Consultations

Thank you to everyone that completed the recent consultations. We'll provide you with an analysis of the responses received in the next edition of the magazine.

Westfield Road Bus Shelters

We are pleased to say that Buckinghamshire Council has now granted permission for the bus shelters. The Parish Council has accrued sufficient funds to install two, on the residential side of the road. We are also working with Safran to install a third shelter outside their site. We'll keep residents updated once we have the details confirmed, surveys undertaken and have an installation date.

Vacancies

Thank you to everyone who expressed an interest in the litter picking role. We're currently holding interviews

and will update everyone in the next edition of the magazine. We still have a voluntary vacancy for a Parish Councillor to serve out the remaining term until the elections in May next year. If you are interested in becoming a councillor, please email parishclerk@pitstone.co.uk.

Swedish Whitebeam

Sadly, our most recent tree risk inspection report, has advised that the Swedish Whitebeam between the skate park and the ball court needs to be felled as it has rotted at the base and thus could pose a danger. Contractors are being engaged and you will see them on the Recreation Ground in due course.

Fibre to Property Broadband

Many of you will be pleased to know that Trooli has now started offering superfast broadband via fibre to property for a number of roads in the village, and should be rolling out to the remainder shortly. Still no further updates from Openreach.

Dog Fouling

We've recently seen another uplift in the number of full carrier bags of dog fouling left next to/on top of the dog bins. This often blocks the bins so they can't be used for their intended use, which is to accommodate individual dog bags arising from fouling during the dogs walk. Those left on the ground, often end up ripped open and the contents spread around the path. Please remember that dog fouling generated at your home address should be bagged and then put into your green lid general refuse bin. It is then taken to Greatmoor Energy from Waste where it is incinerated to generate energy.




Pitstone Development Area

Nicholas King Homes had appealed to the Planning Inspectorate in relation to their application for 21 dwellings (8 flats and 13 houses) on the two remaining areas of their site by the Recreation Ground. These plots had originally be intended as a children's day nursery and a café/restaurant/pub. The Planning Inspectorate initially found in Nicholas King Homes favour, but this was challenged by Buckinghamshire Council at Judicial Review and referred back to the Planning Inspectorate for reconsideration. Their appeal has now been rejected by the Planning Inspectorate on the grounds that the application lacks suitable mitigation in respect of the Chiltern Beechwoods Special Area of Conservation requirement for Suitable Alternative Natural Greenspace (SANG). Two other applications by Nicholas King Homes, one in respect of each of the two plots, are still awaiting determination by Buckinghamshire Council.

Roofing company pays high price in court

A roofing and building company who failed to carry out proper checks on a 'man with a van' who offered to dispose of trade waste for them has paid a high price for its error after being prosecuted in court. Highlife Roofing and Builders Ltd pleaded guilty to the offence of failing in its duty of care when transferring waste to a waste remover when appearing at High Wycombe Magistrates Court on Wednesday 21 February 2024. The court heard that on 18 July 2023, mixed building waste, including black sacks and wooden material, was found dumped at Holtspur Lane, Wooburn Green in Buckinghamshire. An officer from Buckinghamshire Council's Waste Enforcement Team investigated and found evidence amongst the dumped waste, giving an address in The Green, Wooburn Green, High Wycombe. The details were later traced back to a company called Highlife Roofing and Builders Ltd, who explained they were approached by a man with a van who offered to remove waste from a property. The man took the waste which was later found dumped just down the road from where it had been collected. Highlife Roofing and Builders Ltd workers admitted they saw the waste dumped the next day but explained they didn't pick it back up as it was 'no longer their problem'. Magistrates at High Wycombe Magistrates' Court fined Highlife Roofing and Builders Ltd £6,000 and ordered the company to pay a contribution of £1,289.71 towards the council's clean up and investigation costs – making a total to pay of £7.289.71.

New library collections will provide invaluable resource for families with children

A new range of books covering topics around parenting, childhood and childcare are now available for loan at two libraries in Buckinghamshire. Parenting and Childcare Topics (PACT) is a unique collection of 170 different books designed to help parents and carers of children and young people to navigate a variety of topics from pregnancy, to dealing with complex emotions and situations, right up to approaching university. The books cover everything from general parenting tips to specific situations such as being separated parents or caring for a child with special educational needs and disabilities. Many of the books are written directly for adults, but a number are also written for the children and young people, including books around bullying and puberty. A variety of books on the topics of parenting and childcare are already available across all libraries in Buckinghamshire but the enhanced PACT series has been introduced in two of the biggest libraries as an additional resource, with the support of local business, Limitless Tutoring, who have sponsored the collections.

Creating an age friendly Buckinghamshire for all

Buckinghamshire Council has outlined its commitment to helping older people live healthy, active and independent lives as set out in its Healthy Ageing Strategy. The document sets out the vision for how Buckinghamshire aspires to be a place for all residents to enjoy growing older in an age friendly community. The strategy also includes an action plan of how the vision will be achieved. Angela Macpherson, Cabinet Member for Health and Wellbeing explained: "Healthy ageing means living a healthy and fulfilling life, being able to participate in activities

and contribute to your community. It also encompasses having financial security and living in a suitable home in a safe and thriving community. With the right policies, environments and support, people can age well and live independent and meaningful lives."

To become an age friendly community, the strategy focuses on eight interconnecting areas outlined by the World Health Organisation (WHO):

- Outdoor spaces and buildings
- Transport
- Housing
- Participation in society
- Volunteering and employment
- Communication and information
- Community support for health and wellbeing
- Respect and social inclusion

In the first year, the focus for Buckinghamshire will be on two priorities - outdoor spaces and buildings, and participating in society. To oversee the implementation of the strategy a multiagency Age Friendly Bucks Partnership has been set up with external partners including the NHS and voluntary sector organisations. The views and ideas of residents and community groups have shaped the aims of the strategy and will continue to inform the implementation. To further support the success of the strategy Buckinghamshire Council has joined the UK Network of Age Friendly Communities which is run by the Centre for Ageing Better and affiliated to the WHO's Global Network for Age Friendly Cities and Communities. Being a member of this network provides access for a range of additional resources including good practice guidance and advice. In addition, the council has partnered locally with Age UK Buckinghamshire to ensure a local focus is maintained.

Learn how to be a Better Biker

Buckinghamshire Council is encouraging bikers of all ages and experience to enhance their riding skills with the help of a specialist course. The Be a Better Biker (BaBB) workshops are run as part of the council's Travel Safe Bucks road safety initiative, in partnership with Thames Vale Advanced Motorcyclists, Bucks Advanced Riders & Drivers, Milton Keynes Advanced Motorists, Oxford Advanced Motorcyclists and local fire and rescue services. The aim is to reduce the number of bikers killed or injured on the roads and equip motorcyclists with additional skills to keep safe. Costing just £20 per person, the workshops cover a range of advanced techniques including:

- Manoeuvring
- Overtaking
- Cornering techniques
- An on-road assessment with a qualified observer
- A review of the on-road session.

Courses are taking place across the Thames Valley region and locally at:

- Saturday 6 April Winslow Fire Station
- Saturday 20 April Chesham Fire Station
- Saturday 18 May Princes Risborough Fire Station

Now in their 15th year, the courses have helped hundreds of bikers in Buckinghamshire to improve their skills on the road. Anyone wishing to take part must hold a full and valid motorbike licence and have access to their own vehicle to use during the course. 

Pitstone crime fiction author Dave Sivers has released the seventh book in his popular series featuring Aylesbury-based detectives Lizzie Archer and Dan Baines. It brings his overall total of published titles up to twelve.


DCI Archer originally transferred to Buckinghamshire's Aylesbury Vale, hoping to rebuild her life. In *Price to Pay, it's* eleven years on, and she's happily married, her career is back on track, and she has friends she would trust with her life.

But things can change in a heartbeat. Soon after receiving unsettling threats from local criminals, an old flame makes an unwelcome return to Lizzie's life. Days later, a grisly murder too close to home plunges her into a nightmare that could cost her everything as suspicion falls on her and her husband, Dominic.

Dan and his team are sidelined from the murder investigation, but they're not going to let that stop them when a friend is in trouble. And the clock is ticking. Because, if they can't uncover the truth soon, things will get even worse for Lizzie and Dominic. *Price to Pay* came out on 28 February, and is available in paperback and kindle eBook. Crime writer Liz Mistry described it as 'Fast-paced, devious and twisty - the pages turned themselves!' Dave grew up in West London and has been writing all his life, including columns and articles in *The Bucks Herald* and The Leighton Buzzard Observer, as well as short stories in Take a Break magazine and other publications. His DI Nathan Quarrel books are set in Hertfordshire. He is a co-founder of the annual BeaconLit festival of books and writing in lvinghoe, taking place in Brookmead School on 13 July this year.

Do you need a helping hand to 'step-up' to the next level?

Pitstone Step–Up Grants are new grants available to Pitstone residents, funded from income from a local charity*. They are designed to relieve hardship, need or distress by enabling the long-term transformation of the recipient's quality of life in some way. This could be through removing barriers to enable an individual to pursue a life-improving opportunity that would otherwise have been unaffordable, or to complete some form of training or upskilling that will demonstrably improve their professional or earning potential, where funding is not available from another source.

Education Step-Up Grants

These will enable the recipient to pursue opportunities as part of their formal education that would otherwise be unaffordable. They can be used to meet costs associated with accessing any level of formal education from primary school to postgraduate or gaining professional qualifications. Grants may be considered for multiple years where applicable, but an



award of a grant in one year is not a guarantee of funding for subsequent applications. An Education Step-Up Grant may be considered for things like assistance with a bus pass if taking up a school place farther afield, cost of college equipment or providing a deposit for university rental accommodation. The maximum grant will normally be £1,500.



Career Step-Up Grants

Theses enable the recipient to undertake training or obtain specific tools or equipment in order to make a step change in their ability to pursue a particular career and enhance their earning potential. Examples of Career Step-Up Grants might include paying for someone working as a parcel delivery driver to undertake an HGV

training course, or a grant towards the cost of tools to become a self-employed plumber after completing the required qualification course. The maximum grant will normally be £2,500.

Please pull out this information and keep it in a safe place for future reference.

Life Step-Up Grants

These will cover the costs of particular activities designed to enhance life skills through specific experiences. Life Step-Up Grants could include contributions towards participation in specific experiences or schemes designed to expand the horizons and experiences of participants. The maximum grant will normally be £1,000.



Community Organisation Step-Up Grants

These will contribute towards the costs of a specific project being undertaken by any community organisation active within the parish where the work is intended to serve those in the parish facing particular barriers in life. They can be

used towards capital or revenue costs but cannot be used to cover core operating or annually recurring costs. Community Organisation Step-Up Grants are for those organisations that are tackling need, hardship or distress in the community, for example providing food or assistance. (If your group has a more general need, please apply for a Parish Council grant instead.) The maximum grant will normally be £5,000.

Helping Out Grants

Although it is anticipated that the vast majority of grants will be made within the four categories shown above, applications will be considered to assist with situations that do not fall within any of them but still meet the charity's criteria of relieving need, hardship or distress. The same requirements will exist to demonstrate a clear need and show what the



impact will be on improving the quality of life of the recipient. An example of which may include assistance towards the installation of a ramp if a resident becomes a wheelchair user. The maximum grant will normally be $\pounds1,000$.

Application Deadlines:

Grant applications will be considered four times each year. Your application needs to reach us by:

- The end of May for our June panel
- The end of August for our September panel
- The end of November for our December panel
- The end of February for our March panel



IVINGHOE AND PITSTONE WI Kay Ison

Our first meeting of 2024 was held in lvinghoe Town Hall and the theme was "A Precious Evening". The meeting was a great success as members shared items that held precious memories for them. Items included, a rain stick from Munich, a beautiful mother of pearl shell from Canada, a cut glass bowl from Australia used for Christenings, a beautiful sewing box made by a member's mother as well as medals received by a member's father who was a Metropolitan Police officer. There was also a prayer book given to a member's mother by her father and we could see the indent of her hand on the front cover showing how much the book was used and loved. The final precious item shown was a fabulous drawing of a member's mother on greaseproof paper. The mother was a nurse and one of her patients was a wounded Polish soldier who she nursed in late November 1944. He completed the beautiful drawing of the young nurse who was 17 years old at the time and signed and dated it on 25 May 1945. The member discovered the drawing after her Mother passed in 1999 rolled up in lining paper. What a fabulous discovery and memory of her as a brave young nurse working in a hospital in very hard times. Everyone agreed what an enjoyable evening it was. We all learned something new about each member and how our lives and the lives of family and friends affect and shape us and our memories. The way each member held and talked about their precious item was very moving to see and listen to.

Our February meeting in Ivinghoe Town Hall was a talk on "The Royal Flying Doctor Service in Australia" by Graham Laurie MVO. This wonderful service was introduced by the Reverend John Flynn (1880 - 1951) who was sent to the outback to look after the elderly and sick. He tried to get cottage hospitals set up in the outback because at this time the sick had no medical access unless they travelled to a big city which were days of travel away. This was developed into a flying service when Lt. Clifford Peel saw someone take a bag onto a plane in the First World War and was later told this man was a doctor. He

wrote to Rev John Flynn to suggest the idea of transporting doctors and patients by



aeroplane as a quicker means of transport over the vast territory of the outback. Alfred Treager introduced radios and aerials for communication and both H. V. McKay and H. Fysh worked with him to form the Aerial Medical Service in 1928 based in Queensland. In 1934 the service expanded into the Australian Aerial Medical Service covering the whole of Australia and in 1942 the name changed to the Flying Doctor Service. The service caught the imagination of the world and was captured in the 1950s with a BBC radio show and later a television series from 1986-1991. The talk was very informative and interesting and the members enjoyed learning about this vital service which is still needed and used today.

Our WI met up in lvinghoe Town Hall for our last meeting of our financial year in March. The meeting was well attended and after the business side of the meeting was completed we continued with our Annual General Meeting. We said goodbye to 2 of our Committee members, Eilish and Betty. We were very sorry to see them leave as they worked hard over the year to ensure the success of the WI and its fundraising efforts. We also had one new addition to our Committee and we welcomed Elspeth. Our teller was Jenny, a BFWI trustee from Aylesbury and as the number of Committee members were below the recommended number Jenny asked if members were willing to vote them in en masse. There was an overwhelming majority and 6 original Committee members and one new Committee member were voted in. Next followed members' secret nominations for President. Whilst Jenny went through these the Treasurer, Eilish, went through our Financial statement. The statement showed a healthy bank balance due to fundraising. Eilish explained how important it is to have a year's

money in the bank to ensure the WI's survival. Sue then gave the Secretary's report for the year. It has been a busy year with some good speakers and several fundraising activities. The final report was given by our President Annette who emphasised the age of our WI and the expanding nature of our group from one meeting a month to the development of our interest groups whereby members can see each other a lot more than once a month. Annette thanked Committee members for all their support and commitment over the past year. Protecting our Roots – Engagement Event

The 'Protecting Our Roots' project team is holding a second public engagement event to share more about the transformational vision to protect Ashridge Estate for the future. Come along to see more details of their plans and speak to the project team. The event will take place on Saturday 25th and Sunday 26th May between 11am and 4pm on Meadley's Meadow (behind the Visitor Centre, HP4 1LT).



Monumental Task

It's not only Ashridge's nature that needs protection. The Bridgewater Monument has stood proud and tall (33 metres to be precise) since 1832 when it was erected to commemorate the achievements of the so-called 'Canal Duke', Francis Egerton, 3rd Duke of Bridgewater (1736– 1803). The view from the top makes the ascent of its 172 steps well worth the effort, and thousands of visitors climb them each year. On a good day, you can see the Shard.

The National Trust has the responsibility and privilege of looking after this Grade II listed granite column, and it is now in need of attention

inside and out. Internally, repairs are needed to the stairs and the face of the granite, and it could do with a jolly good clean. Externally, biological growth needs removing, the stonework needs cleaning and repointing using a traditional lime-based mortar. Exposed iron cramps need treating or replacing. It is hoped that work will start in July and, once it does, the Monument will be closed for the rest of the year. In the meantime, it's safe and open most weekends and holidays when the weather is good, so make the most of it while you can.

Mobility Vehicles

At Ashridge Estate, we offer a wonderful service for those with limited mobility which is completely volunteer led. We have several powered, self-drive mobility vehicles to use on our accessible routes. There are single-seater, two-seater and four-seater vehicles to choose from, all of which are easy to book and straightforward to use. 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
