

COUNTY COUNCIL NEWS

Avril Davies County Councillor, Ivinghoe Division

Planning for school places has been given a high priority, joint working between planners and education has started and local head teachers have had a positive meeting with county officers.

At the annual Transport for Bucks conference, a promise was made to begin work on an HGV strategy, and I put my name forward for the working group, which kicks off in February.

The local area forum has sent the proposed letter to the Police and Crime Commissioner on the enforcement of speed limits in rural areas, where significant breaches have been recorder by volunteers.

The Chief Constable has responded in writing, which will be put before the next LAF (Local Area Forum) meeting in early February.

The proposals to change home to school transport policies for secondary school pupils have been abandoned, which is good news for my Division

The joint bid from Pitstone and Marsworth Parish Councils to the New Homes Bonus fund has been successful and work is beginning on designing and building the footway to make walking between the two villages a much safer enterprise.

A new 'Active Bucks', County Council walk has been launched from College Lake, every Wednesday at 10.15am.
Participation is free, much like the Monday walk from Ivinghoe Lawn, which is such a success that it will feature in a County Council video.

I visited the Greatmoor Energy from Waste, For more information on the plant, see page 28.

I continue to be impressed by the good work the Aylesbury cluster of children centres are doing in Wing and Ivinghoe. Where they have to share sessions between centres, they hope to facilitate more informal sessions on a voluntary basis, however £500K of cuts for children's centres is proposed in the current budget. The County is yet again looking to reduce its spending by £46M in the next four years, 75% by 'efficiencies' and only 6% by cuts, but where efficiencies are not achievable, cuts are the result. The County's total budget is about £340M, of which £58M is in ring fenced grants. The £23M general support grant will only continue for the next two years, and although due to be

replaced by a share of the business rate going to central government council tax will inevitably increase as the £46M of savings still needs to be found.

It is going to be very difficult to deliver public services at a local government level in the foreseeable future. The chance for Parish Councils to take more responsibility for their own locality has had a mixed response. The future hangs on the Secretary of State and council, and the impact of a local plan on the environment, our quality of life, roads, schools and other services in our communities.

Finally, may I add a personal thank you to everyone who has been so kind and supportive and said such lovely things about my father, who passed away in his sleep on January 4th, one month short of his 97th birthday. 'B' was a well known figure in lvinghoe until he moved to sheltered accommodation 18 months ago. Someone was kind enough to say to me 'He gave a lot to the village in his paintings and drawings, that meant a lot to people'. He had a great life here after my mother died, and thank you to everyone who made that happen for him.



DISTRICT COUNCIL NEWS

Sandra Jenkins & Derek Town, District Councillors, Pitstone & Cheddington Ward

Vale Aylesbury local Plan

AVDC Officers have sought to reduce the unmet need from Wycombe, Chiltern and South Bucks District Councils through the continuing Duty to Co-operate. Both Wycombe and Chiltern/South Bucks had been able to find capacity for more houses than originally declared. This means that AVDC will now be working to a figure of 26,800 homes and the Strategy will need re-writing, so the timetable for submission of the VALP has been pushed back by 8 weeks.

HS2 Information

As parishes will be aware the Bill

is at the stage of examination by the House of Lords Select Committee with the aim of HS2 for the Bill achieving Royal Assent at some point in 2017.

AVDC continues to oppose plans for HS2, and has secured a number of assurances from HS2 through the petitioning process and has continued to petition on a number of issues in the House of Lords Select Committee stage. However if the Bill is successful AVDC will continue to seek the best mitigation for those communities directly and indirectly affected through the planning process



as well as to look for benefits and opportunities for the vale.

In anticipation of receiving Royal Assent, HS2 are carrying out some preparatory 'enabling' work, which includes ground investigations, surveys and other gathering of information as part of their preliminary works, including:

- Surveys (ecology, arboriculture, topographic, structural, demolition)
- Watercourse works including modelling
- Archaeology
- Advance planting & landscaping
- Habitat creation and species translocation
- Site clearance and compound creation
- Utility diversions
- Highway capacity and safety reviews, upgrades & diversions where needed This is likely to increase in early 2017.

The majority of this work will

not require planning permission, and the responsibility for it lies with HS2. Whilst we appreciate that this creates concern and anxiety for local residents and can be seen as HS2 jumping the gun, we do not have the powers to stop such work. If there are any concerns over this work HS2 have a dedicated web site https://www.gov.uk/government/organisations/high-speed-two-limited or contact HS2 directly on 020 7944 4908 or email to HS2enquiries@hs2.org.uk

However there may be some development such as compounds related to that work that will require planning permission in the normal way ahead of the Bill becoming an Act of Parliament. There may also be some applications coming forward as a result of landowner discussions with HS2 for some changes which affects land outside Bill or "build limits (the land identified in the Bill as affected). These will be considered under the usual planning regime.

New development commences in Aylesbury Town Centre Exchange Street car park

The construction work for Aylesbury Vale District Council's exciting new development in the Exchange Street car park will commenced on Monday, 9 January, with AVDC's chosen development partner for the scheme, Durkan Ltd.

The new development will provide Aylesbury town centre with its first purpose-built mixed restaurant and residential development, reflecting how modern town centres are changing to meet a demand for more town centre homes and leisure dining.

The development will take place at the top end of the Exchange Street car park, opposite the cinema. It will create four new restaurants with 47 one and two bedroom apartments above them and a stunning new public square funded by a grant from the South East Midlands Local Enterprise.

The development means that the Exchange Street car park has lost around 120 parking spaces. However, most of these have already been offset by the new car

park adjacent to the site which was opened last year by Bucks County Council. All the existing disabled bays from the Exchange Street car park will be relocated within the development and a number of 30 minute short stay and market trader van bays will be relocated too.

During the construction period, approximately 30 additional parking spaces will be temporarily lost to allow the construction traffic access around bottom and cinema side, ensuring safety for car park users.

Cllr. Neil Blake, Leader of Aylesbury Vale District Council, said: "This new development is an important stage within Aylesbury Town Centre's regeneration and it is with great anticipation that we see the development start. The Exchange will help provide Aylesbury with the facilities required in a modern town centre, giving both residents and visitors more reason to come into the town."

Introducing Aylesbury Garden Town

Aylesbury has been chosen by the government to become one of three new Garden Towns, which will see it receive more than half a million pounds initially to help improve the long-term plans for the town and

develop infrastructure proposals. In telling AVDC that they were successful in their bid for an initial £540,000, Gavin Barwell MP, Minister of State for Housing and Planning, said: "I am impressed by the strength of local leadership and commitment to transformational change that your expression of interest shows." AVDC submitted an application in October explaining why Aylesbury is the perfect place to become part of the Garden Town programme due to its central location within the 'brain belt' between Oxford and Cambridge, and its critical role in delivering growth for the district and the wider area. Aylesbury Vale is set to have 27,000 new homes built in the next 15 years, with Aylesbury itself expected to accommodate around 15,000 of them. Getting Garden Town status gives AVDC the opportunity to develop Aylesbury and the surrounding area in a truly visionary and sustainable way, supporting its development as a settlement that offers the best of town and country living. The money will be spent in a number of areas such as developing the longer term masterplan for the town, which will look at improving transport links and

green infrastructure, which could include new parks and cycle routes. The funding and support that comes hand-in-hand with being a Garden Town will help the whole Vale become a greener, more connected and more vibrant place to live, work and visit.



Councillor Neil Blake, Leader of the Aylesbury Vale District Council said: "I am tremendously pleased that our hard work to make Aylesbury Vale the best possible place to live and work has been recognised by government. People right across the Vale and beyond will benefit from Aylesbury becoming a Garden Town, and it will truly help unlock the town's full potential. It's an exciting opportunity to help make Aylesbury a more inclusive, innovative and

forward looking town that meets the needs and aspirations of people who live in the area, as well as businesses and visitors." AVDC will work closely with a range of partners to deliver the garden towns programme including central government agencies, Buckinghamshire County Council, the two Local Enterprise Partnerships, developers and town and parish councils.

UNITARY - Could five Councils become two?

On 16th January, District Councillors across Bucks voted in favour of submitting to Government, the business case for having two new councils for Buckinghamshire. The proposal is to abolish the county and the four district authorities and replace them with two new unitary councils, one in the north alongside the existing unitary of Milton Keynes and one in the south to cover the area of the three southern district councils. This will save tax payers almost £58million over a five-year period. Under the new proposals each unitary council would be responsible for the delivery of all council services.

Late last year, the district councils engaged with 146 key stakeholder

organisations across Bucks (this included Parish Councils). 41% favoured a two-unitary model, 32% favoured a three-unitary model whilst only 27% said they would prefer a single unitary authority (as proposed by Bucks County Council). This information has been used to help form a proposal for innovative change that will not only improve the outcomes for the people of Bucks, but will also provide a solid foundation for service provision and future challenges.

AVDC together with Wycombe, Chiltern and South Bucks District Councils, have commissioned Deloitte to undertake an open and independent review to find the best option for the future of local government in Buckinghamshire.

Our proposal is to abolish all five county and district authorities and replace them with two new unitary councils, one in the north (current AVDC) alongside the existing unitary of Milton Keynes and one in the south to cover the area of the three southern district councils, saving tax payers almost £58million over a five-year period. Under the new proposals each unitary council would be responsible for the delivery of all

council services.

The four district councils have now drawn up a proposal for two new unitary councils in Bucks. This was presented to members of the council at each of the four districts on Monday 16 January. They are in agreement that we will be submitting our proposal to the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government. The four District Leaders met with the Secretary of State for Communities and Local Government, Sajid Javid, on Thursday 19 January to discuss the districts' proposal. He has already stated that he will make a decision early this year. If a proposal is adopted, it is

unlikely that changes would be implemented until spring 2019.

As part of the work to draft the business case Deloitte considered evidence about the current performance of services and the geography, topography, economies and communities which make up this diverse County. We have looked at models of delivery across the Country and abroad and have looked at the challenges which local government is likely to face in the future.



Do you have a local housing need?

Footpath between Pitstone and Marsworth receives important grant funding

We are delighted to confirm that a footpath along the B489 between Pitstone and Marsworth is now looking viable following our successful grant application (by Pitstone and Marsworth Parish

Councils) for up to £200,000 from Aylesbury Vale District Council's New Homes Bonus Scheme.

As you know, the B489 between Marsworth and Pitstone is a 1.3km, derestricted road carrying approximately 1 million vehicles per year, of all sizes,

in both directions. There is no pedestrian footway and the road travels over a blind summit making it dangerous for pedestrians, wheelchair and pushchair users, and other slow moving unprotected traffic. As a consequence

many potential users are deterred from walking along the route and denied access to facilities at the other end. The new path will provide Pitstone residents with safe walkway to the Chilterns Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, the reservoirs and

canal around Marsworth, the College Lake wildlife centre (via the bridleway), two public houses, Marsworth primary and pre-schools and Marsworth church.

Marsworth residents will benefit from access to 2 shops, 2 doctors

surgeries, the pharmacy, the Beacon Villages Community Library, the post office, the number 61 bus service, the sports and recreation facilities in Pitstone and Ivinghoe, 2 restaurants plus a take-away, both primary and preschool facilities and employment opportunities at Pitstone Business



Park.

Both Pitstone Parish Council and Marsworth Parish Council have been working on proposals for this scheme for a number of years in conjunction with Bucks County Council Local Area Forum. The first stage Road Safety Audit has been undertaken, and the subsequent Feasibility Study and Biodiversity Assessment. Now that sufficient funding has been secured, the full Engineering Report has been commissioned. Next, Transport for Bucks will enter into a tender procurement phase for the works. We hope that actual construction may commence in September 2017 (post the closed season for hedgerow works to preserve biodiversity) and be completed by December 2017.

Both parish councils, the Bucks County Council Local Area Forum and County Councillor Avril Davies' Community Leaders Grant are also contributing financially to the scheme. Our sincere thanks to all those bodies involved with bringing this project to fruition. This project received a grant from Aylesbury Vale District Council's New Homes Bonus Funding Scheme. 
A quick update on other highway matters



Update on Luton airport

We are advised that:
The airport is now up to
14 million passengers per
annum, growth fuelled by the
comparatively strong economy,
business from Eastern Europe and

attractive deals. Construction work to cope with increased numbers (up to 18mppa) is in its comparatively early stages. A revised flightpath was introduced in 2015 for some departures in westerly winds and does not affect Bucks. A combination of reducing the planes' speeds and advances in new technology means changes could be made so that now the vast majority of the flights fly within 500m of the official centre line, which would be good news for many communities.

LADACAN – a community action group – explained that as well as significantly more flights, the fleet mix has altered and there are fewer quieter planes now at Luton. The planes are carrying more passengers and perhaps freight, so they are heavier and therefore noisier. Luton's planes arrive and depart in bunches,



and such bunches are lasting longer, and the planes are flying closer together. Remember that if you are

What would help most communities (apart from those who really are at the ends of the runway) would be if the planes could fly higher for longer. However, interaction with other flightpaths for other airports and holding positions (stacks) make this impossible most of the time. Eventually they want to move the stacks further out and higher up, which would make a huge difference. Heathrow is trialling a later deployment of the undercarriage and we understand that Luton are going to meet with Heathrow with a view to reducing their own deployment. Some plane engines are being retro-fitted to reduce a whining/whistling noise.

Luton Borough Council are currently consulting on a Mass Passenger Transit System to move passengers to and from Luton Airport Parkway railway station and the airport terminal. It is anticipated

that they will submit a planning application in 2017. The airport has asked Arriva to review its bus service from Aylesbury to the airport (which currently requires several changes of bus service).

ENERGY FROM OUR WASTE SAVES US MONEY

Do you ever wonder what happens to the things you put in your waste bin?

All of the residual (non-recyclable) household waste generated in Buckinghamshire is now processed at the Greatmoor Energy from Waste facility, at Woodham, near Aylesbury. Greatmoor is operated by FCC Environment, in partnership with Buckinghamshire County Council.

Greatmoor has the capacity to treat up to 300,000 tonnes of waste a year (approximately 900 tonnes a day), waste which would otherwise have gone to landfill. As a result, it generates a minimum of 22 megawatts of electricity to the national grid, meeting the energy needs of around 36,000 homes.

This alternative treatment of waste will result in a saving to Buckinghamshire County Council of approximately £150 million over the life of the contract.

Greatmoor has a visitor centre, and offers free guided tours by prior agreement. Tours are open to local organisations, clubs, schools (Key

Stage 2 and above), colleges and universities. If you are not a member of a local group but would like a tour, why not organise a group of your friends for a visit, or come to one of our open days?




