Question raised to Thames Valley Police re anti-social motoring offences (especially speed of traffic on Westfield Road and wheel spinning in the Business Park, but the response below includes general information about speed of traffic, rather than just Westfield Road) These are tricky issues to resolve, as they require changes to individuals' personal behaviour rather than physical/purchasable

In recent years, Buckinghamshire Council (BC) have installed a number of physical measures along Westfield Road including roundels and dragon's teeth road markings and improved signage. Thames Valley Police and Buckinghamshire Council work jointly to monitor road safety and BC prioritise expenditure on physical interventions in areas across the county where there is a poor accident record. There have been few accidents in Westfield Road since it was constructed (and most have not been attributable to road design) so this location is not a priority for further physical measures by BC at present. They review annually.

Thames Valley Police (TVP) agreed (once the road was adopted by the Highways Authority), and do, carry out regular speed-van enforcement along Westfield Road, in rotation with other approved sites. Neither TVP nor BC are supportive of the installation of fixed speed enforcement cameras in the parish. The parish council has gained permission from TVP & BC to install 'Police Speed Check Area' signage at either end of Westfield Road and this has now been purchased and installed. The permissions granted are for 'temporary' signage, so residents may see them disappear for short periods of time and then re-appear again.

The parish council owns and utilises our two mVAS units (which flash when a speeding vehicle enters its field of vision) to both remind

drivers and monitor speeds (alternating between the Warwick Road and Bolebec End locations), in rotation with all the other approved sites in the parish (in Cheddington Road, Marsworth Road and Vicarage Road). The units are in place for 6 weeks, and then move to their alternate site, providing approx. 6-weeks on and 6-weeks off for each road. This type of unit has been found to be more effective when it appears/disappears/ reappears, rather than being static. When located in one position, drivers become used to the sign and are more likely to ignore it. Data is published to our website and shows that speed of traffic can be an issue in all our through roads, rather than being unique to Westfield Road (which was originally designed and built as a 40mph road for Business Park access). In fact the average speed in Cheddington Road can sometimes exceed those recorded along Westfield Road, despite Cheddington Road not having the benefits of Westfield Road, for example clear visibility, few parked cars, a grass verge & cycle path to protect pedestrians, and less reasons to cross. Further flashing devices such as a SID (speed indicator devices) were considered earlier in the year, in the hope that rotating the type of sign/message displayed, would still be enough of a difference to trigger changes to motorist behaviour. However, technical reasons that the suppliers can't resolve at present, meant that they couldn't be rotated. Fixed signs will not provide a resolution to the issues and reduce the ability of the existing signs to rotate. Therefore, this was not progressed for the moment (but may be reviewed once the technical issues have been resolved) and the council continues with its existing policy to support all residents, located along all through roads, with equal provision of our two mVAS units.

TVP suggested that if speed of vehicles was important to local residents that people may like to volunteer to set up and run a Community Speedwatch scheme. The parish council has promoted this on several occasions but insufficient levels of interest from residents has been received. If you feel strongly about vehicle speeds, please do check out the information on our website at https://pitstone.co.uk/ppcnews/speedwatch/ and get in touch if this is something that you'd be keen to participate in. Most of the traffic (excluding freight) in our village is likely to be local, and speeding issues exist in all the local villages (as well as within the county and nationally). Drivers may be particularly careful to mind the speed limit in an area close to their home, but not be quite as respectful passing through another location. We may all be part of the problem, and part of the solution. Please do keep your speeds down, wherever and whenever you are driving. We will continue to explore any other opportunities that arise that may be useful to reduce traffic speeds across the parish.

With regard to Anti-social Behaviour (ASB) in the Business Park, the Parish Council had sought, and been declined, permission to plant screening trees in either the BC verge or the Taylor Wimpey Business Park banks opposite Dover Close. TVP encouraged residents to report all instances of ASB (whether speeding, wheel-spinning, drugs, teen-behaviour etc) via their email (greatbrickhillwingivinghoeNHPT@thamesvall ey.police.uk) or via their website (https:// www.thamesvalley.police.uk/). They may not be able to respond straight away, but your information helps them build intelligence and better target patrols.

# Question raised to TVP re parking near junctions in Old Farm & Rushendon Furlong

Like the above, this is a difficult issue to resolve, as it requires people to be respectful of the needs of others, rather than being easy to change with a physical solution. TVP agreed to check these locations if they were patrolling the area and speak to offenders or issue advice letters. As above, please report any regular vehicle issues to TVP via their email (greatbrickhillwingivinghoeNHPT@thamesval ley.police.uk) so that they can identify vehicles, build intelligence, and better target patrols.

#### Question raised to Buckinghamshire Council (BC) re potholes

BC advised that the budget had been increased to try and address the backlog and encouraged residents to report any issues identified via Fix my Street so they could be addressed. The Local Highways Authority inspect surfaces at intervals, with the regularity dependent upon the classification of the road. In between, they are reliant on your eyes and co-operation to report issues. Category 1 issues (eg a deep pothole in the tyre line on an A road) will receive a faster repair than more minor issues reported, and you may find that whilst one pothole in a street is fixed urgently, another a little further along takes much longer to get repaired. ### Question raised to BC regarding resurfacing

BC has already included Marsworth Road on their list of roads requiring attention, but scheduling will depend on county wide priorities, so no anticipated date is yet available. The Buckinghamshire Councillors work in conjunction with the BC team to prioritise the most important roads within their area. Also on the agreed, but not yet scheduled. BC list of highways work to be undertaken are: fixing the failing road surface down by the Cheddington Road railway bridge (due to be done in conjunction with some other works to improve pedestrian safety under the bridge), reconstruction of the Vicarage Road footpath from Tun Furlong towards Church Road and repair of a collapsed section of footpath in Queen Street.

#### Question raised to BC relating to highways weed killing

Buckinghamshire Council has not allowed for any weed killing (by spraying) or weed removal (by hand) beside the highway within its budget for the current financial year. The Parish Council was granted permission (but not provided with any funding) to remove weeds from the pedestrian island refuges (around both the Westfield Road and Marsworth Road roundabouts, and along Marsworth Road) and the build-outs along Marsworth Road and the Recreation Ground roundabout. Our contractor has now undertaken this work and hand cleared all these areas to improve aesthetics and safety.

#### Question raised to BC re road sweeping

Buckinghamshire Council are hoping that sweeping the roads will prevent weeds from taking root. They plan to attend twice per year. The first visit to adopted highways has been undertaken and it subsequently came to light that an administrative problem within the Street Scenes department at BC (the road sweeper is managed by the Open Spaces department rather than their Highways department) had meant that the roads adopted by BC over the previous 12-months hadn't been added to the work schedule provided to their staff. This has now been resolved, BC apologised, and the sweeper returned to clear the previously omitted roads. If your road develops a problem in between the cyclical visits (eg if there is a spillage etc) this can be reported via the link to the BC website: https:// www.buckinghamshire.gov.uk/waste-andrecycling/street-cleaning/report-a-street-thatneeds-cleaning/ Private roads are excluded from this service, and queries relating to roads that are still maintained by their respective developers should be directed to the developer in guestion.

Question raised to BC re zebra crossings (both instead of pedestrian refuges along Marsworth Road, and for Westfield Road)

Buckinghamshire Council have previously advised that both the Vicarage Road crossing and the Marsworth Road crossing by the pavilion did not qualify for zebra crossings (hence the installation of the provided island refuges). The most appropriate type of crossing for each location is based on traffic volumes/speeds, distance, location, and the length of time that pedestrians have to wait to cross safely. The Parish Council had requested a zebra crossing on Westfield Road as part of the planning application feedback for the retail unit at Portland House but the planning has been refused by BC and thus the crossing not progressed by the developer. BC estimate that each zebra crossing costs in the region of £80k+ to provide.

The last proposals put forward by

Buckinghamshire Council for the lvinghoe & Pitstone Safety Scheme, included coloured tarmac at some pedestrian crossing points to raise visibility. The parish council has agreed to revert back to Buckinghamshire Council and the BC Community Board to ask if they can re-assess if any locations along Marsworth Road or Westfield Road would meet the criteria for zebra crossings and if not, if any locations qualified for coloured tarmac to enhance visibility.

#### Question raised to Pitstone Parish Council re tidying the Ravensmoor community plots

The two plots that were due to house a children's day-nursery and a restaurant/pub/ café remain undeveloped at present as Nicholas King Homes (NKH) are seeking permission to build further residential properties rather than the promised community facilities. NKH had taken an appeal to the Planning Inspectorate who had agreed that planning permission should be granted for the homes. Buckinghamshire Council has now challenged this decision and the matter is now subject to Judicial Review, so the plots are likely to remain in limbo for some time. The Parish Council has written to NKH, who have agreed to attend site and tidy the two areas.

#### Question raised regarding the possibility of making the Recreation Ground roundabout more attractive

The parish council has been working with Buckinghamshire Council and Marketing Force (who administer the Buckinghamshire Council roundabout sponsorship scheme) for some time. Buckinghamshire Council will not grant permission for the roundabout to be redeveloped to have a planted/grass centre, and it has been frustratingly difficult to get any permission to put planters etc on the roundabout. Our Buckinghamshire Councillors have also been trying to obtain the necessary permissions within BC on our behalf. Marketing Force has agreed that the roundabout could be included within the sponsorship scheme, but this would only provide signage for the sponsor, and they would not install/maintain planters etc so this would not address the issue of aesthetics. If there are any commercial companies that

would be interested in sponsoring the roundabout, they can contact MarketingForce direct via this link: https:// www.marketingforce.co.uk/ In the meantime, a resident has kindly donated and cares for four planters on the roundabout (our thanks are extended to them). We are continuing to work with BC to find a more permanent solution. Our contractor also cleared the roundabout surface of weeds (our thanks are extended to the resident that undertook this work last year), along with the pedestrian island refuges.

### A question was raised re grass cutting at the junction of Glebe Close (Fairhive)

Fairhive have been experiencing difficulties with their grounds maintenance contractors this year. They are aware of the issues and working to resolve them as soon as possible. In the meantime, if there are any areas of Fairhive maintained grass verge in Glebe Close or Yardley Avenue that are getting overgrown, please report them to Fairhive via this link https://www.fairhive.co.uk/contact -us

#### Parish Council delivered services

There were no queries raised with regard to the Parish Council delivered services eg street lighting, play spaces, sports facilities and litter collection, nor the budget. We welcome feedback at any time. If the matter is not something that is within our legal powers to resolve (eg highways issues where the legal duties fall to the highways authority) we will try to escalate the matter with the relevant body.

### Devolved Services from Buckinghamshire Council

BC have reduced their number of urban grass cuts (inside the 30mph zone) to just 2 per annum and rural grass cuts to just once per annum, more information available here: https://www.buckinghamshire.gov.uk/parkingroads-and-transport/grasscutting/. BC had previously devolved power to the Parish

Council to cut most of the grass verges within the 30mph zone on their behalf, which enables us to provide a higher level of service. We are pleased to say that BC has now granted permission for the Parish Council to undertake the grass verge cutting along Westfield Road as well, and this has now been added to our contractors regular schedule. Had this permission not been granted, Westfield Road would only have been cut twice over the course of the year. Buckinghamshire Council still have a legal duty to maintain vision splays at junctions etc and we requested that Vicarage Road/Upper Icknield Way and the pedestrian path to Marsworth are cut. The proposal submitted by Luton Rising is for an expansion of London Luton Airport from its current permitted cap of 18 million passengers per annum (mppa) up to 32 mppa, including: new terminal capacity; additional taxiways and other transport infrastructure; the construction of landside support buildings; surface access adjustments; mitigation works and other associated development.

### Nicholas King Homes development around the Recreation Ground

During late 2021 Nicholas King Homes applied for planning permission for the construction of 21 dwellings (8 flats and 13 houses), including associated works, car parking and landscaping on the two plots of land that had long been earmarked, subject to viability, for a children's day nursery and restaurant/pub/cafe. The Planning Inspectorate have now concluded their investigation and determined that planning permission should be granted. The Parish Council had opposed this application and felt strongly that these much hoped-for community facilities were feasible and should be delivered. Many local residents also objected to the proposals. Buckinghamshire Council, as local planning authority, were also said by

the Inspectorate to be opposed to the application on a variety of grounds. Planning permission was nonetheless, on balance, granted to NKH.

That, however, is not the end of the story. The Parish Council understands that Buckinghamshire Council (in conjunction with other local planning authorities) are challenging the Planning Inspectorate's decision, via a process known as Judicial Review. They will be seeking a court ruling that the Planning Inspectorate was not properly able to reach the decision that it did, in other words asking that the planning permission should be guashed. The grounds for appeal are believed to include the Chiltern Beechwoods "Special Area of Conservation". of which Ashridge forms a part. There is currently a moratorium on determining planning applications which relate to residential development where the application site is within approximately 8 miles of the Chiltern Beechwoods, which Pitstone is. The argument runs, it is understood, that if the local planning authority cannot properly determine any such application, the Planning Inspectorate should not have done so either. Clearly these matters are at a very early stage and the Judicial Review process could be a lengthy one. If the planning permission is then guashed, NKH's application will go back to the original decision-maker for further consideration on the correct basis. That would also be a time-consuming process. As a consequence, it is unlikely that anything substantive will happen to the two undeveloped parts of Ravensmoor for some time. The Parish Council is aware that concerns have been raised by local residents about the state of these two areas, and in particular the amount of unsightly litter and debris that they contain. We have requested that NKH take steps to tidy them up so that our local amenities are not subject to detriment because of the current hiatus. We will provide a further update when we are able to, about both (1) the condition of the two areas and (2) Buckinghamshire Council's appeal against the Planning Inspectorate's decision.

#### Haddenham Electric Vehicle Car Club

Haddenham have introduced a new service where an electric car can be hired by the hour.

This is still very much a trial for them. The scheme needs a solid base of regular hirers to fund the operation, and this seems to be slowly building but they do have a larger population and different demographic to Pitstone. #### **Other updates**

We are in the very early stages of trying to reengage the numerous parties that might be required to investigate/enable a footpath from Westfield Road to College Lake, we are still trying to work with BC to seek bus shelters for Westfield Road and are also trying to reengage various bodies that may be able to assist with the care & maintenance of the Whistlebrook. The council is exploring grant funding opportunities for solar panels for the pavilion. We have no visibility yet from either Trooli or Openreach regarding fibre to property broadband for the village.

#### And an update on local matters

#### Taylor Wimpey, Croudace, Bellway and Nicholas King Homes Developments No further areas of Castlemead have been

adopted by Buckinghamshire Council from

Taylor Wimpey. BC are proposing to upgrade all the adopted lighting columns to LED lanterns before passing maintenance responsibilities to the Parish Council. All other developer sites still fall within the care and maintenance of the respective development companies and have not yet been adopted. Bellway opened discussions with the Parish Council regarding adoption of the play & open space and we are currently considering the materials supplied. Croudace are currently negotiating with Buckinghamshire Council and the Parish Council regarding highways and lighting respectively.

#### Planning

There are several major planning applications for which we are still waiting for Buckinghamshire Council to provide a determination including the Business Park development off Westfield Road, the 5 new dwellings behind 87 Marsworth Road and 1 new dwelling on Marsworth Road. #### Fairhive

We are aware that Fairhive are experiencing issues with the ground maintenance contractors this year, leading to poor levels of grass cutting in Yardley Avenue and Glebe Close. They apologise for this and are working to resolve as soon as they can.

The Parish Council is financially secure with no loans or debts. The majority of our capital projects progress with a high level of external grant funding, thus the rise and fall in receipts corresponds with the rise and fall in capital projects being undertaken.

Our accounts are subject to three layers of audit each year. The first is carried out by council members. The second is conducted by an 'internal auditor' appointed by the Parish Council – IAC Ltd. The parish council and the internal auditor's findings are then submitted to an 'external auditor' appointed to us, in our case PKF Littlejohn. Members of the public can view all audit reports on our website. This report provides a more descriptive narrative, rather than purely financial.

Last financial year the Parish Council installed the long-awaited skate park and delivered some other minor projects, so the total cost of capital projects accounted for £236,298 of the total annual expenditure. This financial year, the capital undertakings have been of lower value, and therefore the total payments for the year have also fallen. Projects included some minor amendments to the pavilion building including the installation of some protective fencing, installation of sound absorbing panels and built-in racking within the container. Two memorial benches were purchased (funded by the respective families), 3 further bins (to help deter littering) and a pencil bollard (approved by Buckinghamshire Council) installed outside Brookmead primary school. Total cost of new assets therefore £11,568.

We made a financial contribution (as did lvinghoe Parish Council) to Buckinghamshire Council for highway safety improvements outside Brookmead primary school. Our share equated to £5,250.

The normal council operations continue, and these receive no external grants, so are funded via the precept (or partially offset via income generated from hire of our facilities or advertising in our magazine). This includes maintaining streetlights, concluding the roll out of LED lanterns, Christmas illuminations, litter picking, emptying dog & litter bins, maintaining play equipment and open spaces, producing Pitstone Parish Post, supporting local community groups with grants, running the Volunteer of the Year Scheme, running the Youth Café and Community Car Scheme, children's competitions, operating our two mVAS units, running the allotment site, maintaining parish assets, and maintaining the pavilion and football pitches. Last financial year we were fortunate enough not to need to carry out any pitch renovation works due to the impact of the building works and covid restrictions on the football clubs, but this requirement returned during the 2022-23 year.

In line with the above, the capital projects delivered last financial year generated £212,225 of grant and Section 106 receipts (these are funds provided by residential developers towards specific projects within the parish). This year, there was just the final Section 106 contribution of £4,204 towards the Skate Park. We also received the funding from the two families for their respective memorial benches and a donation of £1,500 towards the Community Car Scheme from the family of a previous client. The previous year we received an £8k covid grant towards loss of income arising from covid restrictions preventing hires, that was not replicated this year.

#### **Devolved Services**

The Parish Council undertakes some right of way maintenance, grass verge cutting and siding out on behalf of Buckinghamshire Council (BC) under powers they have devolved to us for these purposes. They pay a contribution of £3,659 towards the delivery of these services, which cost the parish £5,050 to deliver. However, it does mean that our grass can be cut more frequently, works carried out more efficiently, and we have more control over delivery of these services. Due to complications arising from changing their Highways Contractors, Bucking-hamshire Council extended the last contract for a further year to cover 2023, but have yet to confirm what, or if, there will be a devolved service offering for 2024 onwards.

As a follow up, in 2022 Buckinghamshire Council declined to devolve powers to the Parish Council to cut the grass verge along Westfield Road when they adopted it from Taylor Wimpey, however in June 2023 they granted permission (but not funding) and this has now been added to the schedules for our own contractors.

### **Ongoing Projects by Other Bodies/Tiers of Government**

- Hertfordshire County Council continues to work with the Canal & River Trust and Buckinghamshire Council to specify possible cycle route improvements towards Tring station. All roadside options tested failed the required safety audits so a direct straight-line cycle/ pedestrian route along Northfield Road was deemed unviable. They are now concentrating on possible improvements to the route via Marshcroft Lane and the canal.
- Buckinghamshire Council continues to work with developers (Taylor Wimpey, Croudace, Nicholas King Homes and Bellway) to fulfil their highway and leisure obligations including the issues surrounding the multi-use games area.
- The Chiltern's Beechwoods in Ashridge were designated a Special Area of Conservation (SAC) as they are of European importance. This gives rise to mitigation measures that must be put in place to protect them from over-use. Local Planning Authorities are working to establish what these mitigation measures may look like, and this means that planning applications for new residential dwellings are taking longer to determine.
- We are waiting for the new Buckinghamshire Council Community Board brief and their new Highways Contracts to become established, to find out how BC, and both Pitstone and Ivinghoe Parish Councils, can move forward with other aspects of the Safety Scheme.

#### Council pledges commitment to providing high quality education for all children in Bucks

Whatever their starting point, children and young people have the right to access the best quality education and teaching to help them grow, learn and develop so they are able to realise their full potential. That is the commitment Buckinghamshire Council is making to all children and families in the county as it launches it's new Education Strategy.

The Education Strategy sets out five key priorities:

- Access to and availability of high-quality educational places
- Preparing young learners to reach their potential as adults
- Collaborative school improvement to raise standards

• Embedding a climate of inclusion Supporting the emotional health and wellbeing of all children and young people It follows on from the previous Education & Skills Strategy which focused on the development of a programme of continuous improvement in education provision in Buckinghamshire. The new strategy builds on the achievements made and focuses on areas where more work needs to be done. In compiling the strategy, the council worked closely with schools and other education providers and consulted with parents, carers and other key stakeholders.

One of the key elements of the strategy is ensuring that every child is able to access the right educational placement and teaching for them, and that vulnerable children and young people are given the support they need to overcome challenges and achieve the same outcomes as their peers.

#### Bucks resident pays the price for flytipping

A man from Gerrards Cross has learned the hard way that crime doesn't pay after being caught fly-tipping and faced with a hefty fine. Jonathas Da Rocha Souza, aged 45, pleaded guilty to the charge of illegal dumping when he appeared at High Wycombe Magistrates Court on 7 June 2023.

The court was informed that on 12 May 2022, an enforcement officer working for Buckinghamshire Council, discovered a pile of illegally dumped waste in a lay-by on Layters Green Lane, Chalfont St Peter in Buckinghamshire. After further investigation, the source of the waste was identified and the suspected person responsible was reported to the local authority. Mr Souza was later interviewed by Council Enforcement Officers. During the interview, Mr Souza confessed to accepting £30 to remove the waste which he later illegally dumped.

Magistrates fined Mr Souza £1,384 and ordered him to pay clean-up and prosecution costs of £1,010.62. A victim surcharge of £138 was also levied – making a total to pay of £2,532.62

#### Supporting adopters every step of the way

### Play Streets scheme encourages children to discover the joys of outdoor play

Children across Buckinghamshire are being given the opportunity to discover the joys of playing safely outside their homes as part of the Play Streets scheme.

The free scheme invites neighbours to apply for permission to close their road for a few hours at a time so that communities can come together, and children can meet up and have fun outdoors.

Following the successful launch last year, particular focus is being placed on encouraging communities within the targeted areas outlined in the council's Opportunity Bucks programme, in High Wycombe, Aylesbury and Chesham, to take advantage of the scheme, but communities all across the county can take part.

### Electoral Registration – are your details up to date?

Buckinghamshire residents are being urged to ensure their electoral registration details are up to date through the annual canvass. All residents will be contacted during July and August, and will receive an email or a letter from Buckinghamshire Council asking to confirm that the names of people listed as eligible to vote in their household are correct.

Being on the electoral register means that you can have your say and vote in future elections – plus it can also help with your credit rating. All you need to do is to read the email or letter carefully and follow the instructions on how to respond, if necessary. It's very quick and easy! If you're not currently registered, your name will not appear on the messages we send. If you want to register this can be done as part of the canvass (a followup step is required).

### Aylesbury Arm canal towpath benefits from £800k improvements

The Aylesbury Arm, a spur of the Grand Union Canal originally completed in 1815, has seen a significant improvement in its towpath condition, thanks to a £800k investment. The towpath improvements are on the section between locks 15 and 16, resulting in improved conditions for walking, cycling and wheeling.

The Aylesbury Arm canal towpath improvements – which have been made possible thanks to a £621,846 grant from the Housing Infrastructure Fund (HIF) from Homes England and £178,154 of funding from Section 106 developer contributions – are part of wider plans for active travel improvements in Aylesbury and form a main spine route between the town centre and the new developments of Kingsbrook and Woodlands. Improvements for walking, cycling and wheeling include:

- widening the towpath to 7 feet
- resurfacing the towpath
- improving accessibility onto the towpath

• installing new signs along the route. The improvements aim to encourage active travel, improve people's health, and reduce carbon and air pollution.

The new route forms part of the council's aspirations for a 'Aylesbury-Tring-Wendover Canal Triangle' project and the wider Aylesbury Garden Town initiative.

### Celebrating 70 years of safer school crossings

Over the years, thousands of children across Buckinghamshire have enjoyed a safer journey walking to school, thanks predominantly, to the efforts of the county's much loved school crossing patrollers who this week celebrate their 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary. Buckinghamshire currently has around 50 school crossing patrollers, commonly known as lollipop men and women due to the iconic circular signs on poles they carry when on duty, working across all parts of the county. Every morning and evening during term time, come rain or shine, they are out, guiding children, parents and carers safely across the road to and from school.

To celebrate the 70-year milestone and to say thank you to all school crossing patrollers, past and present,

Buckinghamshire Council hosted a special event in High Wycombe on 29 June.

The national school crossing patrol service was officially created by the School Crossing Patrol Act in 1953. The first SCPs wore white coats and peaked hats. Over the years the clothing has changed to more weather-proof, hi-vis jackets and hats, but the popular lollipop signs have remained, relatively unchanged and become synonymous with the popular and much-loved image of school crossing patrollers countrywide. Buckinghamshire's school crossing patrollers collectively have many interesting and amusing tales to tell of their time in the job. Christine Walker is the county's longest service patroller, clocking up 45 years. She received a British Empire Medal (BEM) in 2021 for her long service to road safety and has attended two Royal Garden Parties. All the patrollers build up a unique relationship with local families. One school crossing patroller called Mario is affectionally known as Super Mario by the children who greet him fondly every day. One thing all the patrollers clearly have in common is their love of the iob with all of them saying how rewarding they find the role.

### CELEBRATING 75 YEARS OF THE NHS



5 July 2023 marks 75 years of the National Health Service. Treating over a million people a day in England, the NHS touches all our lives. When it was founded in 1948, the NHS was the first universal health system to be available to all, free at the point of delivery. Today, 9 in 10 people agree that healthcare should be free of charge, more than 4 in 5 agree that care should be available to everyone, and that the NHS makes them most proud to be British. Since 1948, the NHS has evolved and adapted to meet the needs of each successive generation - from Britain's first heart transplant in 1968, to Europe's first liver transplant the same year. From the world's first CT scan on a patient in 1971 (revolutionising the way doctors examine the body), to the world's first test-tube baby born in 1978. Large-scale vaccination programmes protected children from whooping cough, measles and tuberculosis, and in 1999 the meningitis C vaccine was offered nationally in a world first. The NHS has delivered huge medical advances, including the world's first liver, heart and lung transplant in 1987, pioneering new treatments, such as bionic eyes and, the world's first rapid whole genome sequencing service for seriously ill babies and children.

During the pandemic, having a single national health service enabled us to carry out research at an unprecedented scale and find the world's first effective treatment for COVID-19, dexamethasone, making it available across every hospital the same day it was approved. It enabled us to not just deliver the first accredited COVID-19 vaccine in the world but to rollout the NHS vaccine programme with a combination of speed and precision unseen elsewhere.

#### **Transforming the NHS**

The NHS is now a leader in adopting innovative medicines, with industry data showing there are 5 treatments available in England for every 4 in Europe, as well as almost a third more cancer drugs. In 2022, robotics systems have helped to treat patients with prostate cancer and get them back to their homes less than 24 hours after surgery, we saw the first new treatment for sickle cell disease in over two decades, and the 100th cancer drug was fast tracked to patients through the NHS Cancer Drugs Fund.

#### Integrating health and care

We also set up integrated care systems across England, bringing health and care organisations together to address health inequalities and plan services to better meet the needs of our patients. These local health and care services are designing new proactive models of care, improving health and wellbeing today and for future generations.

#### Innovating for future generations

As we look ahead, embracing innovation is critical in enabling the NHS model to deliver better outcomes for our growing population. That means using IT and data more effectively; integrating health and social care; getting better at preventing illness, not just treating it; and speeding up the introduction of 21<sup>st</sup> century genomics-based medicine. Innovating for future generations also means developing new services, such as becoming the first country in the world to

launch clinical training in perinatal mental health using extended reality (XR) technology. More than 100,000 patients have been treated in NHS virtual wards in the last year for conditions such as frailty and acute respiratory infection - that's around the same number of patients who had a hip replacement last year in England. None of this innovation would be possible without the skill and expertise of NHS staff, volunteers and our partners in the social care sector. From the midwives who help bring us into the world, the GPs and pharmacists who are our first port of call when we are sick, the nurses, doctors and other clinicians who care for us in our time of need, the porters and cleaners who keep our hospitals moving, and the hundreds of thousands of dedicated staff and volunteers in between – our people are the driving force in helping us do this. From the day it launched, the NHS has relied on staff from across the world – from the Windrush Generation of 1948 to today's workforce, represented by over 200 nationalities.

The NHS is committed to transforming services, delivering for patients and better understanding the local populations we serve. We know we have much to do, but through modernising our outpatient services, rolling out new proactive and preventative models of care, and creating a sustainable system for the future, we will ensure the NHS continues to be the healthcare envy of the world.

We extend our thanks to all the residents who work within the NHS.

### CRICKET LOVELY CRICKET Klaus Ginda

In 1939 Pitstone's population was under 600, villagers conversed in rural accents that would soon be lost while the country lived first under the threat of war and then the announcement of hostilities.

Tony Puddefoot, a well known character who had some success playing for the village cricket team post war, told me that in the 1930's scenes in a feature film had been filmed on the Recreation Ground showing shots of a cricket match. I contacted the **British Film Institution** and asked if they could identify the film in question simply stating that it included a cricket match played on our Recreation Ground. Tony was on the ball, they replied that the film named simply **Inquest** was made in 1939 by film-makers John and Roy Boulting. The twins were born in 1913 at Bray in Berkshire but by the Census of 1939 their parents were shown as living at The Green in Pitstone:

The brothers career together spanned some twenty-seven years, amounting to sixty films including 1947's Brighton Rock written by Berkhamsted's Graham Greene starring Richard Attenborough and 1959's I'm All Right Jack a film comedy that boosted the career of it's star Peter Sellars.

The **BFI** were helpful and kind enough to invite me to view the film at their new London headquarters. An offer I never took up because they thought I was a young eager film student rather than someone at the other end of the spectrum. Years went by, their email remained in my follow file, when by chance, last year, I was able to view the film on Talking Pictures TV (Freeview Channel 82). After screening by TPTV their films are accessible for some time on a sister service, which requires registration by the user, called TPTVENCORE, it may still be available to view, otherwise is worth looking out for when it is next scheduled on our TV screens.

The film shows spectators - mainly children and the elderly accompanied by their dogs. The Memorial Hall, in use till the 1970's is recognisable to all who stepped through it's doors during the fifty years it served the community as a cinema, theatre, scout hut etc. Those of a certain age may be able to identify family and characters who made an uncredited appearance in the film.

Also included was a short clip of lvinghoe showing a car, involved in the film's plot, turning from the High Street down past the exterior of the King's Head with it's Benskins pub sign. A lone dark haired women is pictured walking up Station Road. At this time were the villagers who seemed carefree, on a bright summers day living under the threat of war or had war already been declared, shots on celluloid soon superseded by the sound of real bullets in the theatre of war?

One of the ladies who showed interest at the stall visited our WI for our June meeting.

Our June talk was given by Daphne Preece and featured Claydon House today. The house was built on a 5 acre patch of land acquired by Sir Ralph Verney, Lord Mayor of London in 1463. He leased it to Roger Giffard who built the Tudor Manor House. There are still some beams from this original building which are part of the house that exists today. Sir Edward Verney who was chief standard bearer to King Charles 1 was the next owner of this house and it remained in the Verney/Calvert family until 1956 when Claydon was given to the National Trust. The very wealthy 2nd Earl Verney, Ralph inherited the house in 1753 and began building the extension Party House He hired Luke Lightfoot a stone Mason who did all the renovations. Luke Lightfoot used carved wood to decorate ceilings and walls. The result was breathtaking. However he fell out with the Earl and was replaced by Sir Thomas Robinson who preferred plasterwork and neoclassical work. Examples of this can also be found at the house. Before he left, Luke Lightfoot completed the magnificent wooden staircase which is known as the singing staircase due to the ears of corn within it. The Earl died childless and in debt. His niece inherited the House and to her credit Mary, Baroness of Fermanagh turned the debt around. She also died childless and the house went to her half sister who was a Calvert. Every Calvert who subsequently inherited the house changed their name to Verney.

Sir Harry Calvert married the sister of Florence Nightingale, Parthenope. Her dowry was used in the remodelling of the house and Sir Harry bought a carpet for £100 which is still there today! Between 1820 and 1910 Florence Nightingale visited Claydon House many times. During the Second World War the house was home to 2 schools and in 1956 conservation work commenced when the house was signed over to the National Trust. During COVID the staff/volunteers made a quilt for Florence Nightingale's bed as a record of both her and the pandemic. The Verney family finally moved out of their apartment in 2019. Several films have also been made there including Far from the Madding Crowd which was released in 2015. We all agreed that Claydon House, which is on our doorstep is well worth a visit. A very interesting talk.

With the start of our new membership year our interest groups continue but with some evolving into a new style. The Random Readers now meet in the library on the first Wednesday evening of the month. Members bring books they have read and give a brief synopsis without giving the story away. They then swop books. There is a small charge to cover the cost of the hire of the library. The Craft Group continues to be a popular group and in April made beautiful button cards. This was followed by trendy bracelets made out of leather and beads in May and for June they are planning to meet twice so that they can make pottery trinket dishes decorated with Mandala painting. Our newly named Social Club replaces our Supper Club. This new group will meet up once a month to visit different venues and suggestions were asked for at the April meeting. This looks like an exciting new opportunity for members who can decide on a much wider choice of venues. The first outing was to Waterperry nursery and garden which they all enjoyed and a few plants were purchased along the way. In June some of the group had a pleasant walk around Wilstone reservoir before meeting other members for a coffee and catch up. It was lovely to catch up with friends outside in the relaxed setting of P E Meads garden and the coffee and tea was spot on. Knit and Natter continue to meet weekly and our helping put together the knitted squares for blankets for Ukraine which will be shipped to Ukraine in June. The Walking Group completed the Aldbury round walk which included views of the beautiful bluebells of Ashridge. The members enjoyed a 10 mile walk which left them a bit stiff and tired but nothing that a good soak in a hot bath couldn't sort out.

We will be running a bottle Tombola at the Village Fete on lyinghoe Lawn on 8th July and will be having our annual outing in August. Next month our speaker will be Leslie Grout on St George's Chapel. This is an open meeting so please contact us on the email below if you would like to come to this interesting talk. Other events to look forward to include a talk on volunteering in Cambodia in September which is again an open meeting and in October we have a talk on the history of famous jewels. November will be an evening of crafts and in December we have our Christmas celebrations. #### ... Bright and beautiful

In the last issue, we called for volunteers to help show visitors the Windmill. It's not too late – **please email ashridge@nationaltrust.org.uk or ring 01442 851227**. Those who do will be able to show off the new tail wheel. It had to go to a specialist wheelwright to be completely rebuilt using traditional methods. Only the metal rim has been retained. Such a lot of craftsmanship was involved that it took three months. The roundhouse roof has also been repaired and retarred. The remaining work, painting the mill body and roof plus repairs to the timber of the sails, will be happening soon.

#### ... Creatures great and small

Breeding bird surveys on Northchurch Common are underway for the first time since 2018 and reflect changes since the habitat has been managed to allow more scrub to grow up. There has been a welcome increase in Yellowhammers and Linnets in the scrubby areas (both on the Red List of birds of conservation concern in the

UK) as well as Whitethroats and Garden Warblers (both visitors from Africa, returning to the UK for summer to breed).

In contrast, a great deal of scrub has been cleared from lvinghoe Beacon hills. This should help the rare Duke of Burgundy butterfly to thrive and spread.
