### A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Dave Nicholls, Chairman Pitstone Parish Council

In the last couple of months the Parish Council has discussed two things at the opposite end of the technology spectrum.

Firstly, we have been running a campaign to try to get faster fibre broadband to the village. Currently, most areas have access to fibre, but only as far as the cabinet that the line comes from. We are trying to get the much faster, fibre to the property option made available. We have been collecting details of people who would like this to happen (See here: https://pitstone.co.uk/pitstonefull-fibre/) and will be passing on all the information to Openreach so they can look into whether installation is feasible. Internet speeds differ quite a lot across the village, with some areas being quite slow, so an improvement will be welcome.

Secondly, we've been discussing the printed version of the PPP. Editing and distribution is all handled by volunteers, and the printing is supported by advertising, but this doesn't cover the full cost. We continuously review council costs and the PPP is a good example of where a decision has to take into account conflicting requirements. We

have a duty to spend public money wisely, but we also have a duty to be as inclusive as possible. We know that most people can pick up information via Facebook, Twitter, or our website, but we also know that the noticeboards are important to some people and that the PPP covers things that the noticeboards don't.

In short, we know that the PPP is important to some people, but we don't know how many. We have looked at printing fewer copies and only delivering to those who request it, but this would be hard to manage and the list would, almost certainly, get out of date quickly as people move in and out of the village.

We decided recently, as we have before, that the need to be inclusive still outweighs the cost. If you do find the PPP valuable please do get in touch with the clerk and let us know. Please also let us know if you think that there are changes, or extra information, that would make it more useful.

The I2-month remedials have now been completed and the final retention payments released to Neville Special Projects. Evenings are getting very busy, but we still have some daytime availability. Please direct any enquiries to 01296 767261 or 07939 809281.

### **Skate Park on the Recreation Ground**

The skate park construction has been completed and the park opened nearly 3 -weeks ahead of schedule. The facility is being well utilised and is very much appreciated by all the local skaters and we are delighted to have been able to finally purchase this land and provide these facilities. Once the grass has had time to grow, it will blend into the vista from across the recreation ground. The skate park has been funded by a release of Section 106 sports and leisure funding, a community chest grant, a community leader grant, the parish council, some sponsorship from local companies and some fundraising by the users. We are currently working on a skate park event - look out for details via social media and banners at the site.

We are, sadly, experiencing a huge volume of litter dropped around the skate park, and some anti-social behaviour, including music being played into the evening. If you are using these facilities, please be considerate and respectful of both our neighbours and the new facilities. Please put all litter into the bins provided. More bins, including mixed refuse and recycling, will be installed shortly to try and encourage more responsible habits. Please also keep music to an acceptable level so that it can be enjoyed without causing distress to other users of our grounds or the surrounding properties, and switch music off after 8pm.

### Multi Use Games Area and replacement car park

Discussions are ongoing with Nicholas King Homes and Buckinghamshire Council regarding these facilities. We will provide any further updates whenever we receive them.

### **Double Lane Cricket Practice Nets** for the Recreation Ground

At the time of writing, the planning application has not been determined by Buckinghamshire Council. We have the funding available to progress with this project once planning has been granted. We will keep residents updated.

### Fibre to Property Broadband

All properties that do not currently have access to fibre to property will have received a hand delivered leaflet from the parish council about this project. Information is also available on our website and social media channels, and there are banners advertising the project at the recreation ground and pavilion. We will be collecting expressions of

interest until 30 April 2022. If enough local residents are interested in registering for the scheme, Openreach will investigate and confirm whether they are able to proceed. If you are interested in a faster internet service for your home/business, please do read through the information and consider registering your details.

### **Keep Pitstone Tidy**

We will shortly be launching a new competition to help 'Keep Pitstone Tidy' focusing on trying to reduce the explosion in litter and dog fouling seen over the last 18 months. Please keep a look out on our website and social media channels for more information.

### Help for the Birds and Hedgehogs



A selection of 12 bird boxes, to provide homes for swifts, house sparrows and tits, have now been erected at our recreation ground, pavilion and local green space sites. Swifts and house sparrows are both on the 'red' list of 'greatest conservation concern'. We also present the Volunteer of the Year award, and it is an opportunity for you to view the new pavilion facilities if you have not already had an opportunity to look around. You will have received an agenda alongside this publication, and we look forward to seeing many of you there.

### Queen's Green Canopy and Platinum Jubilee

The Queen is encouraging everyone to

participate in the Green Canopy project to commemorate her platinum jubilee, and to plant a tree. The parish council is planting and dedicating a maple at our pavilion site. Residents can find out more about how to join in by visiting this website: https://queensgreencanopy.org/ We will also be dedicating our function room at the new pavilion to commemorate the jubilee, which will become known as The Platinum Room and a plaque erected at the site. The Ivinghoe & Pitstone Women's Institute will be decorating the village street furniture etc in time for the Queen's extended bank holiday weekend.

### Information Panels for the Local Wildlife Site

We are pleased to announce that we have been awarded a grant of £2,500 towards the cost of the supply and installation of 4 information panels to promote the flora & fauna of the Local Wildlife Site off Westfield Road. We have also secured the permission of Taylor Wimpey to locate them at the site. There is still a way to go, to both artwork and get approval for the exact wording, but we will keep you updated.

# And an update on local matters within the control of Buckinghamshire Council:

Westfield Road / Castlemead
Taylor Wimpey completed the majority
of the remedial works within phases I-IV
of Castlemead and those along Westfield
Road (including those by the area that
changed speed). As of 18/3/22 there are
still a few works remaining, which need
to be completed before Buckinghamshire
Council can adopt. This phase of work
by Taylor Wimpey excluded Phase V of

the Castlemead residential area and the business park, both of which will follow at a later date. We will continue to work with both BC and TW over the coming months.

Highways/paths updates
Glebe Close, Queen Street and Albion
Road have now all been resurfaced.
Marsworth Road does not yet qualify for
resurfacing. The illuminated signs on the
Wesfield Road roundabout have now
been replaced. The cutting back of the
vegetation and siding out along the
footpath between Pitstone and
Marsworth remains outstanding from
BC. Any resident can report a defect
with the highway (eg pothole) or
footpath to Buckinghamshire Council via
their website https://

www.buckscc.gov.uk/services/transportand-roads/report-a-highways-problem/ or via the Fix My Street website.

Buckinghamshire Council are undertaking a final phase of design work relating to safety scheme improvements by Brookmead School. We will publish these on the website as soon as they are available.

The Buckinghamshire Council Freight Strategy has been re-consulted & concluded, and the consultation about parking restrictions near the quarry also concluded. We are now awaiting the outcome and actions following both. *Planning* 

There are several local planning applications for which we are still waiting for Buckinghamshire Council to provide a determination including submissions relating to the commercial areas within the Nicholas King Homes development (their application sought to convert

these sites to residential use), the additional properties by The Haldi and the business park development off Westfield Road.

### IVINGHOE AND PITSTONE SAFETY SCHEME

In the recent past both lyinghoe and
Pitstone Parish Councils separately
engaged Ben Hamilton Baillee Associates
to draw up a concept safety scheme for
the individual villages to enable
pedestrians and road traffic to coalesce
safely within the villages.

Both parish councils have been busy behind the scenes progressing this concept with Buckinghamshire Council and Transport for Bucks as the highways authority. As a result the two separate schemes are now known as the lyinghoe and Pitstone Safety Scheme.

After many different surveys, concept designs, etc we are now at a point where phase I and phase 2 can be implemented. Both phases were chosen for early implementation as they have a direct effect on the younger members of our villages.

Phase I – Station Road, Ivinghoe Phase 2 – Brookmead School

Many of you will have seen the resurfacing work taking place along Station Road by the junctions with Maud Janes Close and Ladysmith Road and outside Brookmead School. This work was in preparation for the two phases of the Safety Scheme.


### Phase I - Station Road, Ivinghoe

The design concepts here are to provide a 'safety zone' to enable a safer crossing point for children attending Brookmead School and also to provide additional parking for residents and the dropping off and picking up of children.

The scheme incorporates:

- A new crossing point in a slightly different location to the existing one.
- 2 new informal roundabouts
- New signage both on the road and on the road side
- Early warning markers when approaching from Great Gap/Ford End
- A 'grasscrete' parking bay for 5 vehicles (time limited parking during day time hours)
- A footpath from the parking bays to connect with the existing footpath to Brookmead School
- Anti-skid road surfacing
- New tree planting to increase biodiversity

It is envisaged that motorists will have plenty of early warning on the

## Over 2,000 nominations received for Buckinghamshire's Local Heritage List

More than 2,000 sites and assets have been nominated by local people for inclusion on Buckinghamshire's Local Heritage List.

Using funding from the Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG), Buckinghamshire Council is working to improve the quality and extent of its Local Heritage List.

The Local Heritage List seeks to identify locally significant assets and celebrate their contribution to local identity and character. These assets can include historic buildings, archaeological sites, landscape features, historic parks and gardens and more. To date, over 2,000 assets have been nominated for Buckinghamshire's Local Heritage List, including clock towers, road signs, post boxes, bridges and lamp posts, as well as the usual historic buildings, heritage assets and archaeological sites.

The Local Heritage List Project Team is now seeking volunteers to help identify and assess assets important and

local to them. If you have an interest in heritage, particularly that of Buckinghamshire, and some spare time on your hands, this could be something for you!

# More Bucks children offered first choice secondary schools places this year

Nearly four out of every five pupils in Buckinghamshire have been offered their first choice of secondary school in this year's allocations.

Figures for Buckinghamshire show that 78% of the 6917 children who applied for a school place were given their first-choice preference. This compares to 74% in 2020. A total of 99% of children in Buckinghamshire who applied in this year's process received an offer of a school place on Tuesday I March.

The school system we operated in Buckinghamshire can sometimes cause







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complications but I'm so pleased that we have been able to support the majority of our families in finding the right school for their child, to help them continue their education in the school of their choice.

Just over 10% of applicants received their second-choice placement and 4% were offered their third choice.

Only a handful of children, (0.0187%) have not yet been allocated a place. The reasons for this include late applications and preferences for schools far outside catchment or not meeting individual schools' entry requirements.

Offers must be accepted by 11.59pm on Monday 14 March. Families who wish to appeal their allocation can do so by following the guidance given on the Council website.

### New licensing policy adopted for Buckinghamshire

Buckinghamshire Council has adopted a new policy that sets out how it will consider applications and issues relating to licensing. Under the Licensing Act 2003, the new Licensing Policy for Buckinghamshire replaces those that were previously being used by the former district councils.

The policy sets out how the Council will consider applications for licences for alcohol sales, entertainment provided at large scale or late-night events and late night food take-aways. It also explains the Council's approach to dealing with problems at existing licensed premises. The law requires

that the Council produces and publishes this policy at least every five years.

Before the policy was approved, the Council consulted with a wide range of people and organisations who might be affected by it, including the police, licence holders, members of the public and residents' associations. All the

The policy includes elements that reflect how licensing can support the Council's core aims of strengthening our communities, improving our environment, protecting the vulnerable and increasing prosperity. Applications for permanent licences, and any significant changes to current licences must be advertised at the premises and on the Council's website. Anyone who might be affected by the proposed activities, or changes, can object if they think that any of the licensing objectives are likely to be undermined. These objectives are: the prevention of public nuisance, public safety, the prevention of crime and disorder and the protection of children from harm. Existing licences can also be reviewed and action taken where activities are causing a problem.

### Are you caring for someone else's child?

Buckinghamshire Council is urging residents to get in touch if they are aware of children living apart from close family, as this informal arrangement could be what is known as Private Fostering and if so, by law, the council needs to be informed.

Children under 16 (or under 18 if they are disabled) who are living away from their parents or close relatives (such as aunts and uncles, grandparents, siblings or step-parents) for more than 28 days are classed as being in a Private Fostering arrangement. By law, the council must be told of this.

Private Fostering arrangements are

completely legal and can often be the best solution for the child. There can be lots of reasons why a child doesn't live at home and their parent has arranged for someone else to care for them. It might be due to illness or instability at home, being sent from overseas for education or healthcare, teenagers living with the family of their boyfriend or girlfriend, or something else.

As a council, we simply need to know about the arrangement so we can support everyone involved and ensure the child is safe and well looked after. So, if you think you might be involved in a Private Fostering arrangement, or if you are a professional and know someone who is in such an arrangement, please let us know, it's the law.

Last year, Buckinghamshire Council supported a number of children in a Private Fostering arrangement, but it is believed there are other cases it has not been made aware of.

### Buckinghamshire Council to convert first refuse vehicle to electric thanks to government grant

Buckinghamshire Council has been awarded more than half a million pounds to upcycle its first refuse collection vehicle to electric. It marks the start of the Council's programme to convert its fleet to electric, resulting in zero exhaust

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emissions.

The £578,000 funding, which was announced this week, is from the Government's Air Quality Grant, which helps councils to develop and implement measures to reduce the impact of dirty air on people's health.

The grant will cover the cost of upcycling the first vehicle as well as providing a blueprint for the future conversion programme. The funds will also be used to pay for performance trials, spare parts and specialist equipment for maintaining the vehicle. It all paves the way for more vehicle conversions to follow in the future.

The upcycled 10-year-old Dennis Eagle 26 tonne refuse collection vehicle will travel 412 miles a week in the north of Aylesbury, including through three air quality management areas. These are areas which have exceeded the air quality objective for nitrogen dioxide so the use of an electric refuse vehicle in these areas will also promote and contribute towards improving air quality. As a result of using the electric refuse vehicle, over 10 tonnes of greenhouse gas, 69 kg of oxides of nitrogen (NOx), and half a kilo of particulate matter emissions will be saved per year.

Air pollution is the single biggest environmental risk to public health. As part of the same government funding scheme Buckinghamshire Council has also been awarded a grant to purchase and trial low-cost monitoring sensors which will be part of clean air campaigns throughout the year.

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### MIDNIGHT WALK RETURNS FOR ONE LAST NIGHT

Florence Nightingale Hospice Charity's annual Midnight Walk returns to Aylesbury for the final time after a two year hiatus on Saturday 16th July.

Since it began in 2010, the Midnight Walk has seen hundreds of men and women come together and take to the streets of Aylesbury, walking over 50,000 miles and raising over £650,000 for the charity over the years. But this will be the last opportunity to take part in the event.



approach to the safety zone, with the informal roundabouts slowing the traffic further on the approach to the crossing point.

We have already consulted with local residents on the initial drawings for this scheme and residents' views have been taken into account with this latest design.

It is currently planned for the work to be completed during the school summer holidays in late July/August.

### Phase 2 - Brookmead School

The intention is to make it clearer to motorists that they are within a school zone. The scheme incorporates:

- Red anti-skid tarmac surface across the whole school zone
- Buff coloured anti-skid tarmac for the bus stop area
- Road markings to give the appearance that the road is narrower
- 'Pencil' bollards in various colours to highlight both the school and children's presence

- Treatment of the verge opposite to increase sight lines for motorists
- Additional road markings on the approach to the area
- Definitive road markings to delineate the end of the roadway along the side of the brook.

It was envisaged that the speed limit would be reduced to 20mph along this stretch of the road, but we have not been given permission yet to enable this to happen. We will be pursuing this at a later date if funding is available.

This phase of the Safety Scheme is partly within Pitstone and partly within Ivinghoe and as such both Parish Councils have had an input in its design. We have also consulted with Brookmead School.

Some works are due to start late April/early May with the anti-skid surfacing going down. Full completion is expected during the school summer holidays.



### ASHRIDGE RAMBLINGS

#### Repair to the Beacon

The Ivinghoe hills have a unique look and feel – magnificent topography with long views, sweeping chalk grassland with its associated floral and faunal delights, and archaeological treasures such as ancient forts and burial mounds. No wonder people come from far and wide to enjoy them. Accumulated footfall, however, leads to ever broader and deeper erosion and the need for restoration. You may well have noticed the new steps just south of Beacon Road, and various roped-off areas, inside which plant recovery is underway.

A planning application has been submitted to surface the track down from Beacon car park. This will use limestone to create a hard-wearing surface in keeping with the landscape. Users will be relieved that they will nolonger have to deal with very slippery conditions. A more comprehensive plan is being prepared to tackle some of the erosion on the main slope and the 'saddle' (the hill half way between the barrier and the Beacon itself). It is extremely complex due to archaeological, landscape and nature

conservation considerations, but discussions are ongoing with Natural England, Historic England and the Chilterns AONB 'Beacons of the Past' project to work up solutions. The Ridgeway Partnership has its golden anniversary soon and is keen to join with the Ashridge team to improve other sections of the route across the lyinghoe Hills. It will take some time to put all these plans in place but there is a commitment to improving the accessibility of the paths and preventing any further erosion and deterioration of the surrounding habitat.

### Repair to the monument

Over the Jubilee weekend, why not repair to the Visitor Centre, where visitors will be invited to join festivities on Monument Green. There will be a large picnic area where the café will be serving special jubilee cakes; a variety of family games and activities as well as a large community craft base. Craft activities will include decorating bunting in a Jubilee style to hang from the Bridgewater Monument, much like a giant maypole, with the big reveal on Sunday 5th June.

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

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
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
