

We have recently been advised that our grant application to the Community Board for funding towards new equipment to support the Repair Café has been successful and we are now in the process of buying the items.

We are currently delighted to be working with PRS Office Furniture who are donating a suicide prevention bench made by Legend on the Bench for the Recreation Ground. Every bench displays quick access to information at any time of the day or night for anyone experiencing mental health issues.

Their vision is to combat mental health issues and prevent suicides by providing accessible resources and support to individuals in need. They believe that there should be no stigma attached to mental health challenges, and aim to create a safe environment where people can research and obtain vital contact information for themselves or

someone they care about. The QR code on the bench will direct users to a comprehensive reference list of professional support groups, complete with contact numbers,

Congratulations to Avril Davies. Volunteer of the Year 2025

We would like to congratulate Avril Davies, who was awarded Pitstone Volunteer of the Year 2025 at the Annual Assembly on 29 May 2025 in recognition of very many years of voluntary support to our village in numerous capacities including that of County Councillor.



The award recognised Avril's enormous contribution to the village, spanning many years in various capacities, but in particular Avril's contribution to the establishment and ongoing support of the Beacon Villages Community Library and its associated projects such as the BeaconLit Festival which raises funds for the Library.

The Chairman presented Avril with a framed certificate, card and £50.

The Parish Council runs the Volunteer of the Year scheme to celebrate the unsung heroes within our community. If you know someone who goes that extra mile and provides an outstanding voluntary service to the residents of Pitstone, please submit your nominations to the parish clerk (parishclerk@pitstone.co.uk) so that they can be taken into consideration for the 2026 award.

Annual Assembly

This is not a formal Parish Council meeting, but it is organized by Parish Councils and the Council Chairman must chair it if they are present. The Assembly is an opportunity for residents to hear from a number of local groups, charities and

tiers of the council, about activity that have taken place over the last 12 months and plans that may be in place for the upcoming year.

This year, the Assembly took place on Thursday 29 May 2025 and featured a guest speaker from Trading Standards who provided advice on how to protect yourself from scams — this is the fastest growing form of crime at the moment and all age groups are susceptible — please do visit pitstone.co.uk for further advice on how to protect yourself.

Attendees also had training in how to use a public access defibrillator and heard from Thames Valley Police, Rev James Grainger-Smith, Buckinghamshire Council, Pitstone Town Lands Charity, The Williamson Trust, Pitstone Recreation Ground Charity, Pitstone Parish Charity/Step-Up Grants and the Parish Council.

Audit for Year Ending 2024-25

Our end-of-year audit has currently passed through two layers of audit and has now been submitted to PKF Littlejohn, who are the external auditors appointed to us, for the final 'external audit'. The first layer is undertaken by members of the Parish Council and its staff. The second layer is an 'internal audit' undertaken by independent experts appointed by the Parish Council - in our case, this is IAC Ltd. Finally, the accounts and supporting documents are submitted to an external auditor appointed to the Parish Council. As our income/expenditure exceeded £200k this year, the council will be subject to an intermediate-level review. Only following the third layer of audit, are the accounts declared 'audited'. All the information available so far can be found on our website.

Replacement Slide for Windsor Road

Quotations are currently being obtained for the replacement of the slide, and we will update you as soon as possible on the outcome.

Improvements at the Pavilion

Pitstone & Ivinghoe United Football Club have funded the installation of footpaths adjacent to the

senior football pitch at the Pavilion to improve accessibility and amenities for spectators, and installed a hard standing disabled viewing area.

Ivinghoe & Pitstone Safety Scheme

Buckinghamshire Council has confirmed that it has the capacity to investigate and deliver the next phase of implementation for the Safety Scheme during 2025-26. These works will focus on the area between Westfield Road and the roundabout, and are being funded by Section 106 funds paid by Nicholas King Homes to Buckinghamshire Council that can only be spent on delivery of this scheme. Once we have up-to-date proposals from them, we will share them with you.

<u>Planning Application Consultation changes</u> to the Buckinghamshire Council's Online <u>Planning Portal</u>

Buckinghamshire Council, our Local Planning Authority, have taken the decision (along with many other councils) not to publish comments submitted by members of the public on their online planning portal. You will still be able to view comments submitted by statutory consultees such as the Parish Council or Highways.

Buckinghamshire Council will still consider and take appropriate account of comments submitted by members of the public. As they are the Local Planning Authority, and responsible for determining the application, it is vital that you submit any views directly to them.

The change does however mean that the Parish Council no longer has visibility of any comments residents submit to the Local Planning Authority. It is therefore even more important than before, that if you wish the Parish Council to take your views into consideration when undertaking its own deliberations, that you supply a copy of the comments you submitted to Buckinghamshire Council, to the Parish Council ahead of the appropriate meeting where the application is being discussed.

The precept (collected via your Council Tax) for 2024/25 was £119.28 for the year for an average Band D property, which equates to £2.29 per week per home.

The Parish Council is financially secure with no loans or debts. The majority of our capital projects progress with a high level of external grant funding, thus the rise and fall in receipts corresponds with the rise and fall in capital projects being undertaken.

Our accounts are subject to three layers of audit each year. The first is carried out by council members. The second is conducted by an 'internal auditor' appointed by the Parish Council – IAC Ltd. The Parish council and the internal auditor's findings are then submitted to an 'external auditor' appointed to us, in our case PKF Littlejohn. Members of the public can view all audit reports on our website. This report provides a more descriptive narrative, rather than purely financial.

There were three large receipts during the financial year:

- Bellway Homes paid the Parish Council a one-off Section 106 payment of £32,640 to transfer the Tun Furlong play space to our ongoing care and ownership. These funds can only be utilised for this purpose and will be called down over the upcoming years as necessary.
- Croudace paid a fee of £30,600 to transfer seventeen street light columns within the Williamson Way development to our ongoing care and ownership. A further fee of £3,600 for an additional two columns is due this financial year. These funds can only be utilised for this purpose and will be called down over the upcoming years as necessary.
- Safran Electrical and Power sponsored the installation of the bus shelter outside their premises on Westfield Road, passing £6,240 of funding to the Parish Council. The other two shelters were funded by the Parish Council utilising funds accrued over a





number of years for this purpose. The Parish Council will meet all ongoing liabilities for the care and maintenance of all three shelters.

We also saw an uplift in income from the hire of the Pavilion facilities and Pitstone Parish Post advertising income. The previous year had seen a receipt of £23,510 in S106 funds released by Buckinghamshire Council towards the double lane cricket practice nets and a grant of £2,500 from the Community Board towards the information panels at the Local Wildlife Site. The underlying difference between the two financial years is approximately £1,600/5%.

Other purchases during the year included three extra silent soldiers and some sporting and musical equipment for the Youth Café, both of which are being funded by grants from the Community Board but the associated grant payment will not be received until 2025/26.







We worked with Colbree and Little Rothschild Surgery to provide two additional public access defibrillators, both of which were 50% funded by London Hearts on behalf of the central government scheme.





Three benches were installed on the Recreation Ground – two were replacements for old stock and one was a new memorial bench which was partly funded by the Mitra family. This is part of an ongoing project to upgrade the seating at this location and further replacements will follow over a number of years. A white lining machine was purchased to enable the pitch markings at the Pavilion and Recreation Ground, some IT equipment was upgraded, a new dog bin installed in Crispin Field, two litter bins replaced on the Recreation Ground and four additional tables purchased for the Pavilion function room.

Our thanks also go to the P&I Junior Football Club for the donation of new portable

junior goals for the Pavilion site, that they obtained via grant funding.

The Parish Council runs a grant scheme to support local community and charitable groups that provide services that benefit Pitstone residents. During the year funding was provided to 1st Ivinghoe and Pitstone Scouts, Pitstone Memorial Hall Charity and Toy Hub.

The normal council operations continue, and these receive no external grants, so are funded via the precept (or partially offset via income generated from hire of our facilities or advertising in our magazine). This includes maintaining streetlights, Christmas illuminations, litter picking, emptying dog & litter bins, maintaining play equipment and open spaces, producing Pitstone Parish Post, running the Volunteer of the Year Scheme, running the Youth Café and Community Car Schemes, operating our two MVAS units, running the allotment site, maintaining parish assets, and maintaining the Pavilion and football pitches.

Devolved Services

The Parish Council undertakes some right-of-way maintenance, grass verge cutting and siding out on behalf of Buckinghamshire Council (BC) under powers they have devolved to us for these purposes. They pay a contribution of £3,988 towards the delivery of these services, which cost the parish £8,085 to deliver. However, it does mean that our grass can be cut more frequently (Bucks would now only provide three grass cuts in towns and villages over the course of the year), works can be carried out more efficiently, and we have more control over delivery of these services. Buckinghamshire Council has now offered us a further four-year devolved service contract to continue delivering these services on their behalf.

Ongoing Projects by Other Bodies/Tiers of Government

Hertfordshire County Council continues to work with the Canal & River Trust and Buckinghamshire Council to deliver improvements to the Marshcroft Lane/canal cycle route towards Tring station. All roadside options tested failed the required safety audits so a direct straight-line cycle/pedestrian route along Northfield Road was deemed unviable.

Buckinghamshire Council continues to work with developers (Taylor Wimpey, Croudace, Nicholas King Homes and Bellway) to fulfil their highway and leisure obligations including the issues surrounding the multi-use games area.

The Chiltern's Beechwoods in Ashridge were designated a Special Area of Conservation (SAC) as they are of European importance. This gives rise to mitigation measures that must be put in place to protect them from over-use. Local Planning Authorities are working to establish what these mitigation measures may look like, and as Bucks Council does not yet have approved mitigation in place, this means that no planning applications for new residential dwellings have been granted. Once the situation has been resolved it is anticipated that a number of applications that are currently on hold will then be determined by the Planning Authority.

BUCKS COUNTY NEWS Councillors Chris Poll and Peter

Councillors Chris Poll and Peter Brazier

The new Council term is taking shape. Cabinet has had its first formal meeting and other scrutiny meetings are due within the next week or so, although the first planning hearing has been cancelled due to lack of business to discuss.

The new Community Boards have been constituted, and for us will be known as the Fast Bucks Area. This will encompass the Electoral Wards of Ivinghoe - Bierton, Kingsbrook and Wing - Wendover, Halton and Stoke Mandeville - Aston Clinton and Weston Turville. I am delighted to have been appointed as Chairman with Julie Ward as my deputy. Michelle Parker will remain as the Board Manager. The Boards will have a very different look and feel this year as there will be more focus on engagement by the managers and Chairman and fewer meetings. Work will start immediately with a proposed first meeting in September. Communities will be asked to set their own priorities and I envisage much more collaborative working between the many and varied parishes which make up our Board Area.

Buckinghamshire Council's Cabinet holds first meeting

Buckinghamshire Council's new Cabinet has held its first meeting (Tue 17 June), during which the Council's overall performance and stable budget position were reflected on.

A number of key reports were discussed and considered by the new Cabinet, including the Council's Annual Report and a summary of its financial performance during the 2024/25 financial year.



The Cabinet recognised the excellent level of achievement and firm foundations the new Council has inherited following the May elections, and paid tribute to the work of the previous administration.

Council Leader Steven Broadbent highlighted a number of achievements in the Annual Report, which covers the full range of services and projects delivered under **Buckinghamshire Council's four core** priorities:

- Strengthening our communities
- Protecting the vulnerable
- Improving our environment
- Increasing prosperity

The Annual Report is an update on the over-arching Corporate Plan which acts as a golden thread for all the work and services that the Council delivers to improve lives and have a positive impact on Buckinghamshire and its people.

The Cabinet also considered the '2024/25 Budget outturn' report which documents the significant achievement in balancing last year's budget against a context of considerable pressure and volatility. While portfolio budgets were overspent by £6.5m, primarily from Children's Social Care, Home to School Transport and a smaller than forecast income from parking services, these were offset by overall savings made across the Council's spending.

Overall, the council successfully delivered £147.1 million of investment during 2024/25 on capital schemes, progressing major projects such as the South East Aylesbury Link Road and key town centre improvements that include the upgrade of White Hart Street in Wycombe and the creation of the new 'Pavilion Quarter' in Aylesbury Town Centre.

Join our Self Defence Classes across Buckinghamshire

Across Buckinghamshire we have been running FREE self defence classes, supported by local Community Boards.

These classes, delivered by Bucks Pro-Mai, have been designed to empower ladies (12+ - under 16's to be accompanied by an adult) with the understanding of how to preempt any potential situations through predefence and to learn the skills of how to defend themselves if a situation does arise.

What to expect on the day:

- Pre-defence: how to recognise and avoid potential situations, running through body language and simple skills
- Practical Skills: master basic selfdefence techniques.
- Q&A with trained Bucks Pro-Mai instructors.
- Advice & Support: attendees will be provided with crime prevention leaflets and products.
- Evaluation: to help assess the class you will be asked to complete a short evaluation at the end of the session.





A WWII SOLDIER'S STORY

This article was kindly written by the curator of Tring Museum, Brook Street, Tring., and provided by Richard Roberts-Collins, son of Leonard Charles Collins.

With the 80th Anniversary of VE Day, it is appropriate to relate this story of one of many sons of Tring who served their country willingly and bravely during WWII – and happily survived.

Leonard Charles Collins was born on the 3rd March 1919 at 20 Henry Street, Tring. He was the youngest of Walter and Alice Collins' eight children. Leonard was a pupil at both Gravelly and Tring High Street Schools. By 1936 he was employed at John Dickinson, Paper Mill in Apsley. At the time young employees were encouraged to join the Territorial Army from which you would receive a one-off payment of £5 plus one week off each year to attend training. It was because of this that, when WW11 broke out, Leonard enlisted in the 1st Battalion Middlesex Regiment, Inglis Barracks, NW London.



At just 20 years of age, Leonard's regiment was part of the British Expeditionary Force in France experiencing intense action from the rapid German advance. Leonard soon found himself promoted to Lance Corporal and Machine Gunner of 'C' Company when on the 15th of May 1940, 'C' company engaged with the

enemy and destroyed two heavy German machine gun units, enabling the infantry to regroup.

However, as we know, the Expeditionary Force

was overwhelmed by the German advance and were forced to retreat to the Dunkirk beaches and await embarkation to England. Leonard made it back to England on the 13th of June 1940 arriving, "barefooted" at Tring station. This was apparently not uncommon when one considers the soldiers having to wade out to the rescuing boats. He immediately returned to his regiment in Kent, where they remained until 1942 on full alert preparing for the expected German invasion.

Whilst on duty the soldiers would frequent the local dance at the "The Welcome Stranger" pub in Lympne. It was there that Leonard met Leading Aircraftwoman, Woman's Auxiliary Air Force, Renée Hornby-Burgess, who was on leave from Tangmere



Aerodrome while visiting her parents. (Renée's father had served in France during WWI. He liked the name, Renée because it translates to 'Born Again').

They married on the 27th of June 1942 at St Peter and St Paul's Church in Tring. This was understood to be the first full military wedding at the Parish Church since the outbreak of war. After the wedding, Leonard returned to duty where he was then on continuous active service throughout the

rest of the war travelling through, North Africa, Sicily, Egypt, Italy and finally Austria.

On returning to Tring, after being discharged in 1946, he and Renée moved into 26 Henry Street, Tring. Many of the properties on Henry Street were owned by the Co-Op Society. They were reasonably maintained having two ground-floor rooms and two first floor bedrooms. However, the facilities, serving two or more families, comprised of an outside shared WC and washhouse with a metal bath hanging on the outside wall. The kitchen had a coal/wood burning stove and a single cold water tap.

He returned to work at his pre-war employer, John Dickinsons, who held his position open for him as they did for all their serving employees. In January 1959 Leonard was offered a job in the Transport Office of Tunnel Cement in Pitstone where he remained until he died quite suddenly from a heart attack in December 1968. This was

only one week after attending the annual Middlesex Regiment Reunion in Kensington, London. He was just 49 years old.

Leonard's funeral took place with full military honours at Tring's, St Peter and St Paul's Church the following January 1969. His son Richard Collins has kindly provided us with his story, these images and we currently have the pleasure of exhibiting Leonard's medals at the museum, which we encourage you to visit.



ASHRIDGE RAMBLINGS

FANCY A LONG ONE?

Readers are doubtless aware that the Ashridge Estate is a walker's paradise, with hundreds of miles of beautiful tracks on offer, some as marked trails, some freelance. But did you know about the Boundary Trail? And even if you did, were you aware that it's gotten a little longer?

The Boundary Trail was instigated before Pitstone Hill and Aldbury Nowers were



owned by the National Trust. These are two beautiful areas of Ashridge, and a few years ago it was decided to incorporate them into the Boundary Trail. This necessitated a major redesign of part of the trail and, whilst about it, a few other tweaks were made. The signage is now in place and maps with brief route descriptions can be found by searching 'Ashridge Boundary Trail North' or 'Ashridge Boundary Trail South'.

The North Section is 9 miles (14.4 km) long and the South Section 10.5 miles (16.8 km). Joining the two together and missing out the link between them gives a trail of 17.5 miles (28 km). The website gives advice and describes clockwise routes starting and finishing at the Visitor Centre, but you can, of course, start and finish anywhere you like and go round in either direction.



If you go for it, please let me know if you find any aspects of the website description confusing or any signage missing or tampered with.
