A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

For many years the Parish Council has had plans in place to revamp the play equipment on the recreation ground. These plans have been delayed by a land ownership issue, but we believe that these should be resolved fairly soon. As a result, in the next few weeks you will see some initial preparation work taking place. We will be starting with a new path that will run alongside the existing play area, but will be aligned with the planned new fence line. This means that the Kicking Wall will need to be removed; having a path right in front of it is dangerous to other users. We will also we removing the Youth Shelter so that the ground under it, which is also affected by the new play area, can be made good. Both the Youth Shelter and the

Kicking Wall will be stored to that they can be brought back into use at a later date. Further work will need to be delayed until the final issues are resolved, we will keep everyone informed of progress.

On Tuesday 14th May, the Parish Council will be hosting the Annual Assembly at the Memorial Hall. While members of the public are welcome at all Parish Council meetings, the Annual Assembly is focussed on the overall work of the council, rather than the day to day business, and is an opportunity to raise questions with the County, District and Parish Councils, as well as the Police. Supporting 1st Ivinghoe & Pitstone Scouts

You may be aware that the existing scout hut in lvinghoe is reaching the end of its useful life and the group are raising funds to build a new hut. 1st lvinghoe and Pitstone Scouts approached the parish council to see if space might be available for this at the pavilion site

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on Marsworth Road. We understand that the Scouts are currently exploring possibilities for both locations. The parish council has agreed to discuss this further with the Scouts and we look forward to working with them as this project develops. We will keep residents informed of any progress.

Can you help us review dog bin provision around Windsor Road? The dog bin located at the top end of Windsor Road, near the cycle path, and before the junction with Westfield Road is regularly over utilised. There are already additional dog bins located by the Hever Close playground, by the entrance to the Local Wildlife Site and by the Windsor Road playground.

We are trying to establish if there is a need for additional bins in this area and/or if there is a more appropriate location for this bin. To do this, we need to hear from dog walkers in the area so that we can understand:

- which route you take (do you walk up Windsor Road itself, do you come along the cycle/footpath up the centre of the estate, or do you walk up Westfield Road itself?)
- why this bin is particularly over-used
- if you think there may be a need for a bin in another location
- if there is a more appropriate location for this bin
- etc


All our dog bins are emptied weekly during the winter and twice a week during the summer via a service contract with AVDC. The bins are the maximum size permitted. Bins must be located within 25m of the highway so that the collection truck can gain access.

Bus Information Panels To help users of the bus information panels, Bucks County Council confirm that if a normal time is being shown, then for some reason the GPS tracking of that particular bus is not available in which case the display will disappear at the scheduled time. If however, the GPS is working and the bus is being tracked, the minutes until arrival should be shown and will count down, and this tracking information should remain on display until the bus arrives.

We look forward to introducing them to you in more detail shortly.






WHO MOVED THE STONE?



We approach a project to repair the stone work around the windows of St Mary's church you will hear more about this over the coming months.

A large stone was placed in front of the cave where lesus' body was laid after his death but this was found to have been removed by some women who came to visit his grave. These disciples were the first witnesses to the resurrection and the message of his resurrection spread throughout the world. 'Who Moved the Stone?' is the name of a famous book by Albert Ross who wrote under the name Frank Morrison. He sought to piece together the story of what happened to Jesus at the first Easter. He tried to look at the apparent discrepancies in the various accounts in the Bible in order to dismiss the records as unreliable and untrustworthy. He actually came to the reverse conclusion.



A church building speaks to us in different ways. It is a centre for our community to gather to celebrate life at baptisms, weddings and funerals. It reminds us of our history and the names of those who have passed away and those we lost in war. It is a symbol of history and continuity. Its cruciform shape speaks of the Christian faith in which we



worship God within it.

When I have visited the stone circles at Stonehenge, Avebury and Castlerigg, near Keswick, I am left with questions about who moved the stones. There is no consensus about how and why the circles were built. They were assembled at great effort by large numbers of people many thousands of years ago over an extended period. There must have been a reason and they must have held a significant place in the lives of the Neolithic people of our land.

But sadly, stones don't speak. Is it possible to imagine a day when the significance of our church has been lost in the mists of time? They may be more permanent but stones don't speak; people speak. It was not a rolled stone but a couple of women who told their friends of the resurrection of Christ. This message continues today on human lips. Whatever our beliefs, in any context, the knowledge, ideas and stories that matter to us need to be told or they too will, in due course, be forgotten and lost.

CHANGES TO LOCAL HOUSEHOLD RECYCLING CENTRES

By law, Buckinghamshire County Council must accept day-to-day household waste free of charge, for example garden waste, electricals, and paper. These types of waste make up around 75% of waste brought to household recycling centres and will remain free of charge.

Other waste, such as landscaping, construction, or demolition waste is classed as 'non-household waste' and is expensive to dispose of. The Council is allowed by law to charge for these items to offset the cost of disposal. We recognise that many householders carry out small projects from time to time. By applying a small charge this allows us to continue accepting these types of non-household waste.

Traders and businesses should still use the existing commercial waste service.

A full price list is available on site and online, however the table on page number 20 shows the categories of waste that can be charged for.

Aylesbury (Rabans lane), Burnham and Chesham household recycling centres will close 2 days a week on

Wednesdays and Thursdays.

The other six sites remain open seven days a week, and opening times will be unaffected. Residents are encouraged to visit on other days, or use a nearby alternative. The three sites affected are all relatively close to other sites. The nearest alternative sites are also better equipped to deal with extra visitors on those weekdays.

Bledlow household recycling centre will permanently close.

Bledlow Household Recycling centre will permanently close at 4pm on Sunday 31 March 2019. Our analysis of the whole network shows that closure of Bledlow HRC will cause the least disruption for residents of the county taken as a whole.

WILL THESE CHANGES INCREASE FLY TIPPING?

Buckinghamshire County Council is not the first Council to introduce charges for nonhousehold waste. Other local authorities who have introduced similar changes have not seen an increase in fly tipping. Most people act responsibly when disposing of their waste, and the County Council expect this to continue.

Despite this, the Council understands residents' concerns and will be actively monitoring the levels of fly tipping. The

County Council has also given additional resources to the enforcement team to help prosecute those who fly tip and for the successful SCRAP Fly tipping campaign which helps residents ensure their waste is disposed of responsibly. See the link at the end of the document for more information.

WILL THERE BE MORE QUEUES AT OTHER SITES?

No. Many visitors will come back at a different time and these visits, spread across the week, should not cause queues. A number of residents will use other sites as well, such as people in Aylesbury using Aston Clinton, this will also help to avoid queues. WHAT IS THE COUNCIL DOING TO TELL PEOPLE ABOUT THE CHANGES?

The Council is working hard to ensure as many people as possible know about the changes. All sites have new signage and site staff are handing out cards to all visitors. The Council is also advertising changes in local magazines and newspapers, on social media, on local radio stations, on the County's website and many other places. It is important as many people know about the changes, so the Council would ask that organisations and residents spread the word wherever possible.

WHAT ELSE CAN RESIDENTS DO WITH THEIR WASTE?

Despite the changes, residents can still bring the same types of waste to a recycling centre as they could before, but some waste will now incur a charge. Many people only bring materials that do not have charges, so they should be able to use the sites unaffected. Alternatives to visiting a Household Recycling Centre could include selling or donating your items for free. They could be sold via online sites like Ebay, Facebook Marketplace or Freegle where the items can be posted for free.

If residents have small amounts of nonhousehold waste, the local household recycling centre will likely be the best option. Lots of non-household waste is often created when carrying out home improvement projects, so residents may wish to look into alternatives. Residents can hire a skip, or ask the contractor working on their home to take away the waste with them. This may incur a charge, but may be less expensive than visiting the Household Recycling Centre. Residents should always use the SCRAP code to make sure waste is dealt with properly. WHAT HAS NOT CHANGED? Opening hours are unaffected – 9am-6pm Summer (Apr - Sep) & 9am-4pm Winter (Oct - Mar)

The majority of the waste brought to site will stay free of charge to dispose of, so many residents will not need to pay any charges. E-Permits will still need to be used for those bringing waste in commercial vehicles and this process will be simplified. You will still need a permit if you are using a commercial vehicle, using any vehicle with a trailer larger than 1.2m x 0.9m, disposing of asbestos or arriving on foot.

Viewing site webcams will still be available to allow residents to visit at quieter times. DID YOU KNOW?

Less than 2% of waste brought to

Buckinghamshire's household recycling centres is sent to landfill. The rest is recycled, composted, or used for landscaping. Despite this, the costs of managing the sites and waste are increasing. Around ¾ of the waste brought by visitors to site will remain free of charge. Waste like compostable garden waste, electricals, general household waste, furniture, paper is still free to dispose of.

GREATMOOR ENERGY FROM WASTE FACILITY

On Monday 18th February, Pitstone Parish Council took the opportunity to take a guided tour around the Greatmoor Energy from Waste Facility based in Aylesbury. The facility covers the whole of Buckinghamshire and some surrounding areas such as North London. Operated by FCC, Greatmoor sustainably manages the disposal of **Buckinghamshire's household waste by** diverting it from landfill to turn into electricity. More than 25 megawatts of energy is recovered from the process of burning waste which is enough to power 40,000 homes in Bucks.

How does it work?

The facility processes 110,000 tonnes of household (non-recyclable) waste and 235.000 tonnes of trade/commercial waste from bodies such as local authorities. The waste is collected in articulated lorries using the most efficient vehicles with low emissions and they take the shortest distances from A to B to save fuel. The waste processing site is enormous! The waste is dropped into a 23 metre deep bunker, a huge grab crane picks up the waste, dropping it into a grate where it burns at approx. 1000 degrees Celsius for 2 hours. The grate moves mechanically turning the waste to ensure full combustion. The grate is 10m x 12m making it the largest single-line facility.

The thermal energy from the combustion process is used to heat a boiler to produce high-pressured steam (400C and 50 bar

pressure) that is fed to a turbine for the production and export of 25 megawatts of electricity. Sufficient to power 18% of all Bucks homes.



Emissions Treatment and Monitoring Gases and fly ash generated from burning the waste passes through a chemical neutralising system using ammonia, lime and activated carbon, cleaning the emissions. After chemical treatment the flue gases pass into the bag house filter, containing nearly 3,000 filter tunes, before leaving the 95m stack and entering the atmosphere. The emissions are monitored to ensure compliance with legislation and the requirements of the Environmental Permit are maintained. The emissions from the stack are 99% water vapour!

For more information on each event, and to buy tickets, visit: www.whizzfizzfest.org.uk New Homes Bonus micro grants to double to a maximum of £2,000 At its meeting on 12 March, Aylesbury Vale District Council (AVDC) Cabinet recommended an increase in the maximum New Homes Bonus (NHB) micro grant from £1,000 to £2,000, effective from 1 April 2019.

Since the scheme launched in September 2017, 60 town and parish councils and community groups have benefitted from these micro grants, using the funds for a variety of purposes such as, village hall refurbishments or the purchase of sports equipment.

Micro grants are funded from the existing 20% NHB allocation set aside for town and parish councils, and in the last two financial years, this represented £80,000 per annum. The total amount available in 2019/20 will remain at £80,000.

Micro grants are open to applications from across the district, unlike larger project grants – which are only open to town and parish councils in areas affected by growth.

All awarded grants are listed on AVDC's website.

Speaking after the Cabinet decision, Cllr Angela Macpherson, Leader of AVDC, said:

"New Homes Bonus micro grants are clearly appreciated, especially by smaller parishes and voluntary organisations, and provide valuable benefits to local communities. We have kept the application process as simple as possible and by making awards on a monthly basis, groups can approach us throughout the year, as and when the need arises."

Kaya Mallinder, Fundraising and Communications Officer at Buckinghamshire Mind, commented: "We were awarded a £1,000 micro grant from AVDC in May 2018, which we used to purchase suitable chairs for our counselling rooms in Aylesbury. Given our experience with the scheme, I'd have no hesitation in recommending it to other local community groups - especially now that the amount been raised to a maximum of £2,000."

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
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MENTMORE ARTS FESTIVAL 2019 - MAY BANK HOLIDAY

Welcome to the spring update for lvinghoe Division!

There is quite a lot going on at the moment, and I have tried to provide a summary of some of the key issues and changes around our division.

Local Government Reorganisation Update

As I am sure many of you know by now, on 1 November 2018 the Secretary of State announced that a brand new, single council for Buckinghamshire will be established on 1 April 2020. This is a great opportunity to improve services for residents, local communities and businesses. A single council will be simpler for residents to access the services they need, make better use of public money, and be more local to communities.

It is vital through the transition period to the new council that services continue as normal. The business critical transformational programmes and Medium Term Financial Planning savings must be delivered as planned and any decisions on new areas of work must be made with the new council in mind. All service areas will be involved in the change programme although some will be much more directly affected than others. Services will need to be flexible in responding to the programme as it develops. Key for all of the five councils will be retention and engagement of employees who will be critical

in ensuring that high quality services to residents and communities continue. Over the next year all five councils will work together to support the effective and seamless transition to the new council. Key Dates

- New Council 1 April 2020
- To minimise the impact on critical 'business as usual' activity.
- Election for members to the new council 7 May 2020
- To ensure there is continuity of service delivery to residents, communities, businesses and service users.

There will be an overarching programme of work to deliver this change and establish the new council. The programme will be overseen by county and district members. The priority is to establish a new council and deliver on the key commitments in the business case.

Early Help and Pitstone-Ivinghoe **Children's Centre Update**

On 4th March, Buckinghamshire County

Council's Cabinet agreed changes to Children's Services which will mean a new Family Support Service and Early Help strategy for the county. The recommendations for change were prepared following a recent public consultation, conducted by independent consultation agency BMG Research. This asked residents and organisations for views on how to deliver early help services to support children and families. The changes will take effect from September 2019. The new integrated Family Support Service will consist of three area-based family support teams working in partnership with other organisations, particularly schools and health, to improve access to services and provide more joined-up services. The service will include a network of 16 family centres across the county, which were previously used as children's centres. It will also ensure that a further 19 buildings, which will no longer be used as children's centres, will continue to be used for early years services and community benefit. The cabinet also agreed an Early Help Strategy, setting out the ambition of the service and how the Council and its partner organisations will work together.

Other key elements of the changes include:

• A named key worker for each family who will create a team around that family to help them tackle the issues they face. This will help ensure they only need to tell

their story once, to their key worker.

- Investment in the Buckinghamshire Family Information Service website to ensure there is effective promotion of community activities together with information and guidance for families.
- Open access to stay and play sessions for babies and toddlers at family centres.
- Each school will have a named link family support worker to co-ordinate family support.

Hopefully, the new approach will allow for even greater focus on helping vulnerable children and families and on avoiding the escalation of their problems.

Thanks to resident input during the consultation period, the views of our residents

were taken into account and so now BCC will be opening 16 family centres – two more than previously proposed. This is so ensure that we get the right professional support to children and families when they need it the most. The changes should enable BCC to support the most vulnerable children and families. I will be providing more details of this and to the repurposing of the lvinghoe-

over the next few years. There will be no change to arrangements for more than 5,000 pupils who are eligible for free travel. The revisions only apply to children and young people who are not eligible for free statutory home to school transport. The main changes are as follows:

- How we provide school transport

 Many school and public bus services currently duplicate routes. Starting from September 2019 we will aim to reduce this. We will work with service providers to make routes more efficient and offer children and young people more flexibility in their travel options. We will be working to ensure that routes are reliable; that children's safety is prioritised in any arrangements; and that children will be assured of places on any public routes.
 - Phasing out two historic local transport arrangements in lvinghoe [relating to Cottesloe School and Tring School] and Evreham [relating to Chalfont Community College]. This means that parents in these two areas who choose a school which is not the nearest appropriate one for their child will be required to pay for transport. This brings these arrangements in line with the rest of the County meaning fair and consistent transport charges are applied to families. This will take effect from September 2020.

Charging for transport for pupils with SEND aged over 16

– A contribution to the cost of home to school transport for children with SEND (who are older than 16) will be introduced from September 2019. This will replace the free transport offer currently in place. Costs for SEND transport have increased by over £3m in the last five years (from around £6m to £9m). Students with SEND who attend college can apply for a bursary to assist with costs. Eligible children with SEND aged between 14 and 19 years old will be offered an increase in provision of independent travel training, which we expect will enable us to reduce transport costs.

While many families will be unaffected by the changes, BCC wants to ensure anyone who is will be managed in as fair and considerate a way as possible. 

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ASHRIDGE RAMBLINGS Rikki Harrington and Bob Saintey

WHERE THERE'S A MILL, THERE'S A WAY

Ashridge has moved. On the first day of spring, it strapped up its boots and rambled all the way from London and South East England to the East of England. Don't worry, you'll still be able to find all your favourite features – the change relates to the National Trust's administrative regions. Ashridge has teamed up with Dunstable Downs (including the Tree Cathedral), Shaw's Corner, Totternhoe Knolls, Sharpenhoe Clappers and Sundon, to form a portfolio of properties under the leadership of Ashridge's current General Manager, Susie Mercer. Putting these properties under one umbrella makes sense. They are close together not only geographically but also ecologically, and the new structure will offer improved opportunities to share expertise and to create wildlife corridors linking the habitats and helping their characteristic flora and fauna to spread.

You may or may not know that Pitstone Windmill comes under the auspices of the Ashridge team. The oldest surviving post mill in England has been an iconic feature of our landscape since the early seventeenth century. It was in use until 1902, when a freak storm virtually destroyed it. After that,

it gradually fell into disrepair. It was acquired by the National Trust in 1937. Nothing much happened until 1963, when a restoration committee was formed and by 1970 it was once again grinding corn. This was shortlived, however, as the vibrations were so strong that it was feared that the whole building would shake itself to bits. Although it may never work again, the full mechanism is in place and provides a fascinating insight into bygone days. A very informative book on the windmill is on sale in the Ashridge Visitor Centre shop. The mill is open from 10am to 4pm on Sundays and Bank Holiday Mondays from May until August. The National Trust is keen to find more people willing to learn about the mill and pass on that knowledge to visitors by volunteering on a Sunday. 

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WHAT'S GOING ON AT COLLEGE LAKE?

Since my last article we have been busy with our winter work plan which has included scrub clearing, coppicing and hedge laying. Our volunteer work parties have been creating scallops and glades to allow light onto the woodland floor. This will allow light in and encourage ground flora such as primroses and violets to grow which in turn will benefit invertebrates such as butterflies and hoverflies into these areas.



Once again we have been carrying out hedge laying over the winter. This traditional management technique rejuvenates a hedgerow as well as creating good habitat by creating dense cover. Over the past few years our laid hedges have created breeding habitat for birds such as yellowhammers. Part of our hedge laying this winter has included one of the hedges in our car park. This was becoming harder to manage and for visitors to see what spaces were available in other areas of the car park. The plan is to do the other section next winter.

Another new edition to the reserve is a

viewing platform on the Time Trail path. This is predominantly for our school groups to be able to carry out their birdwatching section of the Habitat Safari education program. The design has also enabled all ages and heights to be able to watch the birds on the East Island shore without disturbing them. This will be a good place to look out for lapwing and redshank chicks in the coming weeks. As I write this in early April, we already have returning oystercatchers, little ringed plover and redshank on the islands as well as lapwing displaying and setting up territories for breeding. We hope these will be joined soon by common terns which have bred here over a number of years. The increase in birdsong from species such as blue tit, great tit and dunnocks is very noticeable as they prepare for the breeding season. The dawn chorus is becoming more intense and will



continue to build as more migrant species return to breed. These include warblers such as chiffchaff, willow warbler and whitethroats. If you are interested in learning Pitstone Parish Post

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more about the dawn chorus and birdsong, as well as experiencing the reserve in the



early morning, why not book on our dawn chorus walk on Sunday 5th May. It is a 5am

start, but experiencing the dawn chorus and day break on the reserve is a magical thing and well worth the early alarm. This can also include a cooked breakfast when we return to the Visitor Centre. For more details, or to book for the walk visit our website at www.bbowt.org.uk/events Other events in May include a Wonderful Waders walk and a Miniature Jungle Adventure for families. Have a look online or pop into College Lake if you want more details or to book a place. We are also running a Campaign for a Wilder Future along with Wildlife Trusts across the country. This is to highlight protection for wildlife and create more space for nature. In the Visitor Centre we have cards for you to fill in with reasons you care about wildlife and for children of all ages we have 2 trees in the centre where a paper leaf can be

filled in for us to put on the trees. All of these leaves and cards will then be gathered and delivered to our local MP. 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
