I am writing this at the start of the County Council election campaign and by the time you read this you will have received more than enough from me.

I have written and delivered a very lengthy

**Annual Report (it's been a busy year) to all** the parishes in the County division, and posted it on line through my website <http://AvrilDavies.mycouncillor.org> and Facebook page IvinghoeDivisionLibDems.

The main points are:

- Changes to services because of budget reductions, for example the library or adult day centres
- The successful work through the Parishes Local Area Forum on footpaths and pavements, reducing vehicle speeding, opportunities for young people.
- My continuing disagreement with the Council over home to school transport charges, capital spending on a waste incinerator, lack of investment in roads.
- The work I have done on overview and

scrutiny committees on health issues and academy schools.

My District Councillor role for Ivinghoe and Pitstone continues whatever the outcome of the County elections.

## PITSTONE PARISH COUNCIL (PPC)

We need your help to bring adult further education to Pitstone

When Pitstone Parish Council carried out a leisure survey, a number of residents replied to say that they wished there was a greater range of adult education / language / crafts & hobby events at Pitstone Memorial Hall. You told us that the courses on offer in

Aylesbury and further afield were too far to travel and too difficult to get to. We have been working with Bucks County Council (BCC) Adult Education division who are prepared to run some trial sessions at the Memorial Hall in Pitstone if there is enough demand, as part of their commitment to extending adult education to rural areas. These sessions would obviously be available for anyone to book, but will appeal most to the residents of all the local villages so we are inviting all the villages to feed into the process. If successful, BCC would look to run more classes in Pitstone and offer a greater variety of topics.

As a first step, we need to establish the most popular type of class and the most popular time of day to run sessions, so that the trials can be set up to cater for the greatest amount of people. We are looking

## New play space in Pitstone

By the time this magazine goes to print the parish council is hoping to have submitted the draft plans for the new play space to RoSPA for a pre-installation plan inspection, received authority from Aylesbury Vale District Council to proceed and submitted a planning application.

As soon as everything is authorised, we will get final illustrations up on the web site and around the village for you to see. You will also be able to see the plans at the annual assembly on 21 May in the Memorial Hall.

As the planning process takes at least 3 months and then there is a lead time of 6

weeks for the supplier to manufacturer your equipment it is currently looking as though work will begin on the recreation ground after the school summer holidays. The work to remove all the old equipment and install the new play space is anticipated to take up to 12 weeks, so should be complete and re-open in November.

## New skate park for Pitstone

Aylesbury Vale District Council are handling the procurement and installation of a concrete skate park on behalf of the parish council and the young people in the village. At the time of writing, they hope to get the initial brief out to the market during April and advise us that it normally takes 18-20 weeks to go through the various stages and reach the point where they can appoint a contractor.

We anticipate that the skate park will then require planning permission, requiring another 3 months so the best guess at the moment is that work is likely to start on the skate park in the early part of 2014.

The parish council will keep you posted on progress.

## Land surrounding the Recreation Ground

As you are all aware, the land surrounding the recreation ground has been earmarked as part of the Pitstone Development Area since 2005. There are several parcels of land, owned by different private and charitable landowners. It is hoped that this area will become the new heart of Pitstone, joining the traditional part of the village to the new developments, providing additional housing and enabling the promised leisure development that will include the play space,

skate park, multi-use ball court, picnic areas and additional parking at the hall. Aylesbury Vale District Council has been working with the interested parties to prepare information that will be provided to any potential developer. Draft plans have been available for residents to see at numerous events over the last 2 years and will be shown again at the Annual Assembly on 21 May. There are still a number of issues to be resolved, but it is hoped that it may come to market later this year. We will keep you up-to-date as the project unfolds.

## Look out for our Flashing Speeding Signs (mVAS)

Hopefully by the time you receive this magazine, the council will have received the mVAS unit and it will be operational in Cheddington Road, Vicarage Road and Marsworth Road. For those of you living in Castlemead, we regret to say that Taylor Wimpey (who still own the land) is currently withholding permission for the ground anchor/mVAS unit to be utilised along Westfield Road until after the date that Bucks County Council (BCC) formally adopt the highway (which will be at least 12 months after Taylor Wimpey bring the road up to adoptable standard, after all their residential development is complete). BCC has approved the location on Westfield Road and in their capacity as eventual landowner, provided authority for it to be sited there. However, it would still require Taylor Wimpey's permission as the current landowner. There is no financial, or other, liability for Taylor Wimpey as the parish council is funding, owning and maintaining this project.

The cameras that you may have seen erected on lamp posts around the village are not part of this project. The cameras are owned and maintained by Thames Valley Police who have the ability to capture num-

ber plate data and CCTV footage from them to assist with crime prevention in the village. Bucks County Council can also use the traffic count data they generate but have no facility to see any captured images. The parish council would like to thank Thames Valley Police for this extra initiative to help prevent criminal activity in our village.

## Delay for Castlemead Bus Shelters

Sadly, for all of you that were hoping to shelter from the rain whilst waiting for your bus or school bus along Westfield Road, Taylor Wimpey (who still own the land) is currently also withholding permission for the bus shelters to be installed along Westfield Road.

## New dog bin

A replacement dog bin has been installed on the land by The Crescent. This has a lockable lid which is designed to (a) prevent householders from stockpiling their dog faeces and then trying to put a whole carrier bag full into the dog bin and (b) prevent anyone from removing the contents of the dog bin. You are reminded that it is perfectly acceptable for your dog bags to be placed in your normal green lid refuse collection bin. The dog bins around the village are designed for your use whilst walking your dog and away from home only.

## You must get your dog micro-chipped

The government is bringing in compulsory micro chipping for all dogs from 6 April 2016. This will help reunite owners with lost or stolen pets, relieve the burden on animal charities and local authorities, pro-

protect the welfare of dogs by promoting responsible dog ownership and help tackle the growing problem of strays (each year more than 100,000 dogs are dumped or lost at a cost of £57 million to the taxpayer & welfare charities).

## Highway Improvements Coming Soon

We are delighted to say that a number of highway improvements should be visible around the village soon:

Vale of Aylesbury Housing Trust plan to install the additional car parking provision at

the Marsworth Road end of Glebe Close, with work currently scheduled to start on 15 April 2013. Planning permission was granted a number of years ago so we are delighted to see this coming to fruition and helping the residents.

Transport for Bucks are planning to carry out footpath repairs down Cheddington Road, this has been on the waiting list since 2011. Some of the works have already been marked out, so we hope to see this work conducted shortly.

Transport for Bucks hope to install new signage for the Pitstone Green Business Park during April/May. This has been outstanding since 2009 and will help to ensure that lorry traffic is routed around the outside of the village rather than along Marsworth Road which will be a great improvement.

The parish council is arranging for the repair of the pot holes in the car park at Pitstone Hill. This work will be carried out in April/May once the extent of the damage caused by the winter frosts is known.

Our thanks to both the organisations concerned.

## Foot/cycle path to Tring station

Herts County Council (HCC) has published their draft Urban Transport Plan for Pitstone and Berkhamstead that includes their initial investigations into the foot/cycle path to Tring station along Northfield Road. The full report can be found on their website: <https://consult.hertsdirect.org/tringberkhamstedup/> the Northfield Road proposals being Scheme 12.

Essentially, three routes have been considered and the favoured method is an off-road shared foot/cycle path along the length of

Northfield Road. This has been categorised as a 'complex' scheme as it will involve the some land transfers to provide sufficient space. HCC currently estimate it will be a long term scheme with an implementation time of 3-5 years if the land issues can be resolved and funding obtained.

With regard to the funding provided by Taylor Wimpey, the parish council continues to try and work with Bucks County Council and Herts County Council to get the funds transferred between the two bodies and we hope that this will take place by May/June.

## Annual Parish Assembly – 21 May 2013

**The Annual Parish Assembly isn't a council meeting** (although chaired by the council). It is your opportunity to hear about everything that has been happening over the past year and the plans for the future including up-to-date information about the play space, skate-park, multi-use ball court, other leisure development and the future development of the Pitstone Development Area around the recreation ground.

**You'll also hear from the local charities, the memorial hall, Thames Valley Police and the local District and County Councillor(s)** on issues under their responsibility that affect Pitstone. We are delighted that this year we will be joined by Mr Dave Short speaking to you about the Barn Owl Project. We hope to see you all in the main hall of the Memorial Hall at 7.30pm.

## Party In The Park - Saturday July 13th 2013 - 1pm-6pm

Please do make a calendar note that this year's *Party In The Park* will be on July 13th 2013 on Pitstone Recreation Ground. It is free to everyone.



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## Volunteer of the year - Joe Marling, a Hero among Heroes

"You could write a book about me." Joe says. His life is full of stories about his interest in old vehicles and how they have mapped the path of his life.

Born and raised in Park Royal Joe spent his early years watching the buses and lorries go in and out of factory gates and depots. As a child he intended to follow his father into the army but when Joe was 15 his father died leaving Joe with the responsibility of caring for his mother and younger brother. Instead of going into the army Joe took a job in the Guinness factory that dominated the area. Starting at the bottom as a messenger he went on to become a 'Grease Monkey' servicing the vehicles and changing their tyres. Finally he drove the delivery vehicles. Joe stopped working at Guinness in 1993 but later he went back to the closing down ceremony in 2005 when the last brew was to be made. Joe, with his wife Shirley pressed the button to make the final mash.

Joe's interest in old commercial vehicles led him to restore and show a 1947 Bedford tipper truck on behalf of Ahearns Ltd, rubbish disposal merchants, and he exhibited it at Alexandra Palace and drove it in the London to Brighton Rally in 1978. Later, in 1981 he drove his own, 1947 Bedford coal lorry. It was at Allie Pally that he met Reg Jellis. He was parked next to Reg and they soon became firm friends. Joe and his wife would visit Reg on his farm nearly every weekend and the 'boys' would restore an old Bedford coal truck that Joe had bought in a poor state.

When they retired, Joe and Shirley had planned to retire to the New Forrest but Reg suggested that they should come to Pitstone. He offered them the purchase of his mother's house as she had just died and so Joe moved to Pitstone and has been here for 20 years or so.

Joe has always been interested in things military. At the age of 19 he joined the Territorial Army serving for two years with the 8th Battalion Middlesex Regiment (DCO TA), in the footsteps of his father. It was natural therefore that his mind should be drawn to owning a military vehicle. In 2003 he bought the jeep that we are all so familiar with.

Joe went on to show his Jeep at military vehicle events where he met many old veterans. His involvement with the Military Vehicle Trust led naturally to his collecting for the Poppy Appeal and that is why we see him every year outside Masons Stores in the days preceding Remembrance Sunday. "This is my 6th year [of collecting] and each year has been more of a success than the last one," he says. "The first year I collected £250, then £750. In the third year it was £1,400, then £1,403 and £1,750 then, what a shock, bearing in mind that times are getting hard, Owen, our British Legion Chairman [said] 'Well done, you raised just over £2,000!' What a result!"

Joe is grateful to all the people who have supported him over the years "A big thank you goes to Richard Mason, the pitch outside the shop makes it [more comfortable] as we have toilets, coffee etc. supplied by his fantastic staff. Also, The New May Fu. Tong, the owner, a great guy, supplies free meals, even to my back-up crew. The sandwich man who delivers food to Mason's Stores also provides free food."

Joe also wishes to thank the various ladies who have baked him cakes, especially Heather, "The Bread Pudding Queen", who was so upset when her health prevented her from doing it any more.

"Another young girl who touched our hearts was the youngster who knocked on some of the doors asking for a donation for her 'Poppy Man'. If she or her parents read this: Joe says a big thank you."

It was while at a Military display at RAF Halton that Joe was approached by two young women who wanted him to bring his display to a Help for Heroes fund raising event in Princes Risborough; one of the girls had lost a brother in Afghanistan. Joe wasted no time in gathering together some mates and eventually 10 military vehicles turned up at the event. It was here that Joe met the boy's family and since then he has spent most of his time fund raising for the two charities: Help for Heroes and the Poppy Appeal.

As well as all this Joe and Shirley maintain an interest in Pitstone Green Farm Museum. Joe carries out maintenance work and Shirley sits at the reception desk and also does the flowers.

Joe is a deserving recipient of the Volunteer of the Year award. "A big thank you goes to those who recommended me for this award," he says, but I think we all agree that the big thank you goes to Joe.

## OBITUARY

Tom Williamson

Tom died of pneumonia in Wycombe Hospital on Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> April. Apart from his wife, Diane, he was the last member of the very old Williamson family still living in the village.

Born in Pitstone Tom never strayed far from home, apart from when he served in the Army Airborne Division during the war, something of which he was very proud.

His childhood was spent living with his parents and two sisters at 39 Marsworth Road, Pit-

stone and as a young man Tom enjoyed playing cricket for Pitstone. Eventually, after he met Diane, Tom built the house they lived in for 49 years of marriage, number 87 Marsworth Road. Here they had two sons, Tim and Nick. Tim now lives in the USA and Nick in Birmingham.

**In the past Tom's family owned a lot of the land in Pitstone, much of which was orchard. It is nearly all built on now, including the land behind Tom and Diane's house, which became a part of Rushendon Furlong.** The only remaining small piece of orchard lies in Tom and Diane's garden and many of us have availed ourselves of their windfall apples left by the gate in autumn. Alongside the orchard and visible from the road is an ancient shed, possibly 100 years old, which Diane believes was once used for storing apples. If anyone knows who built the shed, Tom was wondering the same recently so Diane would be very interested to find the answer.

Tom and his father were painters and decorators but moved into house building. When the newly married Tom and Diane took up the occupancy of their new house, Tom put up a sign on the old shed announcing his trade.

For those of us who had the privilege of knowing Tom he was a font of knowledge about Pitstone and Ivinghoe, remembering the locations of wells, long covered up, sewers before road widening and the houses he and his father had built.

**Tom's funeral was held at St Mary's church, Ivinghoe, and he is now buried with the rest of his family in Pitstone churchyard.** Tom was a good and generous neighbour and will be much missed.

## Pitstone aerospace business completes sale to global French company- **8th April, 2013**

Pitstone based aerospace business employing around 500 people has completed its sale to a French-owned global company.

The former Goodrich Electrical Power Systems business on Pitstone Green industrial estate will now become Safran Power UK, part of the global aerospace, defence and security Safran Group.

Former owners, US-based Goodrich Corporation, had been sold to United Technologies Corporation (UTC) last year (July 2012). As part of that deal, UTC was required by competition regulators to sell off the electrical power systems business.

Safran agreed the purchase of the business for approximately EUR 310 million last October. The sale has now been formally completed. Chris Plumb, Managing Director of Safran Power UK said: **"Our Pitstone business is at the forefront of moves towards lighter more efficient aircraft, and will form a key part of Safran's strategy to compete in that market.**

**"The benefits of electrical power include improved safety, gains in weight and space, as well as lower fuel consumption and thus lower carbon emissions.**

**"The transaction gives birth to a world leader in aerospace electrical power systems with a comprehensive product portfolio.**

**"That means we'll continue to need the highly skilled engineers and manufacturers that we already employ – and may even bring more opportunities in the area."**

Safran Power UK is a leading supplier of on-board aerospace electrical power systems. It has a second facility, Safran Power USA, based in Twinsburg, Ohio employing around 100 people.

## PARISH CHARITY NEWS

The two parish charities exist to support older people and others in the village who are in genuine need where no other organisations can help.

*The Williamson Trust* manages funds donated by Mr Marc Williamson and his son Humphrey and uses the interest on these investments to make grants each April to people in the parish over the age of 65. The Trustees would also like to know about people living in the parish who will be aged 65 or over on 31<sup>st</sup> March 2014 **and wish to make themselves known to us.**

*The Pitstone Town Lands Charity* has been operating since the 15th Century and this year celebrates the centenary of its creation in its current form. PTLC supports anybody in the parish in genuine need where no other organisation can help including people under 65. Following a bequest in 2011, the Charity now owns almost 50 acres of land and four flats and uses the rental income and interest on investments to make small grants and provide practical support to people in the parish. Following the bad weather of the last year, the Trustees would particularly like to hear about any person in the parish who may need support or assistance in the event of bad weather or any other emergency. The Charity also currently has some unused mobility scooters and invites enquiries about them to Peter Loose.

Pitstone Parish Council and the Charity Commission recently approved an extension from 5 to 7 trustees recognising the growth in the village and the additional assets. However, the Trustees were sorry to receive the resignation of Klaus Ginda after 9 years of hard work, dedication and commitment to the two charities. Klaus involved himself in every aspect of the charities work and has been a friend, confidante, and advocate for many of our elderly and disadvantaged residents. Klaus was often the first friendly local face to introduce himself to a new resident of the village and helped many villagers to switch to Digital TV. **Residents of the village will continue to benefit from Klaus' dedication in his role as a Parish Councillor, but the two charities will sorely miss his expertise.**



Hello there Pitstone community! We are very nearly open! It is almost two years since we started to harass BCC for a Community Asset transfer of the Old School Ivinghoe for our community to turn it into an informal, level access, welcoming hub for all generations within our extended community!

We should now call our vast group of eager supporters **and the busy action committee and trustees within that, the 'Saved Old School' community group!**

Looking back we should feel really pleased and proud of the successes along the way, but in truth there is never enough time because the next issue always needs attention immediately! As you know by now, we have been awarded nearly £50,000 from the Big Lottery Village SOS and £19,500 for electricity from the Community Chest, £5,000 apiece from the Bucks Community Foundation and Vital Villages for some part of the big insulation costs.

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
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

It turns out not to be very easy to match/patchwork your building specifications, put together with drawings all by Bob Corn, which echo the practical building progression – with **the funding allocation as and when it comes in finally, if at all.....and for what particular purpose specified.** We have to keep each funding purse separate and specific and in some **cases it was not quite enough...so recently we have applied to 'Awards for All' and 'Comic Relief'** – each for a further £10,000 to match part of our £33,000 shortfall beyond our already awarded £80,000. Yes that is a lot of money £113,000 total, but the Old School is soaking it up easily as we speak and deserves the best it can get for its refurbishment now, to take us all well into the future!

As you may be aware the builders are now in , and are stripping the old ceilings away to apply the very good insulation we have purchased between those high ceilings and the until now un-insulated roof. The plaster and lath between the rafters looks in quite a good state, so we are optimistic of the roof condition, that we have not quite enough money to fully focus on yet. After new ceilings are put up in the same level as before we will see the builders strip out the electrics and rewire so that we have all the fittings where we need them safely without extended trailing wires tripping any of us when we are taking part with all the many new activities within the Hub. The IT suite for small businesses and IT learning will then be kitted out as soon as our security system is in and completely burglar proof! The gas heating is having a revamp and new lighting is being introduced, and the Lottery kitchen monies are also about to be used as a basic new kitchen replaces all the old fixtures now stripped away.

Hayley Wesley will be then introducing her own café fixtures beyond that kitchen level, and CuriosiTEA will invite you in!

**This brings us to the predicted timing of the openings, which will be staged...in the order of first the completed building to the level that monies allow just now, then the fully inspected and 'passed' Café - CuriosiTEA Rooms run by Hayley, then the myriad of hourly activities run by Liz Raba and Joley Brindle (...now Roberts) as taster sessions first and then 'summer activities sessions' in August and finally then the Flametree theatre and forest School starts in September 2013.**

For those who have not been here to get to know the plan over the last 23 months, all generations will be served by this Hub, with all the activities the community voted for delivered **back to it by these two businesses above, who will make the 'not for private profit community venture' sustainable into the future via a simple rental administered via the eight Volunteer Community trustees.** Follow all minutes and finances transparently on our new website [www.ivinghoeoldschool.com](http://www.ivinghoeoldschool.com) or through future library notes. These activities range from Mum and Baby yoga, forest school for home scholars, lunch clubs for all, after school clubs, evening theatre school for all teenagers, IT suite for small business adults, film making, arts **and crafts, tailored exercise to music for over fifties, and IT learning for those who haven't yet done so, or want to improve.** Separately there will be a community space for weekend **parties and auction /jumble sales and film sessions etc.....or whatever the community**

**needs.....and of course the CuriosiTEA Rooms Café will be open for your easy drop-in whenever you choose...with affordable but delicious food and drink and even re-heatable suppers to take home! Beyond this we imagine a host of mutually devised other possibilities and 'pop-up' extras!**

We plan a mid-June finish, and thus had hoped to invite you all to a total launch to co-incide with this June 15th Village Fete and that big collective presence on the lawn. However the need for more monies is stretching the building works timings to make that too rushed a date to be fully ready and inspected, so we will just be a jolly, welcoming and informative **presence on the lawn instead. It may be possible to open our doors for a community 'gawp'** of the works so far, but writing this in early April, it is too optimistic to be sure of the **builders view on this yet....or our ability to 'refresh' the village in the way we are fully confident to be doing when next year's fete comes around again! We hope to have a presence by the smaller Old School gate during the fete and will be offering all that is timely and appropriate come the day from there.....with either invitation's for the near future or invitation's within!!**

Now comes the invitation/request that we CAN with surety extend to the community who **will later use it....for those willing to come decorate with us** – your own new Community Hub, by painting our way towards its opening. This will happen over weekends around the end of May beginning of June. The Builders will tackle the topmost spaces but we need to make good and paint the bottom two metres of the whole building, please. or arranged by Ivinghoe Aston composer John Cameron. Now the Beacon Community Choir of Ivinghoe joins this illustrious band by performing a suite of songs composed especially for the choir by John Cameron. John sings with the Beacon Community Choir when **his other commitments allow, and knows well the choir's strengths and has composed a work to demonstrate the choir's joy of singing together, and its sense of humour!**

Oscar-nominated and multi-award-winning composer, John Cameron's works include film scores for Kes, Path to 9/11, A Touch of Class, and the cantata based on texts from 6th to 18th centuries, Missa Celtica, as an arranger, his orchestral scores for Les Miserables, Spend, Spend, Spend, Honk! and Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat. Choir Director Judith Sheridan said: "I'd always wanted a major work for the choir to mark the milestone of the community choir's 5th birthday. John was the obvious choice as he sings with the choir occasionally and the fact that he's a composer of such incredible stature and versatility is a huge advantage. I knew bits of his music – his jazz stuff – very well, and I'd heard some of his classical pieces. I'd heard many more of his pieces before I knew it was he who'd composed them. I had absolutely no idea of what style of music would come out, but I knew it would be good. And now I've heard it, it's wonderful – I fall in love with each piece as I do it. He's thrown himself into this commission with incredible vigour and enthusiasm, and he's doing the orchestrations as well."

Composer John Cameron says: "When Judith approached me about commissioning a piece for the Beacon Choir, I was immediately attracted to the concept that she and the choir envisaged: namely a piece not only about the area we live and work in, but a piece with input from whoever wanted to contribute. Suggestions of pre-existing poems, new poems by members of the choir, images, local historic narrative and snatches of prose and verse describing everything from local wildlife to the secrets of choir practice! All this would find a place in the work. Musically it is firmly in the English choral and pastoral tradition but with a dose of contemporary music theatre thrown in. And principally it is a celebration: a celebration of the work of the choir and the community, and a celebration of this unique corner of the country we live in."

## New from the Chilterns Tourism Network

Due to the proximity to London, the great, the good and the not-so-good have all made their homes in the Chilterns. Some of their finest houses are now in the care of the National Trust, whilst others are in private hands. Make your own selection to plan a short break or a Grand Tour with more than its fair share of opulence, interest and intrigue.

## Here are our top 10 Chilterns favourites

### 1. Cliveden

The Profumo affair – 50 years on. In 1963 the Profumo Affair scandalised the nation and Cliveden hit the headlines as the place where John Profumo first met Christine Keeler.

Now a luxury hotel, this is a rare chance to visit inside the house to see the private rooms and pool that are not usually open to non-residents. The gardens and woodland trails are open all year.

### 2. **Milton's Cottage**

Milton's Cottage is the only extant home of John Milton, the great English poet and parliamentarian.

It was in this grade 1 listed 16th century cottage, described by Thomas Ellwood as "that pretty box in Giles, Chalfont", that Milton completed Paradise Lost, and the idea of Paradise Regained was put to him.

Complete with cottage garden, this really is a Chilterns gem. The cottage is open daily from 1st March to 31st October, Tuesday to Sunday inclusive.

### 3. Greys Court

The Brunner family lived at 16th-century **Grey's Court** until quite recently. The estate is tucked away in a tranquil Chilterns valley with a series of courtyard gardens and longer walks around the Estate.

The house still exudes a welcoming atmosphere, with a well-stocked kitchen and homely living rooms.

The series of walled gardens is a colourful patchwork of interest set amid medieval ruins, which made it the perfect location for another family picnic – for members of the Crawley family in the new series of Downton Abbey.

### 4. Chenies Manor House

In 1285, during the visit to Chenies of Edward I, the earliest occurrence is recorded of eggs being cooked and given to the villagers to celebrate Easter.

Such are the quirky traditions at the lovely Chenies Manor, located in the picturesque Chilterns village of Chenies. Henry VIII and Elizabeth I both visited and it is where Catherine Howard carried on the fatal dalliance with her lover Thomas Culpepper.

Now much used for filming, the MacLeod Matthews family home and gardens are a gem. April – **October on Wednesdays, Thursday and Bank Holiday Monday's open from 2 – 5pm.**

### 5. Lacey Green Smock Mill

So-called for its resemblance to a traditional farmer's smock. It stands on the escarpment of the Chiltern Hills, near Princes Risborough and halfway between High Wycombe and Aylesbury.

It has been restored by the Chilterns Society to preserve its unique wooden machinery, which probably dates from around 1650, making this the oldest smock windmill in the country.

Open from Sunday May 5th between 2 - 5 pm on Sundays and Bank Holidays.

### 6. Chilterns Open Air Museum

Like a doorway into another world, the beautiful collection of restored historic buildings **include the Thame Vicarage Room, High Wycombe Toll House, Shepard's Living Van and Iron Age house** all to be explored around the museum site.

Doors open for the season on March 29th

### 7. Ashridge House

Now a prestigious management school located in the lovely Ashridge Forest, Ashridge House and gardens will have limited opening during March, April and August.

There is plenty to see including; the house where guided tours will be available and includes access to the Humphry Repton-designed gardens that have been extensively restored.

25 – 28 March, 2 – 5 April and 29 July – 30th August.

### 8. Natural History Museum Tring

This branch of the Natural History Museum in London was formally known as the Zoological Museum and the founder, Lionel Walter Rothschild, born into an international financial dynasty, was destined to be famed as a zoologist and collector rather than a banker.

From the cassowary to the zebra, he was fascinated by animals and dedicated his life to studying zoology. He also kept an interesting variety of live animals in the grounds of the museum and in neighbouring Tring Park.

The collection is still housed in the original museum, full of Victorian charm and can be visited all year round. Free.

### 9. Roald Dahl Museum and Story Centre

When he was alive, the postman would deliver up to 4,000 letters from his fans every week.

**Possibly the greatest of Chilterns' sons, the lovely Chilterns town of Great Missenden was home to Roald Dahl for 36 years.**

He used the landscape to draw inspiration for some of his stories including Matilda and the BFG. The museum and story centre are open all year.

### 10. Berkhamsted Castle.

It all began with the Duke of Normandy, who having defeated king Harold at the battle of Hastings in 1066, pillaged his way through southern England until he reached Berkhamsted.

Here he was met by the local bigwigs who swore allegiance and offered him the crown. The offer was accepted and William was crowned king on Christmas day in 1066.

**One of England's oldest motte and bailey castles is free to explore, and can be found adjacent to Berkhamsted station.**

## Florence Hawkins—99 years and counting!

Florence Hawkins (Nee' Tooley) reaches her centenary landmark on 18th May 2013. Florrie's life, has stretched out during a time when tears were shed over two world wars, and among other monumental events, the raising of the Berlin Wall, the death of a President, the winning of a World Cup, the space shot which saw man land on the moon, the appointment of Britain's first women Prime Minister and the dismantling of the 'Iron Curtain' which brought an end to the 'Cold War'.

Born at the Fog Cottages next to the railway, where the bridge crosses Marsworth Road. Florrie was the youngest of four daughters, named after her mother and she was preceded by



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Doris (Blake) and twins Vi (Robertson) and Daisy (Rogers). Her dad Harry worked all his life on the railways and lived at what is now known as Railway Cottages until a year before his death, in 1962, aged 83. Her mum died two years before him at the age of 79.

Florrie, with her sisters attended Pitstone Primary School on the corner of Church Road and Vicarage Road, here she excelled as a runner and a love of sport followed her into adult life.

Few working class children progressed past an elementary education. to go to a secondary school. Secondary education supported only 200,000 children in the whole country. So Pitstone was the only school Florrie knew and from here, aged 12, she would have gone into the world of work.

Florrie witnessed first hand the day to day progress when the Tunnel cement works were built in 1936-37 and lived under the umbrella of the chimneys until production of Castle cement stopped in 1991. The chimneys being demolished on 30th January 1999 an event covered by regional television. Up until married life intervened Florence cycled daily to Tring Station to catch the morning train to Berkhamstead where she was employed as a seamstress.

Florence was married, during the war, on the 11th May 1940, at Pitstone Parish church, to William Harold Hawkins. They began their married life with Harold's mother Lucy at, what is today, 48 Station Road in Ivinghoe. Over a year later David was born to complete their family. Whitefriars in Pitstone and Ivinghoe Manor, were among those who employed Harry as a gardener during his working life after the war.

During the fifties life in Pitstone was shared with the radio family of The Archers. This was a time when television viewing was limited to time spent with family and friends when watching television was a social occasion. Florrie's first television was not acquired until after the death of her husband, twenty eight years ago, when she moved to Pitstone to be nearer her son.

The parish join together with son David, daughter-in-law Sue, grandchildren, Kevin and Michelle, great grandchildren Charlotte and James, Nicola and all other relatives and friends to wish Florence a Happy Birthday later this month. Hopefully in our next issue we can get to share with you the message received from the Queen in recognition of her achievement in reaching a great age.

# Pitstone Car Scheme

Pitstone Community Car Scheme is a new scheme offering a service for residents who have difficulty travelling to healthcare appointments.

The scheme is run by volunteers who use their own cars to drive residents to local hospitals or other healthcare appointments (for example, the opticians, dentist or physiotherapist).

There is a small charge for the service to cover the volunteer's petrol and car parking expenses. To make it easier, a set tariff has been worked out in advance for typical journeys to local hospitals. If you need to access healthcare in another town, eg Hemel Hempstead, the cost will be advised at the time of booking the trip.

## OTHER BITS

### Tales from the Compost Heap - Good News for Tired Gardeners

Have you ever fully plumbed the mysteries of single digging and double digging? Whatever they are, they certainly sound like hard work and almost definitely involve a great deal of wielding of ones spade. So what could be done to make the lot of the gardener an easier one?

To protect your soil – and your back – you may find that a system that involves minimal, or no digging, suits you and your soil best. This is where compost, and other soil improvers come into the picture. Always assuming your bed has no problems with being over-compacted, compost, leaf mould and manures (well rotted or composted) can be spread **over the surface at, I'm told, the "usual rate". I think this means a fair bit, depending on what your soil is like and what it needs to improve it.** Compost and strawy animal manures **provide plant foods and improve your soil structure, whereas leaf mould doesn't have much in the way of nutrients but can be used ad lib as a means of bulking out your soil and helping it that way.** **What you're aiming to do is to use a combination of materials to improve your soil.**

Compost, manures and other organic materials can be put on as a mulch, or dug into the **top 6 – 8" of the soil (just a bit of digging, then).** **They can be put on in spring or summer, which is when they're needed to help your plants along.** **Needless to say, you would observe normal hygiene routines, such as washing hands well, washing produce before eating etc.**

It hardly needs to be said that there is a great deal more to know on this subject; but just for now, once the first warm days of spring arrive, take that lid off your compost bin and have a look inside. Hopefully you will find a quantity of material ready to be fished out, sieved, and barrowed off to be spread on your flower beds or veg plot. And, with luck, you will never need to find out what double digging is.

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
