As we move into spring we start to see the delightful changes to the countryside in fields, hedgerows and trees. This year, around the recreation ground, those changes will include the removal of two trees that have been killed by bark stripping. We have involved the police and are taking further steps to find the culprits, but we really need everyone's help. Almost £23.5K of funding secured for Phase I of the redevelopment at the sports pavilion

The parish council is delighted to announce that grant funding has been secured to commence work on the first phase of improvements to the sports pavilion site on Marsworth Road. Phase I will see the replacement of a section of perimeter fencing, the installation of two sections of ball-stop netting and an enlargement of the senior pitch. This will start to: bring the site up to the specification *required by the*

football league should the senior club gain promotion, improve safety for those using our site and help to make the site more attractive to users.

We are most grateful for all the support received. This project has received £14,298 from the Premier League, through the Football Stadia Improvement Fund; £7,791 awarded by Aylesbury Vale District Council following a release of Section 106 developer contribution funds towards sport & leisure in the parish; Pitstone & Ivinghoe Junior Football Club have provided a donation of £300; Pitstone & Ivinghoe United Football Club (seniors) have provided a donation of \pounds 1.100 and the remainder has been contributed by the parish council. After a lengthy tender process, **AlphaFence Sports & Security** Fencing will be engaged to install the perimeter fence and ball-stop netting, and Agripower are being employed to carry out the pitch enhancements. At the time of writing (December 2017) it was envisaged that work would be commencing shortly, and therefore should - all being well have been completed by the time you read this.

Village roadside litter bins / dog bins

Please be mindful that the parish council provides a number of litter bins around the parish for you to use for the disposal of small items of litter as you are walking around e.g. confectionary wrappers and empty drink bottles. The council employs three retired gentlemen to empty these bins and they physically carry the contents to the Memorial Hall wheelie bin, where we pay the hall a fee for utilising their bin. Increasingly, these bins are being used by residents to discard bulky waste that they don't wish to put into their personal refuse bins such as heavy bags of soiled cat litter, carrier bags of soiled nappies, excess food waste, lots of packaging from birthdays/ Christmas deliveries and presents, old clothes/blankets and garden waste. After Halloween we found several bulky discarded pumpkins in the bins, despite AVDC saying that they would take away all pumpkins left alongside the food waste collection bins. Such deposits cause all types of complications and issues for our staff members, especially when items are heavy, pose health & safety hazards or can't be put into the general waste wheelie bins. Glebe Close and Windsor Road seem to be particularly prone to issues.

Unfortunately, we also find black sacks full of dog fouling left next to the village dog bins, which rip open and spread across the footpaths, for which AVDC need to send out a specialist clean-up team for hazardous waste. Please dispose of all your refuse responsibly.

AVDC can supply larger refuse and recycling bins or additional recycling bins if you need them.

AVDC will take additional recycling if you leave it in a cardboard box next to your blue bin on collection day.

You can sign up to the garden waste collection scheme with AVDC.

AVDC also offer a bulky item collection scheme.

Any surplus waste, or materials such as batteries, can be taken to the recycling centre at Aston Clinton.

There are clothing/shoe banks outside Masons and outside Colbree Engineering.

Inconsiderate Parking

Inconsiderate parking is another area that seems to cause a multitude of problems around the village, especially where the roads are narrow, where parking causes visibility problems at junctions, when vehicles park on the pavement so pedestrians are forced into the highway, and when people park on top of 'keep clear' signs. Here is some useful information provided to us by Thame Valley Police and Bucks Fire.

According to the Highway Code, you must not park:

- On a pedestrian crossing, including the area marked by the zig-zag lines
- In marked taxi bays
- In a cycle lane
- On red lines
- In spaces reserved for Blue Badge holders, residents or motorbikes (unless entitled to do so)
- Near a school entrance, including the area marked by the zig-zag lines
- Anywhere that would prevent access for Emergency Services at or near a bus stop
- Opposite or within 10 meters of a junction
- Over a dropped kerb
- In front of the entrance to a property

Answers to the top parking related questions:

- You don't have the right to the parking space outside your house.
 So long as they don't break the law or contravene parking regulations or restrictions, anyone can park there.
 - * You can't force your

neighbour to utilise their garage or driveway should they choose to park on the road instead.

- There is no restriction on how long a vehicle may park there, so long as it is taxed, insured and has an MOT. The only exception being if the police believe it to be abandoned.
- Driving on a pavement has been banned since the Highways Act of 1835.
 Parking on the pavement in London is banned in the Highway Code. If you do park partially on the pavement you must leave enough clearance for a double buggy to safely use the path, otherwise you will be committing other offences.
- The law only deals with obstruction to the highway, not your driveway. If someone has parked in such a way that your driveway is being blocked the police might be able to give you advice, but probably wouldn't be able

to take any action other than asking them to move it.

 If someone parks on your actual driveway without your permission, this is trespassing. Trespass is a civil, rather than criminal, offence. This means that the police are powerless to take action.

Access for Emergency Vehicles and Refuse Lorries

Firefighters are urging people to think about access for emergency service vehicles when parking in the street. Inconsiderate parking causes them to lose valuable time, and this could be vital if they are responding to an emergency incident. A fire engine needs 10ft (3 metres) clearance to pass safely and it doesn't need to be a whole row of cars to cause a delay, it only takes two cars almost opposite each other, to cause an obstruction. Bucks Fire urge residents to think about their parking as they could be putting the lives of their families, friends and neighbours at risk.

...so please be considerate when using and parking your vehicle.

Other motoring reminders provided by Thames Valley Police:

10 Motoring Laws people forget or ignore

- You should only use your fog lights when visibility is "seriously reduced" i.e. less than 100m.
- Failing to come to a complete halt at a 'stop' junction is breaking the law.
- If you fail to clear snow from your roof and it slips over your windscreen or slides into the path of another car, you could be open to a charge of 'driving without due consideration' or 'using a motor vehicle in a dangerous



condition'.

If you splash a pedestrian with a puddle they have the right to take your registration number and report you to the police where you may be prosecuted for 'careless driving'

 You must only enter a boxed junction if your exit is clear. You commit an office if the exit isn't clear or part of your vehicle is inside the box whilst you are stationary. You must be safely parked to use your mobile in a vehicle –
 being in a queue of traffic or sitting at lights doesn't count. If you are using a sat-nav app on your mobile, your phone must be in hands free mode and/or in a cradle. The penalty for using a
 hand-held phone includes, at the very least, 6 penalty points on your licence.

- Changing your car? The seller must now 'cash in' any unused car tax on the vehicle and the buyer must buy new car tax before you can drive the car on the highway.
- Your photocard driving licence is only valid for 10 years and

failing to update it can lead to a fine of up to $\pounds 1,000$.

- It is an offence to drive in the outside lane of a motorway towing a trailer or caravan unless you are in an emergency situation or overtaking an exceptionally wide vehicle.
 - You are breaking the law (and probably invalidating your car insurance) if you leave your car engine running while you defrost your car in the street while sipping coffee on your door step. You must be 'in charge' of your vehicle at all times when the engine is running, otherwise you risk a fine. If you leave your car, the engine must be off and the handbrake on.

... and remember that it is now illegal to smoke in your vehicle while children are in the car.



Visits to Greatmoor

Energy from Waste

Do you ever wonder what happens to the things you put in your waste bin? Your recycling is sorted and passed on to recycling companies, but what about your non-recyclable waste?

So far over 2500 visitors to Greatmoor Energy from Waste have found out.

All of the residual (non-recyclable) household waste generated in Buckinghamshire is now processed at the Greatmoor Energy from Waste facility, at Woodham, near Aylesbury. Greatmoor is operated by FCC Environment in partnership with Buckinghamshire County Council.

Greatmoor has the capacity to treat up to 300,000 tonnes of waste a year (approximately 900 tonnes a day), waste which would otherwise have gone to landfill. As a result, it generates a minimum of 22 megawatts of electricity to the national grid – meeting the energy needs of around 36,000 homes.

This alternative treatment of waste will result in a saving to Buckinghamshire County Council of approximately $\pounds 150$ million over the 30 year life of the contract.

Guided tours of Greatmoor are available by prior agreement and at no charge. Visiting groups have included WIs, U3As, Rotary Clubs, Scouts, Cubs, Primary Schools, Colleges and lots of others.

A group visit to Greatmoor can be tailored to your requirements and will include a tour around the facility, which includes the control room (where you will be able to see the cranes loading the waste), a visit to the viewing hatch providing an exciting view into the heart of the fire, the turbine hall and the huge condenser fans, which is an

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and safer operation. Season to Recycle

Over the festive season households generated around 30% more waste, so it was even more important to reduce, reuse and recycle. wrapping paper, boxes and empty bottles.

All year round, please help us by filling the blue-lidded recycling bin with; food plastics apart from cellophane and cling film, cardboard, paper, tins and bottles. If in any doubt, check out our new online Waste Wizard that tells you which items can and cannot be recycled. All your food left-overs can go in the food waste bin.

Vale Lottery – an update.

Vale Lottery was set up by Aylesbury Vale District Council (AVDC) two years ago and was the first of its kind in the country. The following statistics will give a good overview of its success so far. Unlike the National Lottery, Vale Lottery is a much more local affair - with 2800+ tickets bought each week; 180 causes supported; £130,000+ raised for local good causes; £23,000+ cash prizes won so far and a potential £25,000 weekly jackpot. Vale Lottery helps local causes and charities to generate vital funding and organisations who are signed up include schools, animal charities, theatre groups, sports clubs, disability charities and many more.

Most causes raise anything from a few hundred to a few thousand pounds a year.

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useful to know the following -

- The lottery licence is held by AVDC.
- 60% of each £1 ticket cost goes to good causes – 50p is paid directly to the chosen cause and 10p to the Community Fund which supports a range of causes.
- The rest goes to the prize fund, running costs and VAT.

The most positive element of this scheme is that there is no cost to the participating causes ie license, management running costs, set up costs etc. The only real labour is the joining effort on line and the promotion of each cause via social media, newsletters (like this publication for example), additionally AVDC will help advise with the promotion of your cause if you choose to take part.

In December, as part of Buckinghamshire County Council's efforts to ensure a good Christmas for some of our more vulnerable children and young people, I was very proud to be able to support the annual BCC Christmas appeal. Since part of my work on the Corporate Parenting Panel includes working with some of the younger members of our

communities, it was lovely to be able to make their Christmas a bit brighter thanks to our council employees and county councillors, who donated Christmas presents throughout December for disadvantaged children across Buckinghamshire. The presents were wrapped and handed over to children and young people by members of the Council's Children's Services teams in time for Christmas. I was delighted to support this effort, and hope that all our young people had a truly memorable Christmas!

As regards my work with Transport for Bucks, one of the advantages of being on the TfB working group is that it has allowed me to develop some very good working relationships with the TfB team as well as to feed back to them, Pitstone residents' suggestions, ideas and priorities. As I know that residents here in Pitstone are naturally concerned about road repairs it gives me great pleasure to report that in the past few weeks the jet-patching I commissioned this autumn has been completed in Glebe Close and throughout lvinghoe Division just before the colder winter weather comes our way. The B488 through Horton has now been beautifully resurfaced, which means I am turning my attention to examining various options to slow down traffic. These include re-examining speed limits on parts of the B488, looking at the data from the recent traffic count on the Brownlow Bridge in lvinghoe. and assisting in the formation of new speed watch volunteer groups in some of our villages. Please let me know if Pitstone residents are interested in more information on the possibility of a speed watch and I will be happy to explore that with you.

Regarding some of my other work at BCC, it is my great privilege to have been appointed as a Trustee to the National Paralympics Heritage Trust as part of my role as Deputy Cabinet Member for Communities and Public Health. The mission of the NPHT is to enlighten and inspire future generations by celebrating, cherishing and bringing the Paralympic heritage and its stories of human endeavour to life.

Over the next 6 years we aim to establish:

• An archive and collection of national and international importance and interest that will be recorded, accessioned, conserved, stored safely and respected globally.

• A website that enables people access to this unique and inspiring resource alongside the ability to share their own stories.

Regional hub exhibitions telling local stories.

Wheelchair basketball and particularly archery were popular for building upper body strength and inspiring patients to improve their health. 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WHAT'S GOING ON AT COLLEGE

LAKE?

A Happy New Year to you from all at College Lake. We have had some wonderful winter days here at College Lake with bright crisp and sunny ones as well as recent snow. Unfortunately the snow soon became a sheet of ice in our car park and on paths around the reserve so we had to close for nearly a week for safety reasons.

One of my favourite winter tasks is hedge laying, and in mid-November we began laying another section of hedgerow on the eastern side of the reserve, which we have carried out

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in sections over the past few years. As with the previous sections of hedge, we started off by running a beginners course for our trainees and volunteers, showing them how to lay a hedge based on our local Midland style. There were twelve trainees working in pairs learning how to cut and lay the stems, known as pleachers. Hedge laying can look quite drastic and even destructive, but this traditional management technique will rejuvenate a hedgerow and create a good habitat for wildlife from insects to mammals. During our breeding bird surveys last spring we noticed an increase in yellowhammers in the area of the laid sections of the hedge, and believe this is due to creating suitable breeding conditions in these sections of hedgerow. Over the next couple of months we will finish laying the hedge before we stake and bind it.

January will be the first anniversary at: of our Simply Walk at College Lake. Part of the Bucks County Council on health walk scheme with over 80 res walks around the county, our walk cal takes place every Wednesday

morning at 10.30. The idea of these walks is for people to improve their health step by step. It is becoming increasingly well-know that spending time in the natural environment is good for health and wellbeing so we thought College Lake would be an ideal place to host a Simply Walk. On our walks we usually do a 2 mile circuit of the reserve on level ground, but there is always the option of a shorter walk depending on each participant's ability. There is the option of a tea or coffee in our café after the walk. 



ASHRIDGE RAMBLINGS Rikki Harrington

Does British nature provide any greater spectacle than an endless vista of bluebells? Is there any better place to witness this phenomenon than at Ashridge? The bluebells of Ashridge are, perhaps, the most famous in the world. They feature annually in the dailies and periodicals advising people where to see them. I even read about them in an airline magazine – they were billed as a prime reason for visiting Britain (by air, of course) in Spring.

Dockey Wood, on the left of Beacon Road as you head towards Ringshall, is widely reckoned to be the prime site. In my view, this is largely on account of its proximity to the road and the ice cream van. I prefer to go off the blue piste and into the great blue yonder, especially the areas known as Pitstone Common (north-east of the Monument), Albury Common/ Old Copse (south-east of the Monument) and Duncombe Terrace. Wherever you choose, please keep feet and paws off the flowers.

Two years ago, the decision was taken to charge non-National Trust (NT) members for entry to Dockey Wood during peak hours over the two main bluebell weekends. The chief reasons for this were to spread visitor pressure and reduce traffic volume on the long, straight (i.e. fast

and potentially dangerous) Beacon Road. The erection of a fence alongside the wood, and low wood banks to deter access to "elephant tracks" caused by years of trampling, have already led to recovery of bluebells in areas from which they had disappeared. New this year is a dead hedge to prevent trampling of the beautiful beeches at the front of the wood. Soil compaction around the roots of these venerable and vulnerable old giants is undermining their ability to draw water and nutrients into their root systems and so damaging their health and longevity. Just twenty or so years ago, the bluebells grew right up to the verge. Hopefully this new intervention will (Continued from page 34)

Top ten bluebell (Hyacinthoides nonscripta) facts

I) It may also be called common bluebell, English bluebell, British bluebell, wild hyacinth, wood bell, fairy flower and bell bottle.

2) A quarter to a half of all individuals of this species are found in Britain.

3) It is found everywhere in Britain except the northern Outer Hebrides, Orkney and Shetland.

4) It prefers slightly acidic soils and is most prevalent in ancient woodlands.

5) It can grow in open habitats, including coastal meadows, especially in the west.

6) It is pollinated mainly by bumblebees.

7) It is protected from most pests by a suite of defensive compounds.

8) It is protected under the Wildlife and Conservation Act (1981) but not under EU or international law.

9) It has often been voted the UK's favourite flower and has even been banned from some such polls because of its inevitable victory.

10)An albino form can be found in Ashridge. Roughly 1 in every 10,000 plants is white.

services, weddings, funerals and community events. Although some ringers do attend Church, this is not compulsory, and this low cost hobby is open to those of any religion and none.

Learning to safely handle a Church bell takes between 10 to 15 hours of individual tuition which the teachers at Marsworth are happy to offer as they are accredited members of the Association of Ringing Teachers. Once a new ringer is competent at handling these huge, ancient instruments, they are invited to join in with other ringers on practice evenings to start learning to ring in time with others. For those who wish to advance beyond basic ringing, there

is also the opportunity to learn the fascinating art of English Change Ringing.

Change ringers do not need to be able to read music, but must be able to count. People who enjoy computer gaming, solving puzzles, number games and visual patterns can often excel at change ringing which has its roots in mathematical patterns.

To date, more than \pounds 7800 has been raised for the Epilepsy Society; \pounds 950 of which came from the raffle, which was only possible with the support of local businesses.




