New Footpath to Marsworth

Work commenced on 5 February and should be complete by the time you receive this edition of PPP. We hope that you all make good use of the new safe route into Marsworth and up to College Lake Nature Reserve. This project has taken several years to get implemented and funded, and we'd like to express our gratitude to all the parties and individuals that have been involved in pulling together and implementing this initiative. Funding was made available via a New Homes Bonus Grant, a Community Leaders Grant, a Local Area Forum Grant and provision from both parish councils. Look out for details on the website and noticeboards of an official opening ceremony and walk to Marsworth.

Ball Stop Netting and Fencing at the Sports Pavilion

We are delighted that the installation of two sections of ball stop netting, and two sections of replacement fencing at the sports pavilion have now been completed. Work will shortly commence on the extension of the larger pitch. Funding has been made available for this project by the Football Foundation, a release of Section 106 sports & leisure development funds from Aylesbury Vale District Council, donations from both the senior and junior football clubs and a provision by the parish council.

Playgrounds

There are long outstanding plans to update/replace the play equipment on the recreation ground once it has been possible to secure the purchase/use of the land. We also operate two further playgrounds in Hever Close and Windsor Road. The current residential development will see further play equipment installed in the parish. Did you know that we check all our playgrounds on a weekly basis to ensure they are in a good state of repair and safe for your enjoyment? If you are the parent of a child with a disability and have any concerns relating to disabled access or have particular disabled

equipment needs, please get in touch with the parish council on <u>parishclerk@pitstone.co.uk</u>.

Public Transport Infrastructure Bucks County Council are currently investigating how best to utilize the Section 106 public transport funds provided by the residential developments in Vicarage Road and Rushendon Furlong. We will keep you updated once the plans have been confirmed.

Pitstone Community Car Scheme

The parish council is still working with the existing car scheme members, other individuals, advisory bodies and local organisations to relaunch the car scheme. If you can spare some time to volunteer as a driver or would like to take up the post of voluntary coordinator we would love to hear from you.

Should we have a Community Bus?

Bucks County Council and the parish council are jointly investigating whether there is a demand and support for a Community Bus amongst the local parishes. In other locations, such buses might run trips to the supermarket, surgeries, libraries, day care centres, some do scheduled bus routes, some do day trip exercisions, some are used by schools/community groups etc. If you feel a community bus would be of value or would like to volunteer to get involved as a driver/committee member/co-ordinator etc then please get in touch. We will keep you updated with the outcome of the initial investigations.

VALP

Following a productive consultation period, Aylesbury Vale District Council has submitted the Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan – the blueprint that will manage and direct growth until 2033 to the Planning Inspectorate for public examination.

The Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan (VALP) will help to reduce the risk of further uncontrolled growth in the Vale. During the latest consultation period, 988 people or organisations commented on the document, comprising 2,441 individual comments, many via a new online system designed to make it easier for everyone to have their say. All of these comments have been analysed, collated and submitted alongside the full plan document with its supporting evidence. Feedback at this stage of the process was a mixture of views, including some suggestions about how the plan could be revised and new sites

for development.

Cllr. Carole Paternoster, Cabinet Member for Growth Strategy, commented: "This plan is crucial in order for us to secure the right growth in the right place, with the supporting infrastructure to meet the requirements of current and future residents of the Vale, as well as protecting the environment. The response to this consultation shows there is a clear understanding across the Vale of the importance of growth being planned in a measured way."

The Planning Inspector's independent assessment of the VALP, alongside the comments that have been submitted, is likely to begin in the spring. AVDC anticipates this examination will take place throughout 2018 before the Inspector publishes his report and any recommendations for changes, after which the VALP should be formally

adopted towards the end of the year. Once the schedule has been determined by the Inspector, anyone who commented during the consultation period will be notified of the next stage.

STATEMENT ON BEHALF OF ALL BUCKS DISTRICT COUNCILS REGARDING TODAY'S ANNOUNCEMENT ON THE FUTURE OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT IN BUCKS

The Secretary of State, Sajid Javid, has announced in Parliament that he is "minded" to implement Buckinghamshire County Council's proposal to replace the existing five councils in Bucks with a single county-wide unitary.

While we are extremely disappointed, the "minded to" decision is not set in stone, and as the process allows, we will be making the strongest possible representations to the Secretary of State that this decision is not the right one. We don't believe that this decision is in the best interest of our local residents. businesses, community groups, parish councils and various other stakeholders across the county and, based on our own engagement, we don't believe it has strong local support. Our new two unitary proposal, which can be seen at www.modernisingbucks.org recognise s key areas of difference for the communities in the north and the south,

such as the economy, jobs, growth and housing markets. We believe a single large unitary will mean major opportunities will be missed in these areas and that a one size fits all model will not mean the best deal. We also question the savings the single unitary model claims to deliver.

There is now a period until 25 May 2018 during which those interested may make further representations to the Secretary of State and we will be reflecting on today's announcement carefully.





COUNTY NEWS Anne Wight, County Councillor, Ivinghoe Division

I am sure that Pitstone residents join me in hoping that the worst of the winter is now behind us and are looking forward to the spring! One of the unfortunate consequences of such an unusually cold and snowy winter has been the emergence of new potholes in roads all across the county. I realise that this is causing problems for residents in our more rural local areas particularly and so just wanted to remind everyone that if they wish to report any potholes or other highways issues, do please use the BCC website to do so. This will provide a reference number to track the progress of repair work, and will also mean that a log is created so that Transport for Bucks has a record of the report. If you are able to safely photograph the pothole to upload with your report, that also helps the roadworks team.

The website address for reporting highways problems, including potholes is: <u>https://www.buckscc.gov.uk/services/</u> <u>transport-and-roads/report-a-problem/</u> <u>tell-us-about-a-highways-problem/</u>

To report an emergency highways issue, Transport for Bucks has an emergency number to ring instead. This is to be used for trees blocking the road, any hazardous material lying in the road, or any similar situation where the problem needs urgent resolution. I have reprinted these below for your convenience.

If you consider this to be dangerous or an emergency, please call us on: 01296 382416 (9am-5.30pm Mon-Thurs 9am-5pm Friday) or 01296 486630 (out of hours and weekends). Otherwise, by submitting the report online, we will deal with it in line with our agreed timescales.

We councilors have also been given some additional funding to help with jetpatching the worst of our roads, which I will definitely be using to try to address this problem locally.

Moving on to local government issues, Pitstone residents may have read in the news that Sajid Javid (Secretary of State for Housing, Communities and Local Government) is minded to create a new single 'unitary' council to replace the existing five county and district councils across Buckinghamshire.

Of the two proposals sent to him (one for a single unitary and one for two

unitary councils), Mr Javid felt that there would be definite advantages to having a single new council for Buckinghamshire.

Mr Javid said he was minded to implement the single unitary proposal based on local support but also because the two proposed councils would not have a 'credible geography'.

He said: 'I am satisfied that establishing two councils for the current county area is unlikely to improve local government in the area, generate significant savings or provide the capacity to sustain major services or address planning and housing challenges.

'I believe the areas of the two councils would not represent a credible geography or clear local identity and that there is significantly less local support for two councils than for a single council.

'Accordingly, I am not minded to proceed with the proposal for establishing two councils.' (Source: <u>https://www.localgov.co.uk/Javid-backs-</u> <u>single-unitary-council-in-</u> <u>Buckinghamshire/44906</u>)

Detailed explanations are also provided so that residents can see for themselves what the key advantages of the single council are and what the changes will mean for parishes.

We are encouraging people to write to the Secretary of State to confirm their support for this opportunity to make local government in Buckinghamshire sustainable and fit for the future. The new council will save £45m over five years, offer better value to tax payers and be far simpler for them to do business with than the current model of five county and district councils. We are very grateful for the views and contributions to the debate that people have provided so far, and look forward to continuing our discussions to develop the detail of the future approach.

One concern of mine, which I know Pitstone residents will certainly share is helping to prevent people from being scammed in doorstep and online scams and frauds. Among them was Martina Stewart, a resident of Aylesbury (middle front in the photo on page 16, just next to me), who has waged a formidable battle against scammers after seeing some residents in her community lose thousands of pounds to mail scams, online fraud and door-to-door conmen.

It was rewarding to be able to work with Martina and her team to hand out anti-scam leaflets and chat with residents to explain how they could protect themselves against scams and frauds.

I think it is worth pointing out how

Friends Against Scams is a key organisation responsible for hosting scam awareness sessions. Anyone can be involved in Friends Against Scams regardless of background or age. Friends Against Scams welcomes people from all walks of life to "Take a Stand Against Scams". Don't worry if you think you don't know much about scams as the awareness sessions will give you all the information you need.

SCAM champions are Friends Against

Scams who want to do more. They host awareness sessions to recruit Friends and drive Friends Against Scams forward in their communities or workplace, as well as attending an additional session to give them a fuller understanding of the laws surrounding scams and some presentation tips.

If a business or organisation would like to be involved they can become a Friends Against Scams Organisation. Friends Against Scams Organisations will pledge to actively promote the Friends Against Scams initiative; the easiest way to do this is to make all employees Friends Against Scams. There are a range of services available to support organisations in becoming Friends Against Scams.

Unfortunately, frauds can take many forms, including online dating scams as well. Action Fraud has a lot of information on this type of scam which I think residents might find useful.

When you think you've met the perfect partner through an online dating website or app, but the other person is using a fake profile to form a relationship with you they may try to use the site to gain your trust and ask you for money or enough personal information to steal your identity. You can protect yourself by taking a few precautions:

-Avoid giving away too many personal details when dating online. Revealing your full name, date of birth and home address may lead to your identity being stolen.

-Never send or receive money or give away your bank details to someone you've only met online, no matter how much you trust them or believe their story.

-Pick a reputable dating website and use the site's messaging service. Fraudsters want to quickly switch to social media or texting so there's no evidence of them asking you for money.

The majority of accounts on dating websites are genuine people looking for romance, but fraudsters may try to contact you by making fake profiles, getting in touch and building what feels like a loving relationship.







ASHRIDGE RAMBLINGS Rikki Harrington

WALK THE CHALK EVENT ANNOUNCEMENT

We are very fortunate to have vast swathes of chalk downland on our doorsteps. Such habitat is pretty much confined to southern and eastern England (as far north as the Vale of Pickering) and central Texas. The word "chalk" is, in fact, unnecessary here, as "downland" or "downs" (from the Celtic word for "hills"), is defined as "an area of open chalk hills".

The Chilterns cover 322 square miles and were designated an "Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty" (AONB) in 1965. They stretch the 46 miles from Goring-on-Thames to Hitchin and are up to 11 miles wide. They have a steep "scarp slope" on their north-west side and a gradual "dip slope" on their south

-east side. The highest point (876 ft) is Haddington Hill, near Wendover. Our very own lvinghoe Beacon is more prominent, but 60 ft shorter. It is the starting point of the Icknield Way and the Ridgeway long distance trail.

Two thirds of the AONB comprises enclosed fields and a fifth is woodland. Only 4% is open land (commons, heaths and downs), and this open land is very special, hosting a richness of rare wildlife. This richness depends very much on grazing by livestock and wild animals. For me it is the butterflies and their foodplants which make it extra special, the eponymous Chalkhill Blue perhaps being the jewel in the crown, but there's an awful lot under our noses (or feet, perhaps) that is truly fascinating and precious.

The Scouts were given a talk about the site, and then a tour, taking in the whole process of creating energy from our waste, the control room, waste bunker (where they could see the grabber at work and try and identify the waste below - lots of footballs and Dorito packets!) viewing inside the grate where the waste is burned, following the ash to where the metal is taken out of it, learning what happens to clean the flue gas and how the energy is produced. Greatmoor offer organised trips to schools, local groups and now have open day tours and certainly 10 Scouts and 4 leaders would highly recommend a visit there. For more details go to

But have you ever wondered why the church got involved with weddings? At one time the parish priest was the village's 'Clerk in Holy Orders'. So it was certainly convenient that the church should serve the community in this way but why should the church be involved at all?

frog spawn should be seen any day now.

There are signs of spring everywhere around the reserve, but as I write this in mid March we have just had another sprinkling of snow. There are daffodils, primroses and cowslips in flower as well as pussy willow catkins. Some of our breeding waders have returned with up to 4 oystercatcher and the first of the redshank giving their evocative calls which I always think of as the sound of spring. There were lots of frogs at a pond I was working nearby so the first

Out on the reserve we are now finishing our winter work plan. We have been carrying out scrub management on some of the grassland areas of the reserve. Scrub is a really important habitat and will soon have breeding warblers such as white-throat calling and nesting in the patches of bramble we have on the reserve. But if left unmanaged the scrub encroaches on the grassland and becomes too dominant which would affect the wild flowers and invertebrates.

Another area we have been working on is creating a new coppice coup area.

Coppicing involves cutting trees down to ground level which encourages fresh growth. Our volunteer work parties coppiced all of the trees that were manageable with hand tools before we took out some of the bigger trees using chainsaws. This opens up the woodland floor to more sunlight which will encourage regrowth of the coppice stools as well as woodland floor flora such as primrose and violets. Managing areas by coppicing on a rotation is really valuable for the plant life as well as



butterflies such as the speckled wood. Keep an eye on this area of coppice near to the Tump hide over the summer to see how it develops.

We have also worked on another big project near to the Tump with the creation

of a large pond. Our Warden Leo used a mini digger to create the pond before we put down underlay and liner. With such a large and deep pond this proved to be a tricky task, especially as it was a little bit windy on the day. Once the liner was in place we used some of the spoil that was taken out to cover the liner, this helps to weigh the liner down but will also provide a suitable habitat for the aquatic plants that will naturally colonise the pond. We did run out of time with the digger to fully complete the landscaping and covering of the liner but this should take place in the next few weeks so we can then leave the pond and surrounding areas to naturally develop. This will be a valuable habitat for dragonflies and amphibians as well as being a point of interest from the Tump hide. Ponds are a really good way of encouraging wildlife into your garden, for tips on helping wildlife in your own garden visit our website at <u>http://www.bbowt.org.uk/wildlife/gardening-wildlife</u>.

We have a new Wednesday work party helping to maintain our Education Wood area. As the name suggests this is used regularly by our visiting school groups and Nature Tots. The work party have been doing a cracking job in creating new weaved fencing around some of the areas as well as moving a mountain of woodchip to lay on the paths.
