A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Dave Nicholls, Chairman

With any role it is important to feel that your efforts are achieving something. For the Parish Council some things are quite easy to achieve. For a requirement that is within our powers, if we have the money, and we can justify the cost we can usually put things in motion straight away. Where we have to deal with third parties, or persuade others to use their powers it can be much harder. One example is the news reported elsewhere in the PPP that we are now in a position to replace the play equipment on the recreation ground. Following consultation with residents we tendered for new play equipment, chose a supplier, agreed a design, and got planning permission for the new equipment in 2013.

At that point everything ground to a halt because the Parish Council used the land under licence but did not own it. This had been the situation from the start but matters outside our control changed the status of the land and prevented us from continuing. We then sought to regularise things by buying the land, but that was also tied in to other matters. It has only been in the last couple of months that we have been able to purchase the land and move forward.

I would like to thank Councillors, and particularly the Clerk, for their efforts over the years. Our apologies to the young people who first saw the new designs in 2013 and may now be too old to enjoy them, but it is good to know that the the land is secured and the current generation will have new, exciting, equipment in the coming months. On other matters, we had a good response

to our recent call for volunteers for the Community Car Scheme and I would like to thank all those who have joined the scheme in the last few months. We are, however, still in need of further volunteers to drive local residents to and from medical appointments. You can find more details of the scheme here: http://pitstone.co.uk/carscheme. If you would like more information or would like to volunteer please contact Stephen, the Parish Assistant, on 01296 767116.

We also need more volunteers for the Youth Cafe, held at Brookmead School on Wednesday evenings during term time.

Safeguarding rules mean that we can't run the Cafe if we don't have enough volunteers and we have come quite close to this in recent weeks. The Cafe is popular with many young people attending. If you are the parent or carer of a child that attends please try to volunteer, even if it is just once a term. We know that the young people prefer to have an evening with their friends without parents being around but, while we have non-parent volunteers who are very generous with their time, it's not fair for them to carry the burden alone

The Local Wildlife Site off Westfield Road

"Local Wildlife Sites (LWS) – also known as Sites of Biological Importance (SBI) or Sites of Interest for Nature Conservation (SINC) – are areas which are locally important for the conservation of wildlife. They are identified and selected for the significant habitats and species that they contain." In Pitstone, we are lucky enough to have a Local Wildlife Site off Westfield Road. There is a Right of Way diagonally across the centre. The land is owned by Taylor Wimpey and they have granted permissive access to the rest of the site, so you will find a number of foot-trodden tracks.

Our Local Wildlife Site is one of the most important sites in the country for the rare small blue butterfly and also home to a variety of species of orchid, as well as other wild flowers, butterflies, birds and insects. It is important that the site is respected and cared for. It is not an area of waste land. It is mown once per year as this is the optimum treatment to encourage growth of the wild flowers. Please ensure that you try to stick to the tracks and paths as this helps to prevent the flora and fauna from being disturbed. Please ensure

you pick up and responsibly dispose of any dog fouling, as excessive fouling left in the field hinders the growth of certain wild flowers, which in turn affects the butterflies that would normally feed on them. A new dog bin has been provided by Taylor Wimpey near the maintenance gate off Westfield Road and the parish council has agreed to pay for its ongoing maintenance and emptying. You will also find parish council maintained dog bins by the entrance from Church Road, the entrance from Hever Close and the entrance from Westfield Road. We hope that you visit the site frequently to enjoy all wildlife, leaving behind only footprints and taking only photographs away with you.

Would you use a community bus? Pitstone, Marsworth, Ivinghoe and Cheddington parish councils know that for many residents (especially those who don't drive), accessing social activities in neighbouring villages, going to the shops or even visiting loved ones in nursing homes, can be really difficult given that we have a limited public transport service. So we are gathering information about the types of activities and places that you feel you would like to be able to reach, to assess whether a community minibus service in the local villages would help to break down these barriers. It may be able to offer some services where it collects residents from their homes, or some set routes. The parish council hand delivered a survey to every home in Pitstone (other parishes have distributed to their residents and/or published in their magazines). The survey is also available online at::

http://pitstone.co.uk/cbsurvey. We need as many people as possible to complete the survey so that we can investigate providing the most suitable service. If you have not already completed either the printed survey or the online survey, please do so before Friday 1 November 2019. Thank you.

Join the Car Share Scheme for Tring Station as there will soon be even less parking provision!

Thank you to everyone who completed the West Midlands Trains survey at Tring Station about usage of the station and how you access the service. WMT were impressed with the level of response they received and are using the information obtained to help formulate effective longer-term strategies for the station.

There will be a short-term reduction in parking at the station due to engineering works. West Midlands Trains are therefore introducing a Car Share Scheme for the site, to help reduce the number of single occupant vehicles requiring parking. Car Sharing should be a viable option as there are lots of commuters travelling independently, lots of departures are clustered around a few key train times, and our village is relatively compact so picking up another passenger onroute to the station doesn't take very long. Hopefully you will all save money, make new friends, and enjoy the experience so much that you'll continue to car share once the

Funding success for pavilion enhancements

The parish council is delighted to announce that it has secured two further sources of grant funding towards the redevelopment of the pavilion site. We are very grateful that this project has received £10,000 funding from the Thriving Communities Fund, a grants scheme for community projects run by Vale of Aylesbury Housing Trust. We are also delighted that Aylesbury Vale District Council has approved awarding £540,000 towards this project from the Section 106 Sports and Leisure Contributions. Alongside

the previous award of £370,000 from Aylesbury Vale District Council's New Homes Bonus and financial contributions from both the football clubs and the parish council, we now hope to have enough funding pledged to offer security to potential contractors and will commence procurement

procedures - we will keep residents advised of progress. The council will continue to apply for further grant funding until the final costs for all elements are known and works are completed.

Excellent news for leisure development by the Recreation Ground We are delighted that the local charity who owned the land at the end of the Recreation Ground which has historically been used for the play area and half the football pitch is finally in a legal position which enables them to dispose of this parcel of land to the Parish Council. The council is most grateful to Aylesbury Vale District Council for their support with this initiative and a release of Section 106 funding to facilitate the purchase of the land.

Now that the land is within the council's ownership, we can progress with the removal of the old play equipment and installation of the new, challenging play space. At the point of writing, we are finalising details with the supplier and waiting for them to confirm an installation date. This is likely to be early in 2020 once the worst of the weather is behind us. We will keep residents advised of progress.

Once the play space details have been confirmed, the council will be able to

commence procurement of the long- awaited concrete skate park. Look out for more updates in due course.

LORD GARDINER VISITS BEACON VILLAGES COMMUNITY LIBRARY

Government minister Lord Gardiner of Kimble was in Ivinghoe on Friday 11th October to visit the Beacon Villages Community Library (BVCL), as part of **Buckinghamshire's Libraries Week. Lord** Gardiner is a minister in the Department for Environment, Food and Rural Affairs. He serves as Parliamentary Under Secretary of State for Rural Affairs and Biosecurity. BVCL, in the medieval Ivinghoe Town Hall, was singled out for the visit as "a great example of how a library can provide a valuable community resource in a rural setting."

The Community Library, run by a committee of local people, shares space in the town hall with the village post office. The minister met a dozen library volunteers, library committee members, County Councillor Ann Wight, and parish councillors from the Beacon villages. He showed real interest in the benefits of the library to the rural communities it serves. The Beacon villages library offers traditional book borrowing and many other services. You can use it to get online, to print and photocopy and use your library membership to access a host of digital services such as e-magazines and e-newspapers.

Beacon Villages Library is one of a cluster of community buildings and facilities in Ivinghoe which include a pharmacy, post office, a hairdresser and a playground as well The Hub, another community-run building with a coffee shop and shared office space.

Avril Davies, who chairs the committee that runs Beacon Villages Community Library, said: "We were delighted to be chosen to

host Lord Gardiner, and show him how our thriving Community Library works. BVCL is an extremely important asset at the heart of our village offering many services and facilities to people in this part of the county and we've been able to show that." Lord Gardiner said: "I am delighted to be here at Beacon Villages Community Library, which is a perfect illustration of how public institutions can bring people together in rural areas." Libraries play a key role for vibrant communities across England, inspiring people of all ages, building digital skills, fostering health and wellbeing and supporting local business."

Welcome to the autumn edition of the **Ivinghoe Division newsletter. It's hard to** believe that we are only a few months away from having the new Buckinghamshire Council up and running, but from 1 April, 2020 that will indeed be the case. Services in the meantime will continue as normal, and on 7th May 2020, we will have elections for the three new Buckinghamshire Council councillors who will be representing Ivinghoe ward. This is a very exciting change which will hopefully provide everyone with better, more accessible services.

We are also in the process of setting up the Community Boards, which will replace the current Local Area Forums. The results from the recent consultation will be analysed to ensure resident input while the format of the Community Boards is finalised, so thank you very much if you were able to help us out with that consultation.

For those who may not know, the Community Boards are a way of bringing together Buckinghamshire Council councillors with local communities to help solve local issues and to provide a vital link between the council, elected councillors and communities. These local issues could include improving facilities for young people, tackling social isolation of older people or helping to set up a community bus. It is hoped that they will enable Buckinghamshire Council councillors to take decisions on local issues, alongside key

partners including other community representatives, and allow Buckinghamshire Council councillors to work with communities to influence service design and delivery on local issues.

We want Community Boards to involve everyone in the local area who want to make a difference and work with the new council to

do this. We're proposing that

Buckinghamshire Council councillors from the local area would sit on their local board. To be effective, Community Boards would also need to include people and organisations from the local community such as fire services, police and health, residents, parish and town councils and young people.

Hopefully, Community Boards will give residents greater influence on how services are run locally as well as contact with elected members and key stakeholders. All Local Area Forum members will be notified of the outcome of this decision and the next steps in setting up Community Boards.

canal bridges in our area have resulted in some weight restrictions and some local fluctuations in HGV alternative routings, driving an urgent need to find the best approach moving forward. We are currently looking at options for the bridges and the local communities in the context of the Freight Strategy in order to plan optimal freight routing.

I know many of you have written to me with concerns about lorry traffic through our villages. To address your concerns, our Freight Strategy officer has come up with several options which are presently going through County Council strategy and budgetary approvals with a view to moving to public consultation at the earliest opportunity. I would encourage all residents to participate in the consultation process, since this is your chance to have a say in the future of freight traffic routes through our local area.

Luton Airport Expansion Consultation I have been continuing my work on both the London Luton Airport Consultation Committee, as well as on the Noise and Track Sub Committee, and I would like to draw everyone's attention to Luton Airport's Statutory consultation for the proposed expansion from 18 to 32 million passengers per year, which will start on Wednesday 16th October and run until Wednesday 11th December. Residents may want to review Luton Airport's airspace proposals when

Buckinghamshire County Council improves CO2 emissions At BCC we are very aware of the need to reduce our carbon dioxide levels to protect the environment. I'm delighted to say that successful carbon reduction projects across Buckinghamshire County Council's services and infrastructure have resulted in an impressive 41% reduction in the amount of carbon dioxide produced in 2018/19 compared with the baseline set in 2009/10. This is a significantly better outcome than the 30% national voluntary reduction target set by the UK Government in its Clean Growth Strategy, and actually exceeds the County Council's own more ambitious target of 40%. Some of the biggest successes have seen the successful implementation of carbon reduction initiatives across corporate buildings and in street lighting. Since 2011, £4 million has been invested in roof-mounted solar panels, LED lights, boiler replacement

Transport for Bucks Update
I am happy to report that the recent TfB
weed spraying programme is proving to be a
success, with clear signs of die back. They
have a few more applications ahead, but
overall the treatment seems to be working.
Great Gap in Ivinghoe is now on the urban
grass mapping and will be cut by our
contractor four times a year going forward.
The team also executed an excellent repair

to the speed cushion outside the Kings Head which was further inspected by the BCC auditor.

We have completed the capital maintenance road resurfacing from Cheddington High Street to the Cooks Wharf bridge, and that surface is now exceptionally smooth. Additionally, all of the £4.5m plane & patch programme was completed by the revenue team ahead of schedule and within budget. This has proven to be of great benefit to our roadworks teams in reducing the number of repeat visits to known problem areas and we are getting feedback from the public as to the positive impact it is having for their daily commute.

Thames Valley Police

I was very pleased to see the announcement in the national news that there will be a national campaign to recruit 20,000 new police officers. I know that burglary and rural crime are issues of great importance to all of my residents, and I share their concerns about the number of rising van and vehicle thefts over the past few months. As part of the effort to combat crime locally, Thames Valley Police are promoting their "Be a Force For All" campaign, which follows the funding announcement by the Chancellor to support the recruitment of a first wave of up to 6,000 officers, who will be shared among the 43 territorial forces in England and Wales. This includes £750 million for 2020 to 2021 and an immediate £45 million to kick-start recruitment.

The 'Be a force for all' campaign features serving police officers, and a website has been created to direct potential recruits to the recruitment pages of local police forces. In August, Thames Valley Police launched its new careers website and hosted a Facebook Live event focused on recruitment. Thames Valley Police is expecting to benefit from the uplift in policing numbers announced in August. While this is very encouraging news

regarding police numbers, there are many things we residents can do to keep ourselves a bit safer. Many burglaries are the result of opportunistic theft, and so if you have been burgled recently or had a vehicle stolen, the Thames Valley Police website has many tips for how to improve home security, a few of which I explain below.

Check for weak spots where a burglar could get into your garden, for example a low or sagging fence, or a back gate with a weak or no lock. A thorny hedge along the boundary of your property can put burglars off but make sure that passers-by can still see the front of your home so that burglars can be seen.

Burglars also don't like gravel as it's noisy to walk on, so this is good to lay on paths and underneath ground floor windows. Avoid building pergolas or gazebos too near your home as they can help thieves reach upper windows.

Using anti-climb paint or fixing trellising to the top of solid fences and walls can make it more difficult for a burglar to climb over. Do not use barbed or razor wire as you could be held legally responsible for any injuries caused.

As I sometimes get resident queries about the possible installation of CCTV, that would be well worth considering if you have been the victim of a crime or simply wish to deter burglars. Residents can now buy indoor and outdoor cameras that connect to an app on your smartphone, although since CCTV will not prevent your home being burgled on its own, it should be used in addition to other deterrents including good quality locks, a burglar alarm and security lighting. Cameras should be positioned for easy maintenance but high enough so they can't be tampered with. If your camera is outside, you must comply with data protection and privacy laws and make sure it isn't pointing at public spaces or other people's houses or gardens.

Please come.

Chat about the selected pictures on show.

Also, remember that many burglars will avoid breaking into a property that has an alarm. There are many alarm systems on the market ranging in price.

Audible-only alarms set off a siren or bell and are usually a cheaper option. Due to the number of false alarms, police will only respond if there is confirmation of suspicious activity such as a neighbour reporting they saw someone or heard glass being broken. Monitored alarms are connected to a central 'listening' service. The monitoring company will check for false alarms and call the police if necessary. Monitored systems are particularly important for isolated properties. Drinking Sensibly in Bucks
While I know the Christmas season is only a
few weeks away, and many of us enjoy a nice
glass of mulled wine or other seasonal drinks,
Buckinghamshire County Council is
encouraging residents to think about their
habits around alcohol and increase their
understanding of safer drinking levels.
While many of us in Buckinghamshire enjoy
drinking alcohol – to celebrate, relax or just
through habit, too much of a good thing can
have adverse health impacts.

This is really just a seasonal reminder to keep the health risks of alcohol to a low level, the Chief Medical Officer recommends it is safest not to drink more than 14 units of alcohol per week. This should be spread over several days with some alcohol free days in between. The Chief Medical Officer also recommends that children should have an alcohol free childhood.

Whether you like the occasional drink, have a couple of glasses of wine with dinner most nights, regularly go out drinking with friends or drink at home, you can lower your risk of conditions such as heart disease, strokes, cancer and dementia by taking simple steps to reduce your alcohol intake.

There are lots of apps that can help you keep track of how much you are drinking, give you tips to help cut down and point you in the right direction if you need one to one support. The Bucks Drink Checker website has a really good app — check it out for yourself at https://

buckscc.drinkchecker.org.uk

However, if you're regularly drinking more than the recommended amount or you feel you can't manage without drinking alcohol, you may be experiencing signs of alcohol dependence. Please seek the advice of your GP or a local support service such as One Recovery Bucks (https://onerecoverybucks.org/) to help you safely cut down on the amount of alcohol you're drinking.

More than I in 4 adults in the county (that's

over 100,000 people) drink at levels above recommended guidelines. Unfortunately, due to different size measures and strengths it can be difficult to know how much alcohol is actually being consumed, and some people may be harming their health because they don't realise they are drinking too much. Apparently, drinking more than 14 units a week is highest in older age groups in Bucks. Drinking above the Chief Medical Officer's recommended level is also more common among more affluent people and men. Although fewer young people are drinking more than previously it is important to think about the messages we give our children about alcohol by what we say and equally importantly what we do as parental influences play a key role in young people's drinking habits.



ASHRIDGE RAMBLINGS -SEEING THE WOOD FOR THE TREES

I find it hard enough looking after my small back garden. Imagine having to care for 5000 acres of our most precious and beautiful countryside. How do you balance the needs of visitors and wildlife? How do you prioritise the huge number of tasks? Careful planning and expert knowledge — that's how. Ashridge's ten-year Woodland Management Plan was two years in the making and has just been approved by the Forestry Commission. The Ashridge team consulted extensively with Parish Council representatives, visitors, other local stakeholders, Natural England, Historic England and the Gardens Trust.

The resulting key objectives include:

- removal of conifers from the ancient woodlands within the Estate (leaving key specimens in the designed landscape as well as sufficient habitat for the specially-protected firecrest bird) and replacing them with native broadleaved trees of higher ecological value;
- widening some of the rides, establishing more glades on the common land and creating scrubby edge habitats for the benefit of wildlife, particularly birds and butterflies:
- enhancing the status as an internationally important habitat for deadwood invertebrates;
- caring for the many trees that are ancient (remarkably old for their species), veteran (younger but with some features of

ancient specimens such as missing branches and hollow trunks) and notable (particularly fine specimens) through halo-thinning, which involves removal of vegetation from their immediate proximity to reduce competition for light and nutrients; and

improving access for visitors and creating more viewpoints from the scarp slope along Aldbury Terrace and Duncombe Terrace (the main track from the Visitor Centre towards Ivinghoe Beacon). Some funding is likely through a grant from the HS2 budget. This will be used for the ancient woodland restoration work in, appropriately, Rail Copse as well as Little Frithsden Copse. Conifer plantations will be replaced by hornbeams to restore the coppice that was felled in the 1960s and 1970s. Volunteers to help with the replanting of these historic woodlands would be very much welcomed. The grant will also cover removal of some of the laurel that is spreading through the ancient woodlands. If you can help, please contact helping.ashridge@nationaltrust.org.uk.

SOMEWHERE OR ANYWHERE?

Rev Adrian Manning, Vicar of St Mary's Ivinghoe with Pitstone

If I were to talk of 'Haves' and 'Have-nots' and then point you to the Parable of the Good Samaritan you would think I was doing my job as Vicar in the run up to Christmas in encouraging you to treat your neighbour with care and compassion at this time of those in need.

Any attempt to divide the world into two groups such as Haves and Have-nots is inevitably a huge simplification but it still serves a useful purpose in shaping our response to it. Our understanding guides our behaviour. What, though, if I were to talk of 'Somewheres' and 'Anywheres'? One writer has recently split the people around us into these two tribes. It is a simplification but may be a useful distinction. There are those who come from Somewhere who feel rooted in a specific place or community such as one of the villages that we live in, Ivinghoe, Pitstone or Marsworth. And there are those who come from Anywhere. They are typically urban folk whose educational and professional working lives have taken them on journeys around the country or world living in different places as they travelled on. It is estimated that half the population are Somewheres and a quarter are Anywheres. The majority of Somewheres feel uneasy with aspects of the modern world. Anywheres however predominate in the socalled 'elite' who dominate our national life.

There is a strong correspondence between the Somewhere/Anywhere divide and the leave/remain split in this country. By the time this piece is read the Prime minister's do-or-die deadline of 31st October will have passed; there will be winners and losers in the national argument. There will be hurt and anger. The debate has fractured us bringing to the surface deep feelings of who we are and where we belong.

Recognising hurts in others brings me back to the Good Samaritan who reached out across a tribal divide to bring healing to an injured traveller. He chose not to pass by on the other side but reached out to one whom he saw as a neighbour in need of care and compassion.





Sometimes it can be difficult to cope with the challenges that life throws at us so talking to a counsellor may be helpful.


