Para 1.20	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> The recreation ground remained open throughout the covid pandemic providing residents with much needed open space to exercise. Pitstone, Ivinghoe & Cheddington United Football Club plus the Ivinghoe & Pitstone United Cricket Club (both seniors and colts) were granted permission to use the recreation ground as their respective home sites and Occupational Licences issued. The Recreation Ground was utilised as a home training ground by several of the Pitstone & Ivinghoe Junior Football Club teams. The Play around the Parish sessions had to be cancelled due to the pandemic lockdowns however Pitstone Parish Council has funded a session for August 2022. These sessions are primarily aimed at attracting families with children under 11 years of age and are provided free to the residents, with dozens of local families attending. The area has been suitably maintained with remedial works (such as replacement trees) carried out as necessary (at the cost of the parish council). The charity is progressing a prior lease/disposal of a small section of land to the Memorial Hall charity which does not appear to have been correctly administered. The previous solicitor, Horwood & James,

		<p>recommended that the charity engage a charity expert. Anthony Collins was subsequently appointed. A formal application has been submitted to the Charity Commission by Anthony Collins solicitors. The final outstanding monies due to Horwood & James have been settled and the initial payment to Anthony Collins made.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The charity also explored options for a café / café seating area on the charities land with a number of parties. At present, discussions continue with a commercial organisation that operates a tearoom from inside Pitstone Memorial Hall relating to the potential provision of outdoor seating on the Recreation Ground Charity land. • The charity is in discussion with P&IJFC about additional cross-pitch markings that would enable a greater range of junior football to be played at the site.
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Financial Review

<p>Review of the charity's financial position at the end of the period</p>	<p>Para 1.21</p>	<p>The Recreation Ground Charity operates a dedicated bank account to receive receipts (operational since 2016) eg through hire of the football pitch</p> <p>Following receipt of advice during 2016, the parish council resolved to undertake day-to-day ground maintenance of the Recreation Ground Charity land (which is also a registered Village Green assigned to the Parish Council) as part of its open spaces policy. The Recreation Ground Charity may, from time to time, resolve to pass any held funds over to the Pitstone Council as a contribution towards the costs incurred. The Charity has not passed any funds to the Parish Council for work undertaken in 2021-22, and was in fact obliged to request a grant from the Parish Council as Local Authority in order to meet its agreed legal liabilities.</p> <p>At the year end, the Recreation Ground Charity holds £1,404.56. Receipts in the year were £1,910 (£330 for pitch hire and the grant from the parish council for £1,580) and payments were £3,225.60 (£72 of bank charges, £1,678 + VAT in legal fees to Horwood & James and £190 + VAT in legal fees to Anthony Collins).</p> <p>The parish council insurance specifies the trustees of this charity and their work as part of its policy, there is therefore no cost to the charity. The Recreation Ground Charity land is listed on the parish council's asset register.</p> <p>The charity has no debtors or creditors and no outstanding loans.</p>

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Other optional information

History

As part of the 1856 Enclosure Award, the land that the recreation ground sits upon was vested in Wibraham Egerton & James, Earl of Powis as recreation ground. The area in question relates to the grassed surface you can see at present and doesn't include the Memorial Hall land/car park or the land at the far end which houses the cricket nets and play equipment. In 1922, the Charity Commission vested the land in the Parish Council and in 1973 it was officially registered as a Village Green in the "Registrar of Common Land or Village Greens". The Recreation Ground was officially registered with Land Registry in 2010.

In the 1970's the Charity Commission granted permission for the Recreation Ground Charity to manage an additional neighbouring strip of land belonging to the Pitstone Allotments for the Labouring Poor under licence. This additional land enabled the recreation and leisure facilities to be extended, including the provision of children's play equipment. Pitstone Parish Charity did not charge rental to the Recreation Ground Charity but did receive the benefit-in-kind of all expenditure related to the land being borne by another body.

In April 2013 Pitstone Recreation Ground Charity received notice from Pitstone Parish Charity that they intended to

revoke the licence to manage this parcel of land. The Parish Charity were following advice from the Charity Commission that the entirety of the land they owned should be disposed to maximise the benefit to the Parish Charity. The parcel of leisure land (not required as part of the charities sale of land to Nicholas King Homes) was subsequently disposed of by Pitstone Parish Charity to Pitstone Parish Council, as Local Authority, in 2019 and therefore there are no ongoing commitments relating to this adjoining parcel of land by the Pitstone Recreation Ground Charity.

Pitstone Recreation Ground Charity has supported the aspirations of the Parish Council to upgrade the current provision to a Neighbourhood Equipped Area of Play (NEAP) from a Local Equipped Area of Play (LEAP) with an exciting new play space, skate park and multi-use games area to improve the asset for the community and attract more usage of the Recreation Ground. The play equipment on the newly acquired parcel of land owned by the parish council was installed by Huck Teck (commissioned by the Parish Council, as Local Authority) in 2020. The parish council also installed a concrete skate park on this neighbouring parcel of land in early 2022. The multi-use games area is currently being installed by Nicholas King Homes on an adjoining parcel of land, which will also create additional parking provision for the Recreation Ground. The addition of these 3 new facilities at the edge of the Recreation Ground Charity land will make the recreation ground more appealing and increase footfall.

The Pitstone Recreation Ground Charity obtained advice from the Charity Commission in 2019, to determine if the Charitable Status could be removed, as the same parcel of land is also a designated local Village Green assigned to the Parish Council for care. The Parish Council, as Local Authority, manage the day-to-day maintenance of the village green under their Open Space policy. The Charity Commission declined the application, citing that the charitable status provided additional protections over and above that of village green status. The Recreation Ground Charity will therefore continue as an entity for strategic decisions and receipt of income etc.
