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A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Athough the few days up to the time of writing have been quite cold and included some snow, there are clear signs of spring all around the village. While remaining mindful of the continuing need to be careful, I look forward to seeing more of you as the easing of lockdown allows us socialise again.

As we leave what I hope will be the last lockdown, I would like once again offer my thanks to the numerous volunteers who stepped in to support residents in so many ways.

My gratitude also goes to councillors, and particularly the clerk, for their efforts in the extended 6 year term of office. For me in particular, their advice and support during my time as chair has been invaluable.

Because there were fewer candidates than places, there will be no parish council election. We already know that the new council forming in May will comprise mostly returning councillors. We are, however, looking forward to welcoming one new face.

It is not yet clear whether future meetings will be in person, online, or a mixture of the two. As it stands, the legislation that allowed the council to legally hold online meetings will expire just after the election, and the Government has said it will not be renewed. There are other legal proceedings that are seeking to retain the ability to meet online, but if they fail, there will be a period where the need to meet in person will conflict with the COVID rules that are in place. We will keep residents informed.

Finally, I would like to wish all Pitstone Residents a safe and enjoyable spring.

Pitstone & Ivinghoe Junior Football Club are looking for someone to take on the role of Club Secretary.

Our current Club Secretary is stepping down as her son is going off to University later this year. She has carried out the role for the past 3 years and will make sure a thorough and supportive handover takes place.

What is the role of the Club Secretary?

To fulfil administrative tasks for the club.

Forward on email information received from the FA to managers. Forward on email information from leagues to relevant managers. Annual affiliation of the club to the County FA - this means working through steps online to submit information to the local FA (Berks & Bucks).

Liaise with managers to book Astro turf requirements over the winter months.

Co-ordinate set up of new U6 manager's email each year. Pay any fines received from the FA - from the leagues for various reasons (we rarely receive fines as a club) or for players' yellow/ red cards (also rare!). This is paid out of a kitty given to you. Attend league meetings specifically for Secretaries (now on zoom). Approx 3 or 4 a year. Distribute information to managers. Take minutes at P&I JFC meetings and distribute (approx every 8-12 weeks).

Organise the Club's AGM, take minutes and distribute.

How much time will I need to dedicate to the role?

On average about 1-2 hours a week. At peak times, it can be 2-3 hours but this is only ever a week here or there.

What else can you tell me?

It's great being part of a village football club! You feel you can make a difference and help provide local children with the football they love. From committee members, to managers, to parent helpers, to children playing - we are all such a good, supportive, fun team of people!

Skate park tendering commenced The skate park tendering information was issued to potential contractors at the end of March and is available on our website. We have received initial input from a group of regular local skaters, and further user & community engagement will take place towards the end of May / start of June once we have established a list of contractors that are suitably qualified to deliver a good quality facility. We hope to be able to arrange some form of open event where you can view initial designs but will need to be guided by COVID legislation in force at the time. Please do keep an eye on our website, Facebook page and Twitter feeds for updates so that you can get involved.

The multi-use games area being installed by Nicholas King Homes is not due to pass to the parish council until the end of July as following completion it will still need to undergo an independent post-installation inspection plus assessment by Buckinghamshire Council prior to the snagging issues being completed and then finally being awarded a Certificate of Completion and passing to the parish.

Staff Changes

We are pleased to welcome Luke Martin as an Asset Inspector, taking over

from Dave Barratt. When you see Luke out and about checking that our playground equipment, fences, trees and benches are safe and well maintained, please do make him feel welcome.

Youth Café We hope to re-open some form of youth café in May once the COVID restrictions permit. It is likely that it will be operating from the new pavilion site as Brookmead School is not available to us. The café will need to be responsive to changing covid guidelines, so may have to close or adapt at short notice. We will be operating in a COVID-Secure manner so will only be able to permit a maximum of 15 young people per session. Anyone wishing to attend will have to book in advance. We are very sorry, but if you have not booked, you will not be able to be admitted. Session times will also need to be reduced, so that we can operate one bubble of 15 young people from the Year 7 intake between 6.15pm and 7pm, then break for a full clean of our space, followed by a second bubble of 15 young people from Year 8 and above from 7.15pm to

8pm. We appreciate that this solution is not ideal, but the youth café would normally have had between 30 and 40 attendees per week, and to keep everyone safe we must operate within the government guidelines in place at the time.

Our Café Manager has made 4 new skate ramps for the young people to try, and our front car park is fully illuminated so they can be safely used throughout the winter (weather permitting).

Anyone who has already registered with the youth café should receive an email communication from the café manager in due course. If you have not registered previously, or you do not receive an email, please contact <u>youth.cafe@me.com</u>. The café manager will advise anyone who has booked for a session of any changes required to follow guidance in place at the time, for instance if café has to temporarily cease.

We look forward to seeing all the familiar faces back at café again, after such a long-enforced break. We also look forward to welcoming the new cohort.

£1,486 grant provided to Windmill Pre-School

In February, the parish council was delighted to award a grant of £1,486 to Windmill Pre-School, which has been able to take out a lease on the adjoining **building (previously the Children's** Centre) and thus expand the pre-school capacity and offering available for local families.

The funds will be utilised, alongside monies raised by the pre school fundraising initiatives, to purchase outdoor equipment to provide an outdoor classroom and sensory area, which will benefit all young attendees and is especially important for those with special needs.

The council was delighted to be able to support the pre-school with this initiative **and to hear that the old Children's** Centre will be re-utilised to expand the local early years provision.

Westfield Road speed mitigation

You will be aware that as part of the adoptions process between Buckinghamshire Council BC) and Taylor Wimpey (TW) that the location of the 30/60mph was moved from the village gate to close to the junction of Warwick Road. It materialised that the signs had been incorrectly placed in the first instance and had never been in a legally compliant location. Buckinghamshire Council arranged a site inspection by their road safety team and Thames Valley Police and has since agreed to install two additional lamp posts, relocate the 30/60mph point half-way back to the gate, install 30mph roundel in the road and install painted dragons' teeth between the gate & start of the 30mph zone. BC has further agreed to install traffic monitoring once the new solution is in place, which will determine if the measures are successful in ensuring traffic slows to the prescribed speed and offered a dedicated community board sub-group to investigate further mitigation measures if necessary. BC will also investigate if TW can repaint the village gates as part of the adoptions

process. Buckinghamshire Council are not consulting on their planned response and the parish council has no legal powers to force the highways authority to take alternative action.

It is hoped that the increased presence of visual reminders will prove more effective than the previous single 30mph sign on the gate. It is recognised that some residents remain concerned about the BC proposals and the parish council will continue to liaise with BC on these matters. We will also continue to work with BC to ensure that their measures are installed as soon as they are able and to review the monitoring data once available so that we can push for further measures if those implemented are proved not to be effective. Elections in May

Both Buckinghamshire Council and the parish council have elections on 6 May 21, postponed from last year due to the pandemic and postponed from the previous year due to the unitary changes at BC. By the time you read this publication the date for residents who are willing to stand for election to submit their nomination papers to BC will have passed. We hope that many of you will have taken this opportunity to volunteer your time and get involved with this tier of local government (parish councillors are all volunteers, who provide an average of 3 hours per week of time).

The number of council seats in Pitstone has increased from 10 to 11, in line with the growing population figures.

There have been 10 individuals willing to stand for election, and because this is fewer than the maximum, Buckinghamshire Council will issue a Notice of Uncontested Election and these individuals will automatically be offered seats. If more than 11 residents had put themselves forward, there would be a full election on 6 May with the successful candidates being offered seats. The parish council will need to fill the one vacant position via co-option. We will keep you all updated throughout the election process.

Our thanks go to outgoing members for their many hours of voluntary service on behalf of our residents and we extend a warm welcome to all new members.

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

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COUNTY NEWS Anne Wight, County Councillor, Ivinghoe Division

One of the primary aims of

Buckinghamshire's 16 community boards is to listen to local people and take action on the matters that concern them most.

That is exactly what the Wing & Ivinghoe Board has been doing as they reviewed the projects and initiatives they have helped support in the past six months.

At the board meeting members reviewed the projects they have agreed funding towards and approved two more. Applications for funding are welcome from any group or organisation within the local area of a community board but are most likely to be successful if they link to one of the areas the board has a particular focus on. Working groups reflect the topics that local people have raised as areas they would like a greater focus to be given.

The Wing & Ivinghoe board currently has four areas that it is particularly focused on this year and working groups have been set up to address each one:

- Environment
- Covid-19 recovery
- •Health & wellbeing
- •Transport

At the meeting board members and residents could see where the funding agreed so far has been used including new traffic calming measures, improvements to children's play areas and crisis funding to

local groups providing support to local

people during the pandemic. The board also acknowledged that parishes and residents from different areas of the locality are working together in a much more collaborative way.

Members also agreed funding for Whitchurch Wildlife Community Group to purchase basic gardening and outdoor equipment to carry out work in the village to improve the surrounding environment of both residents and wildlife. The group hopes the project will have multiple benefits from improving and maintaining natural habitats to supporting the health and wellbeing of residents, enabling people to come together in a productive and sociable way.

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ASHRIDGE RAMBLINGS

The Forty Nine Steps No, not a sequel to the famous John Buchan novel, but a mammoth effort by the Ashridge team to prevent further



erosion of the footpath leading from the sharp bend in Beacon Road towards Duncombe Terrace and thence the Visitor Centre. The very wet winter led to the path getting wider and wider as walkers tried to avoid a mud bath and gain traction.

The Trust has a statutory duty to look after the wildlife and archaeology throughout Ashridge, and an obligation under its charter to cater for the needs of visitors. Reconciling these sometimesconflicting requirements can be a tricky management issue, as exemplified by the above example. In this light, it seems worth reviewing the meaning and purpose of some of the signage on the estate. Public footpath



These can only be used by pedestrians. They are often unsuitable for cyclists and horses because of their narrowness or

steepness, which would cause danger to pedestrians, or they support wildlife that is particularly sensitive to the extra compaction caused by tyres. On public footpaths, pedestrians should be able to expect to enjoy a walk without encountering cyclists or horses. Definitive public bridleway



There are over 30 miles of these throughout the estate, and they can be used by pedestrians, horse riders and cyclists. By law, cyclists must give way to pedestrians and

horses on public bridleways. Chilterns Cycleway



Duncombe Terrace is part of the Chilterns Cycleway, even though it is not a public bridleway. Cyclists may also Pitstone Parish Post

Cycleway, but they provide a useful reminder in tempting spots! Field margins



These provide refuges for wild flowers, which attract insects that help to control crop pests. If they are not

marked as rights of way, they should not be used.

If you don't know Ashridge well (or even if you do!) there are four colour-coded circular trails of different lengths which you can follow, starting from the Visitor Centre. Hello Pitstone Community! We hope you are slowly coming out of hibernation and having a warm stretch in your gardens! What has occurred over this lost year? The Trustees have had five in person Hub Trustee Meetings that I have chaired over the last year, plus further meetings on Zoom.

We all five Trustees have spoken together in keeping everything to Government Guidelines. To make sure that we were well prepared for anything that Covid-19 might throw at us, we attended several Community Impact Bucks Village Hall Volunteer Manager Meetings via Zoom, sharing experiences and gaining advice from CIB and their parent body ACRE over this concerning time.

Last summer, I spent a couple of weekends and a few weekdays patch-painting the Hub walls and gloss painting the hall, all three lavatories, the IT Room, the lobby/corridors and the cloakroom. The Government have been very generous in providing claimable grants to see everyone through and we claimed the appropriate grants needed for all at the Hub to stay afloat!

We repurposed our wellbeing Project away from the Government instructed closure of the Hub and built up 26 generous village volunteers to assist the Ivinghoe Community from home, delivering groceries, medicine, and people to appointments, organised **through our "WhatsApp**-ning in Ivinghoe?" **chat, Ivinghoe village's own** Covid-19 Mutual Support Group. Again, thank you volunteers - you made us all feel much supported and safer!

While the building has been closed, we have organised many repairs and arranged for a new kitchen floor in the café. We continued to walk to the Hub to empty the two bins on the fence, but more recently negotiated Karen, our Hub Cleaner, to incorporate this task and undertake it regularly – and many thanks to her for continuing to provide a good service for us as our Covid secure guardian Angel!!

We are so sorry to have cancelled, again, our traditional booking from the Easter Bunny for a lovely Egg Hunting Day, like Valentines and Pancake racing, covid restrictions would not allow it - we could not guarantee keeping all those chocolatey fingers safe... although we wished Windmill Pre-School well in doing some safer alternative. We have already planned our 'All-day free BBQ come-back relaunch **Open Day'** and it should be a very happy open-day event as soon as the summer promises us a good weekend day! Until then we are taking note of the gentle relaxation of lockdown restrictions, and are starting to hire out our hall, slowly and with time in between, to make sure everything is cleaned and safe. 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PITSTONE CEMENT WORKS - A TIME TO REMEMBER

1927-1939

The plan for a Cement Works at Pitstone originated in 1927 when the site was designated as suitable. However interested parties, at the time, could not raise the capital required. Pitstone was a natural site for the production of cement as glacial action had exposed the low chalk. Cement was already being produced within the Chiltern chalk belt at Sundon, Houghton Regis and Chinnor

and the area was well served by rail and road routes and water and electricity was readily available.

Tunnel Cement's parent company, the Danish F. L. Smidth's first acquisition in this country was at West Thurrock, Essex shortly before the First World War. West Thurrock grew to be the largest cement works in the country having started life in 1873 on the site of Tunnel Farm from which the name of Tunnel Cement was derived.

On 25th February 1936 Wing Rural District Council approved plan number 313260 which allowed for the erection of a cement works on land which up until 1923 had been part of the Bridgewater **Estate. This was F.L. Smidth's first** greenfield site and the last Cement Works to be built in the Chilterns.

Tunnel Cement (Pitstone) Ltd commenced production of cement clinker on the 20th September 1937. The first Works Manager was Mr. Ulrich who was among many employees who transferred from West Thurrock in early 1937. Mr. Ulrich set up residence in the former Pitstone Vicarage known as Erlegh Manor. He was later joined by Gunnor Larson a senior engineer with the company.

The first load of cement was packed by Wally Chatten and delivered to Marley Tiles, Leighton Buzzard, on 2nd November 1937.

Senior staff were housed in homes built by the company. The first of which were six homes constructed by H.C. Janes of Luton in Vicarage Road. 1939 -1945

The reign of King George VI had seen the Tunnel works establish itself not only in the area but in the industry.

During World War 2 the company's Head Office in London was evacuated to Pitstone with the arrival of, among others, 47 female office staff billeted at Moat Farm. Wooden office building were erected for the newcomers, on the site of the Works and a canteen was opened in the Main Office.

1945 - 1965

In Pitstone, after the war, the Company's landholding increased to about 1,000 acres with the acquisition of College and Folly Farms which had formed part of the Pendley Manor Estate. This enabled development to occur in support of national post-war reconstruction.

Kiln 1, built of riveted steel plate had a production capacity of 100,000 tonnes per annum or 400 -700 tonnes per day. The construction of Kiln 2 started in 1951 and it was lit in March 1952. No.2 Cement Mill was commissioned in June 1952 adding a further 130, 000 tonnes of output.

The opening of the Top Site (Quarry 2) was a landmark occasion towards the end of the Coronation Year in 1953. A large drilling programme was carried out on the land that became Quarry 2 which was then unfenced and included an old Rag Pit. Site surveys showed where the chalk suitable for the manufacture of white cement was situated. The Wash Mill Kiln 3 was lit up in November 1954 bringing total Works capacity to 360,000 tonnes per annum.

This period of expansion saw the building of, first, six employee homes in Church Road with a further two added in 1957 occupied by Bill Smith and John Hills who had just returned from Cyprus Cement to join the electrical department. In 1958 two houses were built on Meadow Lane one being occupied by the new Works Manager Mr. Poul Rusager and Erlegh Manor was rebuilt for senior management.

Small quantities of a sulphate resisting cement were marketed from October

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1953 and a large special-purpose plant came on-line in March 1955.

No. 3 Cement Mill was commissioned in April 1956. A separate plant was built comprising clinker silos, cement mill, cement silos, packing and loading facilities and in June 1957 the production of white cement started and continued until the middle of 1972.

Kiln 4 with a capacity of over 200,000 tonnes was a consequence of George **Brown's National Plan of** 1956 prompting the industry as a whole to undertake further expansion. With a chimney of 250 feet it was commissioned in November 1963 and with No. 4 Cement Mill the six new 3,000 tonne silos built by Tileman in 1962 greatly added to the storage capacity on site.

Heavy fuel oil essential for firing the kiln during white cement production showed a huge quality advantage in the production of sulphate resisting cement. The 1957 Suez Crisis saw coal providing the main fuel to combat soaring oil prices, but as these fell with an improving Middle East situation the plant was completely converted to oil firing by 1966. Oil gave Pitstone a cost and quality advantage and buoyed management to invest in Kiln 5. 1968 -1978

Kilns 1, to 4 all used what was known as the semi-wet process of production. At a cost of £7 million Kiln 5 was designed to use an alternative dry process. The process was, in large part, pioneered by F. L. Smidth piloted at a site in Denmark the process was approved and introduced into this country by the company.

Construction of Kiln 5 started in March 1968, the whole plant, apart from the new laboratory, was built quite apart from the rest of the Works. The new chimney was of a tapered design; measuring 350 feet and soon became a landmark to traffic approaching the district from every direction. Kiln 5 was to be serviced by new bucket excavators in Quarries 2 and 3 feeding belt conveyors which led into the works. Kiln 5 came to life at the beginning of 1970 with a capacity of 300,000 tonnes **per annum. As part of it's introduction** quarrying at night came to an end.

Works Manager Poul Rusager retired in October 1969 and was succeeded by Ron Burnett.

Commissioning problems with Kiln 5 proved a steep learning curve as Tunnel management wrestled with the challenges of harnessing a new process.

The Pitstone Works having moved to full oil firing in 1966 moved five years later to North Sea Gas which was then cheap and plentiful.

In March 1972 Works Manager Ron Burnett left and was replaced by Mike Ray who had led Padeswood.

After World War 2 F. L. Smidth's stock holding in Tunnel was reduced to about 30% and in 1973 they were bought out by Thomas W. Ward Ltd who already produced cement at Ketton near Stamford and together with Tunnel operated a site at Clitheroe in Lancashire.

1973 marked the zenith of cement production Sales declined thereafter putting pressure on the less efficient parts of the industry. In Pitstone

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November 1974 saw sixty-five employees made redundant.

Moat Farm House was converted from domestic to office premises, in

poor fuel efficiency made conversion to coal uneconomic. Kiln 4 and 5 would survive the cull and convert to coal. Kiln **4 had in it's favour the sole production;**



of Sulphate Resisting Cement which sold at a premium. 1979 - 1987 1979 heralded a period of contraction when the Pitstone Works was to move from 5 to 2 working kilns. 150 employees were made redundant and subsequent modifications to the plant completed by 1980.

1975 to house the General Manager's

Office together with Sales and Development personnel.

George Goddard transferred from West Thurrock in January 1975 and became the new Works Manager the following April.

In 1976 Tunnel's site at West Thurrock closed with the transfer of key staff to Pitstone.

As fuel prices rose in the ensuing years the Government's decision to link gas prices to that of oil threatened the viability of Pitstone's Tunnel Cement and put a dark cloud over it's future. In November 1978 the decision was taken to resuscitate Pitstone's viability by reverting to coal firing. Kilns 1, 2, and 3 would shutdown from May 1979 as their

In 1981 Quarry 2 saw the tired and worn out bucket wheel excavator replaced by a crusher/feeder working in tandem with a hydraulic excavator more able to handle the hard chalk and supply crushed material into the Works with reduced maintenance costs.

The same year saw the computerisation of office practices together with the introduction of Visual Display Units (VDUs) to place the Cement Works in the vanguard of this new technology.

Tunnel Cement and Thomas W. Ward Ltd. were acquired by the Rio Tinto Zinc Corporation plc in 1982 when RTZ Cement Ltd was formed. Surplus clinker from the Group became available to grind at Pitstone where the cement mills and silos infrastructure existed to support 5 kilns. Sales slowly grew and the Works was kept at full stretch with the additional clinker coming from Ribblesdale.

The various trading names continued until November 1986 when all the plants started trading under their final incarnation of Castle Cement.

In 1984 the cement industry became quality assured, leading to stiff regulations in the production of cement to guarantee standards in the industry by the issue of BSI numbers.

The Industry's Common Price Arrangement was voluntarily concluded after fifty-three years by the Cement Maker's Federation in February 1987. It is a strange coincidence that the Industries Common Price Arrangement lasted for 53 years a life span close to that of the Castle Cement Works which survived 54 years.

1987 heralded a modest increase in the demand for cement which with the earlier collapse of world oil prices and subsequent reduction of the price of gas resulted in Kiln 3 being recommissioned in June 1987.

This however was to prove misplaced optimism in a revival of the Tunnel's fortunes in an industry that flourished, when unregulated, in a post-war Britain that saw growth as a way out of economic woes and floundered when, growth slowed and they were forced to complete through price when the cement they were all trading was essentially the same, with the exception of the Sulphate Resistant Cement which was peculiar to Pitstone.

1987-1991

In September1987 Kiln 5 had produced a total of 5 million tonnes of clinker since **it's commission with a grand total for all** five kilns amounting to approximately 20,500,000 tonnes.

In the first fifty years of it's operation the Tunnel transformed itself into a Castle, saw Pitstone grow five times its's original size and twenty cement manufacturing plants close in the United Kingdom. In 1991 Pitstone joined the list of closures. It's empty shell became the; backdrop for video and film productions by among others the Light House Family, Richard Harris and Doctor Who. In 1994 Castle Cement proposed Quarry 2 (124 acres) which spread into Hertfordshire be used as landfill, for twenty years and then be restored. This was overturned by John Gummer, Minister for the Environment, on the grounds that it would adversely affect an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty. Instead it was transformed into College Lake the vision of Graham Atkins a former lorry driver at the Cement Works who gathered a group of volunteers around him to make his dream come true.

In July 1998 an agreement in principle was signed for the redevelopment of the Cement Work site for 275 houses and light industrial premises.

The Works stood till Boxing Day 1998 when the chimney topping event raised more than £10,000 for two local charities lain Rennie Hospice at Home and Macmillan Cancer Relief . Lynn Wilson of Wilcon Homes had the honour of firing the first of four

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chimneys brought down on a dismal Saturday morning when the weather matched the mood of some of the hundreds of onlookers who had gathered to watch. Geoffrey Palmer the well known TV actor was on hand when the first of three raffle winners Wendy Fitzgerald a local resident representing the lain Rennie charity was given the responsibility of pressing the plunger to blow up a second chimney assisted by her four year old grandson George. Alison Burton from St. Albans

supporting Macmillan's went next. The fourth and last chimney brought down that morning was reserved for Jim Dymond chosen from among former employees. Jim Dymond, travelled from Nottingham, he had worked; at Pitstone between 1975 and 1991 transferring to **Castle's North Wales site before** retiring. The explosions and subsequent crashing to the ground of the chimneys caused enough disturbance to rattle nearby houses.

Kiln 5's forlorn monumental chimney stood alone for a further month 350 feet of diminished grandeur, before it too was swallowed up in a cloud of dust, consigned forever to the memory of all who recognised it as a landmark to either work or their way home.
