The earliest parts of the church, the chancel and north chapel, date back to 1250 and some carved fragments of stone from the 12th century indicate that it may have been built on the site of an earlier church. Open on Sundays and Bank Holidays from May to September, as well as for special events like the Icknield 16 concert (July) and Tea with Music (August). Whilst there look out for the Norman font, the unique brass (probably depicting Lady Neyrnut) and the ancient wooden chest and sanctuary chair, along with medieval floor tiles and wall paintings from the 17th century. ## A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Dave Nicholls, Chairman Pitstone Parish Council

I'd like to wish everyone a very Happy New Year, and I hope you had a lovely Christmas.

The residents of Church Road again did the village proud with their Christmas light display. Thanks to them for their efforts, and to everyone whose donations helped raise nearly £3000 for the Food Bank.

Given the economic situation, and particularly rising prices, I am sure that there are some in the village who have struggled during the festive period and who will continue to struggle in 2023. If you find yourself in need, then there are local organisations that you can reach out to. In particular, details of the Food Bank and the Pitstone Town Lands Charity can be found elsewhere in the magazine. They are sympathetic, very discreet, and will do what they can to help.

During covid the Pitstone community was very generous with their time and stepped up to support the vulnerable. We still have need of people's time. Some drivers for the Community Car Scheme have had to drop out so we are currently seeking new help. You will find contact details elsewhere in the PPP. If you do have spare time, even if only occasionally, then there are people trying to get to appointments who will be very grateful.

I mentioned last time that the Parish Council was working through our budget for the next financial year. We have tried to control costs where we can while also remaining aware that the things we do, like litter picking, grass cutting, and maintenance of play areas, are important to residents. We have also had to take into account energy cost rises.

After full consideration we have put in an increase of about 2.93%. Please note that the parish precept is a small part of the overall council tax bill and the increase represents about £4 per year for a Band D house.

I am writing this on what's been a day of rain. I am looking forward to brighter days ahead, both literally and figuratively. If you see me around the village please do say hello.

#### **Possible Bus Shelters for Westfield Road**

Now that the highway has been adopted by Buckinghamshire Council (permission having previously been denied by Taylor Wimpey) we are trying to work with BC to install bus shelters along Westfield Road. Focus this year is likely to be on providing shelters on the residential/Aylesbury heading side of the road. This is apparently not eligible for Community Board funding so we are working with their Public Transport & Highways departments. We will keep you updated as the project progresses.

#### **Christmas lights**

Thank you for all the positive feedback about the Christmas tree illuminations at both the Recreation Ground and Pavilion sites.

#### **Restoration of Pitstone Quarry**

Clark Contracting Ltd are currently seeking views on their long-term proposals for the restoration of Pitstone Quarry, developed in collaboration with National Trust, before they submit a planning application. The proposals also include infill for re-landscaping via imported inert materials. No official planning application consultation nor quarry licence application has yet been received by the parish council.

#### **Highways**

Thames Valley Police continue to carry out speed enforcement on Westfield Road (on rotation with their other approved locations). Following investigations into the technical operation of Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs) it was eventually resolved not to progress. Our two Mobile Vehicle Activated Signs (mVAS) units will continue to be rotated around our four approved road locations, providing a service to all through roads into the village. When in Westfield Road, the mVAS will alternate between the approved location by Bolebec End and the temporary lamp post location to continue to monitor the Warwick Road junction. ppcinfo/mobile-vehicle-activated-signs/. Buckinghamshire Council are still working on the implementation of the lvinghoe Freight Strategy and hope that the first phase will go live in early 2023.

## And an update on local matters within the control of Buckinghamshire Council:

## Taylor Wimpey, Croudace, Bellway and Nicholas King Homes Developments

No further areas of Castlemead have been adopted by Buckinghamshire Council from Taylor Wimpey. All other developer sites still fall within the care and maintenance of the respective development companies and have not yet been adopted. Bellway have opened discussions with the parish council regarding adoption of the play space and Croudace are currently negotiating with Buckinghamshire Council and the Parish Council regarding highways and lighting respectively.

#### Highways/paths updates

Marsworth Road has not yet been approved for resurfacing. The sunken footpath along Queen Street remains outstanding, as does the installation of an additional bollard & the remarking of the disabled parking bays in Glebe Close. Any resident can report a defect with the highway (eg pothole) or footpath to Buckinghamshire Council via their website <u>https://www.buckscc.gov.uk/services/transport</u> <u>-and-roads/report-a-highways-problem/</u> or via the Fix My Street website.

#### Planning

There are several local planning applications for which we are still waiting for Buckinghamshire Council to provide a determination including submissions relating to the commercial areas within the Nicholas King Homes development (their application sought to convert these sites to residential use, and their first application has subsequently been referred to the Planning Inspectorate for consideration (to which the parish council has submitted further objections)) and the business park development off Westfield Road. #### Beconsiderate – motorists encouraged to think about pedestrian safety when parking by schools

Motorists in Buckinghamshire are being asked to think of the safety of pedestrians, as part of a new campaign focusing around schools. Many children are taken to and from school by car everyday but sometimes in the rush to get there on time, it can be tempting to pull onto the kerb or part way onto a driveway, stop on zig zag lines or even pull into a bus stop. However, vehicles blocking pavements and footpaths often means pedestrians, which can include young children, those with limited mobility and older people, are forced to go into the road to get past, which can be extremely dangerous. Equally, part blocking a private driveway or lowered kerb can prevent larger vehicles including emergency ambulances and fire engines from getting through and pulling into a bus stop can lead to unnecessary traffic queues.

The *#Beconsiderate* campaign recognises that the majority of motorists do consider pedestrians and other road users when they park but seeks to give a gentle reminder to think carefully about where they stop.

## New gully cleansing programme in Bucks over two-thirds complete

For the second year running Buckinghamshire Council has pledged to clean 85,000 highway gullies across the county, repairing those that require it. The operation has been ongoing since the spring and now, the teams have successfully cleaned more than two-thirds.

## Thousands of trees planted in Bucks for National Tree Week



During National Tree Week, Buckinghamshire Council has been working in partnership with Chiltern Rangers and the local community to host nine days of

tree planting events in the Vale of Aylesbury. The nine days consisted of planting over 4,000 trees, hedgerow plants, native bulbs and wildflowers along the new Platinum Way cycleway in the sections of Haydon Hill and Somerville Way in Aylesbury.

The planting supports the Bucks Tree Mission, which aims to create a greener future by planting over 543,000 trees in Buckinghamshire over the next nine years.

## Householders urged to take up free opportunity to cut energy costs

Householders in Buckinghamshire who are on

low incomes and whose homes have a poor energy performance rating, are being urged to take up an offer of free funding to make improvements to their homes which could save them money on their energy bills, but time is running out to apply.

The grants, which are funded by central government, are available to both homeowners and private renters who meet the eligibility criteria. The funding is available for a range of property types including those not connected to the gas grid which are currently using an alternative energy supply such as oil.

To qualify for a grant, homes should have an Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) rated E, F or G (a D rating may be eligible in some circumstances). Households should also have an annual income of no more than £30,000 or be on means-tested benefits. Those who have an annual income of under £20,000 after housing costs are taken out are also eligible. Allowances are made for the number of children in the household and also for those who have recently lost income. Types of improvements include:

Insulation and ventilation

• An upgrade to a low carbon heating system such as an air source heat pump

- Heating controls
- Energy efficient hot water solutions
- Energy efficient lighting

For owner occupiers, the work will be carried out for free. For rental properties (whether private or social), the landlord will be expected to pay at least one third of the cost towards the work.

applications.co.uk for more information and to complete the online application form. The scheme is being managed locally by partners City Energy, who will process all applications and liaise with householders to work out the best options available for their property.

## Builder pays the price for fly-tipping in Buckinghamshire

A builder from North London who tried to evade justice, has paid the price for fly-tipping in Buckinghamshire with a hefty fine imposed by the courts. Faisal Kamran, from Northolt in North London, appeared at High Wycombe Magistrates Court on 30 November. Kamran previously ignored a court summons regarding the charge of illegal dumping and was arrested. When he finally appeared in court, he pleaded guilty to the charge.

The court heard that a pile of rubbish had been found on Wexham Park Lane on 27 April 2022, by an enforcement officer from Buckinghamshire Council. When examined, the waste led the officer to a householder who had recently had his bathroom renovated. The householder revealed that Kamran had collected the waste which was later found dumped. When interviewed under caution at



Hayes Police Station Kamran admitted dumping the waste, claiming that he intended to go back and get it. Magistrates fined Kamran £1,066 and ordered him to pay the council's full costs of £1,097.57. He was also ordered to pay a victim surcharge, making a total to pay of £2,265.57.

## Buckinghamshire Council tops Modeshift STARS league table!

Buckinghamshire Council has topped a league of 59 Local Authorities who are members of the Modeshift STARS scheme – with the council having the highest percentage of schools with a sustainable travel plan. They are also ranked fourth highest in terms of the quality of the travel plans awarded.

The scheme is sponsored by the Department for Transport and encourages school-aged children and young people to walk, bike, scoot or get the bus to school. The scheme awards gradings on a Platinum, Gold, Silver, Bronze and Green basis to promote sustainable, active, and safe ways of travel for families doing school runs.

There are now 60 schools (a total of 24,668 students) in Buckinghamshire with Modeshift STARS, an increase of 14% from the same time last year. The scheme offers schools an online tool to help them plan, monitor and develop a nationally recognised School Travel Plan against set criteria. This plan is then used to designate the accreditation they will be able to achieve.



#### Buckinghamshire Council win appeal against 'inappropriate development' in Beaconsfield

Plans for the 450 residential property Beeches Park development next to the Amersham Road (A355) and Minerva Way in Beaconsfield were refused at the Council's South Buckinghamshire Area Planning Committee on 25 November 2021; this decision has now been upheld at appeal by the Planning Inspectorate (decision announced on 20 December).

## Terrifying, Twisty, Serial Killer Chiller From Local Author Dave Sivers

Local crime fiction author Dave Sivers' tenth novel, *In Ice*, was published on Thursday 8 December in Kindle eBook and in paperback. Dave is our former village correspondent for the local papers, and his published work includes the popular Archer and Baines series set right here in Aylesbury Vale.

In addition to his books, Dave has written extensively for the local amateur stage, most recently the script and lyrics for *Yvinghoe Tales*, a drama and music performance celebrating 800 years of St Mary's Church, lvinghoe with Pitstone. He is also a co-founder of lvinghoe's BeaconLit book festival, which raises funds for our local library and is in its tenth year.

*In Ice* is the second in his West Hertfordshirebased series featuring Detective Inspector Nathan Quarrel and, as before, Tring and surrounding villages play their part.

An anonymous call leads DI Quarrel and his team to a secluded house in a Hertfordshire village and a horrific discovery: three chest freezers containing the naked bodies of five women. As

## BURGLARY PREVENTION ADVICE The Wing and District Neighbourhood Policing Team



"Here's a bright idea, leave a light on"

With the darker nights, we historically see an increase in Burglaries at this time of year. With this in mind, we would like to take the time to offer you some security advice.

- If you are leaving your home during the hours of darkness, please leave a light on. We recommend using a light timer switch, along with a low energy bulb in a lamp, which can be set to come on and go off at a time which suits you. This makes it appear that someone is home. Burglars are usually opportunists and patrol areas. So don't let your home be their target.
- If you are going away, ask a neighbour to use your driveway if it is going to be vacant. This makes it appear that someone is coming and going.
- If you buy high value items, or you receive any for Christmas, don't leave the empty boxes outside your home as this advertises what you have inside your property.
- Make sure you key lock your door, not just pull it shut.
- If you have an alarm, ensure it is set when you are not in your property.
- Consider installing CCTV.
- We recommend installing sensor security lights which come on when someone walks onto your property.

- If you have a keyless vehicle, please ensure the key is kept in a signal blocking box or pouch.
- Be vigilant. If you note a suspicious person or vehicle, report it. It may seem like a small piece of information, however it may be the missing piece of our jigsaw.

## ASHRIDGE RAMBLINGS Rikki Harrington

#### PITSTONE QUARRY RESTORATION

This is the most exciting development I've heard about in ages! The section of Pitstone Quarry between the B488 and Pitstone Hill is to be restored as a haven for wildlife, walkers and open-water swimmers, and the National Trust will assume responsibility for its management.

The project will run in two phases. Phase 1 will open approximately two years after planning consent is granted, so potentially in Spring 2026. This phase covers the northernand western-most 35 hectares and includes 3.5 km of new footpaths, new calcareous grassland, a proposed visitor centre and a car park. The lake will initially only be open to visitors at weekends and bank holidays for safety reasons, with level-crossing-style gates being installed as there will be considerable ongoing commercial activity from Monday to Friday. likely by 2037, restores the remaining 26 hectares, provides an additional 2.3 km of footpaths and removes the level-crossing.

The result will be a brand-new nature reserve, providing recreational facilities and a fantastic mosaic of habitats with links to an existing wildlife-rich landscape. It will help to draw people away from the overburdened area around the Bridgewater Monument, which will benefit some of the most highly-designated parts of the Ashridge Estate, visitors and wildlife alike.

The site is owned by Clark Contracting Ltd, who are financing the project on the basis of money raised by importing 'clean', unimpacted soils from the construction sector to achieve the required landscaping.
