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# A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

**Dave Nicholls, Chairman Pitstone Parish Council** 


In my last report I spoke at length about issues on and around the recreation ground. I'm very glad that, following activity by Thames Valley Police, we are seeing fewer issues. I also had my thought that most people want to do the right thing confirmed when some youngsters who had sprayed some particularly inappropriate graffiti on the skatepark were made to clean it up after their parents had been informed. Thank you to the parents and to the person who took the time to bring it to their attention.

The council has just begun the process of putting together our budget for next year which will, ultimately, set the parish precept that will be collected as part of your council tax payments. Last year the precept was £161,000, which equates to £115.89 per year for a band D property. We are conscious that interest rates and energy costs will be affecting many residents, but we are also aware that it is the council's role to use our ability to raise money to support the needs of residents. We always want to hear your thoughts on budgets and how we spend your money, but this year it is particularly important that you make your views known so we can make informed decisions. Please pass your thoughts to the clerk, or speak to any councillor.

In July I was very happy to represent the parish at the installation of the new vicar, James Grainger-Smith, in Ivinghoe. Lockdown extended the period that the parish was without a vicar and during that time many people stepped in to support the spiritual and other needs of residents. Thank you to them

all. It was delightful to see the joy that the arrival of James brought to the congregation.

On a final, personal, note. My long run of avoiding covid finally came to an end. My wife and I both succumbed and have been isolating for the last week and a half. I haven't really felt that unwell, I've just had no energy and been very tired. It has served as a reminder that the risk is still there and I'm glad to be fully up to date with my vaccinations. #### A warm welcome to Councillor Frances Nash



#### **Sport and Play**

We are delighted that the skatepark and play space continue to be very well utilised. Thames Valley Police have spoken to two separate groups of young people that were generating some anti-social behaviour and this now seems to have



By the time you read this magazine, remedial works should have been carried out in the Hever Close play space to the wet pour surface around the roundabout, an extra litter bin has been installed by the sports entrance to the Memorial Hall and an extra dog bin installed on the Vicarage Road side of the Recreation Ground.

The order has been placed for the double lane cricket practice nets, with an anticipated installation in March 2023—for further information see the I&PUCC article.

Discussions are ongoing with Nicholas King Homes and Buckinghamshire Council regarding the defects with the mutli-use ball court and we will provide any further updates whenever we receive them.

#### **Pavilion**

Evenings and weekends are getting very busy with bookings at the Pavilion. We still have some daytime availability Monday to Wednesday, so if you are looking to run a local class or group at these times, do get in touch (parishclerk@pitstone.co.uk or visit www.pitstone.co.uk).

#### Youth Café

The youth café has restarted strongly this term, with up to 60 young people attending each week. To ensure we have enough supervision, and in line with other local youth groups, we have introduced a parent rota to supplement the regular volunteers and youth leaders. If your child attends the youth café,



please support this initiative and attend on your given week.

#### Audit

The parish council accounts to 31-3-2022 have now completed all three levels of audit and will remain available on the website should you also wish to review them.

#### Fibre to Property

We understand that both Trooli and Openreach have been laying fibre to property infrastructure cables in Pitstone.

#### **Highways and Road Safety**

- Safety Scheme. Buckinghamshire
   Council have completed the installation
   of the safety scheme improvements
   outside Brookmead School. These
   were jointly funded by both Pitstone
   and Ivinghoe Parish Councils and the
   Buckinghamshire Council Community
   Board.
- Westfield Road. No further physical measures are planned for Westfield Road by Buckinghamshire Council (BC) nor the Community Board. BC conduct road safety audits annually and as an adopted road, Westfield Road will now be included within this process. This review identifies and prioritises roads throughout the county that may require remedial measures. Thames Valley Police have approved and added Westfield Road to their speed enforcement program and will be visiting regularly to carry out speed enforcement (on rotation with their other approved locations).
- The Parish Council is currently investigating the possibility of purchasing two Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs) to complement our current two Mobile Vehicle Activated Signs (mVAS), and working with the Community Board to see if any grant funding is available towards the cost. We will keep residents updated of the outcome.
- There was no interest received from the call for volunteers to set up a Community Speedwatch Scheme, so this will not be taken forward at the

present moment in time.

#### **Looking Forward**

Our silent soldiers and wreaths will soon be displayed ahead of Remembrance Day, and the Christmas lights will once again be installed on the Recreation Ground and at the Pavilion during December.

And an update on local matters within the control of Buckinghamshire Council:

#### Taylor Wimpey, Croudace, Bellway and Nicholas King Homes Developments

No further areas of Castlemead have been adopted by Buckinghamshire Council from Taylor Wimpey. All other developer sites still fall within the care and maintenance of the respective development companies and have not yet been adopted.

#### Transport for Bucks updates

Marsworth Road does not yet qualify for resurfacing. The sunken footpath along Queen Street remains outstanding, as does the installation of an additional bollard & the remarking of the disabled parking bays in Glebe Close. Any resident can report a defect with the highway (eg pothole) or footpath to Buckinghamshire Council via their website <a href="https://www.buckscc.gov.uk/services/transport-and-roads/report-a-highways-problem/">https://www.buckscc.gov.uk/services/transport-and-roads/report-a-highways-problem/</a> or via the Fix My Street website.

#### **Planning**

There are several local planning applications where we are still waiting for Buckinghamshire Council to provide a determination including submissions relating to the commercial areas within the Nicholas King Homes development (their application sought to convert these sites to residential use, and their first application has subsequently been referred to the Planning Inspectorate for consideration (to which the parish council has submitted further objections)) and the business park development off Westfield Road. The additional properties on land by the Haldi/Bell were refused planning permission. As always, you can find full details of all planning applications on the Buckinghamshire Council Planning Portal.

#### Opportunity Bucks' – 'Levelling Up' in Buckinghamshire

Buckinghamshire Council's Cabinet has approved a new programme aimed at promoting opportunity for all in the county. 'Opportunity Bucks' aims to help all residents access the fantastic opportunities on offer in Buckinghamshire where education, skills, work, living standards and health are concerned.

Following the government's 'Levelling Up' White Paper earlier this year, Buckinghamshire Council has carried out extensive work to draw up a local approach to promote better opportunity for everyone. The result is "Opportunity Bucks – Succeeding for All."

The approach will vary by area depending on what is most important locally and will initially focus on creating action plans for ten wards where outcomes for residents are poorer than in other parts of the county. The ten wards are in parts of Aylesbury, High Wycombe and Chesham.

This is a long-term piece of work and importantly is a partnership approach with other key stakeholders in the local areas such as housing associations, local businesses, voluntary and community groups, schools, and charitable organisations. Activities will be locally led by neighbourhood Community Boards along with local councillors

#### Planning enforcement success for Buckinghamshire Council

Buckinghamshire Council has issued the highest number of planning enforcement notices outside of London according to the

latest national data. A planning enforcement notice is issued when an individual or developer is found to be in breach of planning control – it might be that someone has carried out works without planning permission when it was needed, or that they've done something that wasn't within the granted permissions.

Buckinghamshire Council has also served the highest number of 'breaches of condition' notices in the whole country – this is where individuals or developers have failed to adhere to conditions set out when planning permission for their project was granted.

#### Buckinghamshire Council to hit 25% renewable electricity target

As part of its commitment to tackling the climate crisis, Buckinghamshire Council is pleased to announce that from October of this year, 25% of the electricity it uses will come from renewable sources. We have finalised the details of how we will procure the energy for council buildings and assets like streetlights.

Buying renewable energy is one of a number of ways we're tackling climate change in Buckinghamshire and is directly related to action 33 in our Climate Change and Air Quality Action Plan. It helps support the renewable generation sector, reduces emissions of greenhouse gases and other air pollutants, and our dependence on fossil fuels. The extraction, processing, and transportation of fossil fuels has various negative environmental impacts so this purchasing decision helps improve the Council's environmental performance overall.

#### **Town and Parish Charter**

In line with the establishment of the new Buckinghamshire Council, we wanted to take the opportunity to strengthen our relationship with all councils across the county. There has been an ongoing programme of work in the last few years and, following discussion and consultations on earlier iterations, we have developed a charter that demonstrates and articulates the commitment to work and communicate effectively with residents. The charter has been published on our website and will be shared widely across the council.

The charter will be subject to an annual review which will of course be done in consultation with you all. Cabinet Members and senior officers will be accountable to the Localism and Communities Select Committee to ensure that the commitments made in the charter are upheld.

#### New Guardian's Guide website launches

Buckinghamshire Council has launched a unique website to support people who may be taking on the role of a Special Guardian in a child or young person's life. The innovative 'Guardian's Guide' website – makes it easy for guardians and parents involved in Special Guardianship Orders to gain access to a variety of helpful information, advice and support.

A special quardian is a person who looks after a child or young person who cannot live with their birth parents or who isn't suitable for adoption. The child can maintain a relationship with their birth family, but the quardian - usually a family member - is responsible for looking after the child and all day-to-day decisions until they are 18. In Buckinghamshire the number of children being cared for by special guardians is rising every year. The number of Special Guardianship Orders being granted for Buckinghamshire children is currently outstripping the number of Adoption Orders, so having easy, accessible information for people new to Special Guardianship is vital.

#### Council employs green technology to repair damaged roads

The programme of work started earlier this month. In three phases, it will tackle some of the 'failing roads' where the filling and refilling

of potholes is not enough to maintain the road surface to an adequate standard. These are generally more rural roads, originally simple tracks, that were never designed to carry the amount of traffic they now do. As traffic levels have increased over the years, the road surfaces have deteriorated and foundations subsided to such an extent that normal plane and patch repair work is not enough.

The repair work is carried out using a process called Regen. It has been trialled previously in other parts of the county. Crews break up the existing road surface. These materials are then pulverised on site, spread out and compacted to create a level surface. A small amount of cement mixed with water, binds the materials together and creates a solid structure. The surface is then covered with bitumen and stone chippings, sealing it to prevent water getting in. The process is specifically designed for rural roads with a relatively low volume of traffic and would not be suitable on bigger roads with higher traffic flows.

The use of the new technique has multiple benefits:

- The whole process is significantly quicker than alternatives so reducing the inconvenience for local residents and road users
- It has a direct impact on improved air quality as there is no need to use hot asphalt
- By reusing materials instead of taking them away from the site by vehicle, it helps reduce our carbon footprint Using fewer materials also brings about significant savings. The cost is £22-£28 per square metre compared to £75-£100 per square metre for more conventional methods.

#### New planning guidance for the Vale of Aylesbury unveiled

Buckinghamshire Council launched a consultation on three important planning guidance documents that, once adopted, will inform planning and development decisions in the former Aylesbury Vale District area. These documents, known as supplementary planning documents (SPDs), provide detailed advice and guidance on policies in the Vale of Aylesbury Local Plan which was adopted by the council in September 2021.

The consultation will be closed on

2 November 2022. Individuals and organisations were invited to give their views on the following documents:

 Aylesbury Garden Town – South Aylesbury Masterplan

This masterplan document is intended to guide landowners, developers, the public and the local planning authority in respect of environmental, social, economic and design objectives for the planning and development of the South Aylesbury area of the Aylesbury Garden Town, situated within Stoke Mandeville civil parish.

Affordable Housing SPD
This document provides further planning
guidance on how affordable housing policy
should be applied to proposals for residential
development within the Aylesbury Vale local
plan area.

Design SPD

The aim of the design supplementary planning document is to ensure that new development across Aylesbury Vale is of the highest quality, is in context with its location, and is inclusive and sustainable. The document sets out clear principles and objectives that aim to inspire developers and designers and assist landowners, developers, applicants and planners in the process of delivering high quality and well-designed development.

#### Update on move to new single system for revenues and benefits

In August, Buckinghamshire Council began the process of moving to a new and improved single system for managing council tax, business rates and benefits – merging the former district council systems into one. The Chiltern and South Bucks systems were taken offline as planned on 15 August and the council has now converted the South Bucks and Chiltern council tax, business rates and housing benefit data and moved it to its new format.

The next step began on 22 September, when the Aylesbury and Wycombe system (that was merged last November) was taken offline and all the data merged into one system which went live on 27 October. One single system is now available to all of Buckinghamshire residents and businesses.

#### Get your veg on with Grow It, Cook It, Eat

Buckinghamshire Council supported 'Grow It, Cook It, Eat It' initiative helps residents in times of hardship to put nutritious and fresh food on their table. As the number of food

parcels distributed to households in Buckinghamshire reached 13,718 in the first six months of 2022, many residents are looking for help to find affordable and healthy solutions and alternatives. Grow It, Cook It, Eat It is a community-led project that focuses on



growing healthy produce, meanwhile educating local residents about maintaining and harvesting crops to allow people to grow their own food.

There is no cost or membership to visit one of the growing sites, and very little to no commitment – anyone can visit when they have spare time. What doesn't get taken home from the allotments is donated back to the community.

If you're a grower and sometimes find yourself with excess fruit and vegetables you can also give back to those in your community who need it via the Grow to Give project, where surplus produce from local allotments and gardens goes towards helping the community via local food banks to help households who may need extra support to access healthy and nutritious foods.

The Grow to Give project has been running in Aylesbury and High Wycombe since 2020, linked to local food banks and was recently launched in Amersham with residents waiting at the door of the council building at 10am to collect fresh produce. Check the Grow to Give website to find your nearest donation allotment site and free access to recipes and cooking videos.

The Grow it Cook it Eat it initiative also provides free cooking sessions delivered by our fully trained Volunteer Cooking Tutors who will link in with their local Grow It, Cook It, Eat It community growing site. Each site has its own dedicated Expert Gardener who is onhand to offer help and guidance about how to

get started with growing your own food.

#### Welcoming Spaces give a warm reception to all

Buckinghamshire Council's latest measure to offer 'a helping hand' to support local residents with the cost of living crisis this winter, is the introduction of



Buckinghamshire's Welcoming Spaces. The council is pledging to develop a network of Welcoming Spaces offering a variety of facilities around the county, with local partner organisations, where residents can come into safe and inclusive spaces, free of charge, to stay warm and enjoy a little company.

The scheme is kick-starting with the launch of Buckinghamshire's libraries and community libraries as the first of the Welcoming Spaces venues. Visitors will be welcome for as long as they wish during opening hours and can make use of facilities including free wifi and computer access. Library staff will also be on hand to offer information and support to visitors struggling with the effects of the cost of living crisis. More information on the Welcoming Spaces scheme can be found on the council website.

#### Household recycling centres switch to winter hours

Buckinghamshire Council's nine household recycling centres switched to winter opening hours on Saturday 1 October. The new opening hours are 9am to 4pm, only the opening hours changed, due to the reduced number of visits to the centres after 4pm.

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#### A SAD FAREWELL TO A CULINARY GEM

30 Sept saw what is truly the end of an era when The King's Head restaurant, Ivinghoe, served its last diners and closed its doors for the final time. The ivy-clad, 17th Century posting house, has been a by-word for fine dining in Buckinghamshire for more than two thirds of a century, and nobody can remember a time when Georges de Maison wasn't the restaurant's public face. orchestrating the consistently high standards that have made its richly deserved culinary reputation. When Georges, Annie Cooney, Patrick O'Keefe and Jonathan O'Keefe bought The King's Head from Granada in 2001, the four-person consortium already had some 75 years' King's Head experience between them.

For the four, taking over the business they loved was a dream come true. Patrick has since sadly passed away, but Georges, Company Secretary Annie and Head Chef Jonathan now total well over a century of service between them. So it's with great sadness that they have announced the restaurant's closure, but "time moves ever forward and we are not getting any younger!" Annie explained.

For Georges de Maison, the catering industry is truly in the blood. His grandparents parents and brother were all in the business and Georges showed an interest at an early age. When he was just 14, he was one of the youngest students at the catering school in Strasberg, combining his studies with parttime work to earn some extra money. His subsequent career included the Auberge de I'll in Illhausen, the famous La Tour d'Argent in Paris, the Café Royal and the Mayflower in Surrey, before joining the French Air Force as part of a General's Retinue. He returned to England as Head Waiter at the Hunting Lodge on Lower Regent Street before, in 1961, finally arriving at The King's Head, where he has been ever since.

Jonathan O'Keefe succeeded his father, Patrick, in charge of the hallowed kitchen. It was his third stint at the restaurant where he did his basic training. His previous experience had included Auberge du Lac at Brocket Hall Golf Club, La Belle Epoque at South



Kensington, Pendley Manor in Tring, and Grosvenor House Hotel on Park Lane. His menus continued

to major on traditional classics, whilst also introducing some more modern dishes. The legendary Aylesbury Duckling has continued to be the speciality of the house & always much in demand.

Annie Cooney had waited tables in earlier days, gained an abundance of experience in hotel management, and spent some ten years at The Kings Head and a similar period at The Bell in Aston Clinton, and was enjoying a break from the business when Georges called her out of the blue with an invitation to join the consortium. Like her colleagues, she has been a very hands on owner, often found behind the front desk.

The reaction to the closure, shock & more than a few tears in the community, has touched this hard working team, who admit that the decision has been the hardest, most heart breaking of their lives. It will leave a gaping hole in Ivinghoe & the culinary world.

The three remaining owners said in their statement, "When Patrick passed away we commemorated him with brass plaque in the garden – 'We shared a dream' - and we have continued to share that dream to the present.

They also thanked staff, past and present, for their skills and dedication, many of whom have been with the restaurant for many years; and their great suppliers, "especially Richard and Beverley Waller, who have worked tirelessly, without a break to supply our famous Aylesbury duckling."

The King's Head truly was a one-off, and locals will travel a very long way to try and find a comparable dining experience. Jonathan said, "It's going to take a while to come to terms with," and that goes for their devoted clientele.

#### **NEW VICAR—NEW CHAPTER**

A full house at St Mary's Church, Ivinghoe with Pitstone saw the Institution, Induction and Installation of Revd James Granger-Smith as the new Vicar of the Benefice, which also embraces Holy Cross, Slapton and All Saints, Marsworth.

The occasion, on a pleasant evening on Tuesday 12 June, was the culmination of a long vacancy and a painstaking selection process, and the church family and the combined communities were well represented.

James was presented to the Bishop of Buckingham, Right Revd Alan Wilson, by Revd Canon Tim Harper, who spoke of clergy needing support and encouragement. He was welcomed by the Ministry Team and the congregation before the Bishop gave a sermon, which he opened by referencing James's experience of uniting several rural parishes in Yorkshire, "finding out where people are and things that can be done together". This was "just the ticket". The Bishop thanked everyone who had sustained the cap benefice during the vacancy and revealed that the theme for the service had been chosen by James, notably a reading from Deuteronomy - a book 2664 years old which offered a choice between good and life: and evil and death. "For God's sake choose life, through and with each other," he exhorted.

After a final, formal welcome, James was greeted with a warm round of applause. He was then introduced to representatives of the local communities: schools, parish councils, churches, the Scouts and Women's Institutes. He thanked the congregation for the welcome, and everyone who had worked to bring the service together. He led prayers of intercession before the choir performed his favourite psalm – Psalm 126 (those who sow), specially set to music by Judith Sheridan to welcome James and his family.

James was born in Kent, went to school in London, and studied for his first degree at Nottingham, where he met his wife, Janice. Since then, life has taken him to Hong Kong for a short period, back to Nottingham, where he trained for ordination and then on to Winchester, where he served his title. In 2007, he became incumbent of several rural parishes in York Diocese, and he served as Rural Dean of North Holderness from 2012 – 2016. Along the way his sons, Peter and Matthew, now adults came along, and now he and Janice are looking forward to this new chapter in their lives in Buckinghamshire.

#### **ASHRIDGE RAMBLINGS**

Many readers will fondly remember talks on Ashridge's wildlife, given at the Visitor Centre by Brian Barton and his late wife. Sian, always accompanied by a fine afternoon tea. They also led countless wildlife walks. Sadly, Brian died recently. I have enjoyed and learnt much from his insights into deer, badgers and edible dormice (glis glis), presentations always delivered with great charm and authority. What he didn't know about the history and wildlife of Ashridge wasn't worth knowing. He had a 50-year association with Ashridge and was chair of the Estate Committee for several years. With Sian, he initiated the 'Gentle Strolls' series, which brought a lot of joy to a whole new audience. Brian and Sian were Ashridge legends and are much missed.

#### Ring out the new, ring in the old!

Ashridge is home to large areas of ancient woodland, defined as having had continuous tree cover since 1600. Only 2% of British woodland matches this criterion. Ashridge used to have more but, from the 1950s, conifers replaced broadleaved trees on some ancient woodland sites. Such sites have a fantastic diversity of plants locked up within their seedbank, as well as fungi, but such species do not colonise new woodland sites and are damaged and suppressed by conifers through the affect that they have in acidifying the soil and the dense shade that they cast. Many benefits of the species that rely on the trees are also lost. The only solution is to

restore broadleaved woodland.

The Ashridge team has been successful in securing major grant funding from the Forestry Commission to trial new techniques for accessing hard-to-reach sites, removing the conifers and replanting broadleaved woodland for the benefit of wildlife. The funding will run for three years. The team will be testing different approaches to using trackway (ground protection mats) to enable extraction of conifers without causing damage to the ground.

Eventually, most conifers will be removed from ancient woodland sites. This year and next, the matting will be trialled in Ringshall Copse (to the east of Wards Hurst Farm). In the third year, work will be done in Sallow Copse (to the north of Monument Drive), which the team has been wanting to work in for a very long time but hasn't been able to due to the fear of damaging the ground.

The family of Bill Braithwaite would like to advise that he passed away on 30th July 2022. Bill also spent 35 years volunteering at the Aylesbury branch of the RNLI and was a former manager of NatWest in Tring.

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
