A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Dave Nicholls, Chairman Pitstone Parish Council

I hope you were able to find some pleasure and relaxation during an unusual and difficult Christmas/New Year, and that a brighter future awaits.

In my last report I talked about the issue of increasing litter in the village and mentioned residents who were taking it upon themselves to supplement the Parish Council's litter picking to deal with the issue.

Sadly, the litter problem hasn't gone away but the council is heartened to note that even more people have joined the litter picking ranks. We thank everyone who is helping with the problem but their efforts should not be required. Please put your litter in the bin or take it home, and make sure that your family members do the same.

Looking back at my report from this time last year it's clear that, in a difficult year, the council had some successes. We managed to complete two of our three major projects, the new play equipment on the Rec, and the Pavilion, but we are still working on the Skate Park.

Skate park tender documents should have gone out during last year, but delays in getting the play equipment installed and other lockdown restrictions halted the progress. The skate park will be located in the space between the new

play equipment and the end of the hall car park (soon to be the site of the new Multi-use games area). That space needed to be available for site visits from suppliers so they can measure and plan. Now that it is we are able to restart the process.

Provision of the skate park has been on the councils agenda for over 20 years. With many council projects raising the money is the most difficult part, for the skate park this wasn't the case. We have had money available the whole time, the issue has always been finding a site. Thankfully we are now at the end of the long process required to obtain and free up the space. Most of the young people who helped us with designs in the past are now adults, with some probably having children of their own. I believe that this year will be the one where the village finally gets this much anticipated facility.

Also in my previous January report I mentioned that we had elections coming up. They also didn't happen but, at this point, we expect them to go ahead in May. If you are interested in becoming a councillor please speak to the clerk, or any councillor, to find out more. Details of our meetings are posted on the website and are a great way to get to know more about how we work.

Want to get involved and become a councillor?

The National Association of Local Councils (NALC) is calling on all community heroes to step up and become a local (parish and town) councillor at the 2021 elections.

What do councillors do?

Local councillors are the champions of their community who invest time in local projects and issues to the benefit of residents and the neighbourhood. Councillors attend to local needs of residents, local groups and businesses, make decisions on local services, collaborate with district and borough councils to adhere to local needs, and progress vital projects to invest in the future of the community.

What do councils do?

Councils lead on community services such as allotments, footpaths, public seating and litter bins, but also larger projects such as the running of local transport, leisure services, youth services and climate change initiatives. These activities are funded by a local tax, called a precept which is determined by the council.

How long does it take?

NALC's Local Councillor Census Survey found that councillors put aside, on average, three hours a week for council work. Council work often includes attending meetings, engaging with residents and speaking to local groups and bodies on behalf of the council.

Can I stand for election?

You must be:

- A British citizen, or a citizen of the Commonwealth, or the European Union
- 18 years of age or older
- Live in an area that is served by a local council

How can I get involved?

- All members of the parish council are volunteers. They receive no renumeration
 for the hours they contribute but share a passion for our village and improving
 the amenities & facilities available to our residents. Due to our growing
 population, the number of seats on the council will increase from 10 to 11 at the
 2021 election.

ew pavilion community facility restrictions are lifted and we look ■ We are delighted that the construction work at the pavilion is now complete, with just the re-laying of the car park to follow in the spring. Football matches briefly re-started, before the covid restrictions were tightened further, allowing teams to take advantage of the new changing village facilities including home & away changing rooms, 2 officials rooms and medical room.

Once the lockdown eases and Covid regulations allow, the youth cafe will be re-located to this site for the time being (as Brookmead is currently unavailable to us), the parish office is located here and council meetings and drop-in surgeries will take place at this venue once we are able to meet in person



again. We have an exercise class for the elderly due to start as soon as

lockdown. Our community facilities (lovely light meeting room, kitchen and toilet facilities) are available for hire by community groups and individuals, within the permitted Coronavirus guidelines at the time (so sorry – we are not able to accept bookings for parties etc at present). We have parking for 42 vehicles and 8 bicycles in our illuminated car park. For your safety and security, both the building and grounds are protected with CCTV and alarms.

/outh Café When Covid restrictions permit, later in the year, we hope to be able to re-open some form of youth café but will be operating from the new pavilion site as Brookmead School is not available to us. Café will need to be responsive to changing covid guidelines, so may have to close or adapt at short notice. We will be operating in a Covid-Secure manner so will only be able to permit a maximum of 15 young people per session, so anyone wishing to attend will have to book in advance. We are very sorry, but if you have not booked, you will not be able to be admitted. Session times will also need to be reduced, so that we can operate one bubble of 15 young people from the Year 7 intake between 6.15pm and 7pm, then break for a full clean of our space, followed by a second bubble of 15 young people from Year 8 and above from 7.15pm to 8pm.

We appreciate that this solution is not ideal, but the youth café would normally have had between 30 and 40 attendees per week, and to keep everyone safe we must operate within the government

guidelines in place at the time.

Our Café Manager has made 4 new skate ramps for the young people to try, and our front car park is fully illuminated so they can be safely used throughout the winter (weather permitting).

Anyone who has already registered with the youth café should receive an email communication from the café manager in due course. If you have not registered previously, or you do not receive an email, please contact youth.cafe@me.com. The café manager will contact anyone who has booked for a session of any changes required to follow guidance in place at the time, for instance if café has to temporarily cease.

lease park considerately, especially near the School 'Keep clear' markings are put there for very good reasons. They signify to you, as a driver, that access is required and that you shouldn't park there. Sadly, some people think that the rules don't apply to them, or don't apply if they are only going to be gone from their vehicle for 10-15 minutes while they pop into the shop or collect their child from school. Orchard Way in particular, opposite Brookmead school, has a

number of elderly residents who frequently need ambulance services and their access is often blocked at school pick up and drop off times. This is not a car park or layby - it is the only vehicular access for this cul-de-sac. You wouldn't park right across the junction of Rushendon Furlong & shouldn't park across this junction either. Just think how frustrating it would be if your grandparents needed an ambulance and unknown people had completely blocked off the access to your road with parked cars. Those extra wasted minutes trying to get through could be fatal. Please be considerate, leave home a few minutes earlier and park a little further away.

We also receive complaints about vehicles blocking dropped curbs, parking on footpaths and cycle paths, causing obstructions in residential roads and blocking visibility at junctions. You can report nuisance parking issues to Buckinghamshire Councils Traffic Wardens. You can report illegal parking and abandoned vehicles, to Thames Valley Police. ew advisory Covid 'marshals' out and about across Bucks From 2nd December, new advisors have been on hand to offer guidance and support to local residents about the latest coronavirus Tier 4 rules and staying safe during the ongoing pandemic. Although the new team has no enforcement role, their advisory work supports the activities of Buckinghamshire Council's Environmental Health and Trading Standards Officers who are providing more detailed additional help to local businesses. The Trading Standards and Environmental Health teams are also working jointly with the Police to help with general covid safety awareness raising as well as in response to local concerns or enquiries.

reeze out doorstep cold callers this winter

Doorstep crime increases during the winter months due to bogus callers and rogue traders taking advantage of our need for a safe, warm and dry home during bad weather. When rain, sleet or

snow sets in it can be difficult, especially for vulnerable residents, to check their property is in good order so when they are told by an individual posing as a legitimate workman that they have a tile missing, or that their chimney is in danger of falling down and killing someone, they struggle to argue and feel compelled to have the work done. And with most of us at home due to the latest Covid lockdown, unscrupulous traders know there's a greater chance of finding someone in who will answer the door or be tempted by a flyer through the letterbox. Of course, winter is also the time of year where genuine issues become more apparent, such as a leaking roof or gutters, or if more urgent work is needed after extreme weather. Distressed residents may become more tempted to contact a stranger who posted a flyer through their door. Fraudsters will often do shoddy or unnecessary work for hugely inflated fees, or simply take money for a job they have no intention of carrying out. In many cases, the property is left in a

worse condition than before with the home owner facing additional costs to rectify the damage. Fred Wilson, Cabinet Member for Regulatory Services at Buckinghamshire Council, says "With a lockdown, fraudsters may think it's an

lockdown, fraudsters may think it's an ideal opportunity to catch vulnerable people stuck at home and pile on the pressure for a job. However I would encourage residents to get in contact with our team if they are concerned, want to report anything suspicious or just want to get one of our free information packs." Fred added, "By taking a few simple precautions, we can all freeze out cold-callers this winter." Trading Standards bosses offer the

following top tips to avoid getting tricked out of your money

- Be sceptical, don't be afraid to say 'no thank you, please leave' and shut the door.
- Take your time, don't be rushed.
- Know who you're dealing with, if you need help talk to someone you know or get in touch with the council.
- Protect your financial information, especially from people you don't know.
- Never engage with someone or allow them access to your home unless you are able to verify their authenticity and who they are.

Buckinghamshire Council takes next steps to purchase Friars Square, Aylesbury On 15th December 2020

Buckinghamshire Council's Cabinet agreed to enter into negotiations with the current owners of Friars Square Shopping Centre, Aylesbury, with a view to purchasing the centre. The Council has already sought independent property advice on this and every step made will subject to meticulous legal and financial considerations before any final purchase decision is made.

Steve Bowles, Cabinet Member for Town Centre Regeneration said: "Whilst the Centre would be bought as a going concern, we are considering the purchase of Friars Square shopping centre not as a retail investment but as an opportunity to acquire the land for the longer-term future use which will allow the council to bring forward a significant regeneration scheme for Aylesbury town centre. The Aylesbury Garden Town Masterplan sets out this ambitious vision for the town centre,

part of which is the station quarter." https://www.aylesburygardentown.co.uk/ masterplan

If the bid is successful, it would be financed by a Public Works Board Loan, paid back over a period of 40 years. Cabinet announces 'incredibly difficult' budget proposals Cabinet today has announced its budget proposals for the next financial year starting in April, which includes plans for a 1.99% increase in basic council tax, together with a 2% rise in the Government proposed Adult Social Care Precept to help fund care for the elderly and vulnerable.

Described as 'incredibly difficult', the billion pound plans focus primarily on

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next year. This is due to the uncertainties over future funding levels given the on-going effects of the coronavirus pandemic and comes the day after a third lockdown was announced by the Government.

Cabinet's proposals, which factor in the increasing demand for services and loss of income to the council as a result of the pandemic, are being seen as a 'Covid-19 response and recovery' budget. However, the proposals also include investment in key service areas such as schools and school improvement, road maintenance, strategic transport and infrastructure projects, waste, housing and homelessness and leisure centres. A small amount of the council's reserves is also planned to be used to help balance the books and reduce future identified risks.

Speaking after the Cabinet meeting, Leader of the Council, Martin Tett said the pandemic was having a momentous effect on budget planning. "While we are grateful for the significant Government grants we are getting to cope with the effects of the virus, it remains incredibly difficult to deliver a legally balanced budget. The new year lockdown just highlights the uncertainty and the difficulty of knowing what's round the next corner.

"That said, we believe these proposals are realistic, flexible, and most importantly, affordable to local taxpayers given the circumstances. Indeed, the Government proposes councils increase the amount they raise specifically for Adult Social Care by 3%, however, while there remains acute pressures in adult social care, we believe that this would not be reasonable given the pressure on residents' finances as a result of Covid. We are therefore proposing only to increase this by 2%, rather than the 3% allowed by Government.

"While I see this as a budget that manages current pressures, it's also a budget that paves the way for longer term economic recovery post-Covid, which invests in infrastructure and also puts us firmly in the starting blocks to help rebuild Buckinghamshire and importantly jobs, after the pandemic ends."

The proposals will now go on to be fully scrutinised by a special cross-party Budget Select Committee. Their findings will be presented to Cabinet on 16 February so Cabinet members can agree the final budget proposals to be presented to the full Council at its meeting on 24 February.

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Sad news from the Treacher family



Mrs Jean Marion Treacher passed away on Wednesday 13th January at Stoke Mandeville Hospital. lean was the eldest of three children born to Donald and Violet Howlett in Westoning, Bedfordshire, Her grandfather, William Henry Howlett, and uncle. Bert Howlett, ran the bakery in Pitstone. This building is now known as Masons Stores. After leaving school, Jean worked as an assistant at the General Stores in Ivinghoe,

One of her teenage friends, Ron Treacher, lived in Pendyce House, Station Road, Ivinghoe. Ron was fascinated by radios and electrical equipment and in 1946, at the age of 17, built the first TV in the area, from instructions in Practical Wireless magazine. Jean's parents loved this new invention, so Ron was regularly invited to bring his TV to the Mill House.

Jean and Ron were married on March 31st 1951 in St Mary's Church, Ivinghoe, and set up their first home together at 4, Bell Row Cottages, Pitstone.

After a visit to the ideal home exhibition in 1956, they bought construction plans for a popular new type of house called a chalet bungalow and in 1959 moved into their new chalet style home, 'Whistlebrook'.

Jean sang in the Ivinghoe Church choir and loved to accompany Ron to watch the cricket at Pitstone recreation ground. She also enjoyed watching tennis, and went, alone, every year, to Wimbledon.

When 'Whistlebrook' caught fire in April 2019, Jean escaped from the house in only her nightdress and slippers. Following the fire, she moved into Hulcott Nursing Home near Aylesbury, where she celebrated her 94th birthday on December 29th.

In early January this year she began to feel unwell and was sent for tests to Stoke Mandeville hospital (where, in the 1960s, she worked as an auxiliary nurse). However, after 3 days, the family was informed that she was not conscious and not responding to treatment. She passed away peacefully on the evening of Wednesday Jan 13th. Her death was not COVID related.

Jean will be buried with Ron, former Chair of Pitstone Parish Council, in Pitstone Churchyard.

In a year of unprecedented difficulties for charities the RBL Poppy Appeal in November was conducted locally in the strangest way possible. Many of you phoned Harry Batchelor or Wendy Mann to ask for poppies, pins or crosses and put your donation in an envelope. Masons stores had a collection box and Joe Marling joined in from home by selling to friends and relatives, while I covered Marsworth. The money was delivered to my home and collected by a RBL official who took it to a Covid secure counting station in Oxford. Between us we raised £1.793:31 which is fantastic. The committee added other donations as well as funds raised in 2019 by the branch, and in all we have made the total up to £3,000. This is an amazing result in such a difficult year and the committee thank you all for your donations.

Like many other organisations the branch committee has not been able to meet face to face but we have kept in touch via email. I also sent out a newsletter to members every month or so. Lockdown gave us all the

opportunity to re-evaluate our lives and I took the decision in June to resign as Chairman and Poppy Appeal Organiser at the November AGM. It transpired that because of illness or age, or in two cases actually moving from the village, the rest of the committee were also resigning. At the moment the branch is in 'limbo' and County havie taken over the recruitment of new members of TRBL to step forward to either form a committee or act as a liaison between the branch and County. 2020 was therefore my last year as Poppy Appeal organiser and as Chairman of the branch. I want to thank the committee: Harry Batchelor; Owen Wynne; John Shadrack; Maggie Halsey; Bob Saintey and Charlie Taylor for their support over the years, and to all of you who have supported us by attending events and giving so generously to the annual Poppy Appeals. The core purpose of the expedition is to

foster greater dialogue and understanding between women from the Western and Arabian cultures, in addition, the expedition will work to inspire women to reach beyond the expectations; to demonstrate the potential of greater intercultural understanding; and to raise awareness of women in the North Pole, who will find exceptional courage and teamwork to overcome the extreme conditions.

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
