

FROM THE CHAIRMAN, PITSTONE PARISH COUNCIL



Parish Council business goes on as usual with the ordinary everyday chores of trying to make this the best place to be. One item that has moved on a pace is that of the Youth café. As we are approaching a 12 month period, it is evident that this was much needed and long over due. Having started with 45+ attendees we now have 120 registered young people. Not all of them turn up all the time and on average we get 60 to 70 per week. Aylesbury Vale 'Youth For Christ' movement has been paramount in its success in engaging young people and moving forwards. We are also very fortunate to have the blessing and encouragement of Staff and Governors of Brookmead School who have pledged the use of their premises for the future. However we are totally reliant upon a dedicated band of volunteers, without whom it would be unworkable. With this number of young people we need at least 10 or 12 additional volunteers each week to continue the success. We are struggling at times, so it is with a heartfelt plea that I urge parents, friends and other interested parties to consider volunteering for a couple of 2 hour periods per month. Please contact myself or the Clerk to the Parish Council.

As we go to print, many of you will have seen the extension and alteration of the speed limits around our village. This has taken nearly 3 years and well worth waiting for. It's not ideal but it is a step in the right direction.

Now to the Jubilee Celebrations. A sub committee has been formed from various bodies including the Parish Council. The variety of interests and activities of this enthusiastic sub committee will create what we hope is going to be a fantastic Jubilee celebration on June 3rd & 4th. You will have had a flier through your door and a full weekend of family entertainment has been planned. This has been funded partly by the Parish Council but mainly by generous donations from businesses in the area.

Sad as it is that The Bell public house has closed, and there is no longer a pub in the village, are you aware that the Social Club in the Memorial Hall is open at weekends? It has become a social meeting place as well as providing valuable income for the upkeep and refurbishment of the Memorial Hall. Please consider using this local amenity.

Speed Limit Review

I have received copies of all the legal documents required for the speed limit changes and works are scheduled to commence on

the various sites Monday 26 March 2012 and are planned to be completed by April 13th. At the time of writing I have unfortunately seen no evidence of this, but I hope that by the time you read it everything will be in place!!? After an implementation period the new limits are formally reviewed again to assess their effectiveness, all as part of the due process, but I don't know when this will be. This review was first proposed in 2003, and begun



about 2007.

‘Why take the trip to the tip’

AVDC have sent a leaflet to every house about the new non statutory service for garden waste. (only household waste, not garden waste, has to be collected, by law) Previously people have been obliged to purchase designated green plastic bags from the council, or get the car out and go to the household waste recycling site, which not everyone is able to do. And, to most people’s distress, those green bags were not collected separately and composted, but thrown in with the general landfill. The contents of the new brown bins will be properly composted.

Our area is one of the last to be implemented, and will happen in JUNE.

This is a paid-for service at £36 a year, for a fortnightly collection from February to the end of November.

Sign up before 8 May 2012 to ensure you are included on the first collection date in June.

A whole new system of waste collections is to be implemented in SEPTEMBER with a weekly collection of food waste and alternate weekly collection for the brown bins, above, and new recycling bins for cardboard, plastic, plastic bags, paper etc. AVDC hopes to remedy the dire state its’ recycling has got itself into with a 60% increase in its recycling rate from 20% to 80%. This can be done now as after many years there are many places who buy and sort recycleable materials, and AVDC recyclables will be

going to Oxfordshire. .

New arrangements at the household waste recycling site

Bucks County Council has awarded a new contract to operate these sites, with some changes.

From 1st April the sites will open an hour later and have fixed summer and winter opening hours. From 1 April – 30 September summer opening times will be in place and all the sites will operate from 9am – 6pm. From the 1 October – 31 March, winter opening hours will be in place and the sites will operate from 9am – 5pm.

The second change which will be introduced on-site is an improved reuse service, which is going to be phased in over the coming months from April 2012 – July 2012. This will include a shop at the Aston Clinton site. Materials suitable for reuse will be collected from the county’s recycling centres and sold. These details are being finalised by the contractor and their partnering charity organisation and will be publicised as soon as completed.

The new contract will also provide enhanced customer experience with ‘meet and greet’ attendants available to help customers unload waste to ensure items are recycled and reused. Users of the site will also notice new signage and improved layouts of recycling containers.

Bucks introduces more charging for home to school transport

The County will introduce from September transport charges for any pupil not attending their nearest ‘appropriate’ school. This does not mean school which you have chosen or

been selected for, but a school which is capable of delivering you the required educational attainment. All upper schools are considered able to provide an education to a grammar school qualified pupil. (A grammar however is not deemed suitable for anyone who has not qualified).

In effect unless you need a special school, and live more than three miles from your nearest school, Bucks will only pay for you to go to your nearest upper school within the county boundary. Tring School and one or two others currently attended outside the county boundary are included in this arrangement, so those getting free transport to Tring already will continue to do so.

Last year far more draconian and inconsistent charges were proposed and withdrawn, except for sixth formers and out-of-catchment pupils who are currently paying large fares. This level of charging for younger pupils was reconsidered as a result of responses to those proposals, and some loud objections from people such as myself, but it is now proposed to phase in the charges, at a much reduced rate. Charges will be introduced at £10 per week to pupils about to start secondary this September, and £2 a week administration charge for pupils in years above already with travel places to schools not their nearest.

Playground Accessibility

Every year the parish council conducts a risk and benefit appraisal of all three of our play areas (Hever Close, Windsor Road and Vicarage Road) to ensure that they are safe and accessible places where all children and young people can play and socialise; that the value of the open space to the community is maximised and that the recreational opportunities reflect the needs and interests of our community.

We have considerable redevelopment plans for the Vicarage Road site to ensure that the above objectives are met and we would encourage everyone to attend our consultation event which will be held at the Diamond Jubilee Party on Sunday 3 June 2012.

An essential feature of our play strategy is to ensure it promotes inclusion and access for disadvantaged and disabled children. Our play areas feature multi-purpose equipment with tunnels, slides, rocking equipment, roundabouts and springers, that can be enjoyed by the majority of children and all sites are fully accessible. Should you have experienced any problems or feel there are additional features that your dis-

abled child may benefit from, please contact the parish clerk.

Speed limit changes in village



You will have noticed that we are now benefitting from a reduction to the maximum speed of 30 mph along the complete length of Cheddington Road

and the housed length of Vicarage Road, plus a reduction to 40mph as you enter the village along Marsworth Road past the pavilion. The parish council will be issuing all properties within the new 30 mph limits with wheelie bin stickers to reinforce the message.

With any luck, there will also be improved signage by Cooks Wharf to deter left hand turns out of the very sharp junction onto Marsworth Road from the far side of the railway bridge, plus a series of new signage to the business park which should reduce lorry movements through the village.

We would urge all parishioners to set a good example and stay well within the new limits, and speed enforcement by our neighbourhood police officers will be happening.

Hosepipe Ban came into effect on 5 April 2012

Following the driest 18 month period in more than a century, Anglian Water, along with seven other water companies, announced a hosepipe ban for all customers with effect from 5 April.

This measure has been taken in the hope that it will mean that more drastic measures, such as introducing standpipes or reducing water pressure, won't have to be taken later in the summer.

Please do all you can to conserve water – remember you can be fined £1,000 if caught breaching the ban. The restrictions apply whether residents are on a water meter or not. There are some exceptions - for instance, if the water use is for health and safety reasons. People with mobility problems may also be able to use hosepipes in specified circumstances.

Dog Fouling – bag it, bin it!



Disgustingly there has been a huge increase in the amount of dog fouling occurring in and around our village, and across our extensive footpath network. Aside

from the health risk this poses to all of us, a small minority of dog owners no doubt seem to think that this is acceptable.

The Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 allows the local authority to prosecute irresponsibly

ble dog owners, if they do not clear up after their dog, after allowing it to foul in a designated area. Owners can be fined up to £1,000 if they fail to comply.

Designated areas include:

- all carriageways with a speed limit of 40 miles an hour or less, and adjoining footpaths and verges
- all parks, recreation grounds, sports grounds/pitches and open spaces owned, maintained and/or controlled by the district, town or parish councils
- open grassed areas located adjacent to areas of residential housing
- public rights of way
- canal towpaths and reservoir footpaths
- church yards and cemeteries
- allotments
- public car parks and pedestrianised areas
- plus a number of specially designated areas across the Vale.

A plastic bag such as an old carrier bag or a nappy sack can be used to pick up any dog's mess. There are three easy steps for cleaning up after your dog:

1. Grab it - using a plastic bag over your hand.
2. Bag it - turn the bag inside out and tie.
3. Bin it - put the bag into a dog bin or take it home if one is not available.

There is no excuse – please bag it and bin it – and show some respect for the rest of us who have to endure this in our village.

Litter

Our dedicated team of litter pickers spend a huge amount of time keeping our village looking nice. Recently however there is an increasing amount of litter being dropped all around the village – the play areas, the woodland path and the streets.

Pitstone Parish Council provides numerous litter and dog bins around the village. Your council tax has paid the associated cost of over £6,500 in this year alone to pick up your litter and empty the refuse and dog bins – please take pride in our village, set an example to children and young people and make sure you bin it or take it home! Thank you.

Proposed Cycle and Pedestrian Path along Northfield Road

Do you walk or cycle along Northfield Road to Tring Station?


Would you walk or cycle along this road if there was a proper cycle path and footpath?

Have you been involved in an accident whilst walking or cycling along Northfield Road?

As part of the agreement with Taylor Wimpey to build the current phase of housing on Castlemead, a section 106 contribution of £100,000 towards the installation of a pedestrian/cycleway along Northfield Road was determined. The parish council anticipates that these funds should be transferred imminently.

The road actually lies outside our county boundary. Therefore, the funds will be passed from Bucks County Council to Herts County Council (HCC). It is a complicated project (as some sections aren't wide enough) and a long road (£100k is unlikely to fund the entire length). The parish council is trying to work with HCC to scope this project, and ensure it is delivered in a timely fashion. It would be very helpful to us, if we knew the size of the de-

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mand for the cycle/foot path and the extent of any incidents along the road.

Skate Park for Pitstone

Pitstone Parish Council has recently resolved to enter into discussions to provide a plaza style landscaped skate park on the recreation ground. This opportunity has recently become attainable due to the possible future redevelopment of some other parcels of land in the village, which mean that both the cricket practice nets and the current basketball square would have to be relocated. Some of the children's play equipment will be moved from its current site into the newly vacated area and the skate park will be installed where the toddler equipment is at the moment.

There is a huge demand in Pitstone for a wheeled sport area that is suitable for scooters, skateboards, BMX bikes and rollerblades. The tender process is currently in the early stages to identify a suitable contractor that can provide such a facility that would appeal to all levels of user, whilst maintaining a high level of landscaping so that families can also enjoy the site and the visual amenity.

A skate park committee has been formed which will have a number of our local young people on. They will help the parish council and our advisors shape the likely park, apply for grants and planning permission and undertake some fundraising. Please do all you can to support their activities. There will be plenty of opportunities for everyone to comment on the proposals as they develop and we welcome your input. The first event will be at our Jubilee Party on Sunday 3 June, so do make sure you come along and let us know your views.

We look forward to developing and installing this highly sought after project, which has been awaited for many years.

Proposals to Extend London-Luton Airport

As you may be aware there are 2 separate proposals to extend Luton Airport. The airport is owned by Luton Borough Council under the name Luton Airport Limited but is being leased for 30 years to a Spanish company called Abertis. As there is too much information in these plans to detail here I suggest that anyone who would like to know more should search for further information on the websites mentioned below.

Luton Borough Council wants to increase profits by raising the number of passengers from around 10.5 million to 18 million per year. It has produced a consultation plan but the final date for comments on this was 26th March. Details of this plan can be found at


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

Albertis has produced a separate consultation plan in which it is proposing to increase capacity to 15-16 million passengers by 2030. A masterplan video of the proposals can be viewed at www.london-luton.co.uk. The 6-week consultation period ends on April 26th. Comments can be emailed to londonslocalairport@ltn.aero or posted to:

Neither proposal is suggesting building a further runway so it is of concern that flying hours could be extended in order to cope with the increased capacity. The night noise policy at Heathrow, Stansted and Gatwick is controlled by The Department of Transport but Luton Airport determines its own. It is likely that our villages will be affected by increased flight noise.

An organisation called *Hertfordshire Against Luton Expansion* has produced a good website with further information and points to make in objecting to this consultation plan. Further details at www.hale.net.uk.

Michelle is the new *Pitstone Volunteer of the Year 2011/2012*, an award she richly deserves for her services to our villages.

Michelle started volunteering at Cubs when her young brother wanted to join, and the local group in Tring needed help. A mere 20 Years has passed since then and she is still involved in scouting. When Michelle and Martin moved to Pitstone in 1993 it seemed natural to get involved with the Ivinghoe and Pitstone Group. "Working in Scouts, although it can be hard work, is rewarding", she said. "I have made many friends among the leaders and parents; it's like an extended family, although I would like to thank, Jakki, Keith and Brian for being great sports during the years whilst working together on Beaver evenings."

Having a home, with two teenage children and a dog, you would think that leading 2 Beavers Colonies and being Group Scout Leader would be enough. It seems Michelle has always helped in some way within Village life whether this was chairing Pre-school and play-groups and later, being on the PTA at Brookmead School. Michelle now works as a teaching assistant and at the same time has achieved two degrees in her "spare time". She would like to do a PGCE (Post Graduate Certificate of Education) in the future. While studying for her degree Michelle's mum passed away causing a lot of stress. She now cares for her Nan as well as everything else!

Michelle's special interest, and the focus of her studies, is working with children with Special Needs. At the school where she works she has set up a group called Move-to- Learn, where she helps children strengthen all their muscles especially their core muscles. "For many children sitting at a desk is quite tricky as they find it hard to sit up and concentrate" she says, "They don't necessarily have Special Educational Needs but they can benefit greatly from attending the group".

This year her son is studying for his GCSEs. Michelle has pushed herself to study alongside him and has told him that he will be rewarded if he gets better grades than she does. "It was harder than the degree," she tells me, "with the degree I was learning what interested me but studying Maths now that was challenging!"

Michelle has lots of support from her family; her husband Martin does most if not all the cooking at home, even so, she seems to have boundless energy and determination. Her

award is very well deserved and we offer our congratulations and thanks to her for all she has done.

BEACON VILLAGES COMMUNITY LIBRARY – SAVE THE DATE!



Ivinghoe library will relaunch on **2nd June 2012** as the Beacon Villages Community Library, run by the community for the commu-

CHILDREN'S CORNER

Ivinghoe and Pitstone Sure Start Children's Centre

Over a year since launch, Ivinghoe and Pitstone Sure Start Children's Centre is proving to be a valued service within the local community. Situated on the Brookmead School site, it can be accessed along the footpath to the right of the school entrance. The Children's Centre is run by Barnardo's, in partnership with Buckinghamshire County Council, providing a one stop shop to local services that inform and support parents within the community. Some services are for everyone and others have a more particular focus, like a group for school transitions. We also provide support for families within their own home.

Since our opening, the Centre has been very well attended with an excellent response from families in the local community and

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wider area. Our reach area comprises the villages of Ivinghoe, Pitstone, Cheddington, Marsworth, Edlesborough, Slapton, Dagnall, Northall and Ivinghoe Aston. Priority will be given to parents from these areas when attending sessions and booking courses. We are also supported by the health teams from the Little Rothschild Surgery and Village Health Centre in Pitstone who run the health clinics from the Centre on Thursday and Friday mornings respectively, along with postnatal groups and the baby café.

The Children's Centre offers a variety of fun and interactive sessions to support parenting and children's learning and development. Timetables are produced regularly with information about the different sessions that are available and are posted onto our website www.barnardos.org.uk/buckschildrenscentres, in local stores and other venues in the area and can also be collected from us at the Centre at any time.

We also work in partnership with other agencies such as the National Child Minding Association, Jobcentre Plus and Bucks Family Information Service providing a wide range of information and links to a whole range of services available to you.

Our Centre welcomes all families with their babies and children up to their 5th birthday. We promote the inclusion of all children, their families and their carers, and seek to create a safe and nurturing environment for you all.

Our group runs every Wednesday during term time between 1.15 – 3.00pm in the Pitstone Memorial Hall, £1.50 per family per session.

Wow, what a busy term we have had with lots of fun activities: we enjoyed making lanterns for Chinese New Year, daffodils for St. David's day, planting sunflowers and pancake racing. We held a special event for World Book day and were joined by Michelle from Ivinghoe library who gave out book start packs and provided a wonderful story time to round off the session. The ladies were pampered with manicures, massages and cakes for Mother's day. The term ended with our Easter party where all the children took part in egg hunts, bunny races and other Easter games: Tracey the vicar finished the session off by telling the Easter story to all

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the little ones.

Some things to look forward to this term include, May Day celebrations, with a tractor ride to the windmill – a favourite with all the children. A jubilee party and a buggy float in the local fete, flag and crown making and biscuit decorating. A full calendar is available on our website.

On January 25th we held a bring and buy sale; this raised £57 for the group and enabled us to buy some new toys. We are keen to replenish our toys and would like toy cars, space toys, books, toy animals and duplo. We have supported the church in their fundraising for Bucks Young Carers and our members raised £12.15 for the charity- thank you for your support. One of our members held a charity cake sale for Pop'n'Grow, a charity that provides specialized baby grows for babies in intensive care at Luton and Dunstable hospital - £29.50 was raised.

The baby and toddler group is an integral part of life in the village and offers a wonderful opportunity for parents, grandparents and carers to meet and enjoy a cuppa together. There have been some good friendships formed amongst both the parents and our younger members. Many of the children form friendships with those they later go to pre-school and then school with therefore helping them settle into their new environments happily.

Each week we offer art and craft activities which allow the children to express themselves creatively whilst keeping their home mess free! Our toddlers have access to a range of toys and activities such as dressing up, train tracks, slides, trikes, trampolines etc. We are able to alternate these toys to keep everyone happy and entertained.

There is a safe soft area with a wide variety of toys for babies to explore and have fun with until they are ready to venture out into the larger area of the hall. A snack and drink is provided for the children and tea, coffee and biscuits, (sometimes cake!) for the adults at no extra cost. The sessions either end with a story time or sing along session, which the children really love.

Throughout the year, we welcome visits from local organisations and enterprises with products such as books, cosmetics and jewellery to name but a few. This offers great retail opportunities for parents and local entrepreneurs and as 10% of all sales come back to the group, it is a great way to support the group. 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

Every year we have been lucky enough to have volunteers walk or ride on behalf of our local churches. We are now on the lookout for people who could take part in this sponsored event this year and raise money for our churches and for the Bucks Historic Churches Trust.

2011-12 Annual Report and Accounts for Pitstone Parish Council

You will be pleased to hear that the parish council froze their element of the council tax again for 2012/13 at £76,500. Unlike the district council, the parish council receives no government subsidy for doing this. This report shows what your household's 18p per day bought during the year and what the plans are for next year.

Financial Position

22% of all council expenditure was funded during the year from other sources, such as maintenance payments, rental income or grants.

At the close of the year the council holds £131,063. £80,158 is reserved for specific purposes or with restricted spending ability (like maintenance payments from Taylor Wimpey) leaving £50,906 of retained reserve. The council is financially independent with no loans, lease payments or debts. A total of £1,301 was owed to the parish council on 31/3/11 (mainly PPP advertising revenue) most of which has already been recovered.

New Projects in 2011/12



£4,866 was invested in the creation of the youth cafe (£2,500 funded by the Local Area Forum) - which has been an amazing success, with over 100 local youths between 11-16 years now registered. Continued funding has been pledged for 2012/13.

Additional funds have started to be invested for the replacement of our aged aluminium street lighting columns. The works will be completed over a number of years on a rolling plan. New lights will feature the latest LED technology which provide better illumination, are better for the environment and cheaper to operate (like energy efficient light bulbs in your home).



A speed reduction initiative was implemented along the main through roads (Marsworth Road, Cheddington Road and Vicarage Road) including homes affected by the new speed limit reductions.

Savings in 2011/12

The wet summer meant savings for the pavilion site of £8,135 on the previous year. £5,621 was saved between the council's two allotment sites, primarily as the old site needed no ground maintenance. The one-off £5,000 grant to Brookmead for the creation of an outdoor recreation area was not replicated (but you will be pleased to know that over £4,000 was still donated to local community groups). The recreation ground play equipment needed £2,500 worth of work during 2010/11 which didn't need replicating in 2011/12 and the funds to install two additional self-closing gates at the Windsor Road play area were funded from S106 maintenance payments.

Free benefits !

Pitstone Hill is managed by the National Trust but the parish council is responsible for some of the car park upkeep. However this is funded from a compensation agreement, so the hill is yours to enjoy for free.



We also maintain several stretches of public footpath, the expenditure for which is currently reimbursed by Bucks County Council. Finally, you will all be familiar with Pitstone Parish Post, our quarterly newsletter. This magazine contains regular updates on what is happening within the village. This is funded from the advertising revenue it generates, so the magazine costs you nothing!

Charities

The council acts as trustees for the Recreation Ground charity and the Pitstone Parish Charity. Neither of these charities hold any finances or generate any income at present.

The Coming Year

2012/13 promises to be very exciting. The first phase of the village leisure development plans will commence with the creation of a skate park and multi-use games area on the recreation ground. Full consultation plans will be available during May and June, and we welcome your input.

The Diamond Jubilee Party will be held on Sunday 3 June to commemorate this wonderful occasion. We hope that everyone will come along and join in the celebrations which will also help raise vital funds for Pitstone Memorial Hall and the Rett Syndrome Research Trust.

The council would like to thank all the volunteers and employees that contribute to the projects and work of the council. Pitstone wouldn't be the same without you! If you'd like to volunteer as well, the clerk would be delighted to hear from you.

Jubilee celebrations this June

In the summer of 2008, Rita & Gavin Ross' beautiful little girl Francesca was diagnosed with Rett Syndrome.

Rett Syndrome is a debilitating disorder which most often strikes previously healthy little girls just after they have learned to walk and say a few words and begins to drag their development backwards. As the cascade of Rett symptoms descends, girls lose acquired skills, normal movement and speech. Then begins the long regression that may leave her in a wheelchair, unable to communicate or use her hands. Extreme anxiety, disordered breathing, Parkinson-like tremors, orthopaedic problems, and seizures are common. Many children live into adulthood requiring total 24 hour care but all are at increased risk of sudden and unexplained death. There is no cure.

But in 2007, the symptoms of Rett Syndrome were unexpectedly and completely reversed in pre-clinical models of the disorder.

Rett Syndrome Research Trust UK has one goal; to speed the time it takes to translate these laboratory findings into treatments and cures for our girls living with Rett Syndrome today.

Love Food Hate Waste

Love Food Hate Waste is a national campaign aimed at reducing the amount of food we as a society waste. We throw away 7.2 million tonnes of food and drink annually in the UK, costing us £12 billion. Much of this food could have been eaten – so bad for our pockets, and bad for the environment too.

Here are a couple of tips from their website. To freshen up bread that is a day or two old, hold it very briefly under the cold tap. Shake off the drops, and put it in a hot oven for about 10 minutes. It will be as soft and crusty as fresh-baked bread.

Bubble and squeak can be made from many tasty leftovers. Don't worry about what you throw in the frying pan (leftover potatoes and vegetables) as long as you soften a little onion in your pan first.

Tales from the Compost Heap, by Barbara Cummings

Following on from the topic in the last issue

of the magazine – what can be put on a compost heap – another Frequently Asked Question concerns what to do with weeds.

Annual weeds are by and large an excellent compost ingredient; the weed seeds may survive in your somewhat tepid home heap, so if possible add the weeds before they have gone to seed. Should this not be possible, and your compost starts to sprout new weeds, simply hoe them off.

Perennial weeds are a slightly different matter, and need different treatment. The roots and leaves of perennial weeds contain a lot of valuable plant foods, so it makes good sense to recycle them. However, as those of you who have had to deal with them have doubtless already found out, many of them are able to re-grow from small pieces of root, stem or bulb. Couch grass, ground elder, bindweed, celandine, dandelions, thistles, nettle roots and docks are just some of the weeds you would be unhappy to see multiplying in your heap.

Apart from the option of a green waste collection run by the council, your home options are either to stuff the plants, roots and all, into a black plastic sack. Mix in grass mowings, or any other green material, tie the top of the sack, and leave in an obscure corner of your garden for about 6 months. When the weeds have turned into a black sludge, add to your compost heap. Alternatively you could create a separate “nasty weed” heap. Cover it well with black plastic, and add to your bin when all signs of the original plants have disappeared. Either way, there's satisfaction to be had in turning problem weeds into a good addition to your compost heap.

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Pitstone Car Scheme



DO YOU have difficulty travelling to hospital or other healthcare appointments?

CAN WE help?

Pitstone Community Car Scheme is a new scheme offering a service for residents who have difficulty travelling to healthcare appointments.

The scheme is run by volunteers who use their own cars to drive residents to local hospitals or other healthcare appointments (for example, the opticians, dentist or physiotherapist).

There is a small charge for the service to cover the volunteer's petrol and car parking expenses. To make it easier, a set tariff has been worked out in advance for typical journeys to local hospitals. If you need to access healthcare in another town, eg Hemel Hempstead, the cost will be advised at the time of booking the trip.

Example costs (excluding car parking):

DESTINATION	MILES	ROUND TRIP	COST £
TRING	4	8	£2.40
STOKE MANDEVILLE	7	14	£4.20
CHESHAM	9	18	£5.40
L & D HOSPITAL	10	20	£6.00
AMERSHAM	12	24	£7.20
HIGH WYCOMBE	20	40	£12.00

So, for a return journey to attend an appointment at Stoke Mandeville hospital, the cost will be just £4.20 plus the car parking fee.

In some circumstances, we may be able to undertake hospital trips to the John Radcliffe or Nuffield hospitals. Please contact the number below if you are having difficulty accessing transport to these hospitals.

The volunteer will usually wait while the appointment is taking place, and then take the resident home. However, there may be circumstances where the return trip is much later or another day. In this case, each journey will be classed as return – as the volunteer will need to return to Pitstone using their own vehicle and petrol.

These charges are exceptionally good. The trips are being undertaken by volunteers so, at present, these cannot be extended to include appointments other than healthcare. Also, there is no guarantee of an available volunteer driver, but we will do all we can with the volunteer resources we have. Please give as much notice as you can.

SAVE OUR SCHOOL (SOS)

Café and activities for all generations in Old School Ivinghoe, with your support - we hope!



Some of you might not yet fully know that Ivinghoe Old School (that lovely single storey fully accessible building on the corner of Ivinghoe community lawn, next door to the safe play area) - has had some recent changes.

Despairing of a means to continue paying rental on a building no longer containing tenants, and the Post Office transferred by County across the road to the Town Hall, Ivinghoe Parish Council returned the keys to BCC who decommissioned it, preparing to sell it off.

The village community itself, however, then woke up to the loss and immediately declared it in no way 'excess to requirement'! They voted their supportive responses through a voluntary Ivinghoe Community Group 'Save Old School' Questionnaire, to rethink how to keep it open for the community as an open all-days, fully accessible social space for healthy, educational and purely fun

activities for all to share on a drop-in/join in basis.

Since last June a smallish Charity Group - Ivinghoe SOS, a not for private profit voluntary band of villagers, with a very much larger supportive section of the village looking on, have been hard at work non-stop - negotiating the building out of its redundant but marketable status, and into a fully worked up financially sustainable and fully transparent plan.

Two businesses, as our Community's tenants, plan to provide and run the much awaited village café and plethora of activities for local people as requested. These activities are designed specifically across all generations, from babes in arms through toddlers to children and youth up to eighteen; adults of all ages and especially those over sixty and in need of some more tailored services on their doorstep!

The new village café will provide what we 'vote with our feet' to support, but in the interim has been described as a place where anyone can drop-in for refreshments, and in the future has the possibility of lunch-clubs to round-off activities taking place in the building and maybe table top craft and game activities, too. The other activities during the day, before and after school, will be run by a Theatre Couple who will be bringing their evening Youth Theatre to our building which serves our own local youth by teaching all the areas of theatre practice, designing, making, directing, producing as well as the writing and acting of the plays, which we hope to then see performed in the Old Town Hall as well as the Court Theatre.

From Mum and Baby yoga to family gardening

groups, Start-up Business shared & equipped morning office hub to afternoon IT skills enhanced learning, Fitness dance to Fashion or Theatre costume/set design and make-up, Cinema to Film making and much, much more!



We in SOS Ivinghoe are of course focused on finally agreeing a Lease with BCC who have received our October, December submissions and have agreed to consider our final business plan ASAP, and this will then enable our Grant applications, especially our Big Lottery Village SOS bids to be finally sent off.

However, local fundraising is now kicking off with a Quiz Night/Skills Auction in the Rose & Crown Pub on 23rd May to which we hope you will come and offer skills or bid for other villager's helpful skills instead! 45 £10 tickets are available in the pub, which includes nibbles for nine tables of five and a fun night out. If you can't come, maybe you can run a fundraiser for SOS Ivinghoe?

Separately, two days later on Friday 25th May, the SOS Ivinghoe group invite you to wander up to the Old School between 2.00pm & 5.30pm, and walk around the inside of the

Old School, ask questions and see a small exhibition of our journey and projected intentions, lists of activities and add your own suggestions. That evening we will hold an open meeting in the Old Town Hall (they have chairs and electricity for tea!) from 7.00pm till 8.30pm where you can hear from SOS, ask questions and have your own say. Volunteers are of course welcome at any point in this community plan, though we aim not to compete but complement the present provision and hope for your declared sup-



port in whatever way you wish to give it back to your own community.....because of course we are the community we make!

A major part of my admiration for my granddad was his work ethic, his success. I asked my granddad when I was little, what I should be when I grew up, what job made me the most amount of money? And his response was to be an accountant. So that's what I am, no ones advice or thoughts meant more to me than his. And since my first day of work, there has been a photo, on my desk of me, my nan and my granddad, in pride of place.

Granddad was the head of our family, he instilled in each of us, that loving and caring for your family was the most important thing of all, and together him and my nan did that everyday. There to help us all, no matter how big or small the problem.

When people told me to think about the happy times with my granddad, I didn't struggle to think of any, the thing is, every minute I spent with my granddad was a happy time. The only problem I keep thinking is that there won't be anymore happy times.

I would often be found not too far away from my nan and granddad at any given opportunity up the yard washing lorries, doing the crossword, or at the farm on the tractor rides. I always remember those Sundays at the farm, and normally being hungover - he'd always just look at me and laugh, followed by the phrase, '**An hour before midnight is worth two after Tanya!**'

Or the time I looked after him, when nanny went to visit my Uncle in Morocco, and we went shopping to Tesco, I'm pretty sure granddad had never been to Tesco before, and he let me buy anything I wanted. Needless to say, we spent that whole week living off tomatoes on toast!

I have many amazing memories of granddad, but most of the time we didn't have to be making memories, because we were just busy being together. Just spending an hour or two, or a whole day together doing something or nothing was all we needed.

That was the thing about me and granddad, I could tell what he was thinking, or how he was feeling just by looking at his face. I could tell every time he looked at me how much he loved me, every time I would leave, and give him a hug and a kiss, he would squeeze me tight, like he wasn't going to let go, and I knew how much he loved me.

I look at photos now of us together, and in everyone, he doesn't look at the camera, he's looking at me, and it makes me sad that I won't ever be able to look back at him again, and feel OK.

I'm not quite sure how things go on from here; being apart from your best friend is difficult to comprehend, and as everyday passes my heart breaks a bit more knowing I'll never see

him again. I can just hope and pray that I can be half the person my grandad was, and make him proud forever, wherever he is.”

The site allows users to access the charity’s secure online form, which has been optimised for mobile devices. Those who have passed on information are also able to make a donation to Crimestoppers via text message through Just Text Giving.

With events such as the public disorder last August generating a huge amount of information for the charity, this new site will allow the public to give information “on the go”. Once again, anonymity is guaranteed.

Lord Ashcroft, KCMG, Founder and Chair of Crimestoppers, said: “As the only crime-fighting charity in the UK allowing people to pass on information about crime anonymously, it is vital we make this process as easy as possible. Through our mobile website we want to encourage the public to give information to Crimestoppers 24/7 whether at home or on the move.

“With the public’s help, and our commitment to making Crimestoppers even more successful in the fight against crime, we can work together to make our communities a safer place.”

Thames Valley Crimestoppers’ Projects Coordinator, Julia Hughes said: “This is a huge step forward for Crimestoppers in making our site even more accessible for those that want to pass on information about crime, whether at home or out and about.

THE NATURE OF PITSTONE QUARRY I

At the end of Westfield Road, on the edge of Pitstone, is a rather insignificant looking area of grassland, formerly known as Quarry I. But this is chalk grassland, a natural treasure, which throughout the country, has a diverse range of our more interesting and rare, flora and fauna.

Take the footpath across the area on a summers day and you will hear Skylarks and Meadow Pipits as they soar in the sky, looking to nest undisturbed in

the grass, for them, an ever decreasing opportunity in an intensively farmed country.

Closer to the ground, Marbled White Butterflies are attracted to the Ox-eye Daisies and dazzling black and red Cinnabar and Burnet moths can be seen taking a clumsy flight before settling on grass stems.

Ground level reveals numerous orchids spread across the area, but mainly around the margins. Common Spotted, Twayblade and Pyramidal, are the more noticeable together with the stunning, but more difficult to spot, Bee Orchid. Also in the Orchid family, three species of Helleborine, White, Broad Leaved and rare to the county, Green Flowered, can also be found.

Adders Tongue fern, the parasitic Broomrape and, local to our area, the Chiltern Gentian (pictured), add to the list of the more special plants.

It is possible to get a brief daytime glimpse of a Fox, or as the day is ending, the magical sighting of a Barn Owl, if you are very lucky.



Over twenty species of butterfly can be seen in the Quarry. Common Blue, Small Heath and Dingy Skippers are numerous while the diffi-

cult to see Green Hairstreak and recent to the list, the Grizzled Skipper, appear in smaller numbers.

But a closer look reveals the real gem of the Quarry. Measuring about an inch from wing tip to wing tip, and having the distinction of being our smallest Native butterfly, is the aptly named, Small Blue (*cupido minimus*). They vary in size with some no more than 15mm across and with their comparatively drab colouring, males charcoal grey with flecks of blue scales close to their body, females a drab brown, are difficult to follow after taking flight and should not be confused with the much larger, more noticeable and brightly coloured, Common Blue.

The numbers of Small Blues usually seen elsewhere, rarely reach double figures, but the conditions and abundance of their food plant in the Quarry means they can be seen in, hundreds, or even thousands in very good years. Because of the sparse and open vegetation and fortuitous management from a local farmer, its sole larval food plant, Kidney Vetch has proliferated. This, coupled with the high microclimates in the quarry

and suitable areas where it is able to seek shelter from the wind, has created the ideal habitat and make this to my mind, a Nationally important site for this species. Its life-style leads to its own precarious existence. Sedentary in nature, it seldom moves far from its place of hatching, thus making recolonisation of suitable sites, slow. This coupled with its sole dependency on Kidney Vetch, makes the majority of its surroundings unsuitable as Kidney Vetch dies out in the face of competition from other plants, or subsequent untimely grazing.

At the Quarry, the farmer cuts the area annually which keeps the scrub from invading and helps distribute the seeds from the flowers. The timing of this cut is crucial and seems to have suited this tiny butterfly and its larval food plant, causing it to reach these incredible numbers.

Nationally it is in decline and in many areas throughout the country management regimes are under way to try and help this butterfly.

So, when you are travelling past that insignificant looking area of grass, think again, but don't feel complacent about its future. It does not have the Site of Special Scientific Interest protection afforded to its neighbour across the road at College Lake Nature Reserve. Things can change very quickly. Remember the site is privately owned and it's with the goodwill of the owner that you venture unimpeded from the footpath. Treat the area and everything within it, with utmost respect.

I would love to think that one day it might receive better protection, or perhaps bequeathed to Butterfly Conservation and continue to be managed for us all to enjoy the plants, and in particular this charming, but very vulnerable butterfly.
