Memorial Bench

Christmas Lights



We hope that all our residents enjoyed the festive illuminations at the Recreation Ground and Pavilion. As the cherry tree that used to house the lights at the pavilion had sadly needed to

be felled during the year, we opted for column mounted panels combined with our existing string lights. Feedback from residents and hirers has been very positive.

Buckinghamshire Council Street Lights

Buckinghamshire Council worked hard to try and catch up on the backlog of outstanding street light remedials in the village. By the end of October all the columns along Westfield Road were operational except 2 that had UK Power Network faults that had to be rectified before BC could return to complete their works. Since that point, several have developed new faults, and been fixed again so on 21/12/23 all streetlights along Westfield Road were operational with the exception of one on the corner of Warwick Road. By 31/12 3 further lights had gone out, which had been fixed on the next check on 4/1/24 (the one on the corner of Warwick Road remained out). but 3 different lights had then gone out, all were reported to BC. These are all old

lighting stock so will be subject to ongoing issues. The Parish Council has been pushing for them to be upgraded to LED in line with

the rest of our village and BC's own policies, and Taylor Wimpey provided Buckinghamshire Council with some funding. Along Marsworth Road, the illuminated bollards were all fixed, but some are now out again, but the illuminated directional arrow signs on the islands required some replacement parts that will be installed upon receipt. BC continue to experience some issues with the reliability of some of the main lanterns along the road, but they did fix many of the long outstanding issues. BC Lighting are also working on the replacement of the signage & illumination at the Westfield Road roundabout following a traffic accident. BC no longer monitor any of their lights, they solely rely on reports being uploaded to their Fix My Street portal on their website. The Parish Council, and a team of volunteers, do monitor lights and we upload reports to the BC portal on a regular basis. If you spot a light that is not operational, or is flashing, or is on when it should not be, please let us know by emailing parishclerk@pitstone.co.uk or log it direct to the BC website. If you would like to join our team of street light champions and check the lights near you, please email parishclerk@pitstone.co.uk.

Would you use a footpath between Westfield Road and College Lake?

A few residents have enquired whether a path along this route would be possible. Initial enquiries with adjacent landowners have shown that any such path would need to run within the verge, besides the carriageway, rather than being set back through the woodland. Buckinghamshire Council's Community Board has advised that such a path would not qualify for grant funding via the Board, so would need to be funded locally or via grants from other sources, if any are



identified. Before any investigative work can be undertaken by the Highways Authority, we would need to assess how many people already walk this route, how many would utilise such a path, where you are trying to access, what other routes you currently use, and whether residents feel that this would be a good use of Local Council tax funds. If you have any views, for or against, please complete the online survey at https:// pitstone.co.uk/path-to-college-lake/ by the end of February. If you do not have computer access and would prefer a hard copy, please telephone 767261 and we will happily provide a printed version. Buckinghamshire Council has advised that it will be consulting in 2024 on its Local Cycling & Walking Infrastructure Plan (LCWIP) so if you are keen to see such a path installed, please keep your eyes out for that consultation and make sure you have your say.

Do you experience any problems crossing Westfield Road?

At the Annual Assembly a resident enquired whether Westfield Road qualified for zebra crossings. Buckinghamshire Council's Community Board has advised that crossings would not qualify for grant funding via the Board nor BC, so would need to be funded locally or via grants from other sources, if any are identified. Before any investigative work can be undertaken by the Highways Authority, we would need to assess how many people experience difficulty crossing Westfield Road, how long you have to wait before a clear gap becomes available, where along the road you are crossing, where you are trying to reach, how many people would benefit/use a crossing, and whether residents feel that this would be a good use of Local Council tax funds. If you have any views, for or against, please complete the online survey at https:// pitstone.co.uk/westfield-road-crossing/ by the end of February. If you do not have computer access and would prefer a hard copy please phone 767261 and we will happily provide a printed version.

Another resident enquired whether the pedestrian refuge islands along Marsworth Road could be upgraded to zebra crossings. The Highways Authority advise that the low wait time and clear visibility at these locations had identified refuge islands as the most appropriate type of pedestrian crossings for these locations. There are proposals within the Pitstone Safety Scheme to try and enhance their prominence, and reduce traffic speeds, via the use of coloured tarmac at crossings and median strips. Phase I of the safety scheme was installed outside Brookmead School in 2023. Buckinghamshire Council are currently reviewing Section 106 funds they are holding towards Safety Scheme works and whether the next phase of Safety Scheme implementation can progress to the next phase.

Westfield Road Bus Shelters

We continue to liaise with Buckinghamshire Council regarding the possibility of bus shelters for Westfield Road. They have now confirmed that no funding is available from either Buckinghamshire Council Public Transport or the Community Board, so these will need to be funded locally via the precept. There are a number of steps that would need to be completed before we can obtain their final approval on the design (particularly as they'd sit next to the cycle path) and get permission to carry out minor works to their highway verge to install them, so this may take some time yet.

Anti-Social Behaviour

On a sadder note, we continue to experience vandalism to the play equipment on the Recreation Ground and have received one report of anti-social behaviour near the Skate Park. If you do witness any anti-social behaviour, please report it to our neighbourhood policing team at Thames Valley Police by emailing greatbrickhillwingivinghoenhpt@thamesvalley. pnn.police.uk and providing details of the people/vehicles etc involved and the date/time that it was witnessed. This enables them to speak to offenders (if known) and better target their patrol activity.

New Curtains at Pitstone Memorial Hall

The Parish Council was pleased to supply a grant to Pitstone Memorial Hall Charity for the supply and installation of new curtains in the main hall, to provide improved acoustic and black out qualities, which will benefit many hirers and enable the Pitstone Picturehouse



(previously Pitstone Film Club) to resume. The curtains were supplied by Panache Interiors at cost, so thank you to this local company for their support of a local

Keeping roads safe this winter

When temperatures plummet, Buckinghamshire Council's trusty fleet of gritters roll into action, salting key roads across the county, to make them safer for motorists. But did you know that the council also provides salt bins for people to freely use to make their roads and pavements safer during cold and icy weather? The bins are filled with salt and are available at multiple locations across the county for drivers and pedestrians to treat public roads and pavements in their local area. The bins are filled and topped up during the winter season with a mixture of salt and sand. They are located in targeted areas known to be affected by icy conditions which the gritting routes do not cover. Salt bins are provided for residents to use on public roads and footways only and should not be used to clear private drives.

Changes to household DIY waste disposal due from 31 December

Residents in Buckinghamshire will be able to dispose of small amounts of DIY waste for free at Household Recycling Centres (HRCs) from 31 December 2023. The changes have been brought in by Central Government and will make it easier for people to freely dispose of small amounts of waste created at home from DIY projects such as re-tiling, renovating a bathroom or digging a pond in the garden. Buckinghamshire Council's Cabinet voted in favour of necessary changes to the council's Waste Access & Acceptance Policy which sets out rules and procedures for the county's 10 HRCs, to reflect the new legislation. Following the change in law regarding the disposal of household DIY waste, the council is reintroducing a digital e-permit for DIY waste. From 31 December, any resident wanting to dispose of household DIY waste at a HRC will need to have an e-permit printed out or on a portable device, such as a mobile phone or tablet before they visit. This only affects residents who wish to bring household DIY waste. The DIY e-permit will allow residents to dispose of one load of DIY waste each week for free. One load of DIY waste is no more than 100 litres of loose DIY waste, or one large item no bigger than 2m x 0.75m x 0.7m such as one bathtub, one door or one kitchen unit. Staff will scan the permit and check the residents address, after which the e-permit will expire. It can be renewed after seven days, to allow residents to dispose of another load of DIY waste for free. Anyone wishing to dispose of more than one load of DIY waste in a week will be able to do so but will be charged, using the same price list which has been in place for the past four years.

Council enforces higher penalties for fly-tipping in Bucks

Those caught fly-tipping in Buckinghamshire face the consequence of paying a higher penalty for their crime following changes to the law which have been adopted by the council. Earlier this year the government increased the maximum Fixed Penalty Notice (FPN) for fly-tipping from £400 to £1,000. The penalty for Failure in Householder Duty of Care, has also been

raised from £400 to a maximum of £600. This penalty relates to people who have waste removed by a third-party waste carrier. By law householders have a duty to check that the carrier they are using is legally authorised to carry out the work and will do so responsibly. If the waste they have given the carrier is found dumped illegally, the householder is deemed to have failed in their Duty of Care regarding their waste and can be liable for prosecution. Buckinghamshire Council's Cabinet today voted in favour of amending local policies to reflect the changes, bringing in powers to enforce the highest rate for FPNs for those caught breaking the law in this way. FPNs are generally used for smaller scale offences and avoid court proceedings and a criminal record. However where possible the council will always seek to impose the maximum penalty and for larger scale or more serious offences the defendant may be summoned to court where fines are set by magistrates and can result in custodial sentences and costs totalling thousands of pounds.

Coming soon to the Aylesbury area - buses on demand

People in the area surrounding Aylesbury will have an exciting new choice of how to travel by public transport after Buckinghamshire Council is set to partner with WeMove to launch a 'demand responsive' bus service. The three-year trial follows the successful introduction of a similar scheme in Wycombe earlier last year, which has already proved so popular that it has expanded to new areas to meet demand. The new service is part of a pilot scheme funded by the Government's Rural Mobility Fund and covers a specific geographical area, enabling passengers to request a pick up from one of the fully accessible minibuses at a convenient nearby 'virtual bus stop' as the buses travel through their area. The areas covered by the service include Aston Clinton, Weston Turville, Halton, Hartwell, Stoke Mandeville, Bishopstone and Weedon. The service will drop off passengers anywhere within the operational area, which includes Stoke Mandeville Hospital, Aylesbury town centre and the railway stations at Aylesbury, Aylesbury Vale Parkway, Stoke Mandeville and Wendover.

Get better health and wellbeing with BetterPoints

Buckinghamshire Council is reminding residents that there is no better time to get active with BetterPoints. The free health and wellbeing app has been helping thousands of people in the county to move more and make simple but effective lifestyle changes to improve their health and wellbeing. Now could be the perfect time for new users to start as a range of extra incentives have recently been added. BetterPoints is an easy-to-use mobile app that motivates users to be more active and offers incentives in the form of points which can then be converted into vouchers to spend in local shops or given to local charities as a monetary donation. Since the initiative launched earlier this year, more than 2000 residents in Bucks have downloaded the app and been using it, earning points when they walk, cycle, run or visit a leisure centre. The simple tool encourages people to make healthier lifestyle choices to boost their health and wellbeing. Extra points are on offer for residents who would like to lose weight or give up smoking when they access support via Be Healthy Bucks. Be Healthy Bucks is Buckinghamshire's free health and wellbeing service to help residents make small changes to lead a healthy life. They offer stop smoking support, healthy weight programmes, NHS health checks and support to cut down on alcohol.

David started his football journey in 1957, joining Pitstone & Ivinghoe FC as a 16 year old. In those days he was a fast running young forward in the football club with a fierce shot. The club were playing in the West Herts League. Wiggy was soon to get his first medal and honour when Pitstone won the West Herts Challenge Trophy in the 57/58 season.

David was a regular in the team until he met and married Sue, they moved in with Sue's parents in Dunstable and as Wig did not drive he decided to play for Waterlows in Dunstable, his works team. Not long after David and Sue moved back to Pitstone and he rejoined the village team. More cups and league wins followed during Wigs time as a player. He played in the various local leagues, West Herts Premier League and Aylesbury District League. David

was instrumental in helping the club gain admission into the Spartan South Midlands league in 1977 which is part of the National pyramid system.

David had been at the club carrying on as a player, Club Chairman, Secretary, and committee member. He put his heart and soul into the running of the club and was rewarded with league and club honours throughout his career. A real clubman and stalwart. Not many clubs can boast of a club legend lasting 66 years at a club beside Pitstone and lvinghoe.

Wiggy will be missed by all at the club, his memory will live on. The photograph shows the Club holding one minutes silence in his memory.

I and Jay Adlem played with David in the early 60s and Wig was certainly a great character on and off the pitch, an avid singer and dancer at club functions, and one lasting memory would be of Wig dancing with Sue with his shirt hanging out, singing along to Elvis!

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IVINGHOE AND PITSTONE WI Kay Ison

Our WI has had a busy 3 months. In the October meeting we had a presentation on "Famous Jewels and Their History" by Peter Hague. The talk was mainly about the famous jewels that belong to our Royal family and how they were obtained and who wore them. We learned that in 1671 'Colonel' Thomas Blood was caught trying to steal the Crown Jewels. He had fallen out with Charles II who confiscated his lands in Ireland, After Blood was captured Charles II was so impressed with his audacity he gave him a job, a pension and returned his lands in Ireland. Who says crime doesn't pay! Peter also told us stories of some of the tiaras worn by the late Queen and her sister Margaret. The Vladimir Tiara was a favourite with the Queen and came from Russia. The Queen also wore George IV State Diadem when posing for her image on the Roval Mail postage stamps. Princess Margaret wore the Paltimore Tiara on her wedding day. She bought it for five and a half thousand pounds. A great investment as it is now worth one and a half million pounds. One of the Queen Mother's friends, Mrs Ronald Greville was an avid collector of jewellery. When she died she bequeathed her jewellery to the Queen Mother including the Honeycomb Tiara and the Festoon necklace. The ruby necklace that graced Kate Middleton's neck and the emerald and diamond tiara worn by Eugenie are other examples of the collection. Other famous iewels talked about included the Peregrina Pearl which was bought by Richard Burton and gifted to Elizabeth Taylor on their first marriage. When they got married for the second time, Richard Burton gave Elizabeth Taylor the Burton-Taylor Diamond. Following their divorce Elizabeth had the diamond auctioned and built a hospital for the needy with the proceeds. Peter finished with a final story regarding the brooch Queen Elizabeth II wore when she met Donald Trump. The brooch had been gifted to her by Michelle and Barack Obama! A Helping Hand for an Endangered Bird

Several National Trust tenants have joined forces with volunteers from the Bucks Bird Club to start a conservation project for one of the most endangered birds on the estate – the Corn Bunting. This is a farmland bird which nests on the ground, often in arable crops, on the chalky soils around lvinghoe Beacon. In the winter Corn Buntings join mixed flocks with other farmland birds and seek out seeds to keep themselves fed.

Bucks Bird Club have generously funded the provision of seed to four farmers so that they can provide additional winter food to help see the birds through 'the hungry gap'

when seeds and insects are difficult to find. Bird Club volunteers are carrying out weekly surveys throughout the winter to collect more information about the populations of farmland birds on the estate, particularly Corn Bunting numbers and distribution.

Members of the Tring Bird Ringing Group have also volunteered to help with surveys and are hoping to be able to track birds through the landscape by fitting small, coloured rings to their legs. This would enable individual birds to be observed from a distance to help understand how far they travel, both during the breeding season and during winter. It would also help to understand how long the birds live, and how many chicks individual birds are able to rear each year.

This is the start of a project that will provide useful information about these rare farmland birds, and it will be used to put in place measures to help their numbers go from strength to strength. 

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
