and district councils deliver different services. It's not cost effective and lends itself to duplication and confusion, " said Cllr Blake, leader of AVDC.

Last year AVDC commissioned an LG Futures Report, which concluded that two unitary authorities: Bucks, North

and South, was a viable option. The model would see both authorities providing a complete package of district and county services for residents of the Vale. "We shared this report with other district leaders in the county but found there was no appetite to progress discussions. As a councillor for both the county and the Vale, I truly believe that having two unitaries in Bucks is the way forward. Whatever the outcome, I'd urge leaders to start talking." Cllr Blake went on to state that our population will grow to around 250,000 over the next 20 years. "We need councillors who are democratically accountable for providing all services for this area. It's not just about value for money it's also very much about localism."

# Twelve into ten doesn't go: The Tring Station conundrum Thank you to those who completed

the Tring Station questionnaire in the previous edition of PPP.

Your responses demonstrated a healthy interest in alternative ways to get to and from Tring Station, particularly amongst commuters, and those travelling for leisure by train, at weekends.

Sadly, "a healthy interest" is different from "sufficient evidence to justify the introduction of public transport" e.g. the bus service that runs from Tring/Aldbury to the station, is one of the most heavily subsidised in the southeast. But there is a growing recognition at various levels, that the situation at Tring is unsustainable, and before too long, something must be done.

The Parish Council is working with our neighbours at Aldbury, and other local councils, to instigate an integrated transport strategy for West Dacorum /Southern Vale. We will be encouraging a co-ordinated approach to address issues such as the cycleway from Pitstone, increased

car parking and better station facilities, so that Herts and Bucks can support the best interests of local residents.

A number of local parishes have inputted into the re-tendering exercise for the London Midland rail franchise. The operator chosen will take over from October next year. Hopefully the Department for Transport will stipulate an improvement to "overall rail journey experience" in the Watford-MK 'corridor', when awarding the franchise.

All of which, takes time. But momentum is starting to gather, and a number of interested parties do want to make change happen - so perhaps the stars might be aligning themselves...

#### Sports and Leisure

Work continues to specify and develop proposals for enhancing the site at the pavilion to provide better facilities for football and an increased range of sports. More news as and when we have things confirmed. If you have a child with a disability and utilise any of our playgrounds we would love to hear from you. We strive to ensure that all our playgrounds have easy access, a range of equipment that can be utilised by a

wide range of children and plenty of contrasting colours and textures. We have sought to include an increased range of features for disabled children within the proposed new playground for Vicarage Road (once the land issues have been resolved and we are able to install it). If your child has any specific needs or you believe we can improve our playgrounds, please do let us know. You will have noticed that the Parish Council has re-applied for planning permission for the children's playground by the recreation ground. AVDC no longer offer an option to extend the time period on an existing granted application, so we have had to re-apply for the same playground. Once the land becomes available, the Parish Council will remain in a position to act swiftly to install the play space (See picture on page 17 of the proposed plan). Improving our paths, highways and sense of place We hope to see you all at the presentation arranged for 10 May 2016 (6.30pm main hall at Pitstone Memorial Hall) to hear directly from Ben Hamilton-Baillie who has specialist knowledge and experience of innovative solutions for reconciling

traffic movement with quality public spaces, about a potential scheme that would improve safety and access for pedestrians/cyclists, whilst reducing traffic speeds and HGV volumes through the village. We are working on this project with Ivinghoe Parish Council as the scheme would affect both communities. We'd encourage you all to come along, listen to Ben, view the literature available and have your say on the proposals being put forward.

For those of you that are unable to attend in person, the literature will be available on the council website and hard copies will be displayed at the surgeries, Brookmead school and Beacon Villages Community Library. Please take some time to review the proposals and provide your feedback to the council.

The completed feasibility study by Transport for Bucks into a footpath between Pitstone and Marsworth is anticipated soon. The two parish councils are working to submit a bid for funding from the New Homes Bonus scheme in July 2016, the results of which will be known in October. We will keep you updated with progress.

New post box now operational in Windsor Road

After two years of negotiations and effort, Royal Mail has installed a post box on the green by the Windsor Road play area. Our thanks to Gary Plummer at Royal Mail for all his assistance and support with this project over the last 24 months. Collection times 4.45pm Monday to



Friday and 9am Saturday.

during term time at Brookmead School. If you can spare just 90 minutes once a week, or once a



fortnight, to play card/board games, serve refreshments, chat to our young people and/or join in with activities, sports or crafts we would be delighted to hear from you. Aged 18yrs+ with no upper limit! No qualifications necessary. Our café is an amazing resource,

with over 70 young people attending each week, mainly aged 11-15yrs. It helps the youths to keep in touch with village friends once they all disperse to the various different senior schools, provides opportunities to get to know people in other year groups, learn new skills, chat to qualified youth workers or our PCSO, join in with sports and crafts or just hang out in a safe, warm place to natter to friends. Since its inception, the levels of antisocial behaviour and vandalism in the village have also significantly reduced. Our existing volunteers range from 18yrs up to their 80yrs, and they gain as much benefit from helping at the café as the youngsters do. Most don't have children that attend. These are our young adults of tomorrow, please spare them a little

of your time today.

Arriva announce changes to bus services from 1 May 2016 Service 61: Aylesbury – Dunstable A new timetable will be introduced with off-peak buses running every 90-120 minutes.

On Monday to Saturday evenings the 1900 and 2020 journeys from Aylesbury to Ivinghoe will be replaced by a journey at 1945 and the 1940 and 2100 journeys from

Ivinghoe to Aylesbury will be replaced by a journey at 2025. In addition, one early morning journey on schooldays will be diverted between Aylesbury and Tring to serve Wendover and RAF Halton instead of Aston Clinton -Service 500 provides alternative buses every 20-30 minutes between Aylesbury, Aston Clinton and Tring. A copy of the new timetable will be made available on our website <a href="http://">http://</a> www.transportforbucks.net/Busesandtrains/Bus-timetables.aspx. in advance of the service change dates. Arriva are currently producing new timetable leaflets and will also be providing information on their buses. There will also be changes to Aylesbury Town Services 8 and 9, Service 50 (Aylesbury – RAF Halton) and Service 60/X60 (Aylesbury -Buckingham/Milton Keynes) from the same date and changes to Service 500 (Aylesbury – Watford) from the following week.

The decision to make changes to these services, which operate commercially, has been made by the bus operator to reflect current and anticipated patronage.

Please be a considerate villager - parking and speeding Whilst we appreciate that the vast

majority of residents are probably law abiding citizens, the parish council receives a number of complaints relating to inconsiderate parking, parking on footpaths, parking too close to corners and junctions thus blocking sight lines, inappropriate speeding down village residential side roads and inconsiderate dog owners failing to pick up fouling from the footpaths and open spaces.

Please try to be considerate to your fellow Pitstone residents.
You may be ticketed by Thames Valley Police if you park on the pavement and don't leave sufficient space for a pushchair or mobility scooter to pass safely. By parking too close to a junction, on a bend,

on top of the 'keep clear' sign by the shop or exactly opposite another parked car, you may well cause another vehicle to have an accident as they can't see around your car and edge out, or you may potentially delay a fire engine reaching its destination or prevent someone further down the road having their refuse collected. One third of all Pitstone residents are under 18 and now the evenings are getting lighter, the children will be back outside playing, so do take care, and slow down.

We all live in this village together. Let's make it the best place to live, and consider other residents before we act thoughtlessly.

All staff, at the waste site, are happy to offer advice on which skip to use. They will even take your waste from you if you're struggling. Sadly, as with everything, a minority of users do not pre-sort their waste preferring

to load all their waste into a single, convenient skip.

Car drivers face being asked to leave the facility with their rubbish, if they are seen to be dumping material in the wrong skip.


I was told by a member of staff, that when a skip is weighed to determine the value of material it contained, its

worth can be reduced, depending on the perceived amount of material that does not belong in it. If a skip contains too much that 'spoils' it, the whole load, including material that could be recycled, is reassigned to landfill, fuelling the urban myth

#### End of an Era

Rev Adrian Manning. Vicar, Ivinghoe, Pitstone, Slapton Marsworth. On Wednesday 6<sup>th</sup> April the funeral of Miss Rosemary Elliott was held in St Mary the Virgin Church. Rosemary was known by all as Jane, and lived in the old shop opposite the church. She lived alone and after she closed the shop in about the year 2000, rarely came out. She inherited the business from her mother. The shop had been run by the family for at least 150 years and probably 200. This is the end of an era for Ivinghoe.

Although her neighbours, a nephew and a few friends looked

out for her and delivered food parcels, she lived an isolated life for her final years. It is astonishing and very sad that in this age she had to manage without hot water or heating, living without a kitchen, bathroom or inside toilet.

Although Jane lived and sadly died alone, many came to the parish church to mourn her passing. For many years she was part of our lives and we were part of hers. Are there other solitary or lonely figures in our community who perhaps lack even the friends who cared for Jane?

# WINDMILL BOOK LAUNCH AT BROOKMEAD SCHOOL

The children will learn that Pitstone Windmill has stood in its field for at least 400 years. It is the oldest post mill in England and its survival into the 21<sup>st</sup> century can be attributed to a group of enthusiastic volunteers, most of them from Pitstone, Ivinghoe and the surrounding area, who took on the mammoth task of restoring the mill and saving it from destruction. The new book describes the history, restoration and mechanical workings of the mill and, for the first time, gives





#### Is your Hedge or Tree overhanging the public highway?

Transport for Buckinghamshire (TfB) on behalf of Buckinghamshire County Council, would remind home and land owners that it is their responsibility to keep the highway free from overhanging trees, shrubs and overgrown bushes etc. Landowners must ensure that there is no obstruction or partial obstruction to the footway or carriageway.

TfB regularly makes inspections and also receives reports regarding obstructions on the highway. If you are notified, TfB would ask that you arrange to have any obstruction cut back within 14 days.



## Pitstone. The Racing Circuit that could have been

Continuation from issue 107 of the story provided by Klaus Ginda

The year 1933 was welcomed with customary optimism by revellers on the streets and in the nightspots of London. It was among the liveliest New Year's Eve celebrations the capital had ever seen.

The note of optimism did not ring for long, though. In January 1933 Hitler was elected Chancellor of Germany while in Pitstone, journalists from the world's press were visiting the site for the proposed motor race course, and the consensus was that they were 'deeply impressed with its potentialities'.

Enthusiasts of the proposed race circuit formed a consortium. Among them were Captain George A. E. Oyston, land speed recorder holder, awarded the Seagrove Trophy in 1935, C. R. Whitecroft, and H. N. Edwards, Secretary of the British Racing Drivers Club. The consortium called upon the skills of the current luminaries of the sport. British and foreign drivers were invited to view the proposed plans and the site, and contribute to the design of a circuit that was challenging for participants, with rewarding vantage points for spectators. At four miles long, to facilitate timekeeping, the Pitstone circuit was shorter than its main international rivals but offered the spectator freedom of movement. Pitstone was viewed as a suitable site because a crowd could be drawn from a potential audience of 9,000,000, within a radius of 40 miles. The Home Counties were seen as a great playground, spread out at London's very door. Hyde Park Corner, only 32 miles away, was well served by arterial roads, and Tring station was little more than a mile away from the village.

The project would employ 700 workers in the construction phase, but voices were raised and letters appeared in the national press.

#### 'Together, we can tackle child abuse'

new national campaign

The County Council is supporting a national campaign launched on 3 March by the Department for Education to encourage members of the public to report child abuse.

The campaign's main message is that if you're worried about a child or think their safety might be at risk, then it is important to tell someone. You don't have to be absolutely certain about whether a child is being abused; if you have a feeling that something's not right, talk to your local children's social care team who can look into it.

It is not just up to social services, doctors and the police to spot the signs of abuse and neglect. It is important that we all look out for children and young people within our community. Members of the public, and particularly other parents, are in a unique position to spot concerns among children with whom they have contact, which may not be apparent to professionals.

Some of the signs of abuse or neglect include changes in:

Appearance – such as frequent unexplained injuries, consistently poor hygiene, matted hair, unexplained gifts, or a parent regularly collecting children from school when drunk

Behaviour - such as demanding or aggressive behavior, frequent lateness or absence from school, avoiding their own family, misusing drugs or alcohol, or being constantly tired

Communication – such as sexual or aggressive language, self-harming, becoming secretive and reluctant to share information or being overly obedient

A third of people who suspect child abuse, do nothing. Some don't act because they're worried about being wrong. It is better to help children as early as possible so that action can be taken to help the child and support the family concerned.

In 2014/15 more than 400,000 children in England were supported because someone noticed they needed help.




