A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

In the last PPP I wrote about the amazing effort put in by various volunteer groups this year. Due to falling demand, the local volunteer group has stood down. Hopefully they will not be required again, but they remain ready to restart if lockdown rules are tightened. Once more, I thank everyone involved for their efforts. One village institution that is looking for help is Pitstone Memorial Hall. As a charity it needs more volunteer trustees. The trustees manage the upkeep of the building and decide how the facilities are used and associated charges. Trustees meet four times a year but do communicate between meetings. The hall is a vital piece of village life, used by a large proportion of residents. If you would like to be a part of its continued success please email

One area where we have volunteers that we shouldn't need, is in picking up litter. The council employs litter pickers who regularly clean up around the village, but recently the amount of litter has increased, in particular

around the new play equipment on the recreation ground. This has led to residents stepping in to tidy up between official visits. One or two residents also undertake more widespread litter picking, including local footpaths and verges. While it is fantastic that people choose to do this, it shouldn't be necessary. We are all responsible for our own actions, and the majority of people who act responsibly should not have to deal with or look at the litter left by the minority. Please reinforce with your family the need to bin or take home litter so we can all enjoy the village and countryside as it is supposed to be seen. It was with regret that the council decided not to hold an annual assembly this year. We had been delaying in the hope that an inperson meeting would be possible, but it can't be done safely while accommodating the usual number of attendees. We can revisit the decision if things change but if you have questions you were planning to ask at the assembly please contact the clerk and we will respond, and publish the questions and answers.

Urgent plea for volunteers to help our elderly and our youth The parish council operates a community car scheme to help get residents to their hospital **appointments as there often isn't** any suitably timed public transport or the health of the patient would make use of public transport difficult. Many of our customers are elderly and have been isolating or shielding. Many of their hospital appointments have been postponed and are now very important.

We also operate the youth café for children aged 11-16 years to provide constructive activities and opportunities to meet friends in a safe environment, as well as providing important access to youth services.

We have ways to make both operate in a covid-secure environment to help protect our volunteers.

In both instances, many of the local volunteers who normally make these schemes possible, are over retirement age or have underlying health conditions, preventing them from returning to volunteering at the moment due

to the ongoing pandemic. We desperately need your help, even if only for the next 6 months, so these 2 groups of residents can access the services they need. To help in the car scheme, please contact

The exciting new play space by the Recreation Ground opened on 10 September and we hope you are all enjoying all the new equipment. This area has been designed as an inclusive play space so that everyone can play together, regardless of their age or ability. You will find a range of play features suitable for toddlers through to teenagers, incorporating a significant number of items suitable for a range of disabled use including swings, sunken trampoline, springers and wide slides to allow carers and children to travel down together. The play space also incorporates visual and textural surfaces and colours to stimulate and assist those with

visionary difficulties. We would love to know what you and your children think of all the new equipment, so do let us know via email, Facebook or Twitter. If your children are old enough to be out playing by themselves, please remind them to socially distance when using our playgrounds and to sanitise their hands before and after using the equipment. It has also been sad to see the huge volume of litter dropped in the new play space, including used nappies as well as food & drink.

Due to the ongoing pandemic it is particularly important to ensure that you and your children make use of the bins provided, for the health and safety of all users and

reduce the risk of putting the virus straight into your body. Signage on all our playground gates advises users of this and the need to use bins. Your amazing new play space has cost over £120k, so please take a pride in it so it can be a fun and safe place for our children. The smaller playground in Tun Furlong at the far end of Vicarage Road is also now open. This features a range of equipment particularly suitable for the younger to mid aged groups. Bellway are arranging for this to be maintained for a period of 24 months by a maintenance company before transfering to the parish council at the end of that period.

The flat seat swings at the Windsor Road playground suffered a frame failure and have for been removed safety. Τwο replacement sets of swings (flat seat and cradle seat) are being procured so that full play can resume as soon as possible.

Youth Café

We hope to be able to re-open the youth café after the October half term. Our café manager is working with Brookmead School and our volunteers to ensure we can operate in a Covid-Secure manner. We will be able to permit

a maximum of 15 young people per session, so anyone wishing to attend will have to book in advance. We are very sorry, but if you have not booked, you will not be admitted. Session times will also need to be reduced, so that we can operate one bubble of 15 young people from the Year 7 intake between 6.15pm and 7pm, then break for a full clean of our space followed by a second bubble of 15 young people from Year 8 and above from 7.15pm to 8pm. We appreciate that this solution is not ideal. The youth café would normally have between 30 and 40 attendees per week, and this term we would normally have had another intake of approximately 20-30 children as they moved from year 6 to year 7. 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Buckinghamshire Council aims for Covid recovery with "best in class" devolution bid

Buckingham Council intends to submit a strong, compelling and best in class devolution proposal to Government, just five months **after becoming the UK's newest** unitary authority.

The proposal, which is subject to approval by the council's Cabinet next month, demonstrates the ambition and potential of the new Buckinghamshire Council, launched on 1st April this year. The council geographically aligns with the Local Enterprise Partnership, strategic NHS partners, business representative organisations and the voluntary and community sector. Working together with these partners, the council is now finalising an ambitious proposal that could not only benefit the economic and social revival of Buckinghamshire, but could add £10 billion a year to the UK economy by 2050.

The hope is that this aligns with the Government's forthcoming 'Devolution White Paper', which will pave the way for devolution bids across the country. Bucking-

hamshire wants to be in the vanguard of those areas who might benefit from devolution in the future.

In putting forward this proposal the new council, together with the Buckinghamshire Local Enterprise Partnership, has withdrawn from the Oxford to Cambridge **'ARC Leaders Group' to present a** bid led by business opportunities and strengths in key growth sectors.

Cllr Martin Tett, Leader of Buckinghamshire Council, commented:

"The Government's election manifesto made clear its commitment to devolution across all of England, not just to cities. It is vital that the Government use its forthcoming White Paper to empower large unitary authorities such as Bucks to drive forward economic recovery and growth, along with tackling long standing social, environmental and health issues.

"As one of the newest and largest unitary authorities in the UK, with a proven track record of delivery, we have our sights set on a 'best in class' devolution settlement which can drive post-Covid 19 recovery for the residents and businesses of Buckinghamshire, as well as creating jobs and prosperity for the UK economy as a whole."

Buckinghamshire has super strengths of high tech and meditech, space and creative and digital industries. When combined with our physical location at the centre of major growth hubs, our proven track record of delivery and strong partnerships between local government, business and health, we know there is huge potential for us to turbo charge our economic recovery.

Post-Covid it is very important that Buckinghamshire is free to be 'business led'. It has become clear that business needs to be able to form alliances and exploit opportunities wherever they lie, rather than being tied to a particular geography. Bucks business will embrace growth and recovery opportunities, working with partners across many areas including Oxfordshire, Hertfordshire, Berkshire or Surrey. It is important to stress that we will work with a broad range of organisations and industries to maximise business opportunities wherever they occur."

Help us decide our budget priorities

Buckinghamshire Council today launches its budget consultation for 2021/22. Residents, businesses and other interested parties

are being asked to submit their views on the council's spending priorities for the coming financial year.

The council carries out a budget consultation every year, giving people the chance to have their say on where money should be invested and in which services or areas they believe savings can be made.

Council finances have faced added pressure this year due to the coronavirus pandemic. The double effect of additional spending to support our vulnerable and the variety of one-off costs incurred, combined with the loss of income from regular funding streams such as parking revenue and business rates has brought about a budget shortfall. Although some additional funding from central government has helped, it does not cover all the costs and has left a funding gap of around £7m. Council Leader Martin Tett explained: "2020 has been a year like no other. As individuals, families and whole communities, everyone has faced uncertainty and many challenges over the past six months. The council's experience has been no different.

"We are now at the stage where we must set our budget priorities for the coming financial year. In any year this can be a challenge but undoubtedly this year will be even harder.

First Buckinghamshire e-bike scheme being introduced along Waddesdon Greenway A fleet of new electric bikes available for the public to use is being introduced for the first time in Buckinghamshire. The ten e-bikes will come into service along the well-loved 4km long Waddesdon Greenway and will give people a new way of travelling between Waddesdon Manor and Aylesbury Vale Parkway railway station. The bikes are now available to use as part of a 'soft launch' of the service before the scheme is available to the wider public later in September. Initially, the bikes are only available from the docking station outside the visitors' centre at Waddesdon Manor, Bikes are available on a first-come-firstserved basis and full instructions on how to hire are displayed on the docking station itself. Hire charges are £1.50 for the first hour and f1.00 for each additional 30 minutes. The second docking station at the railway station is being installed in the coming weeks, ready for the full launch of the service.

Assistance from central government to help volunteer efforts was not at all bureaucratic or obstructive. In case you are not aware, the government via Buckinghamshire Council (BC) assigned up to £2000 for each BC councillor to allocate to local volunteer groups directly or via the parish councils for petrol and other incurred costs in the course of the daily tasks in support of the vulnerable residents isolating/shielding during lock down. We were all impressed at the speed and effectiveness of the process and council officers in transferring the money to the organisations/ parish council bank accounts. Fly Tipping - Call for extra vigilance

The unique circumstances of the lockdown have led to a national surge in opportunistic waste carriers who all too often fly tip people's waste, warns Buckinghamshire Council's illegal waste enforcement team, who have the job of tracing and prosecuting offenders under the Buckinghamshire's 'zero tolerance' approach to fly tipping.

"That's why I'm asking people to be extra vigilant", said Buckinghamshire Council's Cabinet Member for Environment & Climate Change Bill Chapple OBE:

"Lockdown has meant that many of us have had the opportunity to do the biggest spring clean ever, or to finally get into that longintended DIY project - and that's resulted in a lot of extra waste. Added to that, the housing market is beginning to get going again, and there will be lots of clearing out as delayed house moves start to take place. But don't be tempted to hire a 'man with a van' who's offering a cheap job. There's a legal responsibility to ensure that your waste is disposed of properly - and that means using a bona fide licensed carrier. Check the SCRAP fly tipping

Obituary Edward John Walter Stallard (Ted)

26th November 1926 - 20th August 2020

Ted was an East End boy, born with his Aunt's who had a in Plaistow West Ham on the baker's shop in Cambridge 26th November 1926. Jennifer Street.

He joined the Parish Council, his first meeting being the 28th August 1974. He served for over 30 years, completing two terms as Chairman, working with six parish clerks during his time. He considered one of his greatest achievements was in using his powers of persuasion to get an upgrade of the street lights in the village, not everyone was pleased but he said the old ones were the scruffiest he had ever seen, and for years after he carried out regular inspections to keep them maintained.

He also served for 12 years on Aylesbury Vale District Council as councillor for Pitstone, Ivinghoe, Ivinghoe Aston and Cheddington. Jean's highlight over these years

This Newsletter has been prepared in support of the listed building application submitted to (at the time) Aylesbury Vale District Council Heritage Team for carrying out general & specific external maintenance works to all elevations at Tvinghoe Town Hall (Beacon Villages Library).

Buckinghamshire Council are free holders of the property and therefore are authorized to carry out repairs and make good the property in accordance with the covenants and provisions contained in the Lease.

The Schedule of proposed Works has purposely taken an approach to reduce the impact on the heritage asset to minimize the impact on its significance and takes into account:

- · The architectural and historic interest of the building
- · The aesthetic qualities and interest of its design and character
- The building tabric //
- The building's footprint, including its external composition
- Its spatial qualities and decorative schemes

The proposed Schedule of Works not only deals with itenis of work that are deemed to require Listed Building Consent, but it will also include, giving holistic context and relevant information to the building as a whole, items of work that occur to deemed as repairs which reavine the considered to require Listed Building Consent.

The Local Planning Authority (LPA) have attached 5 number Conditions to their Decision Notice which all have to be discharged before and during the works to ensure all works will comply with Section 18 of the Planning (Listed Buildings and Conservation Areas) Act 1990 as amended by Section 51 of the Planning and Compulsory Purchase Act 2004.

This Newsletter edition (#2) is to give notice that the second stage of the proposed External Maintenance Repair works is to discharge the Planning Conditions 4&5 and, in the main, the Re-pointing of existing brickwork and brickwork repairs.

This work will require the erection of a scaffold for safe access while working at height during these maintenance works. Considering the buildings age, the external brickwork and associated mortar joint's durability will inevitably be effected by changing weather conditions. Constant exposure to uncontrolled weathering will lead to physical decay and deterioration.
